### Whirlwind Band Receives Division I Rating

"Jubilant" shook the bleachers of Jones Stadium yesterday afternoon when the announcement was made that the Floydada Whirlwind Band had received a Division I Rating in the University Interscholastic League Marching Contest.

The Division I Rating in marching was the Floydada Band's first in three years. All three judges of the contest rated the Floydada Band a Number 1. Floydada twirlers received a Division II Rating on their twirling solo, and a Division I on ensembles.

In reference to the Floydada Band one judge's critique sheet read as follows: Fine appearing band; fine entrance; good tempo; going good; good control sound; nice balance; some problem in alignment; sure has a pretty sound; fine marching style; just a fine band!

The Floydada Band, under its first year of directing by Steve Schmidley, will compete next spring in concert and sight reading.

### Floyd Voters Approve Five Amendments In Small Turnout

While the state was approving seven of the nine Constitutional Amendments, Floyd voters approved five of them in a small vote turnout Tuesday.

Floyd voters voted as follows on the nine amendments:

1. Annual sessions, pay raises: Approval 230, against 291.
2. Homestead protection for single adults HJR 7: Approval 398, against 119.
3. Homestead exemption for single adults SJR 13: Approval 385, against 129.
4. Rules to create conservation districts: Approval 259, against 218.
5. Coastal counties sea wall bonds: Approval 298, against 184.
6. District courts jurisdiction: Approval 147, against 347.
7. Veteran's land fund increase: Approval 306, against 199.
8. Broadening ad valorem tax: Approval 174, against 322.
9. Water storage tax exemption: Approval 221, against 279.

Early incomplete returns indicated the amendments approved by state vote included 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 9.

### Carthel, Crow Win Football Contest

Carthel, Box 708, Lockney, won the Hesperian football contest last week. Carthel won for his winning entry, one miss and a tie-breaker. He nosed out Tommy W. Marivena, Floydada, by three but said 58 points in error; 44 was the actual total.

Both Carthel and Cathey picked Floydada to win. Third place went to Richie Crow, 110 South Fifth, Floydada, who missed four games and guessed 48 points would be scored in the Floydada-Idalou game. Several others missed four but finished out of the money on the tie-breaker.

Carthel missed these games: Bovina-Kress, TCU-Baylor, and Friona-Dimmitt. Cathey, finally making the payoff for the first time this year, won \$5 for missing just Friona-Dimmitt, Arkansas-A&M, and Tahoka-Roosevelt. Crow's wrong guesses were on the Bovina-Kress, Arkansas-A&M, Phillips-Panhandle, and Tahoka-Roosevelt games.

Gaining honorable mention with four misses were Carl Lewis, Clarence Denton, Dell Yandell and Grand Hambricht of Floydada, Zoa Honea and Sam E. Ellis of Tulia, and Gaye Hammonds of Canyon.

### Case Moving To United Transport Building

Case Power & Equipment announced this week that a lease agreement has been signed with United Transport Company and about the first of the year will be moving to the former United Transport building in east Floydada.

Manager Frank Milby told a Hesperian reporter, "we will do quite a bit of remodeling before we move... we will expand all departments and our service department will have about four times as much space."

The Whirlwind Quarterback Club has been successful in its efforts to collect enough money to have a 14-foot green Whirlwind painted on the City of Floydada's big elevated water tank, according to QB Club president Jack Stansell.

When the Floydada city council recently took bids for cleaning and repainting the tank, it was learned that, for an additional \$475, the Floydada High School "Whirlwind" symbol could be added.

The Quarterback Club started the drive off with a \$90 donation, money contributed by exes at Homecoming last year for just such a project. Several other Floydada organizations and individuals came to the rescue of the "Whirlwind-on-the-water-tank" fund after it appeared to be doomed to failure, and Stansell announced this week that the effort was successful and the money had been turned over to the city.

Scheduled completion date for the painting is November 30.

### 'Winds Gun For District Crown

The Floydada Whirlwinds and the Lockney Longhorns meet here at 7:30 Friday in the annual contest for the football championship of Floyd County. Also at stake this year will be, virtually, the District 4-AA title and a trip to the playoffs.

A Whirlwind victory would mean at least a two-way tie for the district crown and would put the 'Winds into the playoffs against Littlefield, already a sure thing in 3-AA. Should the Longhorns win, there arises the possibility of one of those circular three-way ties, among Floydada, Lockney and Abernathy. If the Antelopes beat Idalou Friday and upset the Longhorns the following week, and if the 'Winds beat Tulia in the season finale, it will mean a coin flip for the playoff spot. Either way, the winner of the Floydada-Lockney shoot-out gets at least a share of the title.

Both teams have 5-3 season and 3-0 district records. Both sustained non-conference losses to Post and Olton. Lockney's other loss was to Dimmitt. Floydada's other defeat came at the hands of triple-A Levelland. A comparison of common foes this year reveals that the 'Winds lost to Post 14-7, while the Longhorns dropped a 29-20 decision to the Antelopes; Olton beat the Whirlwinds 22-18 and dropped the 'Horns 26-21; Floydada clobbered Ralls 54-0 and Lockney beat the Jackrabbits 47-6; and the Whirlwinds beat Idalou 35-9 after the Longhorns had humiliated 'em 63-0.

Last year, the Whirlwinds rolled over their neighbors to the north by a whopping 55-14 count after jumping to a 13-0 lead but falling behind 14-13 in the second period.

For the fifth straight year, Coach L. G. Wilson's Whirlwinds are in the thick of the district battle near the end of the season, and, "We're glad we're still in it," Wilson said this week. "This is what it's all about." Wilson said in an interview Monday, anticipating the hard-fought game that is traditional when the two Floyd County football powers meet.

No Wilson-coached Whirlwind team has lost to the Longhorns, although the 'Winds had a close call his first year here when they won by just 8-7.

The Whirlwinds come into the contest following a game in which they didn't execute well, Wilson says. The Floydada coach says he didn't expect the Whirlwinds to be high for the Idalou game, which they weren't, but he did expect them to play consistent football, which they didn't, after the first quarter. Lockney blanked Tulia, highly regarded in pre-season, 21-0 last Friday.

Wilson was happy with the defensive effort Friday, however, and said the Lockney game would be a test of defenses. "The defense will probably determine the outcome," he said, as both teams have good offenses.

The Whirlwinds will be in good physical condition, Center Ashley Wester is still hobbling but responding to treatment for an ankle injury and is listed to start. Everybody else is well, Wilson says.

Lockney's offensive unit drew favorable comment from Wilson, who said the Longhorns have probably the best-balanced running attack the 'Winds have faced all year. Running backs Dart Carthel, John Mathis, John Clark and Robert Delgado combine to give the 'Horns lots of running ability. Quarterback Zach Cummings is a fine ball-handler and a percentage passer, Wilson says. The Longhorns throw mostly to balance their running game but do a good job when they do go to the air.

The Longhorns defense has allowed only six points in three district games.

### Advance Tickets On Sale Now

Tickets to the Floydada-Lockney football game will be on sale Thursday and Friday at Floydada athletic director Preston Watson's office at high school. The general-admission (not reserved-seat) tickets are \$1.50 for adults and 50¢ for students.

Watson said the advance tickets might save fans a wait at the Western Field box office. A big crowd is expected for the game. Standing-room only capacity of the stadium is about 4,000. Watson said the stands can set 2,500 to 3,000.

### Undefeated JV Tries For Perfect Season Tonight

The Floydada Whirlwind junior varsity tries for a perfect football season here tonight (Thursday) when they host the Frenship JV in a game starting at 7 p.m., the last of the season for the Floydada junior varsity.

The Floydada JV will enter the contest with eight victories and no losses.

Several freshmen will be moved up to the JV for the game. Ninth-grade and JV games with Tulia originally scheduled this week have been cancelled.

Both Floydada Junior High teams travel to Tulia, as scheduled, for their final games of the season this evening.

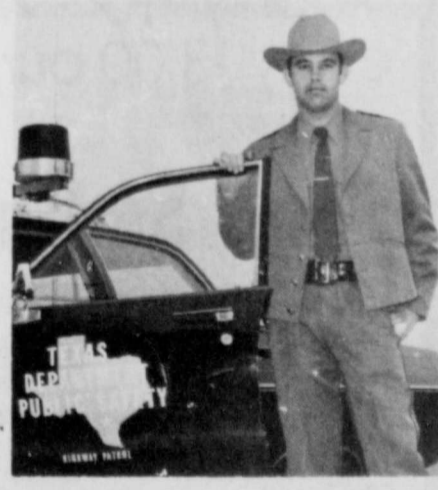
He was a member of the Methodist Church, and the Methodist Men's Sunday School Class.

Jay Ostrander, Teacher  
A trip to Skid Row cost Jay Ostrander nearly \$90,000. After graduating from high school in the 1920s, Mr. Ostrander left northern Michigan to visit a sick friend in a large Southern city. While there, he got lost and wandered onto the local version of Skid Row. "This was like something dreamed up by Dante," he later recalled. He returned to question the derelicts, many of whom were about his own age. He wanted to know what made such human degradation possible. One thing stood out. Each of the derelicts had suffered a complete loss of self-esteem. Mr. Ostrander returned home determined to "hit out at this thing in some way." He put himself through college and became a teacher. For 43 years, he took youngsters about to enter ninth grade to Chicago. Every trip included

Dear Mr. Tooley:  
I was very interested in reading the editorial "Rural Development Program Can Help Floyd County". I do believe it can; at least that was the intention of the Texas Rural Development Commission. Possibly the final report will be of some value to the rural counties. I suggest you keep in touch with the previous director of the TRDC, Mr. Raymond L. Prewett, whose address and phone number is: Texas Department of Community Affairs, Division of Rural Community Services, P.O. Box 13166, Capitol Station, Austin Texas 78711, Phone: 512-475-6534.  
Speaking of textiles, personally, that is my great hope for West Texas. We have the cotton; we have the labor; we have the garment plants. All we need is the finished fabrics, and we believe here at the Textile Research Center that new equipment has been developed that will handle our kind of cotton. It is just a matter of a few years until this can be proven. We think there will be what we term a textile complex on the South Plains, where every county and most every town will have one or more textile mills. We will need to have one mill that can finish or dye goods, and probably out of every 7 or 10 textile mills completed. These textile mills will need a supply of water and, probably more important, a sewage disposal system that can take care of their needs. The water can come as reused water from the larger towns at a very low cost. I believe I can assure you, Mr. Tooley, there is going to be a need and room for everyone.

While in Austin attending the Governor's Conference, I spent some time with the Attorney General, and was pleased with our conference. I think his office has sent to the Supreme Court the test case that will permit any political sub-division to issue revenue bearing bonds up to \$5 million. This could be handled by Floydada as well as Lubbock or Amarillo. Incidentally, the property of the political sub-division is not liable for the bonds. Hopefully, we can get this case finished before January 1st. The national rural development program is definitely intended for towns of 50,000 and under, and preference is given to those of 10,000 and under. This program is being handled by the Farmers Home Administration, and they should be ready for business before January 1st.

I am enclosing a copy of the list of companies that chose Texas in August and September. While Houston is mentioned several times, quite a few selected the small towns. This is put out by the Texas Industrial Commission. If I can be of any help to you in any way, please let me know.

#### COTTON HARVEST INCREASING

Cotton harvest operations are increasing daily on the South Plains, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. This increase is reflected in the increasing number of cotton samples being received at the area U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland.

Samples from 74,000 bales were classed at the four offices during the week ending Friday, November 2nd. This brought the total classed for the season to 96,000. This is far ahead of the pace of last year's crop. At this time last year samples from only 1,200 bales had been classed.

Quality of the cotton harvested continued excellent and is considerably higher than last year.

Grades 31 and 41 continued to be the predominant grades at Lubbock, making up 70 percent of all classed. Grade 31 made up 32 percent, Grade 41, 38 percent and Grade 32, 11 percent.

Staples were predominantly 30 to 32. Twenty-five percent had a staple length of 30, 21 percent stapled 31 and 15 percent was 32.

Micronaire readings continued excellent. These readings indicate that most of the early harvested bales were fully mature. Eighty-four percent of all cotton tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 10 percent was in the high micronaire range of 5.0 to 5.2 and 4 percent was in the very high range of 5.3 and above.

Progress is being made in an effort to standardize, insofar as possible, the basic provisions of cotton contracts for 1974 and future years. But it is generally agreed that this will not solve the contracting problem of most concern to cotton producers — the problem of contract performance.

The Texas Cotton Association, the American Cotton Shippers Association and a committee of the National Cotton Council all are working toward a standard contract. Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and a member of the NCC committee, stated recently that "This is something we need as an aid in promoting better understanding of each party's contractual obligations, but it is not something that will assure producers that buyers can and will live up to contract terms."

It is also noteworthy that the Food and Fibers Marketing Subcommittee of the Texas House Agriculture Committee is holding hearings to determine if buyer licensing or other means can be found to protect producers against loss in the event buyers default on contracts. But the Texas Legislature doesn't meet again in regular session until 1975.

Meanwhile Johnson is advising cotton producers in PCG's 25-county area that their best protection for 1974 will be a thorough investigation of any party with whom they consider contracting.

"It is foolish for producers to assume that everybody in the cotton contracting business will have the ability to pay contract prices should the market go against them," he says, "and odds are that any producer who contracts in such a careless manner sooner or later will find himself party to a one way contract under which he has all to lose and nothing to gain."

Before signing a contract to deliver cotton at a specified price the producer should take special pains to assure himself that he is not the only party with the ability to abide by contract terms, Johnson advises.

"First, the producer should learn as much as possible about the man with whom he is doing business. He should consult with his banker, and with the buyer's banker. He should ask the merchant for the names of producers with whom he signed contracts last year, for example, when contract prices generally were above market prices at harvest time. And he should personally check with those producers to find out whether those contracts were fully honored by the buyer.

"If a buyer purports to be representing one of the large and reputable cotton firms, the producer should make certain that he, the buyer, in fact has written authority to bind that firm to contract terms."

Johnson also believes that these precautions on the part of producers will always be worthwhile whatever licensing, bonding, arbitration or other requirements may be written into law at some future date.

"While some measure of legislated protection for producers is definitely needed and will probably be forthcoming, no amount of legislation can ever substitute for the good practice of exercising caution in all business dealings," he concludes.

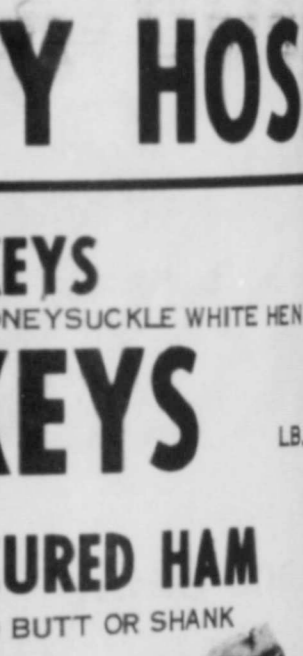
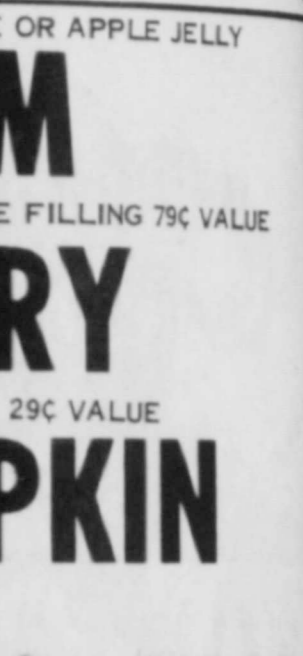
