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

Draft On Standby Registration, Lotte

AUSTIN — Young men born in 1955 will have their Selective Service lottery numbers drawn on March 20, even though there is no draft or plans to resume callups for involuntary military service, Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas announced today.

The sixth annual Selective Service lottery drawing for the nation's young men who become 19 years of age during 1974 will be held in Washington, D.C. on that

"Although the nation is at peace, it is generally recognized that there is the need to maintain a strong defense capability in order to insure continued peace," Col Glantz said. "The present 'standby' Selective Service System, which continues to register and

classify young men, is a vital

part of our defense prepar edness program."

Texas has approximately

Texas has approximately 110,000 19-year-olds who will have their lottery numbers established by this drawing, according to Glantz.

The Military Selective Service Act requires all young men to register with the System at the time of thie 18th birthday. They are assigned their Random Sequence Number through the lottery which is held during the year in which they become 19 years of age. They are potentially vulnerable to induction throughout the calendar year of their 20th birthday; thereafter each year, they are placed in a lower priority selection

Earnings on the accumulated money are not taxable until the individual retires. The money may then be taxed as a capital gain or ordinary income, depending on the method of withdraw-

"Any self-employed person is eligible for the program which is completely voluntary. Up to 10 percent of earned income or \$2,500, whichever is less, can be invested each year," says the Texas A&M University System specialist.

A farmer with a gross income of \$50,000 and \$20,000 expenses could defer about \$900 in taxes by putting \$2,500 into an approved retirement plan.

Once a farmer invests in a plan, it is a permanent


investment," notes Havenga. "If the money is badly needed, it can be taken out under stiff penalties. Also, it has little value as collateral against a loan."

A farmer can select from several options, depending on his situation. The contribution to a retirement plan may be based on a fixed number of dollars per year or expressed as a certain percentage of net or gross farm income.

An individual should file a proposal with the Internal Revenue Service before a retirement fund is started, advises Hayenga. However, he suggest consulting a banker, attorney or investment counselor before deciding to participate in the retirement plan.

Elvis Warren transferred from regular carrier to regular clerk and will be in charge of the Food Stamp Program. He is a ten year veteran who began his service August 13, 1963





DALLAS - Clarification of procedures for farmers and ranchers to use in filing forms for fuel allocations were issued today by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas. Regional Administrator for the Southwest Region of the Federal Energy Office

"First of all I want to emphasize that the farmer should make every effort to solve his problem through his individual supplier Fowler said.

"The farmer or rancher is entitled to 100 percent of his current requirements, and his supplier should see to it that his fuel is delivered. Fowler continued.

"But I also want to emphasize this does not pr sale. exempt the farmer or rancher from using conservation measures like everyone else," Fowler noted. adding the warning, "This status can be taken away just as easily as it was given if the privilege is abused."

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




