Floyd Banks Set All-Time Deposit Record

Over \$35 Million

On December 31, 1973, a bank call, Floyd County's bankers a look at their deposit situation discovered they have set an all-time high with over \$35 million on deposit at the First National Banks of Floyd and Floydada.

Although both banks had been setting deposit records all year, the total exceeds anything ever expected by the bankers. And there's a possibility deposits will go much higher on the 10th of January when much of the cotton and some of the grain from crop money will be deposited.

One banker pretty well summed up the reason for the record deposits. . . . as the Floyd farmer's prosperity goes. . . so goes the economy and the bank deposits. Floyd farmers have just experienced a record crop year and record prices for those crops.

Lockney First National Bank's deposits were up from \$9,771,903.87 in 1972 to \$14,377,692.68 in 1973. Loans were up a little, from \$4,654,531.19 to \$4,902,576.46.

The Floydada First National Bank was up in deposits from \$15,998,125.00 to \$20,200,273.51. Loans were also up a little, \$7,093,533.00 to \$7,508,905.56.

Levelland, Lubbock Tip Hand On Japanese Textile Industry

While Levelland and Lubbock Industrial foundations tipped their hands to the area press about what they are offering the Japanese textile firm Daiwa to locate in their communities, the Floydada Development Company declined to reveal what it has offered Daiwa to locate near Floydada.

Bill Hale, head of the Floydada Development Company, has continually pledged to Daiwa representatives and the Texas Industrial Commission silence on negotiations until decision is made by Daiwa.

Now, Floydada has the advantage of knowing what competing towns are offering and this might prove beneficial in getting Daiwa to locate near Floydada.

The following publicity report by Mel Tittle, reporter for the Lubbock Avalanche Journal appeared Tuesday: "A Japanese company planning to build a \$15 million cotton spinning mill on the High Plains may have to weigh higher taxes against water availability in its final decision on a plant site.

An announcement of the location for the Daiwa Spinning Co. Ltd. venture could come during the latter part of this month, spokesmen for the Texas Industrial Commission have indicated.

Representatives of industrial foundations, chamber of commerce affiliated organizations, in Lubbock, Levelland and Floydada met in late December with three officials of the company to discuss incentives and proposed sites.

The Levelland foundation offered the company a free 100-acre site outside the city limits thus exempt from city taxes, 71 acres of water rights, \$30,000 in cash and free sewage disposal.

Store Hours Discussed

Floydada business people discussed opening and closing hours at a meeting Wednesday afternoon. Generally, the local business people favored moving both opening and closing times 30 minutes to an hour later after January 6, when year-round Daylight Saving Time goes into effect. Floydada schools will change to a 9-a.m.-to-4-p.m. schedule on Monday, January 7, and most of the merchants at the Wednesday meeting favored changing business opening hours to parallel the school opening hours.

However, Daiwa officials are rumored to be concerned over the dropping water table at Levelland.

Lubbock's foundation offered only 50 acres of land southeast of the city for development of the plant.

Daiwa has requested land connected to city utilities but outside the city limits in order to avoid city taxes. According to John Logan, chamber of commerce manager, city regulations eliminated this possibility. "The city has a policy of annexing developed property when utilities are run to the site," he explained.

Floydada industrial foundation chairman Bill Hale refused to disclose the terms his city has offered Daiwa. "They've told us to stay close-mouthed on the deal and we've tried to do everything they asked," Hale said.

Logan said Lubbock city taxes on the plant would be approximately \$250,000 per year.

If the plant were to locate in Lubbock its initial 450,000 gallon per day water supply would be reclaimed from sewage effluents at the "going rate" of 14 cents per 1,000 gallons, according to Logan.

The remainder of the plant's eventual usage of 2 million gallons would come from the city's fresh water supply at the normal rate of 34 cents

per 1,000 gallons.

"Ours was a flat offer, not a bid in competition with the neighboring cities," Logan said. "The plant would be good for the area no matter where it is developed."

Logan said the industrial foundation stressed Lubbock's assets as the center of the cotton producing area, the airport's availability as a transportation facility and a county-wide labor force of 200,000.

Request Increased

The chamber manager said Daiwa had first asked for 50 acres of land and then increased its request to 100. "Our first offer was 50 acres, but they can get the 100. There's another 50 for sale," he said.

Earlier reports have said early phases of the Japanese plant will be operational in 1975 with subsequent development planned. The projected payroll is more than \$2 million annually.

The mill will use open-end spinning machines produced by the Toyoda Automatic Loom Works Ltd. Open-end spinning is a relatively new technique which makes efficient utilization of High Plains-type cotton.

The open-end process is rated most efficient in the formation of coarser yarns for which shorter, lower

License Plate Renewal Applications In Mail

AUSTIN — Owners of some 8.4 million motor vehicles in Texas will have some important mail coming their way early in January.

Registration renewal application will be put in the mail shortly after the holiday season by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The same quick and easy method made possible by modern computer technology will be in effect this year as it has been in the last few years.

Vehicle owners can save time that used to be spent waiting in long lines at county tax offices throughout the state by ordering their 1974 license plates by mail.

All that must be done is to send the entire three-part application by mail to the county tax assessor collector in the owner's home county, enclosing the registration fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to cover handling and mailing.

There are three things to remember:

1. Leave the three-part form intact. Don't separate the three parts.
2. Mail it to the county tax office in your home county. (Mailing it to the Highway Department will only delay getting your 1974 license plates).
3. Be sure to include the registration fee, plus \$1 for each vehicle for postage and handling.

You may apply for license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't mail plates until after February 1. Owners should allow at least 30 days from the time they apply for the license plates to be returned.

In-person registrations will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, at substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application procedures have speeded up the process, waiting lines will grow progressively longer as the April 1 deadline approaches.

What they are selling is not a tangible hard good or even a direct service, but a solution to one of the most dreaded social problems in our country today — drug addiction.

The cost of the solution comes in many forms. One is the donation of beef on the hoof to feed the approximately 1,600 men, women and children now living in Synanon.

Last year local cattlemen donated 175 head of beef to help Synanon in fighting drug abuse and addiction. This year Synanon members will again be contacting cattle feeders, hoping to procure part of their yearly need of 500 head of beef.

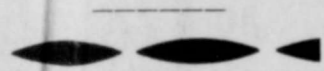
Synanon is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization, founded in 1958. It is now nationally recognized for its work in rehabilitating drug addicts, alcoholics, and people with similar character disorders.

Headquartered in California, Synanon offers help to people from all over the country. Some 16,000 men and women have come to Synanon, and many are now leading responsible, productive lives.

Mike Haan, 22, was born in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. By the time he was 18 he had run the gamut of drug abuse from glue sniffing to shooting heroin. Finally, Mike was arrested and facing a five year prison term. A North Carolina judge gave Mike a second chance, sending him to Synanon instead of prison. Today Mike lives on Synanon's ranch in Marin County, California, and works to help obtain Synanon's needs for food and equipment.

Pam Anderson, 22, is a native Californian. She experimented with drugs for a year and a half in the Berkeley California community. Then, at 17, she came to Synanon. Today she runs the Agricultural Department at the Synanon Ranch, including supervision of 55 acres of oat and hay production and landscaping of all the ranch buildings.

While in the Southwest, Synanon representatives will be contacting judges, probation officers, police officials and others to make known Synanon's availability to as many people as possible. Anyone can enter Synanon free of charge as long as they have a sincere desire to work hard and help themselves. Arnette Giles, Volunteer Mother

What can one person do? Ask Mrs. Arnette Giles. She's been doing it all her life, as her 40 "children" can testify.

Born in Pearllington, Mississippi, 73 years ago, Arnette Giles was abandoned by her parents and shunted from one relative to another. Despite mistreatment, she recalls, "it never made me bitter, only it made me try harder."

Married to the Rev. Charles Giles, a United Methodist preacher, Mrs. Giles took in a 5-month-old baby boy whose mother was dying. That was in 1934. He went on to become a jazz musician in Los Angeles with a band of his own. Throughout the years since, while raising five children of their own, the Gileses always seemed to have room for another.

Most of the children were abandoned. Some of them were considered hopelessly retarded. One child who was given no chance to walk, not only walked but completed high school.

Although Mrs. Giles had completed only one year of high school herself, she strongly encouraged her "children" to get all the education they could. At the age of 68, she returned to high school and received an equivalency diploma "with distinction." To increase her skills, she then enrolled in a program for special education in the University of Southern Mississippi.

"We as parents," she said, "should teach our children to respect retarded children. They're God's children. He must have had a reason for making them - and it's our business to exercise our love and our talent, such as it is. I wish I had more that I could give, but I can only give myself as I am." People like Arnette Giles should make the rest of us wonder how much we can give.
