## Burl Huckabee To Retire June 30 From Floydada Postal Route

With 405 days sick leave to his credit out of 36 years and 11 months working time, Burl Huckabee, rural carrier for Route 3, Floydada, will retire June 30. Huckabee has used only two days of his sick leave from the near "40 years" he has been with the Post Office. This time unused will be added to his retirement. He is also credited with driving over a half a million miles of his 19 years and eight months as carrier, with no accidents.

A native of Mitchell County, Texas, Huckabee moved to Floyd County from Memphis, Tex., January 1, 1917. He and the former Doris Spence were married here in October of 1929. He began working with the Postal Service as a carrier in August of 1936 for 65 cents per hour. At that time the late Mrs. Lon V. Smith was postmistress. Huckabee said when he started with the local post office there were two morning mail runs, one coming in by Santa Fe and the other around 11 a.m. by QA&P, which required two city deliveries per day.

Huckabee said he and Lorin Leibfried, who recently retired from the Postal Service in Floydada, walked several miles in those days. Huckabee was city carrier for 15 years and eight months and recalls

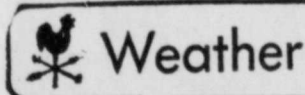

## City Council Agrees To Caution Lights At One Intersection

After receiving petitions from several farmers and farm type business firms the Floydada city council held a called meeting and decided to change the four-way stop light at Main and Missouri Streets in downtown Floydada.

It has been changed from a four way stop light to caution for the east-west traffic. Stop lights remain for north-south traffic.

Although the petitions also asked for caution lights at the Missouri and Wall intersection, the council decided to keep a four-way stop light at that intersection.

"We must stay with our effort to slow traffic down on Missouri Street in downtown Floydada, but we feel that making this change, we will not slow the farmer down to two stops as he originally had it planned," mayor Parnell Powell told the Hesperian Tuesday.

"Our only aim in putting up the stop lights in the first place is to stop the continuous

accidents at these two intersections on Missouri Street, and we feel the only way to do this is to slow the traffic with at least one stop light," the mayor continued.

## USDA Schedules Grocer Meeting

A meeting to discuss the Food Stamp Program with Floyd County grocers will be conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on Friday, June 22. The program will open in Floyd County on August 1.

The meeting is set for 7:30 p.m. in the conference room of the Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc. at 201 West California Street in Floydada, according to Ellis P. Schmid, food program specialist with the Lubbock field office of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint grocers with food stamp program operations and responsibilities. "Store owners and employees must understand Food Stamp Program operating procedures before a store can be certified," Schmid pointed out, "so it is most important that county grocers attend the meeting."

The Food Stamp Program is a cooperative effort involving the State Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Under this program, families certified as eligible by the welfare office can buy USDA food coupons which are used like cash at retail stores authorized by USDA to

redeem the coupons. In addition to the coupons they buy, needy families are given "bonus" coupons to enable them to obtain better diets. The value of the "bonus"

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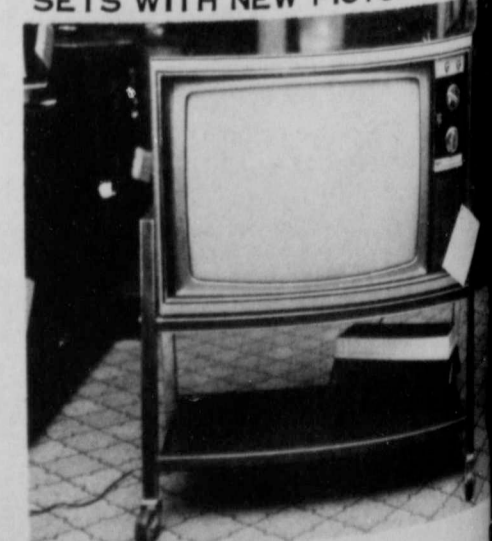

further production. Vegetable plants which are not harvested usually stop producing. Have a neighbor check and collect fast maturing vegetables such as okra, tomatoes, squash and cucumbers.

Control existing insects and diseases to prevent a build-up of the pest during your absence. Summer insects and diseases do not take a vacation and will work overtime on healthy plants.

Be sure that walks and beds are neatly edged before your departure, as the build-up of growth while you are away will be difficult to manage upon your return.

Landscape preparation for a summer vacation sounds like a

lot of extra work — not really much more than the normal weekend chores in maintaining a healthy, well-groomed landscape. Home is all the more welcomed upon return when you have properly prepared the homegrounds prior to your departure. 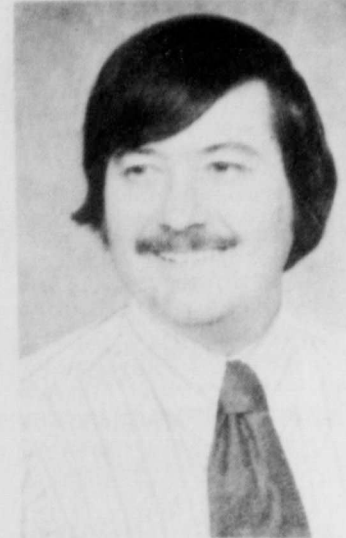
**Johnston Awarded Master Of Divinity Degree**

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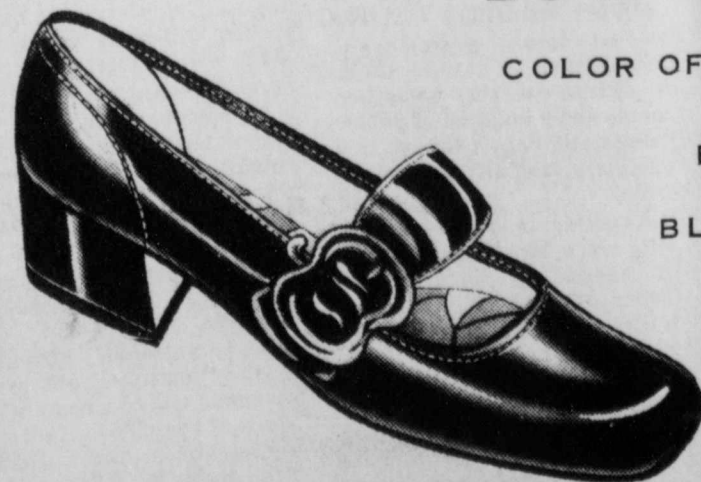

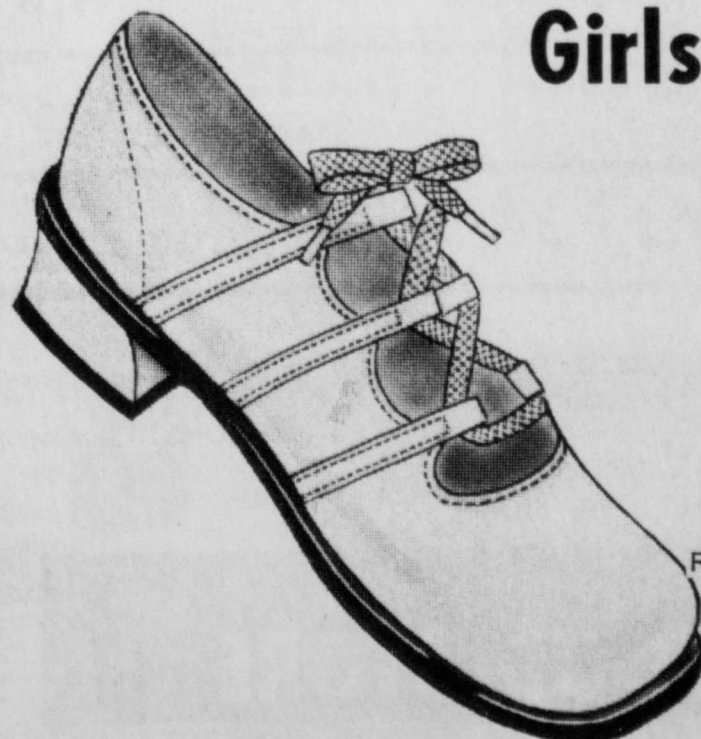

Other food items and the farmer's share of the dollar spent are: white bread—15 cents; frozen peas—16 cents; potatoes—27 cents; dried beans—43 cents; fryers—49 cents—and eggs—57 cents.

Some banks are offering a mixed bag of special services to attract customers into his neighborhood financial insti-

tution. You can now get checks that are literally scenic. They have backgrounds from every description even to the Stars and Stripes.

If you happen to be going to Italy, the last I heard you can even cash your personal check at the posh Villa del Este, on Lake Como, Italy, something you find a little hard to do in the United States.

# Bosses' Pet Peeves

In 1969, the Office Education Class of High School conducted a study of "bosses' pet peeves." As a participant in the survey, we were given a copy of the results. It was interesting to note that the "pet peeves" of Tulia bosses coincided almost exactly with the results of national surveys as published in a number of textbooks used in college business courses.

The pet peeves were listed according to the number of times mentioned by Tulia bosses.

At the top of the list was "late to work." And in second place, "discussion of confidential business outside of office."

It is noteworthy that the two most often mentioned "pet peeves" did not concern skills or training. Sometimes a person, despite her intelligence, despite her desire, despite her efforts, finds it almost impossible to be a good typewriter or shorthand. She's a lit-math, or perhaps she has a hearing defect. True, she has a problem. She is limited by not being expert in business skills or physical abilities.

This lack of proficiency is not No. 1 of "pet peeves."

It isn't take a business college diploma, an IQ of 130 to be on the job, to have sense enough not to do any business outside the office, thus to be a boss.

Ranking pet peeve, according to the survey, was "errors in spelling, grammar and punctuation."

Fourth, "taking care of personal company time." No. 5 was "too much watching."

Of these top five complaints, only No. 3 might be beyond the ability of some persons to overcome.

Yet, many more persons will perhaps solve No. 3, if properly motivated, than will solve the other four!

The next five peeves were:  
Untidy as to personal appearance and the appearance of the office.

Failure to accept responsibility for doing a job and doing it correctly.

Lack of pride in work.

Lack of courtesy in greeting customers and poor telephone manners.

Jealousy toward another employee's position or salary scale.

Strangely, not one of this second group involves skill or training. Each one could be overcome simply by reading a book on elementary good manners, an elementary course in human behavior.

And the remaining pet peeves of Tulia bosses were:

Not being available when needed.

Absenteeism.

Not interested in the welfare and future of the business.

Not being loyal to employer.

Not being honest with yourself nor with your job.

Every employee in Tulia might well score himself on the basis of these pet peeves. Chances are, if they were the boss and participated in such a study, the results would be essentially the same.

Meanwhile, the majority of Tulia employees will continue to go right on "peeving the boss" in these same ways as they wonder why they are "underpaid."

came to \$1,647,000,000, the Tax Foundation reports, based upon figures it obtained from the Treasury Department.

The awards were for such local needs as school construction, health facilities, urban renewal, welfare, job training, vocational education and the like.

On the other side of the ledger is the cost of these benefits. They are paid for out of Federal income and excise taxes that are collected from the public at large and allocated to the aid programs.

Floyd County's share of the costs, according to a breakdown of the statewide figures, amounted to approximately \$1,642,000 in the year.

For the entire state it came

to \$1,728,000,000, the report shows. This was exclusive of matching funds.

In some areas the costs exceed the grants and, in others, the reverse is the case. There is no attempt to keep them in balance. The allotments are determined by local needs and requirements rather than on a dollar-for-dollar basis, it is explained.

Under the new budget presented to Congress by the Administration, there will be a change in the way aid will be channeled in the future to states and local communities.

As analyzed by The Conference Board, specific grants will be replaced by "special revenue sharing." About 70 grants will be so-affected, it

says. "The net result," it finds, "is that total aid in fiscal 1974 is to be frozen fractionally below the level of the previous year."

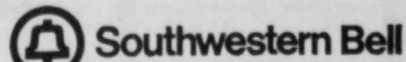
