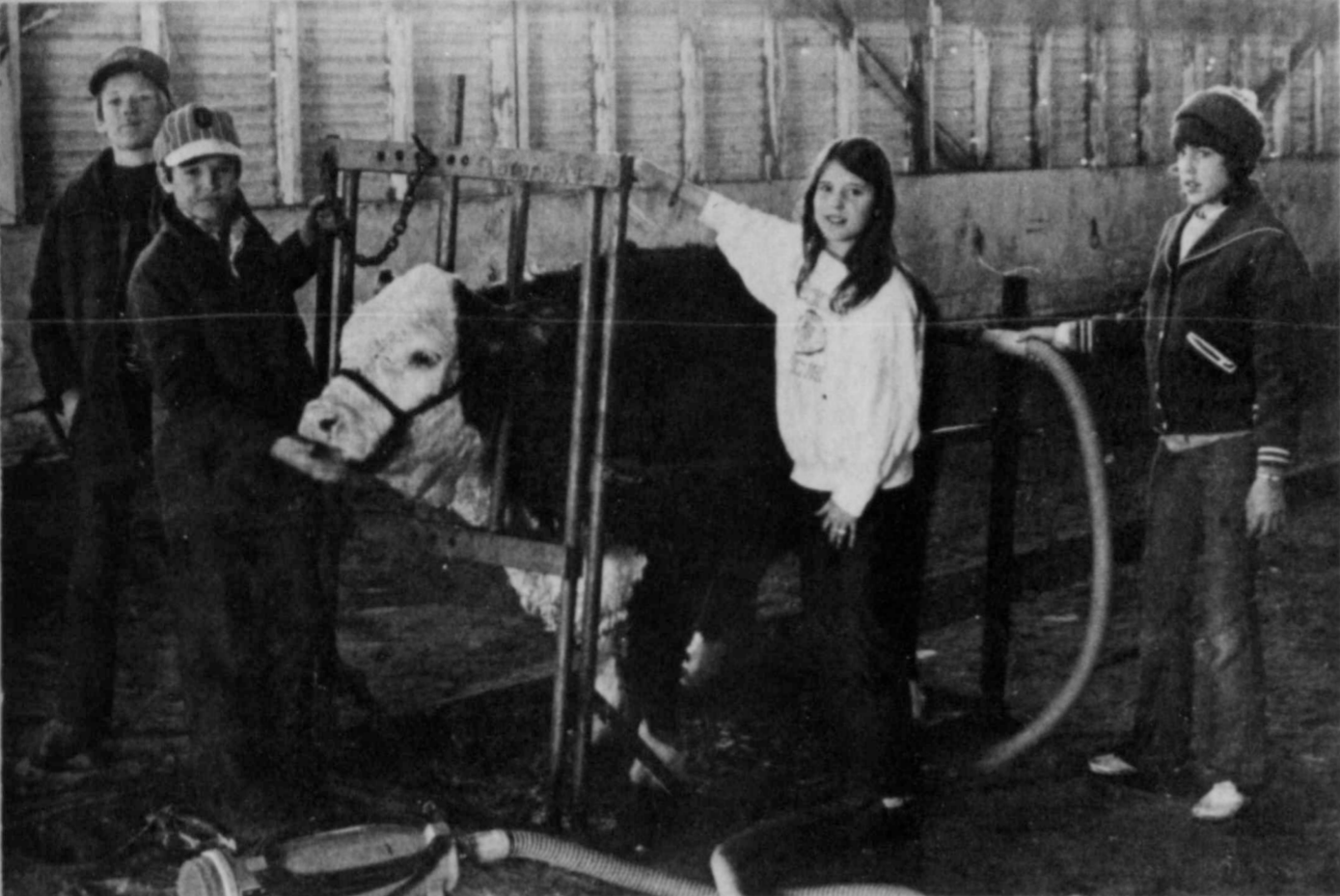

Three Local Elections April 6

Three local elections are scheduled in Floydada April 6 — the terms of three city councilmen, three school board members, and three members of the Caprock Hospital District board of directors expire on that date.

The last day to file for the city council and school board elections is next Wednesday, March 6. The filing deadline for the hospital board contest is March 12.

Councilmen Leroy Burns and Gary Carthel have filed for re-election. Both were appointees to fill the terms of Frank Goen and Gayle Baucum. There were no candidates Tuesday for Johnny Bill Sue's place on the Council.

Tuesday morning there were no candidates for the Floydada Independent School District board of trustees. The terms of Thomas Warren, Jerrold Vinson and Betty Holmes are up in April.

Candidates for the Caprock Hospital District board must file written petitions, with the signatures of 25 qualified voters of the district, with the secretary of the board by March 12 (25 days before the election). Hospital board members whose terms expire are Doyle Walls (present secretary of the board), E. A. Williams, and Clay Henry. The Caprock board members chosen in April will serve two-year terms. No candidates had filed petitions Tuesday.

Rites Pend For W.E. Bill Marrs

Funeral rites were pending at press time at Moore-Rose Funeral Home for W.E. (Bill) Marrs, a farmer in the Blanco Community. Marrs died about 8:40 yesterday morning in Lubbock Methodist Hospital of an apparent stroke. He and Mrs. Marrs had been to Del Rio with friends and were enroute home when Marrs was stricken near Colorado City. He received treatment there and later in the day was transferred to Lubbock.

A native of Santa Anna, Texas, Marrs was born to Mr. and Mrs. W.B. Marrs July 15, 1913. He moved to Floyd County with his parents in 1924 and was married in Floydada to Edith Fuller, daughter of the late Frank Fullers, May 19, 1931. The couple resided a brief time in Salinas, Calif., then returned to Texas and lived in Albany three years before returning to Floyd County. Marrs farmed in the Blanco Community.

AT BROWNFIELD TRACK MEET

'Winds Surprise AAA Teams, Take Third

The Whirlwind track team placed third in the Brownfield track meet Saturday, amassing 99 team points to finish behind the winning host team and second-place Lubbock Estacado. Track coach Joe Paty said he was pleased with the Whirlwinds' showing in the first meet of the season, especially since all the competition was from Class AAA schools.

The 'Winds (Alvin Stofel, Juan Barraza, Joe Huerta and Danny Bradford) took first place in the four-mile relay, Rance Young won the pole vault, and Danny Quisenberry was first in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Quisenberry placed second in the other hurdles event, the 330-yard intermediates. Shotputter Leslie Soto got the 'Winds' other second-place points.

Placing third for the Whirlwinds at Brownfield were the mile relay team (Lynn Becker, Steve Moore, Tom Assiter and Kelvin Ratliff), Assiter in the 880-yard dash, and Ratliff in the high jump.

Fourth-place finishers for the FHS thincleds included Steve Moore in the 120 high hurdles, Mark Craig in the discus, and the 440-yard relay team (Tony Soto, Danny Quisenberry, Rex Yearly and Kelvin Ratliff).

Soto placed fifth in the 220-yard dash, Huerta was fifth in the 880, and Barraza finished sixth in the half-mile event.

Draft On Standby Registration, Lottery

AUSTIN — Young men born in 1955 will have their Selective Service lottery numbers drawn on March 20, even though there is no draft or plans to resume callups for involuntary military service, Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas announced today.

The sixth annual Selective Service lottery drawing for the nation's young men who become 19 years of age during 1974 will be held in Washington, D.C. on that date.

"Although the nation is at peace, it is generally recognized that there is the need to maintain a strong defense capability in order to insure continued peace," Col. Glantz said. "The present 'standby' Selective Service System, which continues to register and classify young men, is a vital

part of our defense preparedness program."

Texas has approximately 110,000 19-year-olds who will have their lottery numbers established by this drawing, according to Glantz.

The Military Selective Service Act requires all young men to register with the System at the time of their 18th birthday. They are assigned their Random Sequence Number through the lottery which is held during the year in which they become 19 years of age. They are potentially vulnerable to induction throughout the calendar year of their 20th birthday; thereafter each year, they are placed in a lower priority selection group.

The President's induction authority would have to be restored by the Congress before these young men

Retirement Plan Saves Taxes

Earnings on the accumulated money are not taxable until the individual retires. The money may then be taxed as a capital gain or ordinary income, depending on the method of withdrawal.

"Any self-employed person is eligible for the program which is completely voluntary. Up to 10 percent of earned income or \$2,500, whichever is less, can be invested each year," says the Texas A&M University System specialist.

A farmer with a gross income of \$50,000 and \$20,000 expenses could defer about \$900 in taxes by putting \$2,500 into an approved retirement plan.

"Once a farmer invests in a plan, it is a permanent

investment," notes Hayenga. "If the money is badly needed, it can be taken out under stiff penalties. Also, it has little value as collateral against a loan."

A farmer can select from several options, depending on his situation. The contribution to a retirement plan may be based on a fixed number of dollars per year or expressed as a certain percentage of net or gross farm income.

An individual should file a proposal with the Internal Revenue Service before a retirement fund is started, advises Hayenga. However, he suggests consulting a banker, attorney or investment counselor before deciding to participate in the retirement plan.

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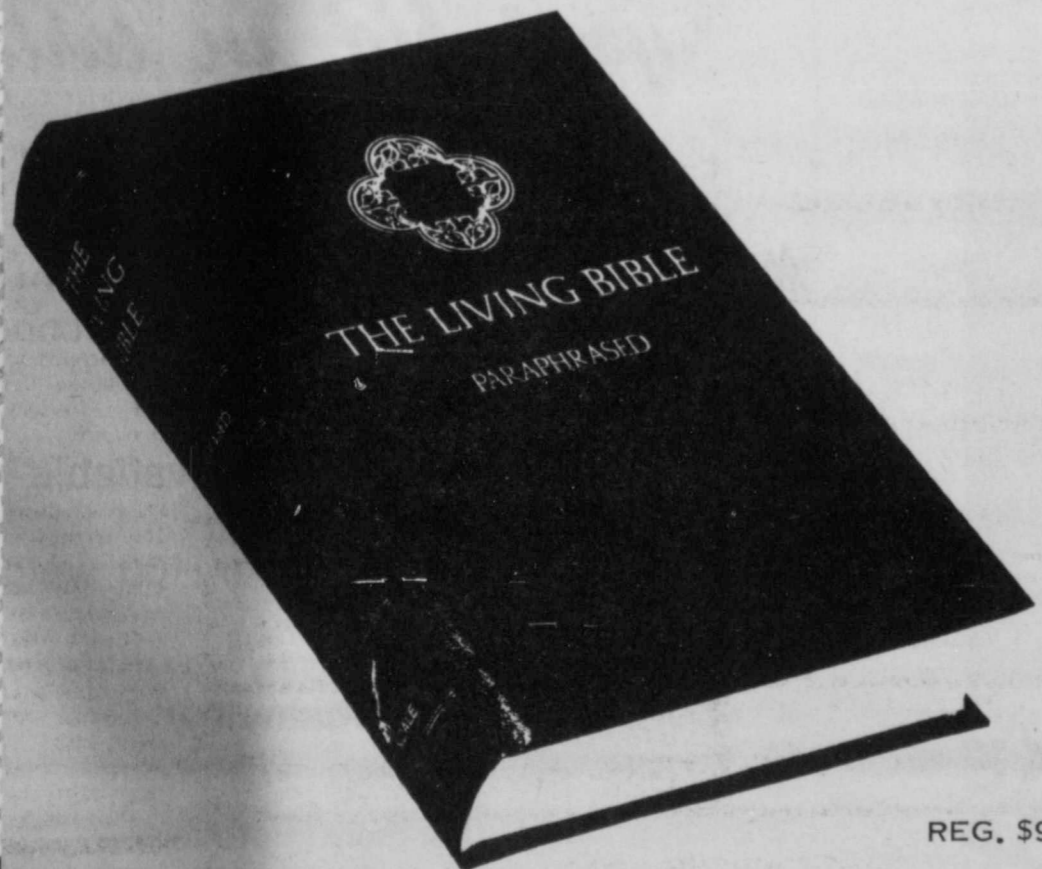

Entitled To Fuel Requirement

DALLAS — Clarification of procedures for farmers and ranchers to use in filing forms for fuel allocations were issued today by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, Regional Administrator for the Southwest Region of the Federal Energy Office (FEO).

"First of all I want to emphasize that the farmer should make every effort to solve his problem through his individual supplier," Fowler said.

"The farmer or rancher is entitled to 100 percent of his current requirements, and his supplier should see to it that his fuel is delivered," Fowler continued.

"But I also want to emphasize this does not exempt the farmer or rancher from using conservation measures like everyone else," Fowler noted, adding the warning, "This status can be taken away just as easily as it was given if the privilege is abused."

There are two instances where a person involved in agricultural production would apply directly to the FEO regional office, using FEO Form 17:

1. If he qualified as a wholesale purchaser (he buys 20,000 gallons or more annually, and none of the suppliers he has contacted are willing to accept him as a new customer as they are obligated to do under the regulations, he has the desired supplier fill out block 12 on the FEO Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office asking that he be assigned to a supplier.
2. If he qualifies as a wholesaler purchaser, and he and his supplier cannot agree on the base period allocation volumes to be provided, he has his supplier indicate the disagreement in block 12 on the Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office for resolution.

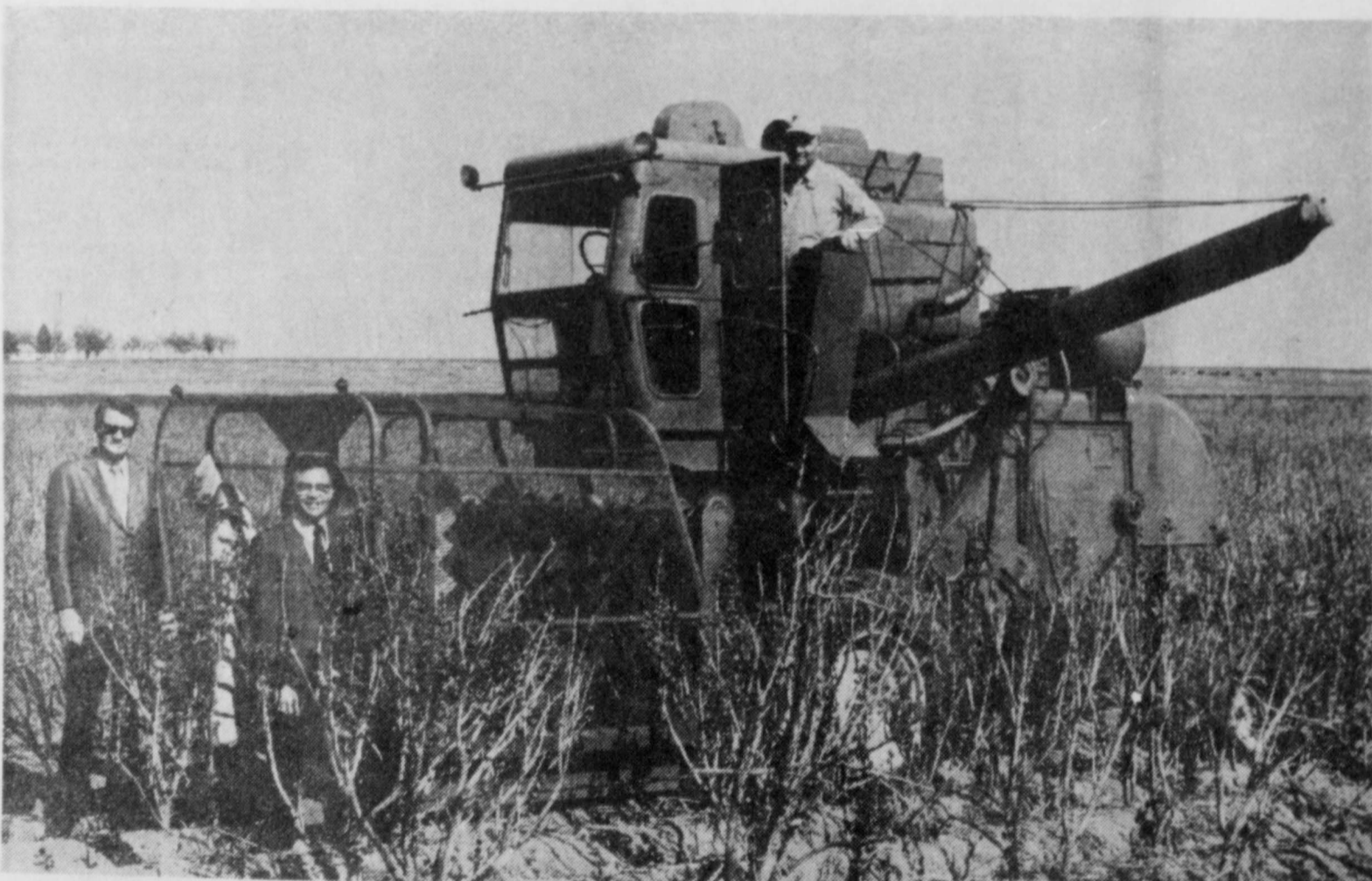

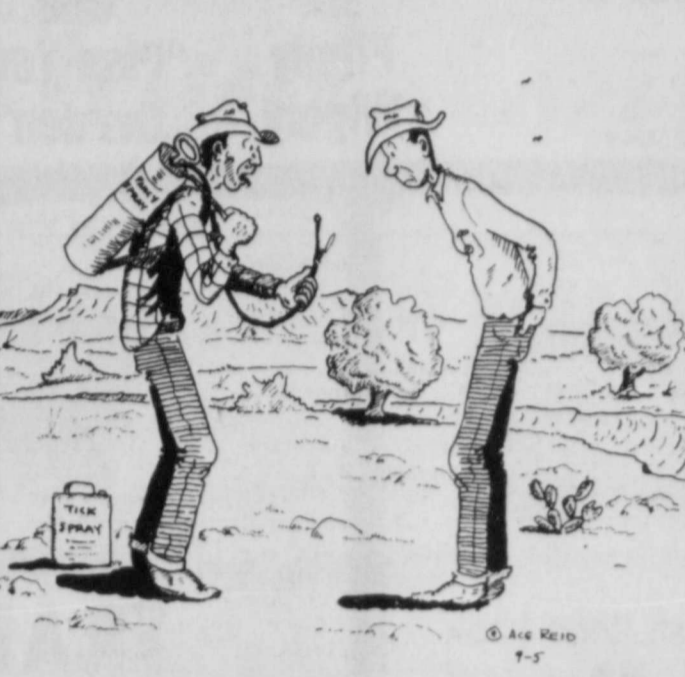

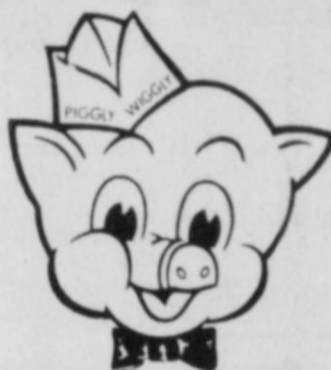
