this area have been found to perform "exceptionally well" in this type of manufacturing process.

"Open-end spinning is approximately three to four times as productive as conventional ring spinning," Parker said.

Parker said he believes open-end spinning "should make rapid advances in capturing a large portion of all manufacturing". He said it has been estimated that 20 percent of all yarn produced in the world will come from open-end frames by 1980.

"We have no facts on the future, of course, but it does appear that as far as High Plains cotton is concerned, this type of yarn manufacturing will be fantastic," Parker said.

LAST LAUGH LIKELY

Parker pointed out the High Plains has been criticized for producing low micronaire (a measurement of fiber fineness or maturity), short staple cotton.

"But we may have the last laugh yet," he said.

"The results of work being done at the Textile Research Center show that low micronaire cotton can make beautiful yarns and fabrics. As a matter of fact, our studies have shown that low micronaire cotton can be spun into stronger yarns than fiber with medium or high micronaire."

In the president's annual message, Riley spoke optimistically of the future of cotton on the Plains.

Whirlwinds Working On Easter Seal Campaign

Members of the Whirlwind Football Team, led by Coach L.G. Wilson will be on downtown streets and residential areas taking donations for the Easter Seal Society. Donations for the society go to provide treatment and servie for physically handicapped children and adults in Texas.

Football players conducting the sale will be identified by the Easter Seal coin canisters they will be carrying and wearing green football jerseys.

Bob Lilly, defensive tackle of the Dallas Cowboys football team, is serving as State Chairman for the Football Boys' Lily Day for Crippled Children in Texas.

Lilly has contacted over 500 high school football teams in Texas asking that they participate in Lily Day to raise funds for the services the Easter Seal Society provides. Last year, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services to 20,570 physically disabled Texans through a statewide network of affiliates and representatives, including 18 treatment centers.

Lack Of Cooperation 'Bugging' Boll Weevil Control Program

Lack of cooperation from a few cotton producers located below the Caprock north of the Middle Pease River in Motley, Floyd, Briscoe and Hall Counties may cause this general area to be excluded from the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program in 1974. That is the action recommended by the program's Technical Advisory Committee, made up of the nation's leading entomologists in the field of weevil control.

Farmers have refused to allow as much as 15 percent of the cotton acreage in key locations within this area to be treated with insecticide in accordance with the schedule recommended by program entomologists, and this voids the primary principle which provides the basis for the program's success, reports Ed Dean, Field Service Director of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the organization responsible for coordinating the

program. "Orderly treatment of all infested acreage in an area designated as part of the 'control zone' is a prerequisite to an effective control effort," Dean said. "and when for any reason it becomes impossible to treat virtually all acreage, it is no longer feasible or consistent with the objectives of the program to continue treatments in the general area where cooperation is lacking."

Judge Orders Bankruptcy Hearing

AMARILLO
 Judge Frank R. Murray of U.S. Bankruptcy Court here has ordered a hearing at 10 a.m. March 26 in the U.S. District Court at Amarillo for the first creditors' meeting in the case of James Louie Heller, Amarillo cattle buyer and commodity trader.

Heller was declared bankrupt Feb. 28 after he submitted a statement that he was unable to pay his debts. Heller's assets and debts along with a statement of his financial affairs was filed in Amarillo Friday.

Heller claimed secured debts of \$37,000 and unsecured debts totaling \$3,154,853. Assets, including exempt property valued at \$52,500, amounted to \$876,611, the cattle buyers filings showed.

United Beef Producers, Inc., of Hereford was the creditor with the biggest unsecured claim—\$766,649. Other feedyards with claims exceeding \$200,000 were Lubbock Feedyards, \$353,653, Southwest Feedyards of Hereford, \$337,633, Lockney Feedyards of Lockney, \$213,553, and Cattle Town, Inc., of Hereford, \$210,952.

According to Heller's petition his assets include accounts re-

ceivable of \$352,237 from a Chicago commodity broker, \$120,000 from R-B&H of Chicago, the nature of which was not specified, \$172,000 in a certificate of deposit with the First National Bank of Peoria subject to a trust agreement between Heller and the Packers and Stockyards Administration of the USDA, 500 shares of the G&H Cattle Co., Inc. valued at \$25,000 and a Beech Barron airplane valued at \$43,000.

Heller claimed a \$30,000 house in Washington, Ill., where he maintains his residence, as exempt property.

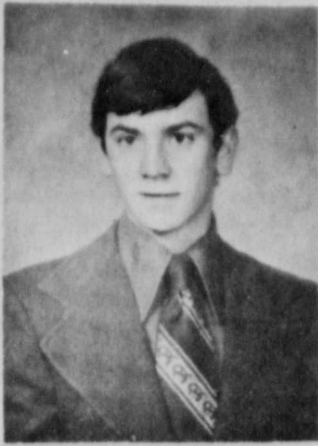

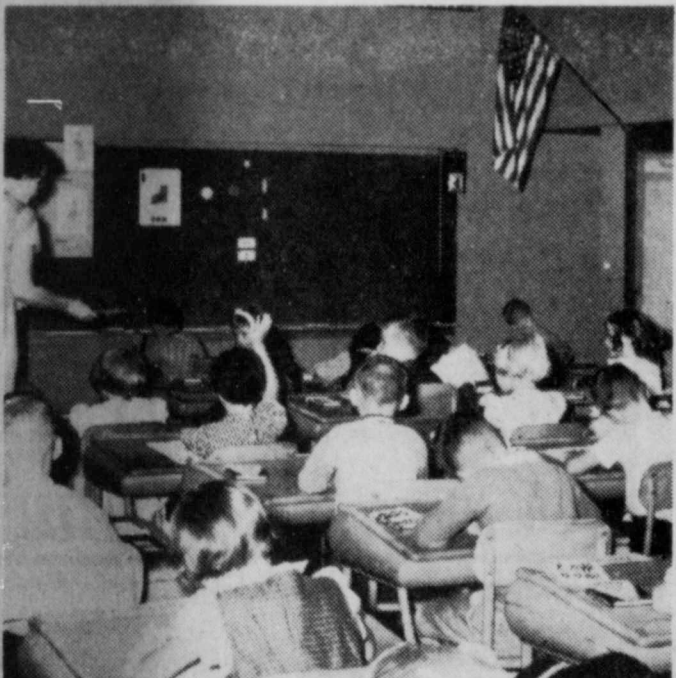
TODD WESTER MAKES TECH DEAN'S LIST

Mrs. Johnson said over 12,000 people are burned to death or suffocated every year in fires. She said that each housewife has a duty to have an escape route in her home for each member of the family. Each night before the housewife goes to bed she should have a checklist with these four things on it: 1. Check ashtrays for smoldering cigarettes; 2. Check portable heaters; 3. Check cook stoves and make sure all burners are off; and 4. check all bedroom doors and make

There were some differences in the price for "Chuck" and what the Beedy children sold theirs for this year. "Chuck" sold for 95 cents and the Beedy champ this year brought \$1.16 per pound. Not too great a difference over the period of 20 years tho. The grand champion lamb in 1954 was shown by Eldon Fortenberry, which he sold for \$1.25 per pound, compared to \$2.10 this year. The grand champion barrow this year sold for \$2.50 per pound and the one shown by Gene Handley in 1954 went at \$1.10 per pound. That was the year Randall Jones won first with his Hampshire shoot at the Lubbock Stock Show.

Other worthwhile repeats from the March and April issue, 1954 were: Light-house Electric holds open house; Don Skaggs opens new photo studio in the former Jackson Studio; A. W. Coltharp was elected to be principal of Andrews Ward; we were having new stadium seats erected at Wester Field; it was the year and the second consecutive year that First Baptist Church received the Advance Standard of Excellence award in Sunday School work. It was the only one in Texas to do so that year.

SO far our cold spells of March did not get all the fruit blossoms. Unless we have what is called a "hard freeze" maybe there will be a good supply of apricots and peaches. Since it's days and days until Easter and the season has been uncommonly warm and dry there is every reason to think that another cold period or two would be due to plague us.

SINCE several have tried my Cherry Cobbler recipe and relate its good, let's try

another from the files. This recipe is really a treat for social gatherings. It seems a little long and drawn out, but really not as complicated as it sounds. It's Lemon Cracker Squares, and calls for the following:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup cold water
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 30 PREMIUM Saltine Crackers, finely rolled (about 1 cup crumbs)
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup flaked coconut
- 3/4 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed

In top of double boiler combine sugar, cornstarch and salt; stir in water. Cook over low heat, stirring gently, until thickened. Place over boiling water. Cover and cook 10 to 12 minutes, stirring occasionally. Slowly stir into eggs; return to double boiler. Cook, stirring constantly, 4 to 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Stir in 1/4 cup butter or margarine, lemon juice and vanilla extract. (Mixture will be thinner). Strain into a bowl. Let cool while making crust. Combine cracker crumbs, flour, coconut and brown sugar. Cut in remaining 1/2 cup butter or margarine until evenly mixed. Sprinkle 2/3 mixture over bottom of buttered 9x9x2-inch baking pan. Pour filling over; sprinkle with remaining crumbs; press lightly. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 20 to 25 minutes until browned. Cool at room temperature. Serve cut in squares, topped with whipped cream, or cut in bars.
