On the positive side, Wilson said he has been pleased with the aggressiveness and quickness shown by the 'Winds. 'Our defense looked much better than we had expected." he told The Hesperian. "It looks like the defense will be capable of 'holding 'em'," he said, "and our offense should be able to move the ball."

The Whirlwind head coach mentioned again this week the good physical condition in which the team reported for workouts. He said the team had worked "real hard" and had shown "a lot of fire, spirit, and hustle" in the workouts.

Wilson said the 'Winds' passing game is "way ahead of last year," with Cagle reporting with his arm in better shape and Rance Young (temporary backup quarterback for Cagle until Mike Vickers returns after an operation) throwing better. The backs and ends, especially Rex Yeary, Marc Smitherman and Lynn Becker, are doing a "real good job of catching the ball," he says.

Wilson noted a lot of good competition going on at the center, guard and tackle positions on the offensive line. He said the offensive linemen are "really working hard," and he feels that these positions, which started as a potential weakness in the Whirlwind lineup, may turn out to be one of the team's strong points this season.

The team came out of the first week's workouts in good condition, with no injuries except to Yeary, who strained knee in the scrimmage Friday and will probably be held out of the scrimmage with Brownfield this week. Vickers probably will not see much practice for at least two weeks and is not likely to get in any contact work until after the first game.

HEARING SEPTEMBER 10 **Floyd County Budget Filed**

(The first in a series of five articles on the Floyd County budget, from information furnished by O. M. Watson Jr., County Auditor)

The 1974 Floyd County Budget was filed August 17 in the County Clerk's office for public inspection.

The county budget hearing is set for 1 p.m. September 10 at the Commissioners Courtroom. The public is invited. The budget is prepared by County Judge J. K. Holmes, the County Commissioners (Aaron Carthel, Pct. 1; Bob Jarrett, Pct. 2: Grigsby Milton, Pct. 3; and Bill McNeill, Pct. 4), and County Auditor O. M. Watson Jr. The 1974 budget is \$548, 967.00. The budget is divided into seven funds: Jury, Road and Bridge, General, Permanent Improvement, Interest and Sinking Fund, Library, and Officers' salary.

Proposed tax rate is 90c per \$100 valuation (no change from last year), and the county valuation is set at \$34,411,-131.00, 30 percent of actual value used for taxes.

In March, 1974, a final payment of \$12,000.00 on Floyd County courthouse bonds will put the county completely out of debt. Bonds for a million dollars, approved by the taxpayers in 1948, 1949. and 1958 for farm-to-market roads, the four-lane highway program in Floyd County, and a new courthouse, have been paid through the years. No taxes were collected in 1973 or will be in 1974 for bond payments as the money has been in bond funds to pay off all bonds. There has been no increase

in total county taxes in several years, as taxes usually assessed for bonds and interest in the past have been transferred to the operating

effective January 1, 1974. Salaries paid by the county have always been below the salaries paid by other West Texas counties and are "far below" the salaries allowed by

situation, as inflation has affected Floyd County as it has all other businesses. Everything the county buys - parts, repairs, diesel, machinery, record books, printing and services - has increased in price, County Auditor Watson notes.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Mrs. Jonelle Fawver and her staff. Mrs. Marjorie Martin and Mrs. Jacqueline Walls, collect taxes for other taxing agencies in addition to the county: Caprock Hospital District, High Plains Underground Water District, Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District, and the Dougherty and South Plains Rural School Districts, and the State of Texas. Only 44.5 percent of the money collected over the counter of the Tax Collector's office is received by the County of Floyd to carry on county business.

It is estimated by the Tax Assessor that the county will receive \$294,215.00 in taxes for 1974. The remainder of county income to cover the budget will come from auto registration (\$145,000.00), fees of office, fines and other sources. There are 51 employees on the county payroll. The new budget includes a 10 percent increase in pay for employees. Some elected officials who work in the courthouse will receive \$693.00 per month: commissioners, sheriff's deputies, the librarian and the district clerk will receive \$550.00 per month; men who work for the precincts will receive \$550.00 per month; and secretaries' salaries are set at \$386.00. Weed Seeds To Meet Thursday

Scientists who ran germination tests on weed seeds tion wish to thank all those buried for up to 50 years came up with startling proof who attended or who helped in any way the Hawaiian Luau, of this. which was a very successful

They reported that 51 of 107 weed species tested still had viable seed after 20 years. Weed seed with the greatest longevity were dock and pigweed. Scientists said 52% of dock seed buried for 50 years germinated, while 66% of pigweed seed sprouted after 40 years. Tests also showed that 74%

of morning glory seeds germinated after 51/2 years, and 29% of Johnson grass seed after 3½ years. The reason these seeds re-

main in the soil for such a long period without sprouting is apparently related to environmental conditions. According to the scientists, some seeds need just the right combination of moisture, temperature, and nutrients before they will germinate. This is why, they add, that farmers may suddenly be confronted with a weed prob-lem they thought they had cured years earlier.

Cotton Picture Looks Good

COLLEGE STATION -Favorable weather so far this season points to a successful Texas cotton crop that will pay farmers their highest cotton prices since 1951. "Tight supplies and rela-

tively strong demands, both domestic and export, indicate that the average 1973-74 cotton price to the farmer will be higher than in the past season even though mid-season demand will again be weak," says Charles Baker, marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Early season cotton last year was heavily contracted to cover domestic mill needs for the last quarter of 1972. However, the anticipated large crop resulted in a weak mid-season market with prices unduly depressed. Domestic mills and foreign buyers sharpened demand in late 1972 and early 1973, resulting in depletion of uncommitted stocks, contracts for much of the 1973-74 crop and record prices," explains the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Texas, the nation's leading since 1880, produced 4.1 million Lake.

bales in 1972 on 5,570 acres for a total value of \$535 million. The 1973 Texas crop, planted on 5,700 acres, should produce three percent more than the 1972 total and have a value exeeding \$700 million for the first time since 1962.

During the 1972-73 season, domestic mill use of cotton dropped to 7.7 million bales, a 34-year low, while exports rose to a 10-year high of 4.8 million bales. The large 1972 crop of 13,702 bales enabled carryover stocks on August 1 this year to rise to 4.5 million bales compared with the 20-year low of 3.3 million a year earlier,

points out the economist. Although domestic use of cotton is down due to imported cotton fabrics and increased use of synthetics and blends, cotton still remains "king" in Texas, contends Baker.

Attorney General Rules On 18 Year Old Right

Youthful offenders must be released from correctional institutions for delinquents when they reach 18, Attorney General John Hill held. In other opinions concerning

Field Day Activities

Set September 11

LUBBOCK - The 64th Annual Field Day and Open house of the Texas AGricultural Experiment Station has been set for September 11. A review of new developments in agricultural research on the South Plains will highlight the special occasion.

Announcement of the upcoming field day activities was made by Dr. Geroge McBee, resident director of the TAES, and Oliver Newton, meteorologist with the National Weather Service and field day committee chairman.

According to Newton, discussions and explanations of research work conducted by TAES and USDA-ARS scientists will be presented in 11 different field locations on the sprawling 320-acre site north of Lubbock.

"The field tours will begin at 1 p.m. and will include new research developments in cotton physiology, environmental effects on grain sorghum, cotton diseases. irrigation studies, cotton varieties, soil fertility, weed control, grain sorghum insect resistance, narrow-row cotton, sorghum varieties and oil-seed crops.

Says Newton, "We have added several new field tours "this year, and as an aid to visitors, a shuttle service will be available. The shuttles will depart from the station headquarters every 15 minutes throughout the afternoon, allowing visitors to get on or off at any field stop. Visitors will be able to examine and discuss the particular area in which they are interested for as long as they wish, thenc atch another shuttle when ready to move on.' "Because of the recent

developments in the agricultural industry," concludes Newton, "both the producer and the consumer should be interested in this informative examination of agricultural research work being done here on the South Plains."
