

# Births, Deaths, Marriages Decline From 1972 Records

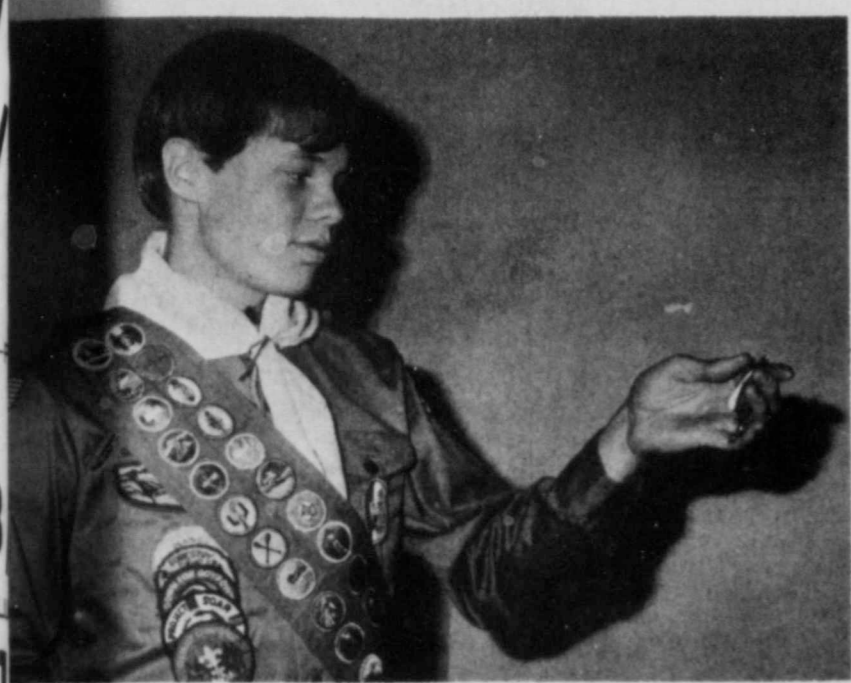
Statistics in births, deaths and marriages showed a decline in 1973 in Floyd County over the 1972 period, but it was increased by three. The birth rate in the county usually shows in excess of 300. This does not mean over 300 Floyd County women give birth each year, but means there are that many births in the county. Statistics show that women from Hale, Grayson, Floyd and other counties give birth in Floyd County hospitals. The births are recorded as county births.

Starting in 1969, there were 361 births in the county. Eleven more in 1970; 23 more in 1971; 32 more in 1972 and a decline of 40 births in 1973.

As to deaths in the five year period, there were 99 in 1969; only 39 in 1970; 77 in 1971; 87 in 1972 and 79 for 1973.

Marriages were on the up-swing in 1969 with 121 licenses issued. They fell to 89 in 1970; increased to 99 in 1971; 113 in 1972 and fell back to 105 for 1973.

Divorces actually granted in the county in 1969 totaled 34. There were 21 in 1970; 36 in 1971; 24 in 1972 and 27 for 1973.

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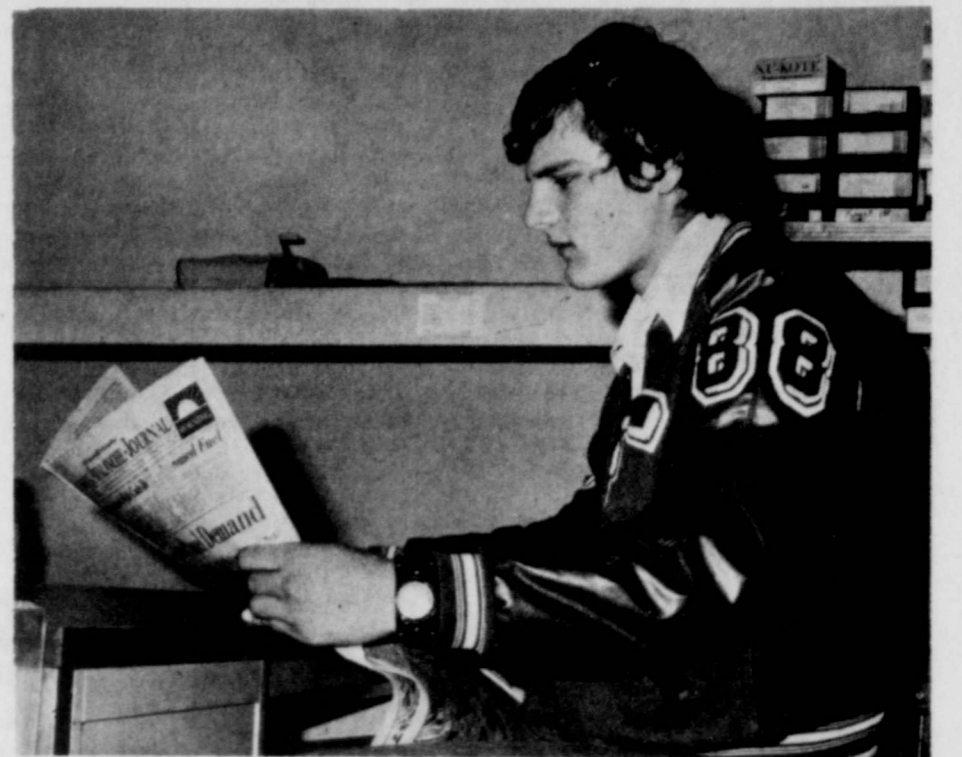
## Lynn Becker Named To All-State Football Team

John Clark of Lockney was named to the first team defensive backfield. Other area first-team all-stars included Skip Smith of Littlefield, an offensive line pick, and Morton's Larry

Thompson, another selection to the defensive secondary. Jay Pollard of Post was named to the second team offensive line.

Becker, a senior, caught 25 passes for 499 yards and three touchdowns during the 1973 season and was a mainstay at defensive end for the Whirlwinds. ## Football Banquet Saturday

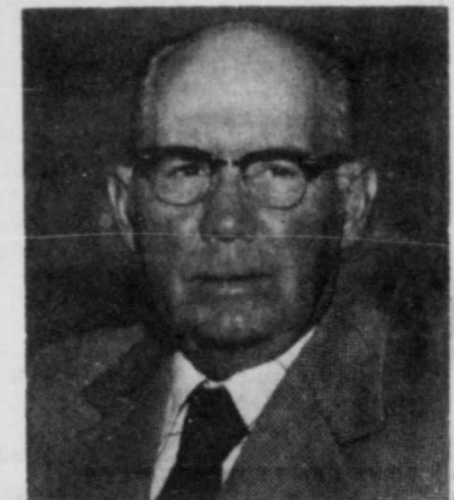
The Whirlwind Football Banquet will be held Saturday (January 12) at 7 p.m. in the Massie Activity Center. The

55 MPH Limit Set In Texas

AUSTIN (UPD) - The State Highway Commission Tuesday ordered Texas' speed limits lowered from 70 to 55 miles per hour at 12:01 a.m. Jan. 20, but agreed to consider exempting tire test vehicles.

Frank Liams of Houston protested the proposed exemptions and questioned the need for any speed reductions.

"This energy crisis in my opinion has been created," Liams said. "But if you're going to do this (reduce speeds to conserve gasoline) no one should be exempted."

Representatives of two South Texas tire test companies asked the commission to make special provisions to allow their vehicles to continue to travel legally at 70 mph.

**Cotton Harvest Passes Two Million Bales**

The South Plains cotton harvest is now past the two million bale mark, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Samples from 2,052,000 bales had been classed at the Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland offices through Friday, January 4, and the four offices had 80,000 unclassified samples on hand at that time. Estimates indicate that there was enough cotton in trailers and in ricks to make 400,000 to 500,000 more bales.

Personnel at the four offices tested and classed samples from 93,000 bales during the week ending the 4th.

Quality of cotton continued excellent and this crop continues to be one of the highest quality crops ever produced on the South Plains.

Grades 32 and 41 continue the predominant grades at Lubbock, making up 68 percent of all classed. Grade 41 made up 55 percent, Grade 31, 13 percent, Grade 32, 13 percent and Grade 42, 11 percent.

Staples were predominantly 30 to 32. Sixty-seven percent had staple lengths of 31 and shorter and the remaining thirty-three percent stapled 32 and longer.

Micronaire readings continued excellent. Seventy-eight percent of all cotton tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 5 percent was in the high micronaire range of 5.0 to 5.2 and 2 percent was in the very high range of 5.3 and above.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA reported

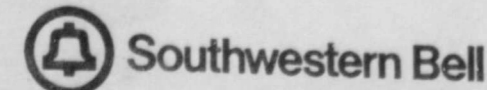

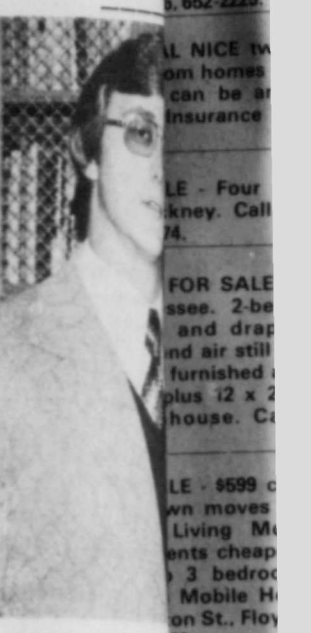
