Judge Aldridge To Be Candidate For Re-election

Judge John Aldridge this week authorized The Brand to announce his candidacy for reelection to the office of Judge of the 69th Judicial District, subject to action of the Democratic Primary in July.

Judge Aldridge was appointed to his post in August, 1944, by Governor Coke Stevenson to fill the unexpired term of James W. Witherspon of Hereford, who resigned; and won the office at the polls in the general elections in November of that year. Judge Aldridge, who hails from Farwell, beat B. N. Richards of Dalhart in a hotly contested election race.

Aldridge, who believes that a judge should be free of political cliques and attached strings, insisted on running his own race, although he was endorsed by bar associations in Deaf Smith and Parmer counties.

An allotment of \$198,000 for construction of rural electric lines by the Deaf Smith county REA Cooperative has just been approved by the Rural Electrification Administrator in Washington, according to a telegram from Gene Worley, Member of Congress from this district.

The new allotment gives the local cooperative a total of more than \$300,000 for the construction of some 215 miles of rural electric lines, extending the present service in Deaf Smith, Parmer, and Castro counties, with a short extension into Randall county, Leo Forrest, project manager, said.

In addition, plans call for construction of two sub-stations; one, a 3000 KVA station, to be located 6 miles south of Hereford to relieve the overload on present lines and to take care of additionl consumers; and the second, with 600 KVA capacity, to be located south of Dimmitt, serving additional lines which will be built through the Flag community area.

The planned extensions, Forrest said, are, with some additions, approximately the same lines tht were planned for construction before the war.

In addition to the \$198,000 just appropriated, the Deaf Smith Cooperative still has available for the construction \$110,000 from previous appropriations, making a total of \$313,000 for the project.
