Whirlettes Bi-District Champions

Defeat Olton 50-48

It was an exciting game from the opening whistle until the final buzzer as the Floydada Whirlettes defeated the Olton Fillies 50-48 Monday night in the Plainview high school gymnasium.

The filled-to-capacity gymnasium rocked and rolled as the screaming fans saw the Whirlettes take the Bi-District Championship.

Now, it's Stratford in the 1 p.m. game of the regional championship Saturday in the Lubbock Coliseum.

It was nip and tuck from the very beginning as Olton led 20-19 at the end of the first quarter. Olton was still ahead by one point at halftime, 28-27.

Donette Marble was most of the offense in the first quarter, making four lay-up shots and shooting seven out of seven free shots. Nancy Puckett made four out of four free shots.

The second quarter was all defense with each team scoring only eight points. Nancy had made only one point in the second quarter when the coach substituted Karen West. Nancy had four fouls at this time.

SECOND HALF

Nancy entered the third quarter and really sparked the team as she made ten of the 12 Whirlette points that quarter. (Nancy never fouled in the last half of the game).

Things were looking up for the Whirlettes at the end of the third quarter as they led 39-36.

In the last quarter forward Debby

Johnson made one of the most sensational plays of the game. She charged in toward the goal, passed the ball to Donette. The pass was a little high and Donette missed it. Debby circled under the goal, retrieved the ball right on the border line, dribbled back out, shot and made two points.

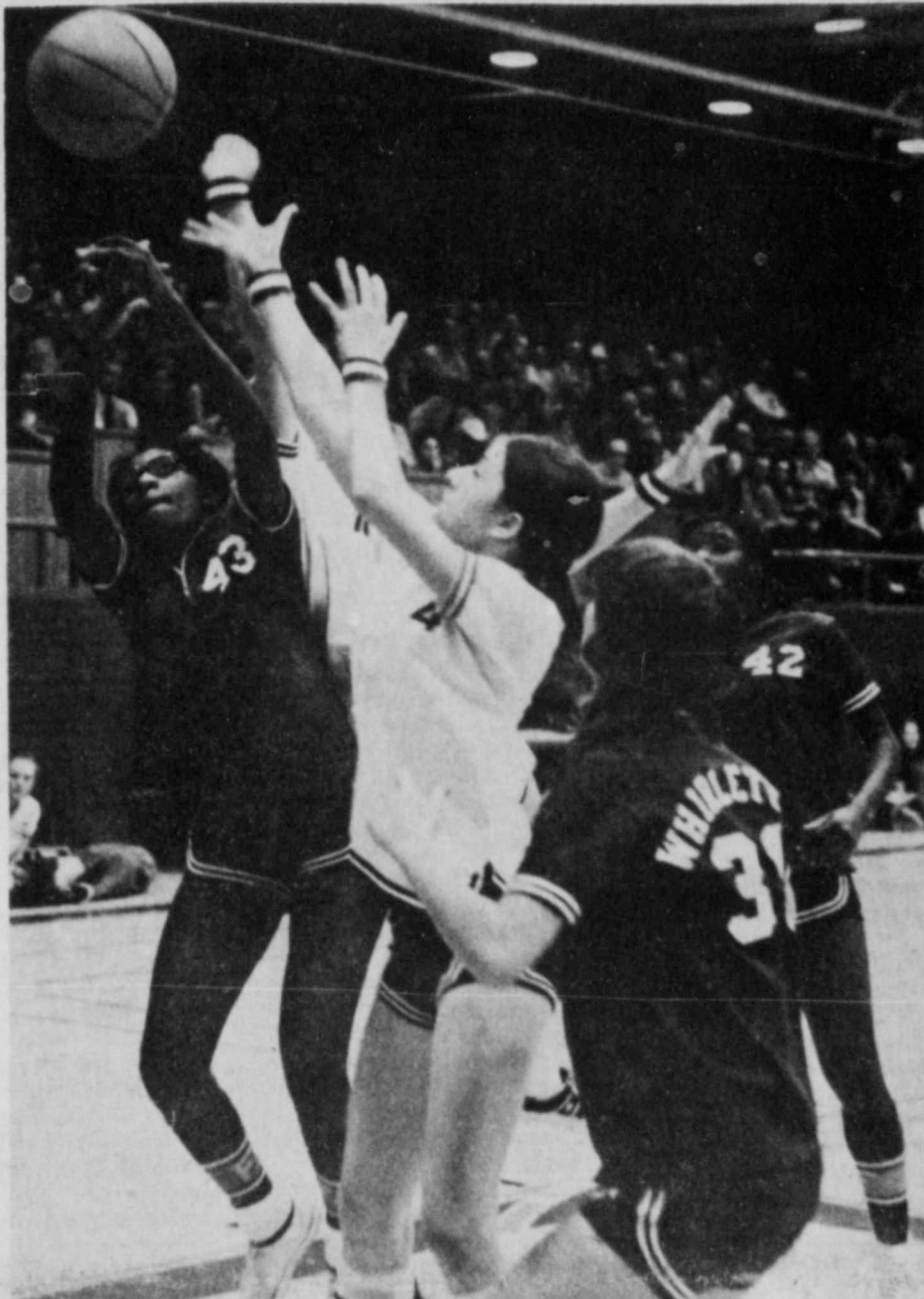
With 5:25 left in the game Floydada was still barely ahead 43-40. A 3:10 Olton was back in the lead 44-43. Then Donette made a couple of field goals and with 1:42 left in the game Floydada was ahead 47-44. Debby made a couple of points which the referee wouldn't let her have. Then with 0:52 left Debby made a couple more. Floydada led 49-44... the biggest lead of the night. Olton came right back and narrowed the score 49-46. Donette made a free shot, Olton made a field goal and the score was 50-48 with 0:09 left in the game.

Guard Pauline Cooper was literally covered up by the three Olton forwards. However, she quickly called time out and saved the ball for Floydada.

The guards, Kathy Hinsley, Sonja Curry and Pauline stalled the ball the rest of the game. No doubt, it was the best performance by the guards this year.

Looking at the scoring totals, it was Donette with 25, Nancy with 14, Debby with six and Karen two.

For Olton, the scoring was spread three ways: Culwell 18, Hodges 16, and Mueller 14.

Puckett Provided Second-Half Spark; Whole Team 'Kept Cool'

The Whirlettes really "kept their cool" Monday in the bi-district playoff game with the Olton Fillies, according to the Floydada girls' coach, Sally Miller — even when they were behind

in the fourth quarter, they never let up. "I was pleased with the way the girls showed poise when they really needed it," Coach Miller said.

Donette Marble led the scoring for the Whirlettes Monday, but it was Nancy Puckett who came back in the third quarter (after being taken out of the game early in the second period with four personal fouls) and provided the "spark" to the Whirlette offense after halftime. Puckett scored 10 of the FHS girls' 12 points in the third stanza. Marble sank 14 of 15 free throws in the game. Debby Johnson had six points for the Whirlettes.

Olton's Susie Culwell, who had averaged 32 points a game until Monday, was held way below her average by the Whirlette guards. Sonja Curry, who was guarding Culwell most of the night, drew praise

from Coach Miller for her defensive work, along with the other Whirlette guards, Kathy Hinsley and Pauline Cooper. Curry had six rebounds and four steals for the night, Hinsley had five rebounds and a steal, and Cooper caught seven rebounds, stole the ball once, and blocked two shots. It was Cooper who, trapped on the sideline near the Whirlette bench with nine seconds to play and a two-point lead, called time out and possibly preserved the lead for the Whirlettes.

The Whirlettes came out in a man-to-man defense in the first quarter, thinking it the best way to stop Culwell, but switched to a zone after the Fillies scored 20 points in the opening period.

The Whirlette coach again expressed gratitude to the fans for their great crowd support.

City Council Approves Paving Bid

The Floydada City Council accepted the bid of Hi-Plains Paving Company in Plainview for seal coat paving of several blocks in the city this spring and summer. The bid was \$20,250 for 75,000 square yards of seal coating.

Three companies submitted bids to the Monday night meeting of the council. Hi Plains has received the contract for several years under the city's plan of constant improvement of all paved streets in the city.

The council also approved calling of an election on April 6 for the election of three councilmen. Deadline for filing for the election is March 6. The terms of Leroy Burns, Johnny Bill Sue and Gary Carthel are up. Carthel and Burns were appointees to finish the terms of Frank Goen and Gayle Baucum.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council adopted an ordinance requested by Pioneer Natural Gas that will allow Pioneer to adjust rates monthly to both the city residents and the city's power plant.

Approved letting of bids for aerial mosquito control of the city this summer.

Authorized a public hearing on the 1974-1975 budget of the city at the next council meeting, March 11.

Discussed bids on new hospitalization insurance for employees.

Appointed Bill Hale, Ed Wester and Frank Barrow for a term of two years on the Floydada Housing Authority.

All of the council was present except Jerry Thompson and Leroy Burns.

Heart Drive Sunday

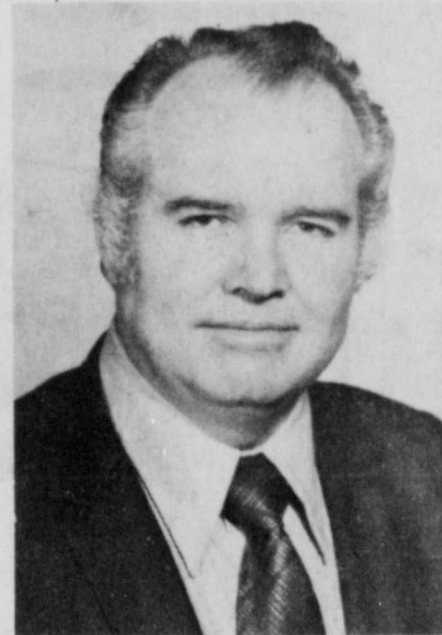

LOCKNEYITES DAUGHTER WINS TRIP TO LONDON

Mrs. Lynn Keck, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. McCandless of Lockney won a trip recently to London, Rome and Morocco for being one of the top real estate brokers in the Houston area. She has been in the real estate business for three years and been employed with her present employer for a year and a half.

Accompanying Mrs. Keck were other top salesmen from the Houston area. They left for a 12 day tour and will be back Feb. 20.

"Simply dial 1-800-292-9600 and ask any questions you wish. It won't cost you a cent from anywhere in Texas," Finnell said. "These telephones are staffed by Convention personnel who will give you facts instead of opinions and rumors."

The toll-free phone is staffed Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and at night requests are recorded and answered the following day.

Finnell, a candidate for the 30th District senate seat being vacated by Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon, said that as his Convention duties permit he will campaign in West Texas, including visits now planned in Floydada, Childress and Seymour.

Texas Soybean Champion Carthel, Wins Orient

LOCKNEY — Robert Carthel, winner of the 1973 Texas 5-Acre Soybean Yield Recognition Program, has been awarded a trip to Japan, Taiwan, and Hong Kong on the 1974 Elanco-Treflan Soybean Champions Tour. The Texas Champion's yield of 67.6 bushels per acre topped all other entries in the state's official soybean yield contest.

Carthel and his wife, Nancy, will join 22 other state champion couples on the two-week visit to major soybean importing countries. During the tour, the champions group will observe soybean market development activities financed by U.S. farmers and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Sponsor of the tour is Elanco Products Company, manufacturer of Treflan soybean herbicide.

In 1973, Texas soybean growers produced nearly \$26 million of soybeans for export. A major purpose of the tour award is to encourage high yield practices to push Texas' soybean income even higher. Carthel's winning yield was more than double the 1973 Texas average of 27 bushels per acre. He grew

his championship beans on an 11 1/2 acre irrigated, clay loam field that had been followed the year before.

Carthel attributes his high yield to fertilizer, water and herbicides. "We need to fertilize soybeans just like any other crop," Carthel says. He applied 200 pounds of anhydrous ammonia, and 250 pounds of 7-14-4. He also added 20 pounds actual sulphur per acre.

Carthel watered his soybeans five times with a gated pipe system. He watered June 19, July 3 and 17, and August 6 and 20, adding 2 acre-inches each time.

"We had excellent weed control," he says. "We put out 1 pint per acre of Treflan with a tractor-mounted boom." Carthel incorporated the herbicide twice with a tandem disk. Prior to applying the Treflan, Carthel chiseled and disked the grazed wheat.

Carthel used York certified seed in the winning field, because "York is a good yielding bean that branches and pods higher off the ground." He planted his beans on May 17 in 40-inch rows at a rate of 73 pounds of seed per acre. He tries to plant about 12 seeds per foot of row.

Doyle Warren, Floyd County Extension Agent, certified the winning yield. The soybeans were harvested on October 23 at 9 percent moisture. Carthel didn't encounter any harvesting problems, "but we only lost about one bushel per acre because of shattering."

Carthel raised 150 acres of soybeans, averaging 51 bushels per acre on the entire acreage. "I'm going to continue growing soybeans because they're a clean, easy crop to grow," Carthel says. "And as long as domestic and foreign use keeps increasing, soybeans should remain a profitable crop to grow."

The Carthels will leave the U.S. on March 12. The first stop is Tokyo, Japan, where the champion group will be briefed by the U.S. Embassy staff on U.S. soybean market development projects. They will also attend a Japanese soy food cooking school.

HANNAH GINZBURG, WILDERNESS LOVER

How much is a river worth? It's hard to put a price on a river. But Hannah Ginzburg of Pasadena, Texas knew that once you lose one, you'll never get it back.

So she took the cause of saving 12-mile-long Middle Bayou, outside Houston, after the tragic death of her friend, Armand Yramategui, of the Texas Conservation Council.

Mr. Yramategui had been scheduled to testify before the Harris County Commission against turning the wilderness river into a storm sewer for home-developers. Mrs. Ginzburg testified in his place.

She took on major opponents, including a large oil company. She also organized canoe trips downriver for newspaper reporters and television cameramen. They saw, and showed the public, the last wilderness tract in the area - a tangled thicket of trees, bushes and wild flowers that sheltered deer, alligators, turtles and herons. The clean waters teemed with crabs, shrimp, redfish and spotted trout.

Mrs. Ginzburg wrote articles in newsletters and magazines and penned guest editorials in weekly papers. After three years, Hannah Ginzburg, supported by an aroused public, got the federal government to help fund a survey and then purchase a 956-acre tract along the river. She was responsible for raising several million dollars to match the government funds.

Hannah Ginzburg did not save the bayou single-handedly. But, without her, Armand Bayou - named for her slain friend - would be a sewer instead of a natural treasure. In God's providence, you have a contribution to make to the public interest. Find out what it is and get going.

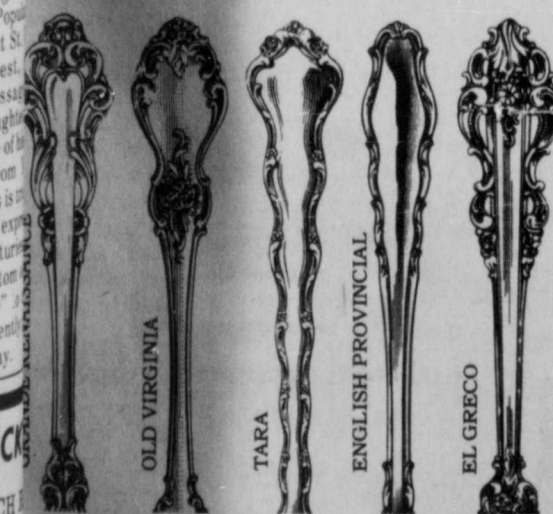

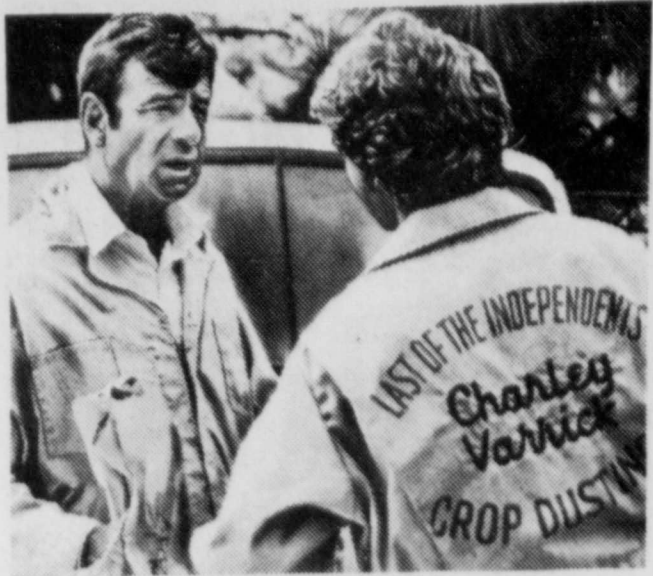

consider the dry February hasn't been so dry years. Back in total of .45 of recorded in from October through February.

At present a total of 1.23 has been recorded. It rained 1.06 back in October, and there has only been .17 of moisture via light snow and ice since that time.

Soil moisture is at a very low level over all sections of the South Plains with a recent survey by National Weather Service showing that the soil contains less moisture than has been

recorded during the past six years, when records were started.

In a thirty-day forecast (through February) the weather forecasters say that temperatures will be aver-

age to slightly above normal and precipitation is due to be less than normal.

February is normally a dry month with precipitation averaging around a half inch. Last year's February was better than usual with 1.04 of moisture recorded. A brighter note from the

weather man, said there is a probability of precipitation increase towards the end of the month, and there may be small areas which will accumulate beneficial amounts of moisture.

Looks like moisture will have to be supplied through irrigation if the area is to

have a good soil moisture reserve at planting time. In fact, farmers with small irrigation wells are already watering the "beds."

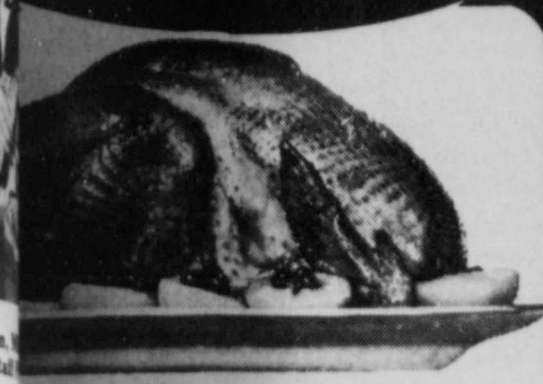

Commissioners Court Meets

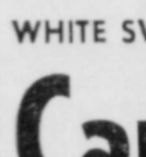
