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## Council Studies Christmas Lights Power Use

The Floydada City Council, in a session that lasted past midnight Monday night devoted considerable time to discussion about the costs of power required, and the power supply need for Christmas lights in Floydada this coming Christmas season.

Lawrence Stovall, power use supervisor for Floydada Power and Light reported that over \$800 worth of electricity was used by the Christmas lights last year and when the labor is figured in to put them up and take them down, it would amount to over \$1,000. Stovall said the lights burned 24 hours a day for 34 days. He said it was not possible to turn the lights off in the day time. He also said that two engines were required to maintain the necessary power in Floydada each night, and adding Christmas lights made it necessary to run another engine until about midnight when most of the city's residents were in bed.

The council has called a special meeting next week to discuss the Christmas light situation with the Chamber of Commerce board.

The council also discussed or took action on the following agenda:

Discussed paving or improving more downtown alleys;

Discussed financing of another power generating engine for the light plant that may cost some \$568,000 installed and generating electricity;

Approved advertising for bids for diesel fuel, gasoline and tire repairs needed by the city another year;

Approved advertising for bids on a new four door sedan police car;

Turned down request for radar unit for police department;

Discussed increasing right-of-way for future widening of Highway 70 through Floydada with highway engineer Sam Fowler;

Approved returning control of advertising signs back to the state highway department;

Approved advertising for bids on a new computer machine to be used by

the city's bookkeeping and billing department;

Approved four day holiday for the city's employees November 22, 23, 24, 25, and another four day holiday December 22, 23, 24, 25;

Discussed building a \$24,000 fire department building with a contractor;

Met with Sam Fowler and Sam Spence, who live just outside the city limits on the Ralls highway.

Fowler and Spence said they did not like to pay city and Mackenzie water taxes when they did not live in the city limits. Mayor Parnell Powell explained that everyone who received water from the city and lived outside the city limits paid the tax which was added to their water bill.

Fowler and Spence said they would like to come in the city limits if the city would furnish them garbage pickup

and sewage. City manager Bill Feuerbacher said that he had proposed an estimate of cost for sewage and sewage lift to the fourteen home owners on the Ralls highway and they could not reach agreement on paying for the project.

Mayor Powell said that the council would study the problem and come up with action next council meeting.

All councilmen were present.

# 'Winds Need Victory At Tulia

The Floydada Whirlwinds, already the District 4-AA representatives in the state football playoffs, try to gain sole possession of the conference crown Friday night. The Tulia Hornets would like nothing better than to knock the "Winds back into a tie for the title with Lockney or Abernathy, however, and Whirlwind head coach L. G. Wilson says "They're tough." The game starts at 7:30 p.m. in Tulia.

Rumor has it that the Hornets still harbor some feelings toward the "Winds for that last-second, come-from-behind 21-21 tie last year in which Tulia saw a 14-point lead vanish in the final four minutes of the game and the playoff berth they thought they had sewed up go to the Whirlwinds via a 5-3 edge in penetrations.

Some sources say the Hornets believe Floydada was lucky to win, and that Tulia should have been the 1972 playoff representative from 4-AA.

The Hornets will definitely be high for the game, the Whirlwind head coach said this week. Will it be hard to get the "Winds "up" for the game? "I don't believe so," Wilson said. "We had a good workout Monday, and the attitude seems good. I think we'll have a good carryover (from last week) for the game... We've accepted the fact that we've added a game to our schedule, and we need to get ready for

every game..." Wilson said the "Winds would like to go into the Littlefield (bi-district playoff) game on a win, and besides, "We want the whole thing," he declared, speaking of the district title.

The Whirlwinds are in good physical shape for the game, with no injuries except the regular knocks and bruises suffered in the Lockney contest.

Wilson said end Lynn Becker and halfback Kelvin Ratliff played outstanding defensive games against Lockney, and linebacker Mike Reves had his best game of the season against the Longhorns. He added that Rex Yearly played possibly his best game of the year at offensive halfback, and quarterback John Cagle turned in one of his better performances of the year Friday. Wilson had praise for the whole offensive backfield, especially, he said, the blocking of Rance Young and Danny Bradford.

Tulia fields primarily the same type team as Lockney, Wilson told The Hesperian, but not as big overall. They have a big running back, though, comparable to John Clark of the Longhorns, in Raymond Williams, a 210-pound sophomore. Williams runs with power and has speed too. "We've got to stop him," Wilson said.

The Hornet quarterback, Alan Pohlmeier, is a good runner and can pass. Tulia is primarily a running team,

but they have good receivers when they decide to go to the air.

Some of the Hornets' outstanding linemen are Ken Hayhurst, a 181-pound senior center, and Larry Freeman, a 180-pound tackle.

The Hornets are a senior-and-sophomore-dominated team, with most of the starters seniors and a lot of sophomore reserves.

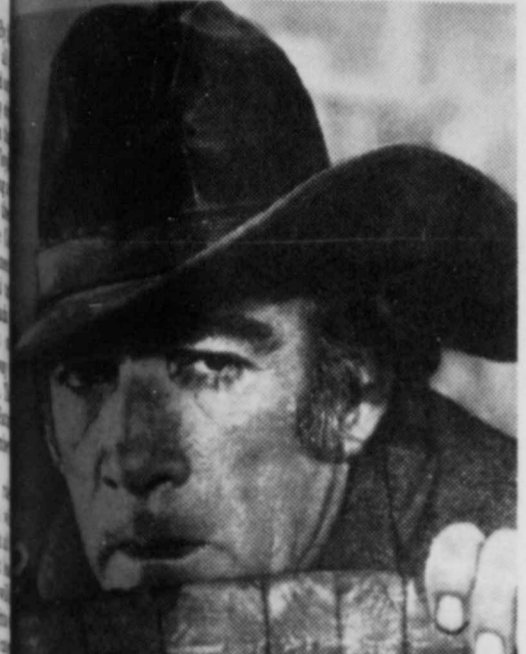

### Whirlwind Band Boasts Four French Horns

(By Cary Brown)

The French Horn is a brass instrument with three valves. It is played in a similar manner to the trumpet. It is the most difficult of the brass instruments to play and is noted for its mellow tone.

The French Horn was derived from instruments carved from rams' horns. It was used as a signal by stagecoach drivers and in hunting expeditions. It originally had no valves but was simply a long, coiled horn. Complicated signals used in hunting expeditions of French kings demonstrated its musical value and gave it its name.

The French Horn is the only valve instrument played with the left hand. The right hand is inside the bell of the horn, where it may be used to block partially or completely the mouth of the horn, thereby changing the notes produced.

We have four members in the French Horn section in the Floydada Band. Two of these members are juniors: Craig Hambright and Cary Brown. Cary twirls in front of the band during marching season. The other members are both freshmen: Cheryl Bearden and Tim Dyess. Tim plays the trombone during marching season. When Tim was a seventh grader (because of his ability on the French Horn) he went with the high school band to the Sun Bowl and Parade in San Antonio.

One more member of the French Horn section that we mustn't forget, band director, Mr. Stephen Schmidley. Mr. Schmidley, who can now play any instrument in the concert or marching band, started on the French Horn.

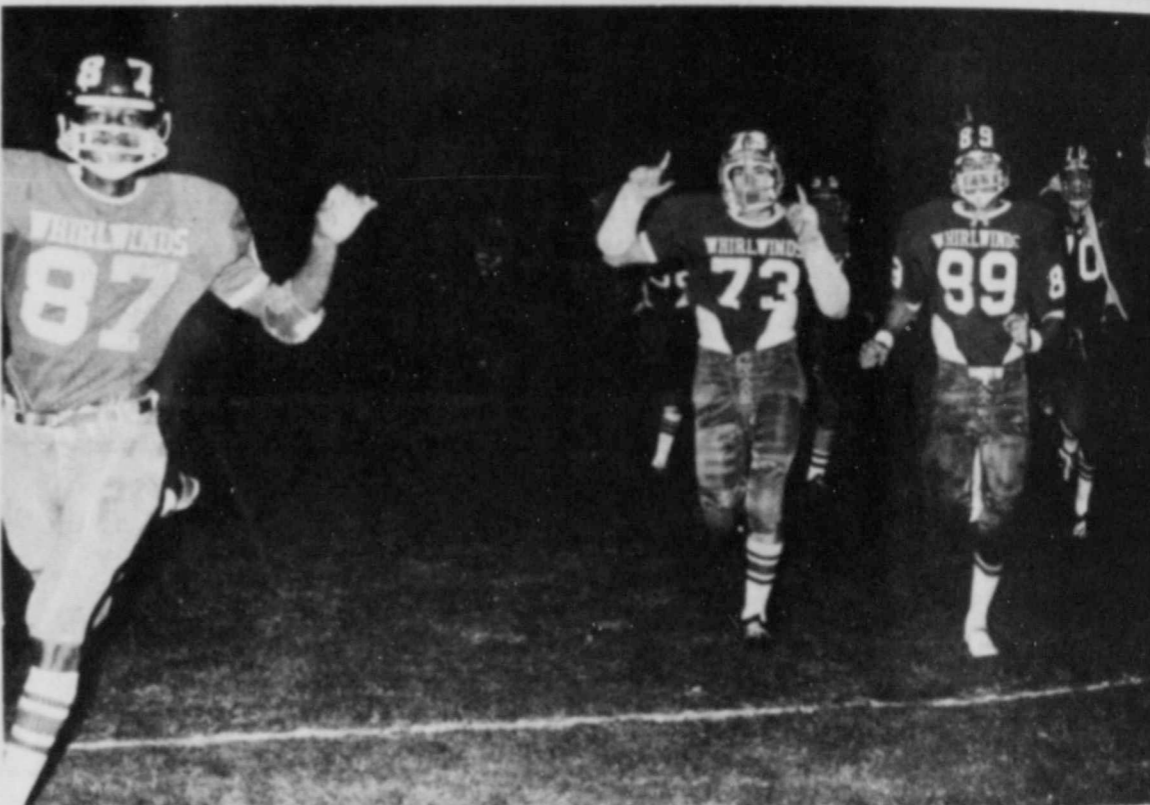
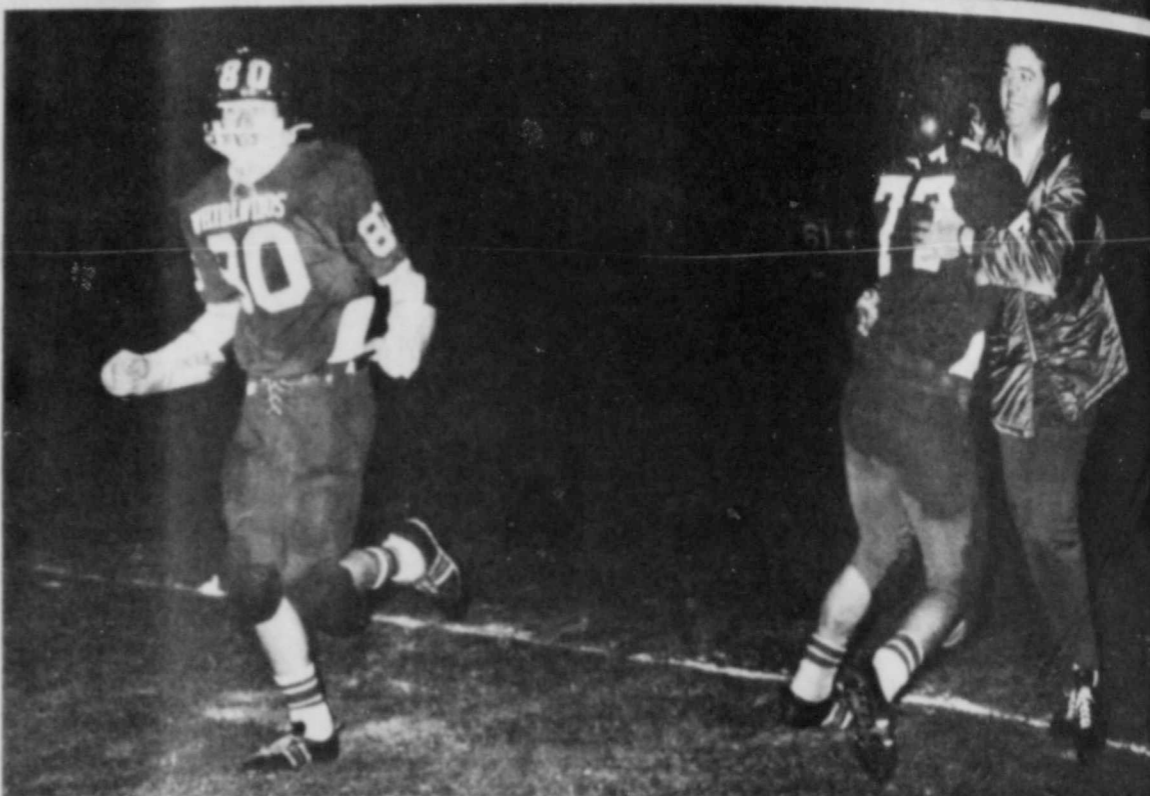
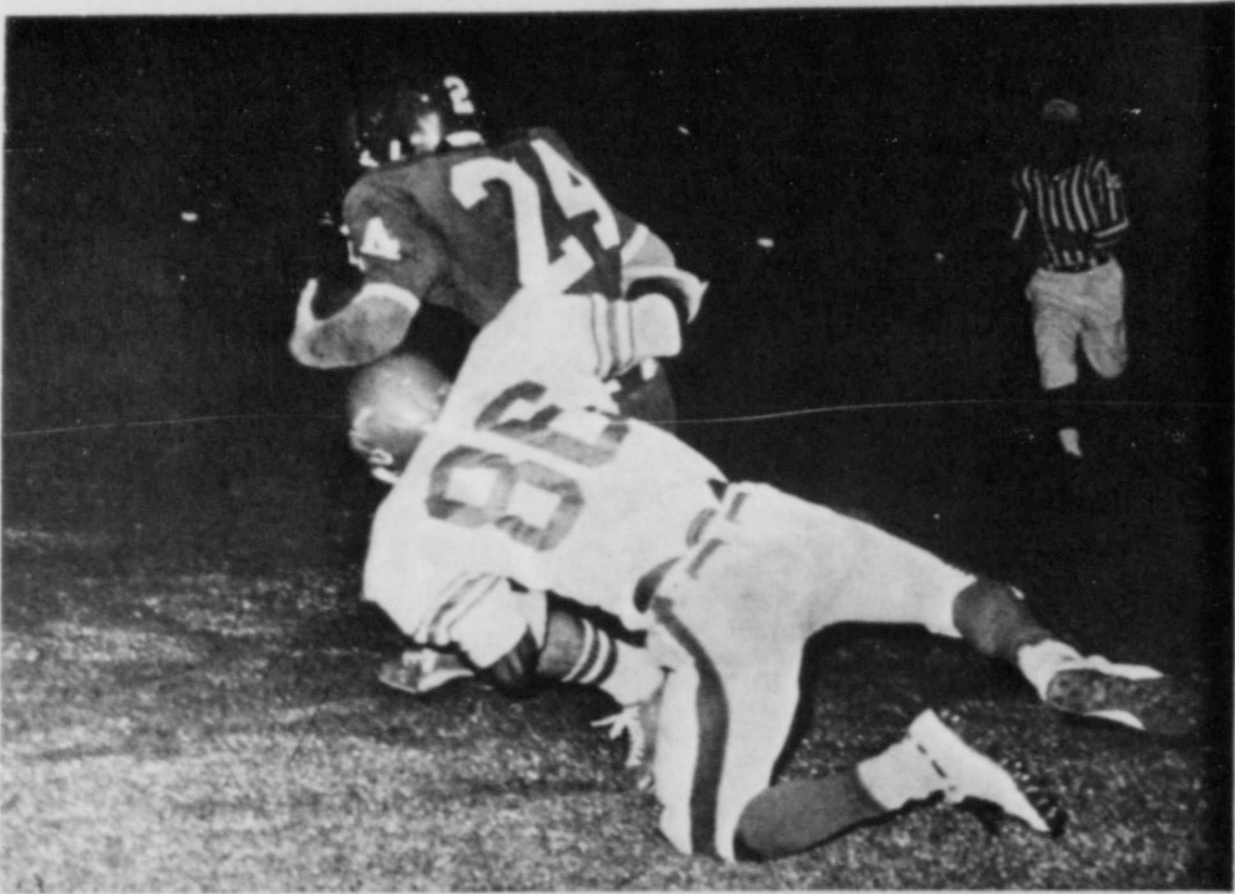

### 'Original' Whirlwinds Recalled

(By James Huggins) News that the Floydada Whirlwinds clinched a tie for the district championship and a bi-district playoff spot with their victory over Lockney Friday night prompted memories of another time an FHS football team represented the district in the playoffs. Things were a little different then, though, because the Green And White beat the Plainview Bulldogs and the Lubbock Westerners enroute to the district title, and they were first called "Whirlwinds" before their bi-district clash that season with the Amarillo High School Golden Sandstorm. The nickname was born when Floydada coach J. C. Wester asked about the Floydada team's chances against the Golden Sandies in the 1922 bi-district game, told an Amarillo sportswriter "We just have 17 boys, and our team will only be a small whirlwind in front of the Amarillo Sandies." Wester and two of the players he coached in the twenties still live in Floydada. Lorraine "Brit" Britton was on that original Whirlwind team. Clement McDonald played his last season for FHS the year before. The '21 team played under the Green and White colors but had no nickname or mascot. McDonald recalled this week: "No team in the world had as many trick plays as we did." Apparently the game was a little more informal then, because McDonald recalled playing center and faking an argument with the quarter-

back about the snap count and, while the opposing team looked on amazed, flipping the ball to a halfback who invariably made a long gain. The FHS team, back then, played without many of the "advantages" the current Whirlwinds enjoy — like shoulder pads, hard helmets, huddles, handoffs or hash marks. Standard headgear was a padded leather affair, and all the players had one of those, judging from photographs, but not many played in shoulder pads (Britton says he never did). The quarterback called the signals on the line of scrimmage, and the center snap went right to the ballcarrier. After a tackle, play was resumed right where the ballcarrier went down, unless he went out of bounds, in which case the pigskin was brought in bounds a step. Wester recalls that his teams ran off a short punt formation (shades of the Dallas Cowboys in the early sixties!) and were generally pretty good passing teams. This was before the shape of the ball was changed to make throwing the pass easier. Another difficulty in passing was the rule that a team that threw incomplete passes on two consecutive downs drew a five-yard penalty, Britton remembered. Evidently the 17 team members who made the trip to play Amarillo in '22 represented a pretty good turnout — McDonald recalls

playing in one game at Silverton and looking over at the Floydada "bench", and seeing only Coach Wester and one player. There were few substitutions in any case, because, as Britton remembers, a player who left the game couldn't come back in the same half. "Brit" played four years of high-school football, and his last year, the fall of '22, he was in on every play of every game. Some of the other players from Wester's teams of the twenties who are still alive and remembered by the trio from Floydada include Leroy McDonald (Clement's brother), Kenneth Henry, Bill Daily, Terrell Loran, Ira Marshall, Faye Maxey, Bill Colville and Bill Beedy.

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# Construction Late In 1973

Special—Groundbreaking likely will be held at the end of the year by the Japanese firm which will become the most prominent plant in the South Plains, sources here said. The beginning of the year is pointing to the start of the mills and to plans for a joint Texas-Dutch venture to have an "open-end" spinning plant in operation at Lubbock during the next cotton marketing year.

The "open-end" process is said to be especially well suited to the types of cotton grown on the Plains, which usually produces 45-50 per cent of the Texas cotton crop and around 15 per cent of the entire U. S. output.

**Briscoe Shares Announcement**  
Monday's announcement was made jointly by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Naohichi Seto, president of Daiwa Spinning Co., Ltd., headquartered at Osaka, Japan, the firm that will build the plant.

T. Konishi of Osaka, managing director of the company, was present for the ceremony here. Also present was Roy B. Davis of Lubbock, consultant to the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University and a leader in the effort to bring textile processing to the Plains.

A specific site was not announced. Spokesmen in the governor's office, however, said the plant would be "in the Lubbock-Plainview area."

Briscoe and Seto said Daiwa will "establish a cotton spinning mill in the heart of the cotton rich South Plains" and will employ 750 persons within the first five years of operation.

The announcement culminated several months of negotiations among state industrial leaders, the Texas Industrial Commission and Daiwa officials.

The plant will be named Daiwabo Texas, Inc., officials said, and "will be equipped with the most modern textile equipment available," including 50 sets of spinning frames utilizing what has been called a revolutionary

"open-end" process. Production of 800,000 pounds of cotton yarn per month will be possible until a second stage of expansion doubles that capacity, with the addition of 50 additional sets of spinning frames.

**Joint Venture**  
The initial \$15 million investment is a joint venture, with Daiwa associated with Toyoda Automatic Loom Works, Ltd. and Marubeni (America) Corp. Toyoda will manufacture the equipment and Marubeni will market the product.

Briscoe said production will begin in January 1975. Seto will be president of the total operation.

"It has been agreed with state officials that assistance will be provided to Daiwa in locating 100 acres for the site, full service utilities and industrial training for the initial work force," officials said.

Daiwa plans to expand the plant, officials said, to make it a fully vertical textile operation including weaving and finishing facilities.

**25,000 Bales Needed**  
The plant initially will consume approximately 25,000 bales of cotton a year, spokesmen in Briscoe's office said.

When the Daiwa plant is expanded, Briscoe said, Texas "will have realized one of the

goals of this administration and one of the goals for our economy."

"We will then be exporting totally finished products — not exporting our raw fibers and later importing them from other states and nations as finished products," the governor added.

Carl Cox of Dallas, executive director of the Natural Fibers and Food Protein Committee of Texas, said there are strong prospects for additional Japanese plants to be built in Texas to use Texas cotton where it is grown.

He said the Japanese move comes as a result of a major policy change on the part of the Japanese, a decision to move more of their textile manufacturing to the source of the raw product.

**Projects Listed**  
Cox said the Japanese, who have built 11 large textile mills in Brazil since 1966, have given him the following indications, in addition to the announced Daiwa plant:

Kowa Textile Mill of Nagoya, Japan, has sent its board chairman to discuss plant location with Cox's office and the Texas Industrial Commission.

The Floyd County sheriff's office and Lockney police are investigating vandalism damage to tires on cars parked at Lockney High School Friday night. Routine investigations by the sheriff's office involve reports of stolen bicycles and license plates and defaced highway signs between Floydada and Silvertown.

Interment was in Ralls Cemetery.

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

Survivors in addition to her parents are two brothers, Scott, a student at Texas Tech and Clay of the

home; two sisters, Sherri of Houston and Rusty of the home and grandmothers, Mrs. W. H. Simpson Sr. and Mrs. Orb Tye, both of Floydada.

Dr. Floyd C. Bradley officiated for the service. Interment was in Floyd County Memorial Park under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

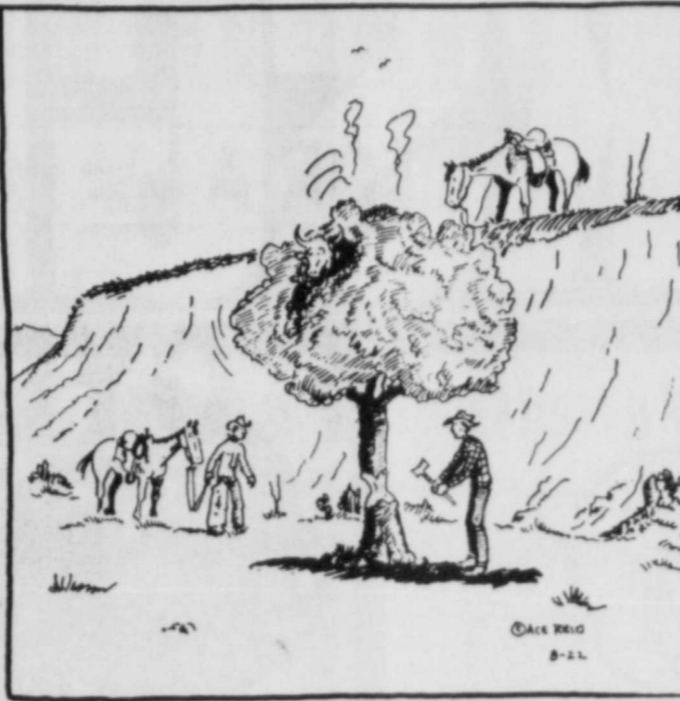

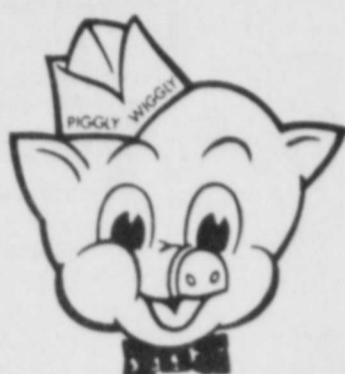

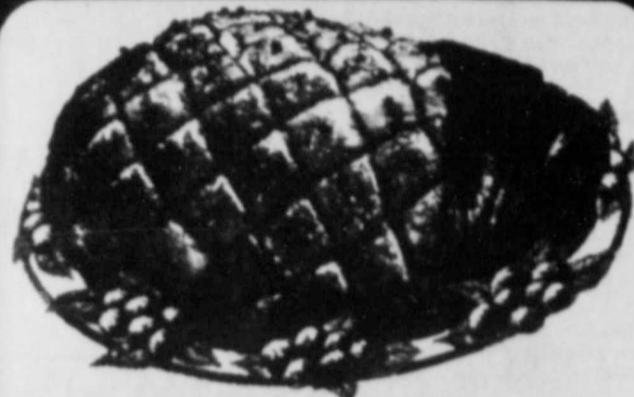
