The county has allocated part of its revenue sharing money for purchase of the new fire truck.
Specifications call for the brand-new vehicle to be a white Chevrolet, Ford or GMC 4x4 with a minimum wheel base of 130 inches, heavy-duty V-8 engine (minimum displacement 345 cubic inches) and manual transmission.
At press time yesterday Lockney's mayor Claude Brown said there would be a city council meeting today to determine if Lockney will take a fire truck or similar amount

of money from the county commissioners.

Rev. James Tidwell New Floydada Methodist Pastor

Rev. James Tidwell will be moving his family to Floydada June 13 to assume the pastorate of the First United Methodist Church. He is coming here from Perryton.
His appointment was made official today at the Methodist Conference in Abilene.
Rev. C. B. Melton will be conducting services here Sunday, and he will move to Muleshoe June 13. The Muleshoe pastor, Rev. J. B. Fowler, will be moving to Perryton.
Lockney also gets a new pastor as their pastor moves to Tahoka, and Rev. Hugh Daniel of Tahoka moves to Lockney.
Rev. Tidwell has compiled an outstanding record in Perryton, covering many areas of civic endeavor, during his eight years as pastor of the First United Methodist Church.
During the eight years of his Perryton ministry, he has seen

the church grow from 953 to 1,078 members and the budget has increased from \$50,000 to \$88,000 annually.
He has established a reputation as a "cooker of steaks", and has cooked approximately 10,000 steaks for Methodist Men, Chamber of Commerce banquets, YMCA benefits and other community events during these years.

A man of many interests, Rev. Tidwell joined the Perryton Volunteer Fire department when he arrived and has served as president of the department. He has answered 585 fire calls during his tenure in Perryton, or 90 percent of all fires reported. He was honored by the fire department at a testimonial dinner recently in appreciation of these services.

He is an amateur radio operator and as such has performed many services for citizens of the Perryton community. One such service is the setting up of an overseas radio conversation each Friday night for the families of Rev. and Mrs. Jerry Key, Baptist missionaries to Brazil. Rev. Key's mother, Mrs. S. D. Key, and Mrs. Jerry Key's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Johnson, both live in Perryton and have enjoyed weekly conversations with their families through the services of Rev. Tidwell.

Mobile Home Gutted By Fire

A 12 x 65-foot mobile home was heavily damaged by fire at the West Side Trailer Park, 1010 Tree Street in Floydada, Tuesday afternoon.
Three units of the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department answered the fire call at 12:55 p.m. Tuesday.
The residents, Mr. and Mrs. Frankie Buckner, were not at home when the fire was reported, and no one was injured. Firemen said the mobile home and contents were probably "a total loss." A fire department spokesman said Tuesday the cause of the fire was unknown. The blaze reportedly started in a bedroom, near a clothes dryer.
The mobile home and some of the furnishings were the property of Mrs. Ruth Evans, owner of the trailer park. Mrs. Evans said the mobile home was insured but the contents were not.
Joe Billegas, a resident of the trailer park, discovered the fire and notified Mrs. Evans. Mrs. Riley Teague, who lives near the trailer park, was the first to report the fire to the fire department.
Property was estimated at over \$5,000.
Mrs. Evans expressed thanks, especially to the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department, who arrived quickly at the scene, and to the people who helped notify her and the fire-fighters of the blaze.

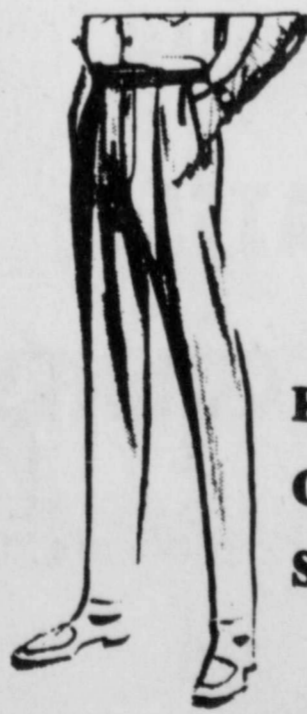

Joint funeral rites for a Floydada couple, Maurice Eldon Noblin, 50, and his wife, Rose Lee Noblin, 35, who were killed Saturday afternoon about 3:10 in a one-vehicle crash north of Tulia, were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church in Floydada. Dr. Floyd C. Bradley, pastor, officiated. A second service for the couple has been scheduled for today (Thursday) in the First Baptist Church in Ellisville, Mo. Burial will be in Laurel Hills Memorial Garden in Pagedale, Mo. Local arrange-

ments were conducted by Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

A "Love Fund" for the two Noblin children, injured in the wreck, has been started at First National Bank in Floydada. Contributions may be mailed or deposited at the bank.

Mrs. Noblin, driver of the 1973 van, was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital and her husband died about an hour later in Northwest Texas Hospital where the couple and a son, Craig Eldon, 7, were taken by ambulance. The ten month old son, Michael Eugene, was treated at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia and released. He was taken to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview by friends Saturday night where he was admitted and continuing treatment for a slight concussion. Craig is under treatment for broken bones and internal injuries but is reported to be in a stable condition. It is thought he will have to remain hospitalized for at least a month.

The Noblin family, one of many Floydada United Transport families in the process of moving to Amarillo, were enroute to that city with household items at the time of the accident. Several other families of United Transport came upon the accident scene some three and a half miles north of Tulia.

Department of Public Safety Officer, Claudie Hinkle said the Noblins' vehicle was northbound on U.S. 87, traveling in the outside lane when the van apparently veered across the inside lane, into the center median and hit a large tree.

Noblin was a native of Salem, Mo., born Feb. 7, 1923. He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the U.S. Navy and had been employed by United Transport since November 13, 1952. Noblin moved to Floydada with the transfer of the company here and returned to Missouri when he and the former Rose Lee Bolin were married December 8, 1962. The couple had resided in Floydada since that time.

Mrs. Noblin was born in Arbyrd, Mo., May 20, 1938. She was an active member of the First Baptist Church where she was a member of the Adult I Sunday School class.

She is survived by her two sons, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Bolin of Pacific, Mo.; a sister, Mrs. Jane Wood of Melville, Mo., and her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Nora Bolin of Senath, Mo.

Social Security Income For Delayed Retirement

A worker who doesn't get any social security benefits before he's 65 and delays his retirement past that age will be eligible for higher payments when he retires, according to social security officials here. Benefits increase 1/12 of 1 percent for each month—or 1 percent for each year—after 1970 if the worker doesn't get social security benefits between age 65 and 72 because of his earnings.

"This higher benefit can be paid to retired workers under a new provision of the social security law," a spokesman said. "It doesn't affect social security payments to their families."

The new provision will mean additional benefits to some workers already get-

ting social security payments. "It is on the right higher past that age will be eligible for higher payments when he retires, according to social security officials here. Benefits increase 1/12 of 1 percent for each month—or 1 percent for each year—after 1970 if the worker doesn't get social security benefits between age 65 and 72 because of his earnings. 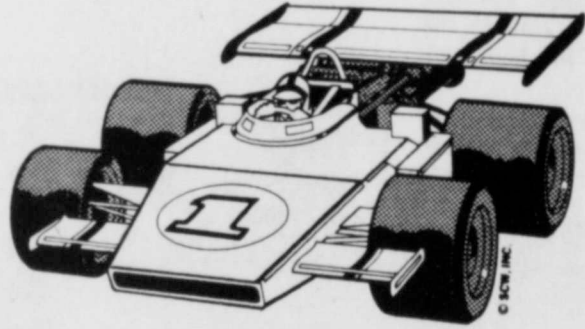

ORDER FOR ELECTION FOR CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICT AND THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF FLOYD

WHEREAS, under the provisions of S.B. No. 483, Acts of the 63rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, provision is made for an election to be held within the area of the proposed Lockney General Hospital District upon the question of whether the Lockney General Hospital District shall be created and established with authority to levy annual taxes, and whether said District (in the event same is created) shall be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose hereinafter set forth, and in accordance with said law, it has been and is hereby determined that such election should be ordered; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE TEMPORARY BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE LOCKNEY GENERAL HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 7th day of July, 1973, which date is not less than thirty-five (35) days from the date of the passage of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of the area of the proposed Lockney General Hospital District, including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"SHALL the Lockney General Hospital District (with boundaries being all that territory situated in Floyd County, Texas, which is not within the Caprock Hospital District as created) be created and established with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such District subject to hospital district taxation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's indebtedness and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the Board of Directors of the Lockney General Hospital District (in the event the District is created) be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of ONE HUNDRED TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$110,000) for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair, or same for hospital purposes, and for any or all of such purposes, and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually ad

valorem taxes on all taxable property in the Hospital District taxation, sufficient to pay interest on said bonds as the same become due, together with all other taxes of the District in any one year the rate of 75 cents on each \$100 valuation to be issued in one or more series serially or otherwise not more than FORTY date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as the Board of Directors shall determine?"

SECTION 2: That the official ballots for prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" propositions which shall be set forth in the following form:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"THE CREATION OF LOCKNEY GENERAL HOSPITAL DISTRICT WITH THE AUTHORITY TO LEASE TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON EACH \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY SITUATED IN SAID DISTRICT, SUBJECT TO HOSPITAL DISTRICT TAXATION FOR ALL HOSPITAL DISTRICT PURPOSES."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"THE ISSUANCE OF \$110,000 BONDS."

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be printed on the left of each of the propositions, and each elector shall place an "X" beside the statement indicating the way he votes.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the City of Lockney, Texas, and the precinct one election precinct for said election.

SECTION 4: That the following named persons be appointed officers of the election: C.L. MOONEY, PRESIDENT; J.D. COPELAND, ALTERNATE PRESIDENT.

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than five qualified clerks to serve and assist in the election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as clerk.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. MRS. ERMA LEE DUCKWORTH is hereby designated Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and City of Lockney, Texas, is hereby designated as the place where absentee voting shall be conducted for the period absentee voting is permitted by law. Designated for absentee voting shall be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official holidays.

SECTION 5: Said election shall be held under the provisions of Article IX, Section 9 of the Constitution of Texas, and the provisions of Sections 483, Acts of the 63rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, and any other laws, rules, regulations, orders, resolutions, and statutory provisions shall be held in conflict with the provisions of the State regulating elections.

SECTION 6: All resident qualified electors of the proposed District, including those who own taxable property in the proposed District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box only resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified electors) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each box shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as to reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation and the votes cast by all qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

SECTION 7: A substantial copy of this order, together with proper notice of said election, and said notice shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the District once a week for two consecutive weeks, and a copy of this publication to appear at least 30 days prior to the date established for the said election.

Overhauling of local tax evaluations to give an equal percentage on the present market value of property is favored by 75.9%.

Nearly 78% believe in spending more for crime prevention and prosecution, but only 49.6% want to spend more for criminal rehabilitation programs.

Responders did not approve of local option elections on horse racing and pari-mutuel betting, with 48.8% against and 42.8% for.

Requiring proof of financial responsibility for every driver or owner of an automobile in Texas before being allowed to drive on public highways is favored by 68.6% against 25.2%.

If additional revenue is absolutely required by the state, the responders voted

56% for sales tax increase; 25.4% for state corporate income tax; 14.3% for uniform property tax increase, and 13.3% for state personal income tax.

A big 62.7% wanted to retain the present penalties for possession of marijuana. Voting for decriminalization were 20.4%; for legalization, 4.9% and 12% had no opinion.

On insurance rate reform, 49.1% voted for competitive rates; 34.4% for no fault auto rates; 13.1% for retention of the present system; and 3.3% had no opinion.

Stephenson Dogs Travel Circus Circuit In Air Conditioned Trucks

As you enjoy the madcap antics of Ireland's world-famous Stephenson Dogs in the all-new 102nd Edition of Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, stop for a minute and ponder this question:

How do you transport 39 dogs, two ponies, 5 performers and three assistants across the length and breadth of the continent to the dozens of cities which The Greatest Show on Earth visits each year?

It's no easy bit of logistics but you can be sure that when

Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey arrives at The Lubbock Municipal Coliseum on Friday, June 15 for performances through Sunday, June 17, the Stephenson dogs and their animals will be very much in evidence.

The Stephenson entourage includes an air conditioned truck for the dogs, a trailer for the ponies, three spacious silver trailers for people, another truck and two cars — and a speedboat! (Frank and his younger brother, Billy, are avid water ski buffs.)

Once the caravan arrives at the arena in which The

Greatest Show on Earth is scheduled, the dogs are taken from the truck and placed in large pens. This gives the animals more room to exercise and is a welcome relief from the confinement of a long trip.

The Stephenson choose their animals — all males — after they are about a year old. By then the dog's intelligence is evident and the family can pick a lightweight but not feather-brained pup.

"Poodles are the smartest," says Frank, with a trace of his native Ireland slipping into his speech. "They can learn a trick the easiest and do it the quickest, too."

Billy Stephenson, who supervises all of the family's training sessions, says he never spans a dog to punish it. "You've got to make a dog enjoy doing his work, especially in the circus," he says. "Otherwise he'll cower in the ring, expecting to be smacked if he does something wrong."

The Stephenson dogs seldom goof. Once, they recall, a pup that had been trained to climb a high ladder and then jump into a net, got all the way to the top, decided "Not this kid," and tried to back down.

"We had to pull the ladder down," smiled Frank, "because the crazy dog couldn't get down himself."

Three older dogs, old-timers named Finnigan, Nickie and Peter, still travel with the family. They act as "senior advisors" but haven't been in the ring for seven years. When the act's music begins, the family has a hard time keeping the trio backstage.

In-the-ring signals to the dogs are kept simple. The

Stephensons use only "no" to stop a dog and "right" to tell him that the trick is over. Frank says they never use hard signals because the act is too fast-paced and the dogs could get confused.

The Stephenson and all of their animals are quite a group. Audiences of Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus immediately understand what Frank means when he says, "The dogs have fun, and sure, so do we."

WW II Internees Can Get Social Security Credit

United States citizens of Japanese ancestry who were interned by the United States Government during World War II may get additional social security wage credits, according to social security officials here.

"People who think they may qualify for these additional credits should contact any social security office as soon as possible," a spokesman said.

These credits are given for the time a worker was interned if he was then a United States citizen and was 18 or over. The period covered is from December 7, 1941, through December 31, 1946.

"These credits count toward retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare coverage for United States

citizens of Japanese ancestry who were unable to work and earn social security credits because of their internment," the spokesman said.

More information is available at any social security office, he said.

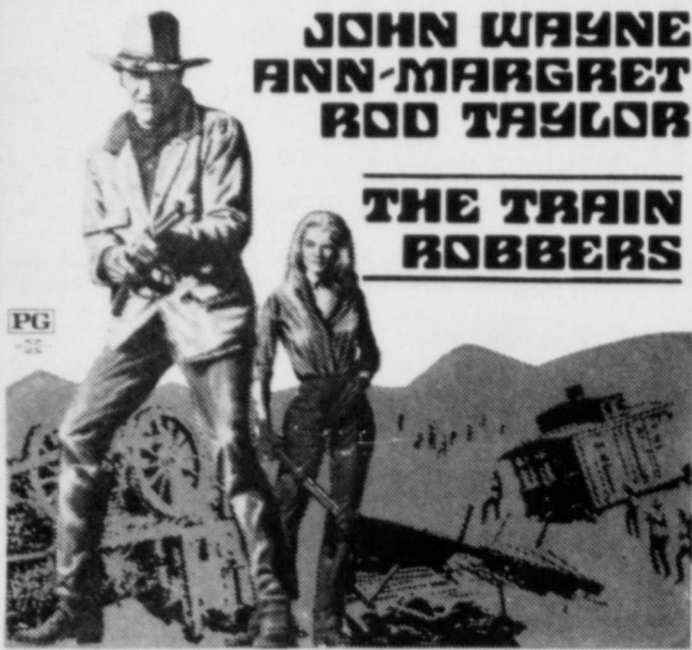
Store Front Modernization Is First

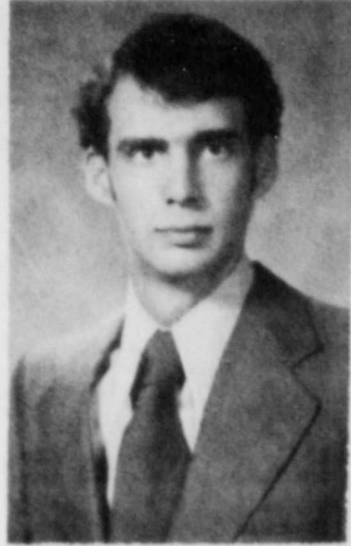

High-Load Accidents Down

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Department today reported a marked improvement in the number of accidents involving high loads on trucks and highway structures throughout the State.

Several months ago Highway Department engineers expressed deep concern about the number of bridges and overpasses being struck by vehicles bearing loads exceeding maximum limits.

Earlier estimates of damages to structures was running thousands of dollars a year in only a few of the more heavily populated Highway Department Districts.

A recent check of the Houston, Fort Worth, Dallas and San Antonio Districts indicated that the number of high load accidents have decreased sharply in the last few months.

Dallas District reported that a truck bearing an industrial tank struck a frontage road overpass in early May. Damage was estimated at \$12.5 thousand, for which the owner of the truck is liable.

San Antonio reported one recent accident, but a full assessment of damage had not been made at time of the report.

Truckers planning to carry loads of more than 13 feet 6 inches are expected to obtain an overheight permit, which describes a route over which the vehicle may travel without damaging overhead structures.

It is the truckers' responsibility to be certain that his vehicle can pass safely under all overhead structures.

on his route. Many truckers — particularly those hauling construction equipment or tanks — do not obtain permits because they believe their loads do not violate the overheight load limits.

However, the boom of a dragline may bounce vertically 18 inches to two feet or more when traveling at highway speeds. The bouncing boom may clear the initial beams of an overhead structure and then catch on subsequent beams at the peak of the vertical movement.

Although recent accident experience has been favorable, Highway Department engineers urged truckers throughout the state to continue to use extreme caution when carrying loads which might damage overhead structures.
