## \$6,666,000 In Federal Taxes Forecast From Floyd

**[Special to the Hesperian]**  
**NEW YORK, March 16** - To what extent will Floyd County residents be enriching the Federal coffers, come April 15th, through their income tax payments?

The government counts on their contributions being larger than they were last year, when local returns of personal income and employment taxes were close to \$5,847,000.

That is the approximate amount that was turned in locally, based upon an unofficial breakdown of the statewide collection figures released by the

Internal Revenue Service.

From the State of Texas as a whole, Uncle Sam received over \$8,354,000,000 last year, the IRS figures show. Of this total, taxpayers in Floyd County paid an estimated 0.07 percent.

The returns, generally, are expected to be bigger this year because of the

wage gains chalked up by most families in 1973 and because more people were employed nationally than in 1972.

As a result, the budget submitted by the Administration looks for personal income and employment taxes to yield a record \$202 billion this year.

That is \$24.8 billion more than in 1973, when the tax haul was \$177.2 billion.

continue on its upward course and will reach new heights.

The budget anticipates \$220 billion next year in personal income and employment taxes, an increase of \$18 billion over the current level.

For the local population to produce its proportionate share of this addition, total earnings in the area will have to rise by about 9.0 percent.

Local taxpayers will be shouldering their full share of this increase, it is expected, reflecting the higher level of income in the area in the past year.

On that basis, the Floyd County collections next month will come to approximately \$6,666,000, it is calculated.

The Administration's new budget, for the fiscal year that begins in July, 1974, calls for bigger income tax receipts next April than ever before, although the rates will remain the same.

### Congressman Omar Burleson Announces For Re Election

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 4, 1974 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 33 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 466,500 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave us examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the Congress.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U.S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the

Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation.

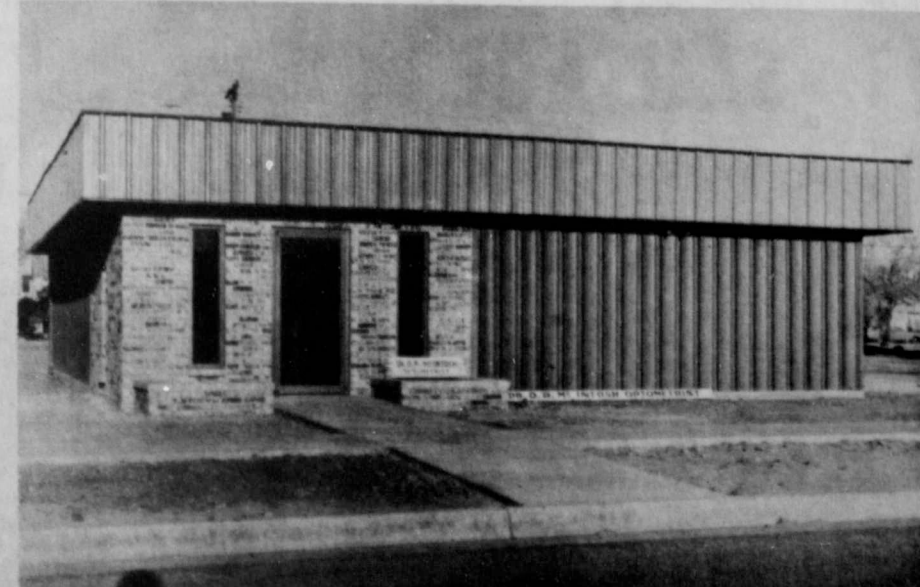

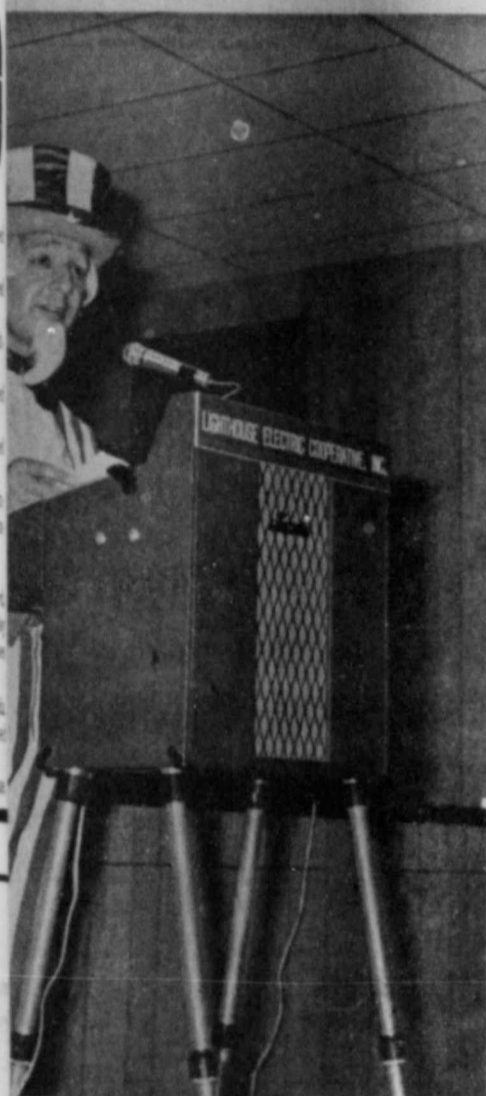

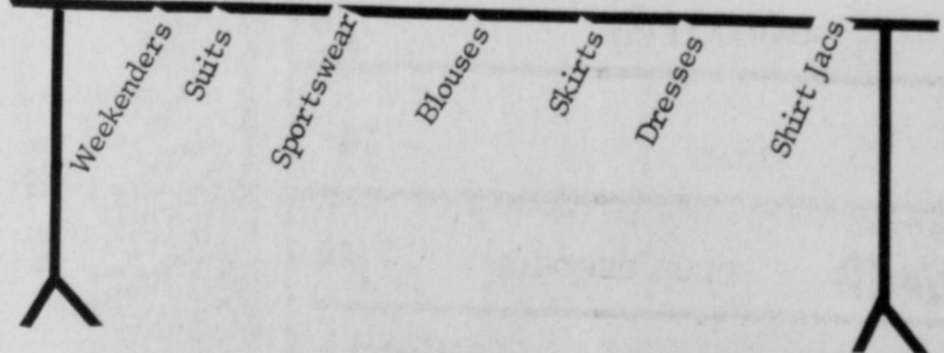

Prior to that, Captain Graham had received his BBA degree and his commission as a U.S. Air Force second lieutenant upon graduation from Texas A&M University at College Station in February 1964.

After graduation from Reese and further schooling at Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona in the F-4C Phantom jet fighter, Captain Graham was assigned as a Pilot Systems Operator for the Tactical Air Command's 16th Tactical Fighter Squadron at Eglin AFB, Florida. Before completing that tour of duty he was upgraded to Aircraft Commander status and spent a three month tour of duty in support of combat operations in Southeast Asia while based at Ubon Royal Thai Air Force base in Thailand.
