Congressman Omar Burleson Announces For Re Election Atlantic and the Pacific.

The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 33 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live

about 466,500 people. Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense, Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consitently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave us examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased. Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this





Two important events in 1973 ushered in the new spirit at WTSU. The school marked its 10th year with unveristy status, and Dr. Lloyd Watkins arrived to take over the reins as university president.

The new enthusiasm has already begun to show itself in a number of areas such as the concept that the University is operating to serve students. That concept is manifested in a broad range of practical applications, from simplified registration procedures that have shortened those traditional lines at the start of each semester to a faculty-student ratio of 1-20, which means that no WTSU student ever becomes just a

numbered seat in an

West Texas Sate's six schools - the School of Agriculture, the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Business, the College of Education, the School of Fine Arts and the Graduate School - offer a total of 16 different bachelor's and master's degrees with over a hundred majors and areas of emphasis. Expansions of the curri-

culum in recent years have taken diverse forms. Five new degree programs and courses in social work and criminal justice administration have appeared. Latin has reappeared, and horsemanship is now offered for either physical education or agriculture credit. WTSU students, within the past year, have found themselves engaged in projects ranging from digging for archeological material threatened by a new dam to mapping Mars from photos gathered by the Mariner spacecraft.

Just as WTSU recognizes that all students cannot attend classes at the same hours, the university also knows that all students have made buns time when they are not attending classes. There are 61 organizations on the WTSU campus, from fraternities and sororities for special interests, to provide for those hours not spent in

The hub of the cultural and social scene at WTSU is the Activities Center, a complex of Bowling alleys, pool tables, handball and paddleball courts, a weight training room, four basketball courts, an Olympic-size swimming pool, and rooms for reading, music and films.

Students arriving at WTSU now can take advantage of a remarkable growth program of the past five years, which added eight new buildings and a 2,400 acre ranch to the university's facilities.

Captain Graham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clemons M. Graham both natives of the Lubbock-South Plains area, who currently reside at 5004 16th Street in Lubbock. Dennis was graduated from high school in Greensburg, Kansas before the Graham family returned to Lubbock in 1960. "He always loved Texas and considered himself a native Texan,' according to his mother, "even though he spent some of his younger years in Kansas:"

Captain Graham has two brothers, one older and one younger, who are both in the Air Force. The older is Major William G. Graham, stationed at Eglin AFB, Florida and the younger, Captain Eddie M. Graham is assigned to Malmstrom

AFB, Montana. A younger sister, Mrs. Judy Little resides in Austin.
