Board Considers New School Hours

According to a new school hour plan designed by the Texas Education Agency as much as 15% power savings can be achieved and the Floydada school board devoted a considerable amount of time at their regular meeting Tuesday night in discussing the plan.

According to the statement issued by the Education Agency the governor is requiring:

- set all thermostats at 68 degrees during cold weather and at 78 degrees during warm weather, with the 76 degree variation for areas of high humidity;
- reduce the setting of all thermostats to 65 degrees a half hour prior to the departure of students from a building and reset the thermostats to 68 degrees one hour prior to the arrival of students in the morning;
- schedule, for the months of January, February and March, classes to end at 2:30 p.m. for all students (3:30 p.m. Daylight Saving Time);
- schedule all student activities to the extent possible, including athletic events, in the afternoons during the months of January, February and March;
- turn off all unnecessary lighting;
- close off and reduce heat to the minimum in all portions of buildings not necessary to the instructional program;
- where possible, plan maintenance and custodial work to be done during the day rather than at night.

The board voted to start school at 9 a.m. and close at 3 p.m. January, February and March if daylight saving time begins in January. The new plan allows a school five absentee days without makeup due to bad weather, and on extremely cold days school could be cut to four hours per day. Superintendent A. E. Baker was in a

meeting with other superintendents in the Floydada district at press time, and it is possible that Floydada school hours might be 9:30 to 3:30 if other schools in the district so desire.

Class periods would be cut throughout the day to arrange the shorter school day.

The board also discussed other ways of saving energy. . . 20% savings could be made in bus fuel if the school went to a four day school week, students who drive their cars to school could save gas by riding the buses, schedule less night meetings, plan athletic bus trips with all teams possible on each bus, schedule competition closer to home.

In other business the board opened bids for the sale of three school buses. Chris Enriquez bought the 1960 Chevy for \$1,005, D. E. Krouse bought the 1966 Chevy for \$2,033, and Bush Distributing Co. bought the 1967 Chevy for \$2886.50.

The board approved letting bids on roof repair for the south wing of Andrews Ward Elementary.

All board members were present, superintendent Baker and business manager Claude Estes.

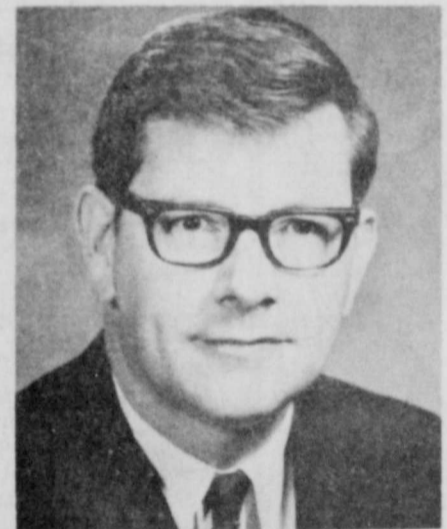
Father Ralph Zincer will be away during the holidays and Rev. Clifton Cochran will be present for Confession

Ray Farabee Seeks Senate Office



Ray Farabee, a Wichita Falls businessman and attorney, has announced his candidacy for the Texas Senate in the 30th District. A Democrat, Farabee will seek the Senate seat being vacated by Jack Hightower who has announced for U.S. Congress in the 13th District.

The 41 year old attorney expressed his concern over the growing lack of confidence in government and stated his belief that citizens who care must become involved in order to reverse the trend.

Active with the State Bar of Texas, Farabee serves as co-chairman of the Responsible Citizenship Committee.

He is a member of the Legal Aid Committee. His past service to the State Bar includes the Legislative Committee and the Special Task Force

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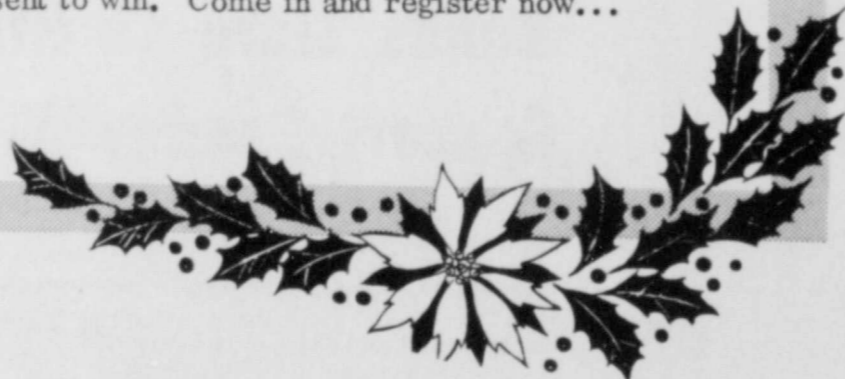


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SOUTH PLAINS NEWS by Mrs. Murray Julian

Smith's To Celebrate Wedding Anniversary

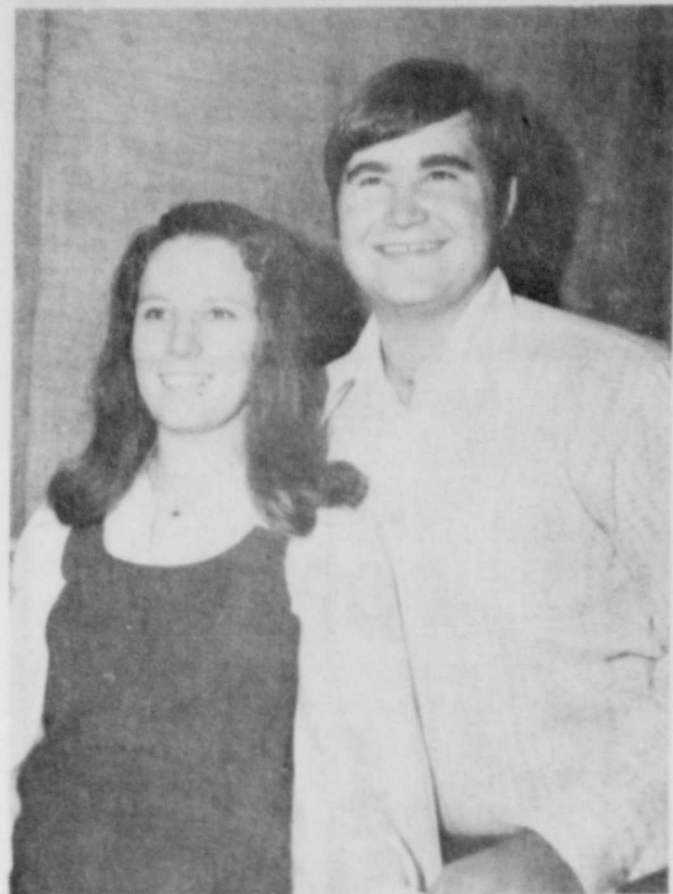

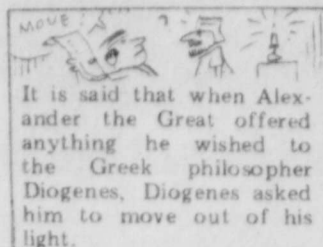

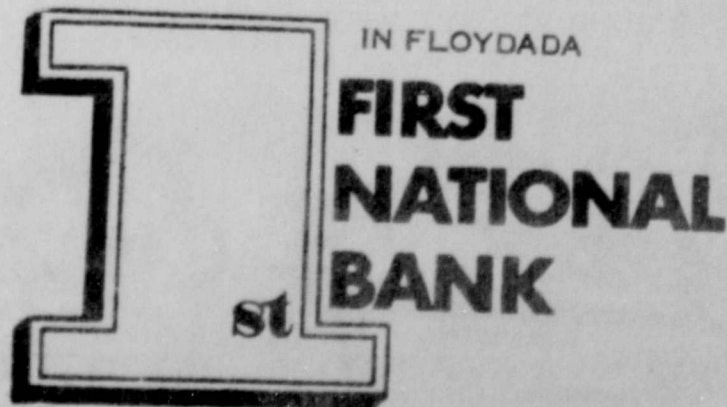

County Agent's Corner

Taking advantage of any fertilizer supplies when they are available ought to be foremost in the minds of producers in planning for crops in Floyd County in next season. Reports greatly indicate that nitrogen and phosphate shortages will be with us throughout 1974 contributing to these shortages at the dealer level are insufficient supplies of natural gas increase and fertilizer export, release of reserve acreage for producer, higher crops prices and transportation difficulties.

Field fertilizer application on the heavier soils is well established by research conduct here in Floyd County and across the South Plains. Where phosphate applications need to be made, these applications are just as effective if made in the fall, but nitrogen applications return greater yields if they can be applied in the spring to prevent leaching losses. The leaching possibilities is not as good a disadvantage as the possibility of not being able to obtain adequate nitrogen fertilizers next spring due to

the shortage. Floyd County farmers should take special interest in obtaining soil test results on their farm this winter so that available fertilizers can be applied to the soil that most need it. Most soil test data from the High Plains greatly show that less than half of the soils will report profitably to application of phosphate so phosphate material should only be applied to deficient areas. Also there are instances of appreciable nitrogen carry-over. If this is the case, nitrogen rates could be reduced on that crop of the farm and higher rates of nitrogen applied to the areas that are deficient. Feedlot waste is another possibility of obtaining adequate fertilizer supplies. There is much evidence to indicate that a 10-ton application of average feedlot waste is sufficient to

produce maximum grain sorghum yield without commercial fertilization. Proper fertilization has become a major contributor to profitable yields. By careful planning and proper application of the fertilizers, they will be available to maximize profits from Floyd County crops. Green bugs have been building in the wheat for the last several weeks. There have been considerable amounts of insecticides applied for control at this time. Farmers should be carefully checking for green bugs infestations and assess the economical population for control just because a few green bugs are present does not mean that an insecticide application is necessary. There are some guidelines present on effective research in the control of green bugs in small grains. Irrigated crops can

usually withstand larger green bug populations than dryland before yield losses occur. A reliable guide in determining the need of treatment in small grains is: Plant Height (inches) 3-6; Number of green bugs per linear foot: 100-300; Plant Height: 3-8; number of green bugs per linear foot: 200-400; Plant Height: 6-16; Number of green bugs per linear foot: 300-800. Care in looking for green bugs and assessing the populations should be taken by all producers and good judgement should be used in the application of insecticides. Research has shown that reducing the recommended amount of insecticides has given excellent control of green bugs. For further information producers should contact the County Agent, fertilizer chemical salesman.

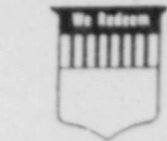

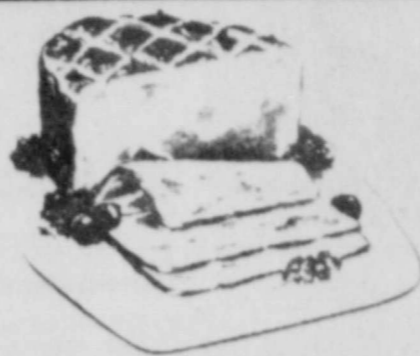
