## Attendance To Hear McFarland At Chamber Banquet

An estimated 385 persons attended the Floydada Chamber of Commerce banquet in Duncan Elementary Cafetorium Tuesday night and expressed their enjoyment of keynote speaker Dr. Kenneth McFarland with several rounds of applause and a standing ovation.

Highlight of the event was an award given to Bill Hale in appreciation of the many hours of work and leadership he gave trying to get the \$15 million Daiwa textile plant located in Floydada.

"Although, Floydada did not get the industry, we feel that Bill did a good job of putting Floydada before the eyes of the state, and Floydada offered Daiwa more, considering size of town, than any of the other competing

towns," master of ceremonies Wayne Russell said as he made the award presentation.

Hale is president of the Floydada Development Company.

Another award was made to Bob Kirk, who led a new member drive for the Chamber of Commerce, signing up 67 new members . . . possibly a record membership drive for the Floydada Chamber.

Incoming president Clarence Denton expressed the appreciation of the Chamber to outgoing president Russell for a job well done and predicted a bigger and better year in 1974 as the city continues its theme of "friendly, progressive Floydada."

Dr. McFarland expounded on how the individual person could help his

community and praised the free enterprise system. He drew the crowd's applause on the following statements:

"We have more important things to consider than whether Rose Mary Wood erased 18 minutes of tape."

"In 1974 let's declare there's nothing wrong with waving the flag of the U.S.A."

"There is nothing more honorable than wearing the uniform of the U.S.A."

"There is nothing the government can do as well as the free enterprise system can do...for example the postal service costs increase, while the telephone company gives better service at less cost."

On the positive side, he said the U.S.A. spends more money on

education than all the rest of the world combined. He praised America's young people when 100,000 of them gathered in Dallas for "Expo 72" and the police did not have one complaint. He emphasized that we must teach our children basic rights and wrongs.

In conclusion Dr. McFarland said, "the American system is framed by a spiritual foundation...Americans are created in the image of God and this country recognizes this through our many freedoms."

The picture isn't perfect, but you don't improve it by destroying it."

In referring to the chamber, he said, "your Chamber of Commerce holds a big responsibility in providing leadership to achieve whatever goal this community defines for itself."

## Preston Watson Promoted To Principal

At the February school board meeting Monday night superintendent of schools A.E. Baker announced to the board the retirement of Duncan Elementary Principal W.P. Nicholson Jr.

After considerable discussion the board decided to promote Preston Watson from athletic director and assistant high school principal to full time elementary principal. Assignment

to school campus will be made later.

To replace Watson as athletic director, head football coach L.G. Wilson was selected. FHS principal Charles Tyer will be assuming full principal duties which he performed before Watson was appointed athletic director and assistant principal.

In other action the board approved salary raises for both Wilson and Tyer...also cost of living raises for the other school system principals: Bob Copeland, A.W. Coltharp, and Plan A supervisor Bill Rhodes. Watson also received an increase in salary.

The board also approved two year contracts for all principals, Wilson, and Rhodes.

Nicholson is retiring after 34 years of teaching and principal experience. He has been in the Floydada school system 20 years, 18 as principal.

Watson has been teacher, principal

and coach some 29 years. He was elementary coach and principal at Archer City school system before coming to Floydada.

He was FHS football coach from 1950 to 1960. He has served as athletic director and assistant principal at FHS the past six years.

Wilson has been in the Floydada school system for six years as head football coach.

#### OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the school board called the election for Saturday, April 6...deadline for filing for three places on the board is March 6. The terms of Thomas Warren, Jerrold Vinson and Betty Holmes are up.

The board accepted the bid of Lydick Roofing Company in Lubbock to repair the roof of the south wing of Andrews Ward school. Bid was \$2780.

The board also decided to get bids on

repairing the gymnasium floor and discussed new state requirement of schools going under the worker's compensation insurance plan.

All board members were present.

### City Council To Sell Bonds, Buy Power

In a very light vote the citizens of Floydada voiced their approval 154-22 Tuesday in favor of a \$600,000 revenue bond to buy a 2500 KW engine to increase power at the city power plant.

The \$600,000 also includes additional space in the plant and all necessary installation costs.

Mayor Parnell Powell told a Hesperian reporter Wednesday morning that the council was pleased with the approval of the people to stay in the electricity business and increase needed power in the plant.

"We will have a meeting tonight with the bonding official and start work on the project immediately," the mayor said.

The Floydada city council did not have to have the approval of the people, but called the vote by the

The Floydada High School student council's old-newspaper collection drive, originally scheduled last Saturday but postponed because of the Whirllette basketball team's play in the regional basketball tournament that day, has been rescheduled this Saturday, February 23, according to student council president Marc Smitherman.

The council has asked that Floydada residents who have old newspapers to donate to the drive leave them on driveways, porches or sidewalks (anywhere visible from the street) Saturday morning so that representatives of the student council can pick them up without disturbing the donors. Smitherman asked that the newspapers be bound or sacked and not left loose.

The newspaper drive is one of the student council's community service projects. The newspapers will be taken to West Texas Paper Company in Lubbock for recycling. The Saturday collection will be the student council's final pick-up.

Rites for Mrs. A. H. Hammons, 89 year old Childress resident and sister of Henry Love of Floydada, were conducted yesterday in the Childress Assembly of God Church. Mrs. Hammons, who is a former Lockney resident, died Monday night in the Harmon Hospital in Hollis, Okla.

A native of Gadsden, Ala., Mrs. Hammons moved to Childress from Lockney in 1921. She had been residing in a nursing home in Hollis for the past two years.

Survivors include four daughters, a son, the local brother, 17 grandchildren, 24 great grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

**LUNCHEON TODAY AT FIRST CHRISTIAN**

A luncheon will be held today, Thursday, February 21, at the First Christian Church in Floydada during the church's "Week of Compassion" observance. Guest speaker at the meeting will be Walter D. Cardwell from Indianapolis.

Cardwell is the executive secretary of the office of interpretation for the Division of Overseas Ministries of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). He also serves in the field of area assistance helping the administration where there is special need. At present he is serving in this capacity for Africa where he has had many years of experience.

All members of the church and their guests are invited to attend the luncheon, from 12 to 1 p.m.

Cardwell, who was in Christian service in the Republic of Zaire for 13 years, also served in the office which was formerly resources and interpretation and in the department of evangelism of the United Christian Missionary Society.

A native of Louisville, Kentucky, he received the B.A. degree from Transylvania College and the B.D. from Lexington Theological Seminary, both in Lexington, Kentucky.

Mr. and Mrs. Cardwell were married in 1938. They served in the pastorates of churches in Kentucky and Mississippi. Their zeal for missions in helping others to see the needs of those in other countries led the Cardwells to volunteer for service abroad. They attended Kennedy School of Missions, Hartford, Connecticut, for special training and, after their appointment to Zaire, studied French in Montreal, Canada. They served in Africa from 1945 to 1958.

Cardwell was legal representative of the Disciples of Christ in Zaire, whose headquarters are at Mbandaka, and taught at the "Ecole des Predicateurs" in Bolenge.

In 1952 he was chosen to be director of the preacher training school at the Zaire Christian Institute.

All of the time he was in Zaire, Cardwell was engaged in evangelistic work and made many trips into the "back country" to meet with groups of Christians and to give guidance to the Zairois pastors. Part of the time he served as the mission secretary and as a representative to the Zaire Protestant Council.

From September 20 to October 18, 1973, Cardwell visited eight countries of South America making contact with most of the personnel and nationals with whom the church works.

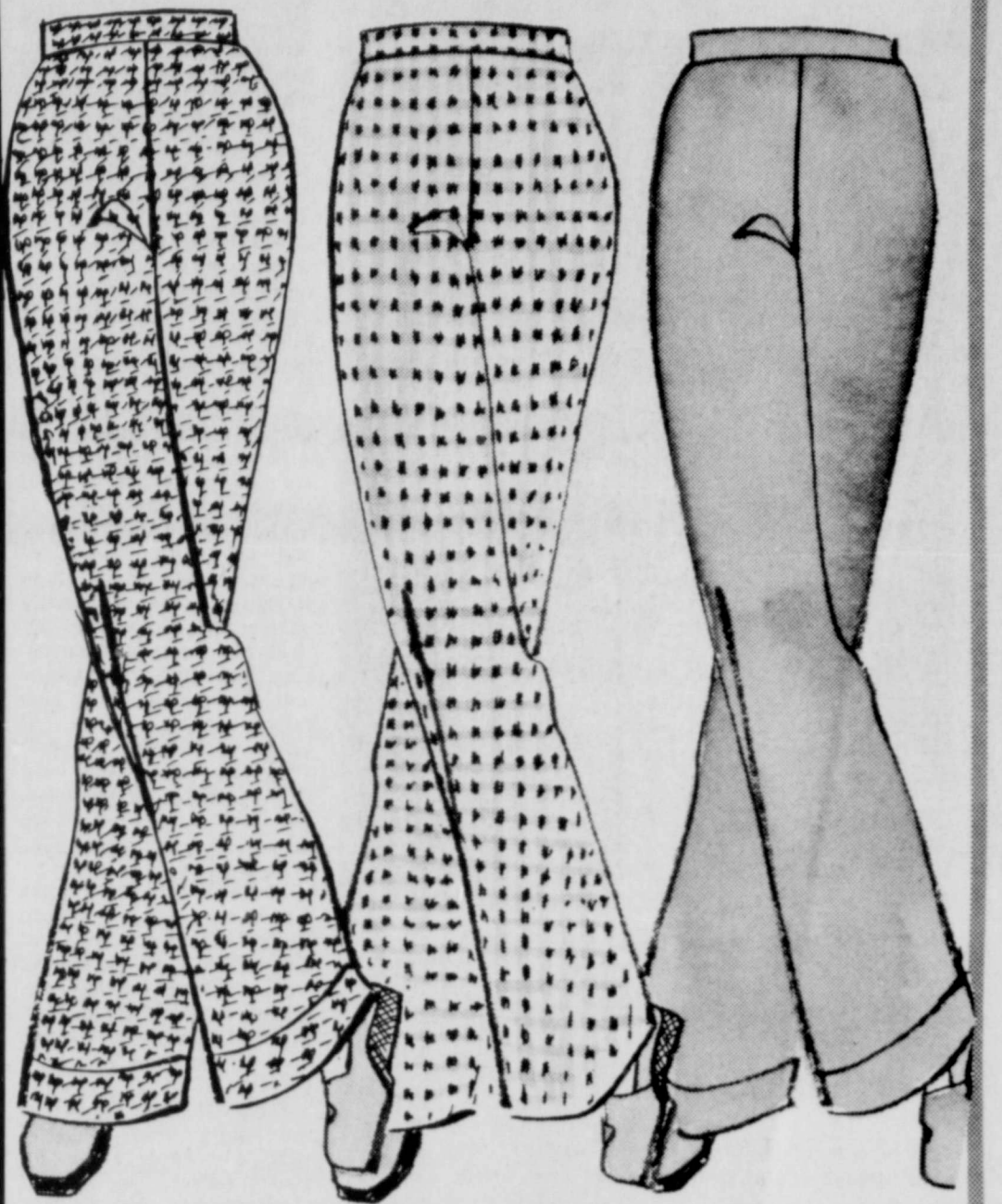

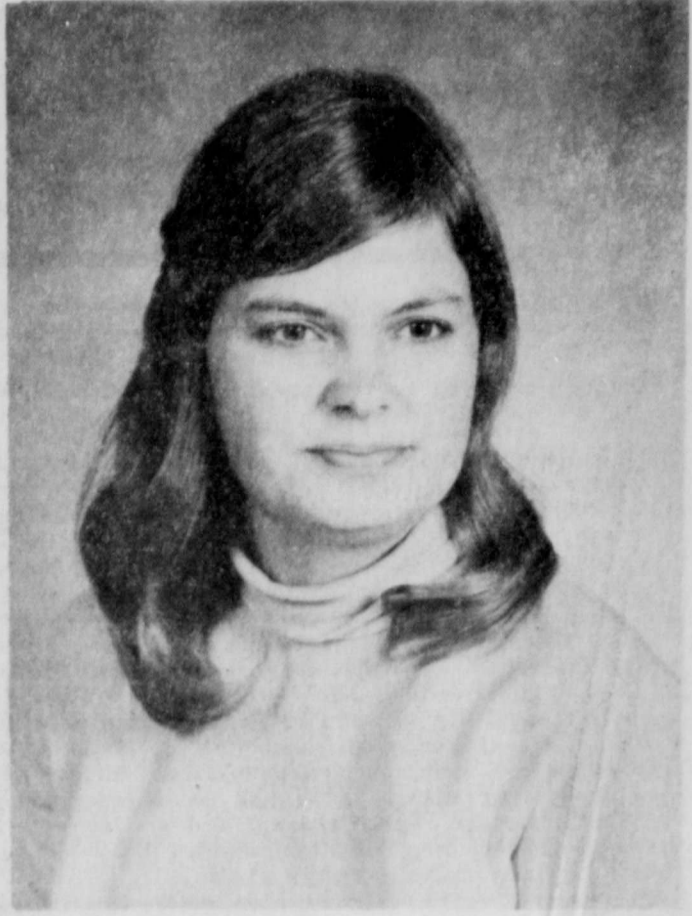

Q. I'd like to find out if I'm eligible for monthly social security payments, but I have trouble getting around. Can I call my social security office to get some information?

A. Yes. Many social security questions can be handled by telephone. You can call any office. The number is listed in your phone book under Social Security Administration.

Q. Last year my husband and I adopted a 5-year-old child through the county adoption agency. She was an orphan and, before we adopted her, she was getting monthly social security checks on her father's work record. I heard that her checks could start again. Is this true?

A. Yes. A child's payments no longer stop because of adoption. A child, like your daughter, whose payments were previously stopped because of adoption can again receive monthly benefits. Contact any social security office to reapply for benefits for your adopted daughter. Benefits may be paid back to October 1972.

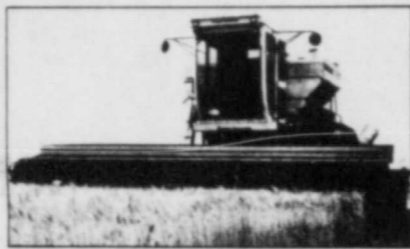

Northcutt asked the Senate Subcommittee on Agricultural Production, Marketing and Stabilization of Prices to increase loan rates and target prices for grain sorghum.  
"There simply is not enough money available through private sources to finance the total grain crop throughout the year. A more reasonable government loan level would assist farmers and their buyers in a more orderly marketing of the grain," Northcutt told the subcommittee.  
Northcutt termed an annual price escalator clause is vital to farm legislation because "with the higher cost of production, there is hardly a farmer in the United States who could survive if the market dropped to or below current target prices."  
Under the present farm law the escalator clause was deleted for 1974 and the cost of production is estimated to increase by 25 percent or more.  
The subcommittee heard Northcutt's testimony Feb. 4 in Washington, D.C.

## Education Fund Would End State Ad Valorem Taxation

AUSTIN — Senator delegate Jack Hightower (D-Vernon) said Thursday that the Education Committee's "Higher Education Assistance Fund" section would end the need for all state ad valorem taxation.  
Hightower is a member of the Constitutional Convention's Education Committee. "Under our committee's proposed method of funding, all state ad valorem taxation would be phased out completely. Taxation of real property for educational purposes has proved to be painfully inadequate for institutions such as Texas Tech University, Midwestern University and West Texas State University," he said.  
Hightower added that the fund would "insure necessary funds and a higher

quality education for colleges and universities not funded by the University of Texas Permanent Fund."  
The present Constitution provides for taxation of 10 cents per \$100 on real property to fund schools not covered by the Permanent University Fund. Under the proposed section, an amount equal to the Available University Fund would go to the 22 state colleges and

### Finnell Wants Agricultural Land Valued On Productivity

AUSTIN — Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday said this week that he is working in Austin for constitutional guarantees that agricultural land be valued according to its productivity for taxation purposes.

"I hope that this Convention will recognize that farm and ranch land must be taxed as just that — farm and ranch land," Finnell said. "What a piece of land might be worth to a promoter or subdivider in the future has no place in figuring today's tax on agricultural land."

Agricultural producers are being forced out of the business as ad valorem taxes equal or exceed income from the land. This situation must be corrected if we are to keep the producers in the business of producing food and fiber necessary to feed and clothe the citizens of Texas and this nation. "I think we should be strong and spell it out in the constitution so there will never be any doubt," Finnell said.

Finnell, now in his fourth term in the Legislature, is a candidate for the Texas Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon.

### SPAG Gets Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today the approval of a State of Texas Planning Assistance Grant in the amount of \$50,226.70 to the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG).

In addition to administering the State planning grant program, the Division is actively engaged in coordinating State planning activities and in developing assistance programs for local governments and regional councils of governments.

Funding for the SPAG planning grant comes from a \$1.7 million dollar appropriation of the 63rd Legislature.

SPAG is headquartered in Lubbock. It is an association of local governments, with membership including 38 cities, 14 special purpose governments and the counties of Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, King, Lub-

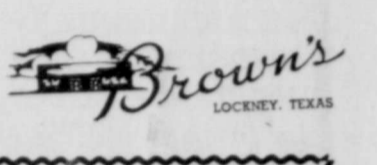

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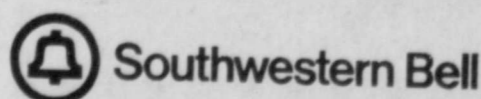

### VA Offers Income Tax Tips

The Veterans Administration is offering tips for recipients of veterans' benefits in preparing their federal income tax returns. Officials noted that, in general, veterans' benefits

are exempt from taxation, and need not be reported as income.

Interest on government life insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with VA is an exception. Since this

interest is considered income, it must be reported, officials explained.

Dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies are exempt from federal income tax, but proceeds are subject to federal estate tax.

Compensation, pension,

GI Bill, and other educational assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees, are among other major tax-exempt VA benefits.

Also exempt are grants to service-disabled veterans eligible for specially adapted

homes and cars, and clothing allowances for those whose prosthetic devices tend to wear out or tear their clothing, VA officials advised.

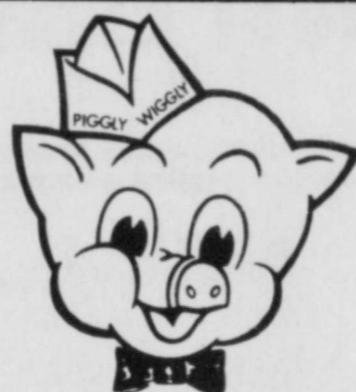
