Soil Testing Lab At A & M College Offers Services

A soil testing laboratory has been set up at Texas A. and M. College to make chemical ananalysis of soil samples. The service, as set up by the Board of Directors, is open to the general public. The laboratory will be operated by the Division of Chemistry, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in cooperation with the School of Agriculture and the Extension Service. Fees will be charged ranging from 25 cents for PH. test to 7.50 for a complete soil analy-
