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## Free Blood Pressure Clinic Here Wednesday

February is Heart Month, and as part of many local activities during the month, the Floyd County Unit of the American Heart Association is sponsoring a free blood pressure clinic next Wednesday, February 6, in the county courtroom on the first floor of the courthouse in Floydada.

The testing will be conducted from 3 to 9 p.m. Wednesday (so Wednesday-night churchgoers may come before or after prayer meeting). All residents of Floydada and the surrounding area are urged to attend the clinic.

Those who attend the clinic will be given a card with their blood pressure reading. If at that time the reading shows to be above the normal range, it will be suggested that they see their own physician.

High blood pressure, or hypertension, is a leading cause of disease and death in this country. One in every six adults has some elevation of blood pressure. High blood pressure can result in stroke, congestive heart failure and kidney failure and is a major cause of death in black Americans.

High blood pressure is a silent, mysterious killer...silent because it has no characteristic symptoms; mysterious because, in more than 90 percent

of the cases, the cause is unknown, and there is no cure.

Surveys of various population groups indicate that only 10 to 20 percent of hypertensive patients are currently receiving preventive treatment. Approximately half of those with high blood pressure do not know that they have it.

Treatment of even moderate high blood pressure can prevent its dangerous end - results—stroke and heart and kidney failure—and reduce the risk of heart attack.

How Blood Pressure Is Measured—An inflatable rubber cuff connected to a graduated glass tube filled with mercury (or a pressure gauge), called a sphygmomanometer, is used to determine blood pressure. The cuff is wrapped around the upper arm. Enough air is pumped into the cuff to cut off circulation. As the air is gradually released, the physician or nurse listens, with a stethoscope, for the first sound of blood rushing through the artery while noting the pressure on the gauge at that moment. The pressure measured at this point is called systolic, indicating the pressure exerted when the heart contracts. After noting the systolic pressure, the physician or nurse continues to release air from the cuff. At the point where the sounds become muffled or disappear, the pressure registered on the gauge is checked. This is the diastolic pressure, which is the lowest level that occurs between beats, when the heart is at rest.

Floydada Whirlettes staged a quarter comeback Tuesday to defeat Tulia 45-42 in a 4-AA girls' basketball game. The Whirlettes were down three to two with about a minute to play when Donette Marble drove the ball and made a short jump shot. She was fouled in the act and sank the free throw to tie the game at 42-42. Whirlette guard Sonja Cole took the ball and Debby Johnson drove in for a layup and scored the winning point in the final seconds left in the contest. She also made the free throw to bring the score to the final 45-42.

was 29-15 Tulia at intermission, and the Tulia girls had led 15-10 at the end of the first quarter. The Whirlettes closed the gap to 34-24 at the end of the third period, then outscored the Hornets 21-8 in the final frame.

"This has to be the best team effort we've had all year long," coach Sally Miller said after the game. "Our kids were down and they fought back all the way."

The victory gave the Whirlettes a perfect 3-0 record in second-half District 4-AA play. It was Tulia's first district loss. The Whirlettes lost only to Tulia in the first round, when the Floydada girls went 4-1. The FHS girls have won 17 and lost six overall this season.

Upcoming for Floydada: a trip to Abernathy Friday and the regular-season finale against Idalou here Tuesday. A junior varsity girls' game preceded the varsity contest with Idalou.

## Stockholders Vote

## Major Improvements

One of the best attended annual meetings in several years of the Floydada Country Club Stockholders was held January 24 at the Massie Activity Center.

Proposals to amend the by-laws, major improvement recommendations, and the election of new directors were the order of business. The change in the by-laws to give the board authority to set dues was approved after a lively discussion. Previously any change in membership dues had to be done by amendment by two thirds of the members present.

Two proposals were submitted for improved facilities. The addition of nine holes to the golf course, construction of a new club house, paving of parking facilities, storage for maintenance equipment, and a new water system were rejected by accepting the second proposal which omitted the addition to the golf course.

It was felt by President Al Harrison that an increase of dues to \$15.00 per month would be sufficient to pay the indebtedness on the proposed improvements. It is hoped that approximately twenty per cent of the capital improvements can be raised by voluntary subscription among the members. In order to indebted the country club property the constitution will have to be amended.

Three new directors, Kenneth Bain, Jr., C.L. Davis, and Gail Wilson were elected to replace Al Harrison, James Leftwich, and Dan Fry. The carry-over directors are Kinder Farris, Ernest Smitherman, and James Word.

As soon as new officers are elected, the board of directors will begin study of actual costs of the improvements recommended by the referendum vote taken at the meeting.

Another outstanding speaker on Friday was Texas' own Anne Armstrong, counselor to President Nixon. "President Nixon has become pretty philosophical about the Water-gate scandal and has turned his problems over to his lawyers," she told us.

Mrs. Armstrong said she urged Nixon to make the tapes public when their existence was discovered to prove his innocence. "He said he would never give up the tapes," she recalled.

She said she was not bothered by the existence of the tapes of her conversations with Nixon but said "it sure does bother me" when she thinks of anyone but Nixon hearing them. She said she hopes the tapes disclosed will not inhibit persons speaking with Nixon.

Mrs. Armstrong is an outstanding speaker, seems very calm and collected, is nice looking and no doubt very capable in the position she occupies.

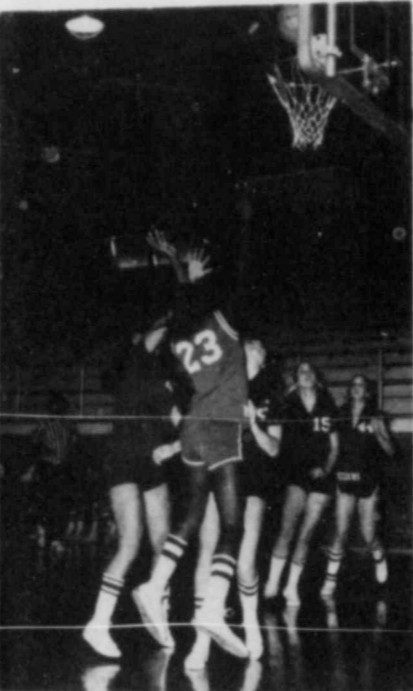

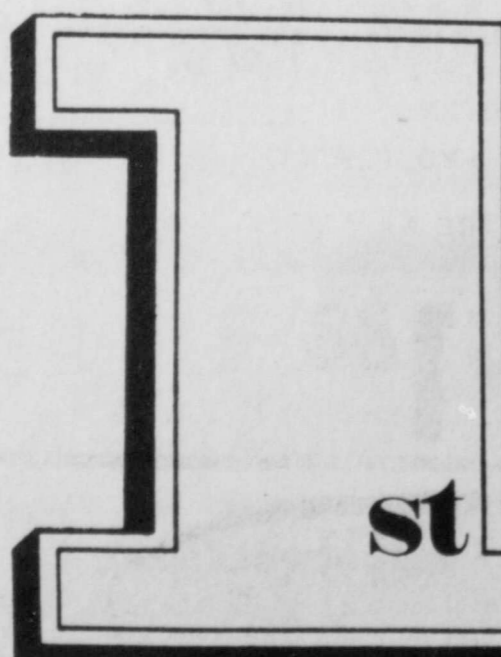
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JV Whirlettes Take Third In Tourney, Defeat Ralls

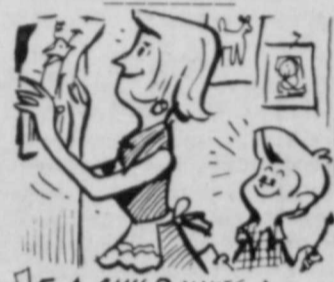
**Delbert Bybee Honored On Birthday**

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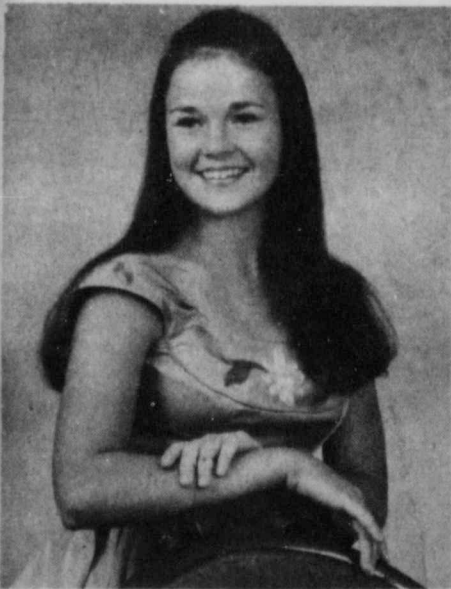

The Federal Excise Tax on telephone service continues to drop.

The first drop in the rate was January 1, 1973, when the tax was reduced to nine percent from the 10 percent figure which had been standard for a number of years.

Jim West, manager for Southwestern Bell, pointed out that a one percent annual reduction in the excise tax is scheduled to continue through 1982, when

the tax would be terminated.

The 10-year reduction schedule was established by federal law in 1970.

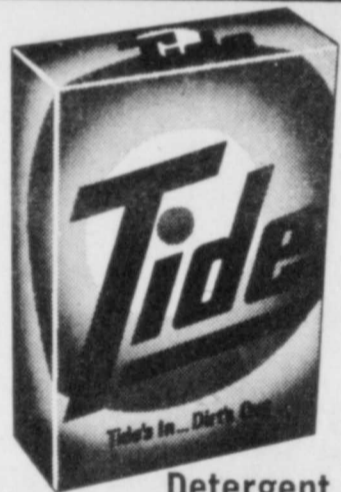
