## No Set Aside Land For 1974

In order to assure adequate supplies for domestic and export markets, the Agriculture Secretary has announced that there will be no governments set-aside of land for 1974. The effect of this announcement will be to free farmers to go all-out to produce feed grains, soybeans, wheat and cotton. This announcement will also permit farmers to begin making plans for 1974 crops.

Effect of 1974 program announcement.

A. There will be no set-aside of land in 1974 for feed grains, wheat or cotton.

B. The maintenance of an established conserving base will not be required as a condition of eligibility to receive price support or program payments. Counties shall discontinue all conserving base work and adjustments for 1974. Exception: conserving use requirements will remain

in effect for CCP or CAP agreements which are not terminated.

C. Producers with existing CAP and CCP agreements which continue through 1974 and subsequent years will, at their option, have the opportunity to terminate such agreements. Specific instructions for handling CAP agreements which may be terminated will be contained in another notice.

Farris will assume duties at the First National Bank on Monday, July 30.

### Cannery Open For Business

The Floyd County Cannery in Floydada at 310 E. Mississippi, has opened for business and is under the management of Mrs. W. L. Hartline. Hours are from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. except Saturdays and Sundays. The one in Lockney has been opened several weeks and is under the management of Mrs. T. L. Hulcy.

Mrs. Hartline said the Cannery is being operated as in past years. Persons are welcome to bring their own vegetables and containers and use the cannery free of charge or the cannery will put up edibles on the halves or do the entire job.

Mrs. Hartline said with the cannery furnishing the containers and labor, the cost would be 17 cents per can or jar by the pint. If you furnish containers, the cost is 9 cents per pint, or no cost on the halves, except for container. For the freezer, you furnish container, it's 10 cents per pint.

Everyone is welcome to use the Floyd County Canneries, either in Floydada or Lockney. Mrs. Hartline said they were receiving peas, beans and corn, which would get more plentiful within the next few days.

**HISTORY OF CONVENTION**  
The 15-County Singing Convention was organized in 1933 at Gasoline, Texas, with C. M. Lyles of Floydada as the first president. Tom Stephens was the first vice president of the convention, and Lyles' daughter Verna Boteler served as the first secretary of the organization.

The Convention began with four counties. Those counties are 1 Floyd, 2 Hall, 3 Motley and Briscoe. Other counties were added to make a total of eight counties. Those were 5 Crosby, 6 Hale, 7 Dickens and 8 Childress. Then July 31, 1966 9 Kent and 10 Swisher Counties were voted into the Convention, making it a 10 county Singing Convention.

At Tulia, Texas September 28-29 Hutchins County was voted in, making it 12 County Singing Convention. Then at Quanah, Texas in March 29-30, 1969, Wheeler County was voted in, making it 13 County Singing Convention.

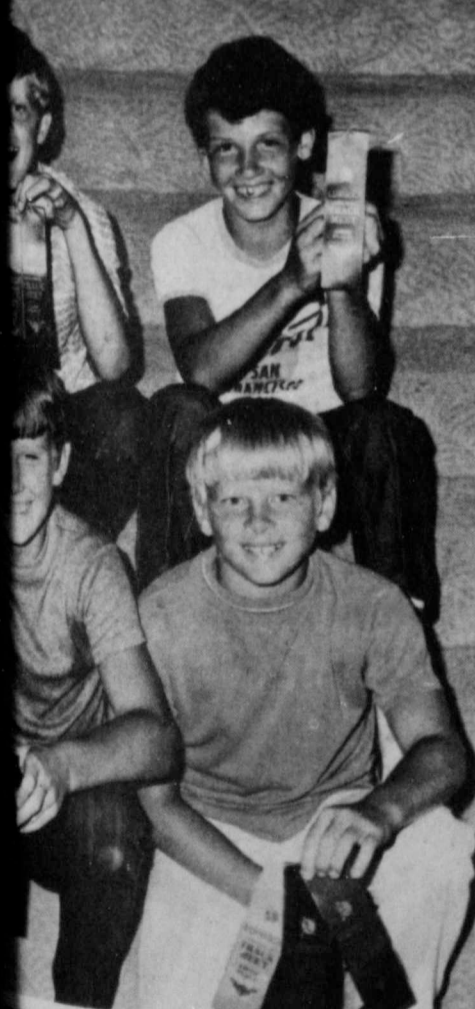

schools Floydada, Lockney, Petersburg, Dougherty and South Plains-participating.

The new system is a comprehensive program of special education in which handicapped children between the ages of three and 21 will be served, and is not restricted to the education of mentally handicapped children.

Of 531 students which will be involved in "Plan A" instructional programs this fall, a very small number will be considered to be slow learners.

The bulk of this student population will be composed of children with temporary language and learning disability, minimal brain injury, or temporary emotional disturbance. Only 17 percent (87 students) may be classified as educable mentally retarded.

The plan will continue to serve students with language and speech difficulties, allowing a larger budget for services to those with physical problems such as seeing and hearing disabilities, orthopedic handicaps and other areas of disability.

Plan A includes provisions for special seating, transportation, and instructional tools in all areas of media.

For students with unique problems, Plan A provides appraisal and consultative services and special materials. Consultative services are rendered by the supportive staff of trained diagnosticians and counsellors, working closely with the Region Service Center in Lubbock.

The new program is a very flexible one, Baker noted, which is not hampered by set routines. Plan A students will be scheduled according to individual needs and all such schedules will be based in a regular classroom setting where possible.

Children will go to "Resource Classrooms" for individual instruction in such skills as are needed for progress according to the ability of each child.

The new special education plan will employ a total of 37 staff members. Estimated total budget for the cooperative plan is \$300,000, representing an increase of \$200,000 in the Floydada school budget. The program is 100 per cent

funded by the state. In the past the state has furnished 80 per cent and the local school 20 per cent of the funds for special education programs.

Hiring of most of the Plan A staff was approved at the last meeting of the Floydada school board. They include four supportive personnel - Billy Rhodes, newly-hired supervisor-administrator; Jo-Hal Brown, supervisor; Mary Glen Degge, counselor; and Ruth Lyde, educational diagnostician.

Baker said the major administrative offices would probably be housed at the Della Plains School building in Floydada.

Of the 20 classroom teachers and 10 aides in the Plan A program, eight teachers and four aides will be at Floydada; five teachers and three aides at Lockney; and seven teachers and three aides at Petersburg. Each town's school district recruits its own teachers, Baker said, but Floydada, as fiscal agent, must approve hiring of the staff.

Several positions remain to be filled on the Plan A staff. Plans are in progress for three early childhood instructional units.

Under a new state ruling, every school in Texas must be in Plan A by 1976. The local co-op is one of the first approved for Plan A instruction. Each system in the plan is to have a minimum of 3,000 average daily attendance, although there are exceptions to the attendance regulations, such as in very sparsely populated areas.

Baker feels that the community is fortunate in being among those few schools selected to participate in the Plan A program at this time.

### Grandparents, Retirement Age Plan To Rear Two Grandsons

Families learn to adjust to tragedies and Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Bolin of Morley, Mo., are no different. However, starting over, so to speak at retirement age, with the rearing of two grandsons, may change their way of life somewhat.  
Bolin retired June 1 as caretaker of a large farm near St. Louis and at that time he and his wife were completing an addition to a home they had purchased in Morley. It was June 2 when tragedy struck the couple. Their daughter and

her husband were killed in an accident near Tulia and their two grandsons injured, one critically. Ironically, the victims, Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Noblin and two sons, Michael and Craig, were in the process of moving to Amarillo from Floydada. The family van veered out of control and hit a tree. Mrs. Noblin was pronounced dead on arrival at a Tulia hospital and her husband died a few minutes later. Craig, age 7, sustained head, body and internal injuries. Michael, age one, sustained a slight concussion and bruises.  
Craig is just recently out of an Amarillo hospital but still confined to a cast from the waist down. The Noblins and the two grandsons are residing in an Amarillo home, earlier purchased by the Noblins, at 4721 Buffalo Trail. Despite the cast worn by Craig, he and his brother, along with their grandparents, and friends, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hendrickson and family, had an outing Sunday at the Amarillo Zoo.  
These past weeks have been busy ones for Mr. and Mrs. Bolin. Craig to be seen after at the hospital. His adjustment of learning the fate of his parents, and the caring of Michael at home. The remainder of the Noblins' household goods had to be moved to Amarillo and there was a trip back to St. Louis to move the Bolins furnishings from the farm to their new residence in Morley.

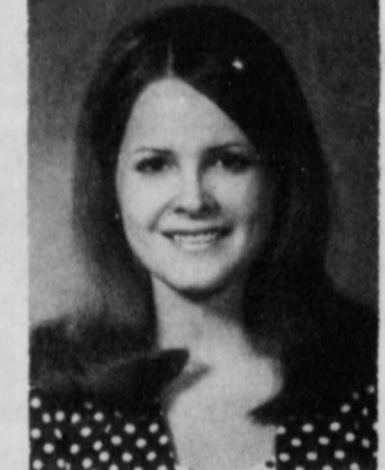

# History's Riches, Present Needs Clash

SILVERTON — The history of the Indian corn growers who planted their crops on the floor of Tule Canyon long ago will be snuffed out if money cannot be raised to excavate 14 canyon sites, soon to be covered by waters impounded by Mackenzie Dam.

And just who, if anyone, is responsible for doling out the estimated \$80,000 for the project is expected to be determined by the state attorney general in what promises to be a precedent-setting decision.

In state water projects. Should the attorney general not designate a party responsible or be late in returning his decision — and it is getting late since the earthen dam will begin impounding water in December, the Antiquities committee will "reluctantly" seek the power of injunction.

"We just don't want to interfere in the water project. We know how important water is in that area. But we'd kind of like to have a little cake and eat it too," says Tunnell, one of seven members appointed to the Antiquities committee, a body created several years ago to salvage and protect Spanish shipwreck sites along the tidelands.

Tunnell says Tule Canyon contains a wealth of archeological data, especially in the stratified terrace sites on the canyon floor where artifacts

and especially pollen encased in the various sedimentary levels will enable archeologists to reconstruct the area as it once was.

"We'll be able to determine how the climate and vegetation have changed over the years in the whole river valley," says Tunnell basing his observations on an on-site survey made in 1970 that labeled 77 different sites for excavation in the canyon — 14 of which have been nominated to the National Register of Historic Places.

One site in particular is the

location of an Indian village where small houses were constructed by the domesticated tribe and fields of corn were tilled in the red soil. Others include 10,000-year-old campsites of early man and dug-outs of early Panhandle settlers.

Tunnell estimates that excavation work, expected to be undertaken by students from

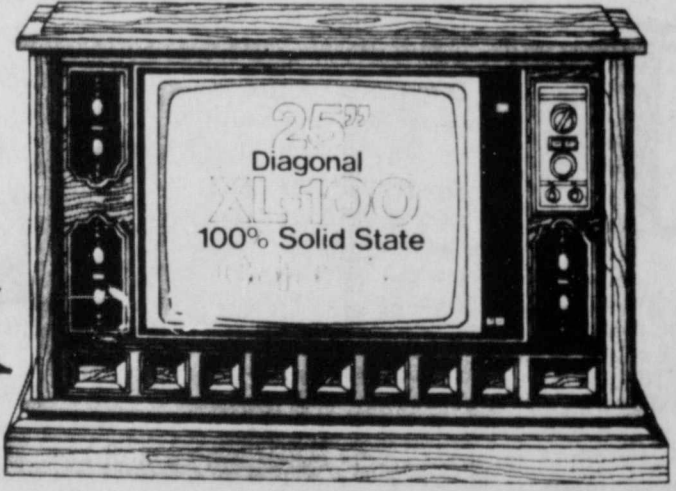

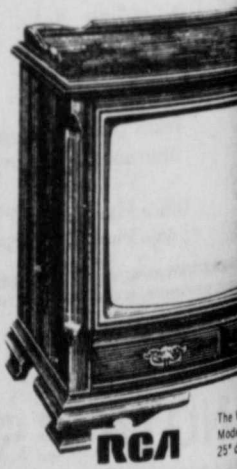

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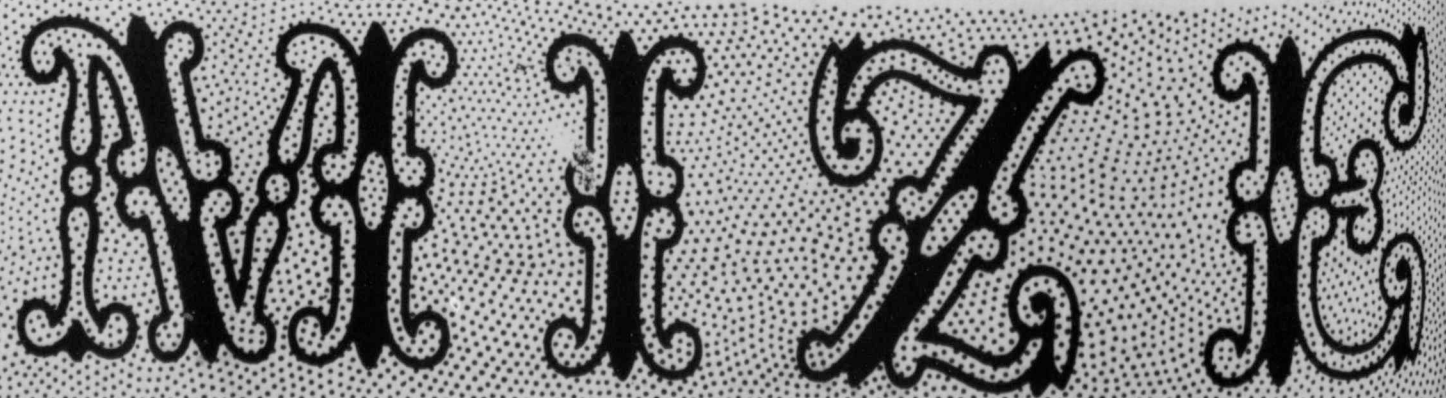

# As It Looks From Here

Omar Burleson, M.C. 17th District, Texas (Following is a summer rerun from August 12, 1965)

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In 1951 an agreement between the United States and Mexico provided for what is commonly known as the Bracero Program.

The purpose was to regulate the movement of Mexican farm workers into the United States in the summer and fall. Large numbers of such workers were admitted for a period of six to twelve weeks, paid wages equal to those of Americans, and returned to their homes below the border. Many workers returned year after year to the same employers, and it was mutually profitable.

Under pressure from large labor unions, some church groups and the reformist liberals, the arrangement ended January 1, 1965.

These forces argued that it caused unemployment in this country and that it hampered efforts to unionize farm labor.

The result is that at this very moment there are unharvested crops rotting in the fields of California. The flow of money from the West to the East, and even abroad, has been drastically reduced.

The fact is, there are fewer and fewer Americans who are willing to perform "stoop labor." Anyone who has ever

picked cotton will know it is not the easiest job in the world to pick berries or cut asparagus and celery. It is obviously not a matter of available workers, but a matter of their willingness to work. True enough, the wage rate is only comparable to the lowest of common labor, but here again it was proved on trial that this is not a principal factor in the problem of recruiting field workers.

With all the federal help programs and local relief, the incentive is just not there. As developed in hearings in California, out of more than 8,000 able bodied people receiving public assistance in the City of Los Angeles, 235 accepted jobs. At the end of 10 days, there were less than 30 working.

The Federal Government attempted to supply the need for workers by recruiting high school students called A-Teams. But the boys, athletes back home, found the work too hard and the sun too hot, and the teams melted away. Many college students who were "standing up for their rights" in the last semester, found stooping over in the fields to earn a few dollars quite another matter. Of 300 Indians transported from the Dakotas at a cost of \$6,400 to the vegetable fields near Salinas, California, all but 20 vanished in a few days.

At the same time all this is going on there is a \$106,000 Poverty Training Program in Oxnard, California, to train advisors to train seasonal workers. This would indicate the growers of the farm products to be harvested are unable to tell them how to do it.

This situation concerns more than just the fruit and vegetable growers of California. It concerns cotton growers, sheep and goat raisers, ranchers and about all other agriculture everywhere.

Furthermore, it concerns the housewife who is going to pay more for food. One lady recently buying a head of lettuce asked that it be "gift wrapped."

Prices are bound to rise for crops ripened in September and October, and after that, prices of canned goods are likely to increase in the winter.

The human element touches more deeply the Braceros themselves. While Washington spends billions to help the poor in Egypt, India and elsewhere, and all the talk about the Alliance for Progress, our Government has visited a cruel hardship on our nearest neighbors to the South. It is denying a livelihood to tens of thousands of Mexicans who depended on this work.

NOTE: (On January 31, 1973, I introduced legislation to restore this program. In addition to other benefits it would cure the "wetback" situation and save millions of dollars in efforts at enforcement).

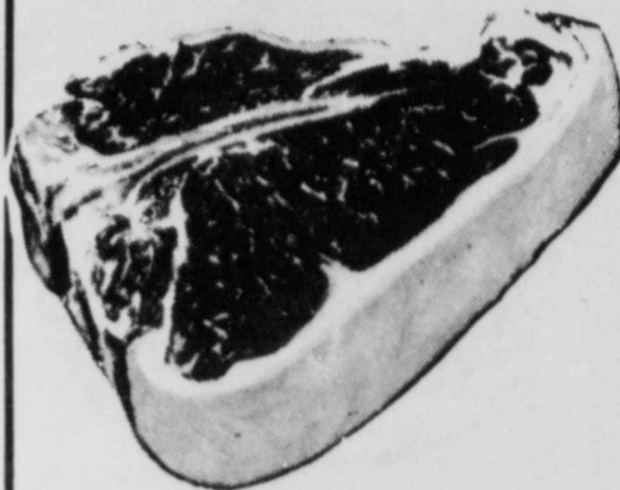
