Parade Highlight

More than 1,000 persons jammed downtown Floydada Saturday to celebrate the Floyd County Pioneer Reunion and watch the parade.

Old-timers from far and near gathered around the courthouse square for a day of reminiscence, parade and gala award presentations, as cool, cloudy weather prevailed.

Some 500 pioneers signed up at 9 a.m. Saturday and at least 360 of them received free barbecue dinner as part of the one day program.

A total of 450 persons enjoyed the noon time barbecue. Officials reported a real good turn-out.

PIONEER MAN AND WOMAN

Francis Carthel of Lockney and Mrs. Jack Henry of Floydada were honored as the Pioneer Man and Woman of the Year. They were presented by Hubert Frizzell.

Dougherty farmer Fred Cardinal was elected president to succeed Guy Sams. Dude Adams was elected vice president, Frizzell was re-elected treasurer and Ann Swepton re-elected secretary.

The names of almost 100 persons who died in 1973 were read in the Memorial service by Mrs. Virginia Taylor, Robert Lee Smith and the Rev. William Prater also participated in the service.

Mrs. S.W. Ross gave an interesting history on the Floyd County courthouses.

Juanita Phillips of Richmond, Kentucky travelled the farthest to attend the reunion. She was born in Floydada in 1919 and lived in Floyd County some 22 years before moving away.

Oldest man and woman pioneer present was Mrs. O.J. Lady, 91 and Theo Griffith, 90.

Headin' For Elevators

1974 wheat came from Cooperative Wheatery Monday

Producers at Dougherty received more wheat on Tuesday from Floyd County wheat farmers Homer Farmer and Vick McCown.

D&P Grain in Dougherty received its first Floyd County wheat at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday by Vernie Moore.

Manager of the elevator, Kenneth Robertson, said the grain had a moisture content of 12.10 and test weight of .61.

Moore, who is doing his own

combining, is averaging from 10- to 12 bushels per acre. D&P is paying \$3.15 per bushel.

The first reported load of wheat for the Lockney area came in to Muncy Elevator about 6 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Raymond Rucker of Lockney cut the grain, which belonged to W.O. Newberry, from a patch a mile and a half south of Muncy. Rucker hauled the 3,560-pound truckload to the elevator Tuesday before a shower halted harvesting operations. The wheat tested 12.60 per cent moisture.

Absentee Vote Indicates High Interest In Saturday Commissioner Run Off Election

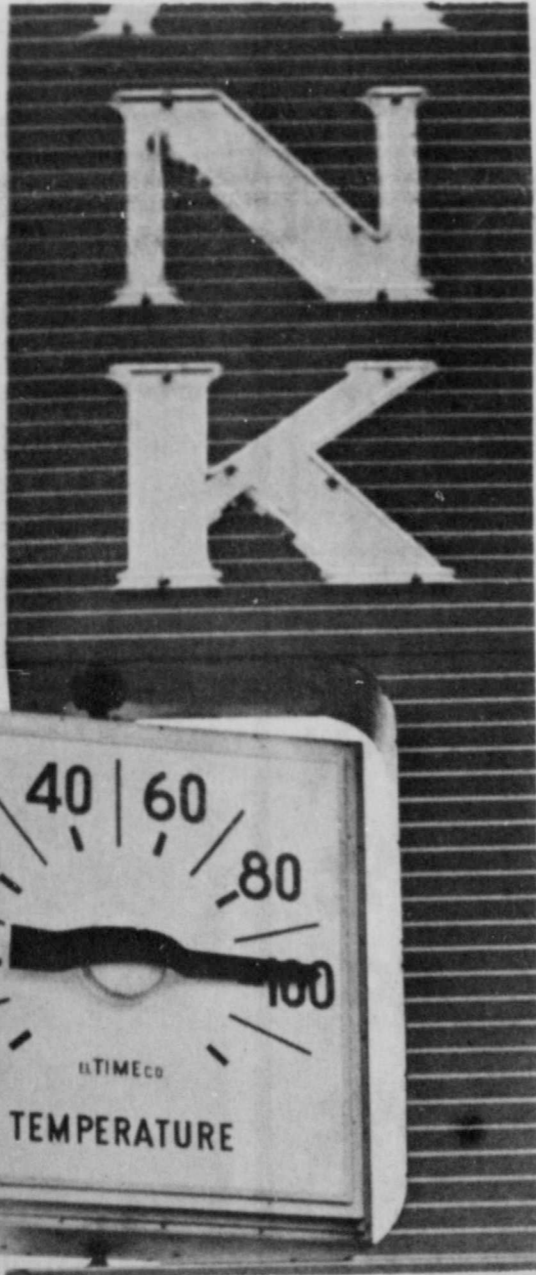
Twenty-one persons have voted absentee in the run-off election for County Commissioner of Precinct 4, indicating a strong interest in the outcome of the election.

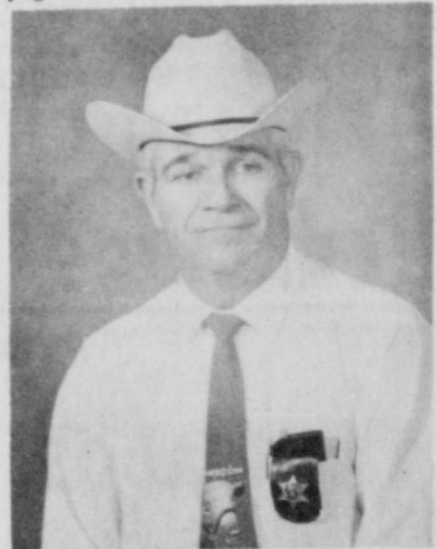

Tornado Warning Explained

"Were you among those seeking shelter Thursday night after the city sirens sounded or were you one of many who called the City Hall to find out what it was all about?" If you did the first, you were right to do so. If it was the latter, you are advised to please not do it again, unless you have spotted a severe storm or funnel cloud.

City manager, Bill Feuerbacher said the sounding of the alarm last Thursday evening around 8:30 or so "was not a false alarm" and was sounded in order that persons would have time to seek shelter. The alarm was sounded on the advice from Lubbock Weather Bureau to Floydada City dispatcher when a tornado was

detected by radar some ten miles southwest of Floydada. Officials from the weather bureau called to give the alert, and in ample time for persons to seek shelter, in case the tornado touched ground. Had it done so, some citizens might have lost their lives while on the phone to the City Hall trying to find out if it was really an alert. When the wailing of the sirens at intervals, starts, you can rest assured it's a warning to seek cover for your protection, officials say.

Feuerbacher said both phones at the City Hall were tied up by people calling wanting to know if it was a tornado alert. It might be well to go to shelter first. When the storm passes, if

you are still in doubt, then call.

Remember that one blast from the alarm is for a fire. The 12 second blasts at intervals which were heard Thursday night, is a definite alert for the citizens and the warning should be heeded by all. City officials say this means, "head for cover and don't call the City Hall." Phones to the City Hall must be open to receive weather alerts concerning Floyd County.

When a severe weather alert is given, radio equipped men of the Floyd County sheriff's department, High Patrol, city police, units of the Civil Defense and other employees of the City of Floydada including the volunteer Fire Department, station themselves outside the city as cloud watchers in

outlying areas. They keep constant contact with in-town officials who will notify you by the siren of danger or possible danger of a threatening cloud. The re-working of the "watch systems" is presently under study as it is updated each year by officials and more on this will be carried later in the Hesperian.

The point officials are trying to "get across" to the citizens at present is to seek shelter, stay off streets when the alarm is sounded, and please do not "tie up" city official phones unless it's an emergency.

Remember four blasts of the siren means take all precaution (an alert) and seek underground protection if possible. A long continuous blast is an all clear.

Dear Editor:

On behalf of millions of children who suffer from lung-damaging, diseases, I want to say "Thank you" to the people in Floyd County who contributed so generously to the Breath of Life campaign, and to the volunteers who gave their valuable time and untiring efforts in the campaign activities. We also heartily thank the Floyd County newspapers and radio station in Floydada for their interest and excellence in reporting the plight of these children and our campaign to help them.

All of these people have shown they really care about long-damaged children. They have helped raise a total of \$721.14 in the Floydada area, which will support the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation programs for diagnosis, treatment, research and public education.

Research is accelerating to find a control or cure for Cystic Fibrosis, one of the most serious genetic diseases. Recent advances have also brought us closer than ever to developing a practical test to identify the carriers of this inherited disease. About one in twenty people is believed to carry the recessive gene for C/F.

The medical care now provided in over 117 Cystic Fibrosis Centers is lengthening the lives of our C/F children and in many cases, relieving or curing the conditions of children suffering severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and a condition sometimes called "childhood emphysema. We are encouraged by this progress, and we thank our friends here in Floydada. At the same time, we ask everyone to renew the dedication to the continuation of this fight against lung damaging diseases in our children.

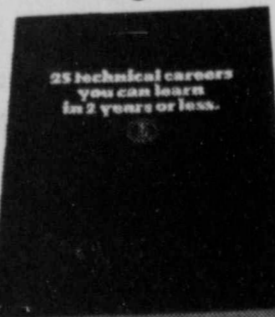

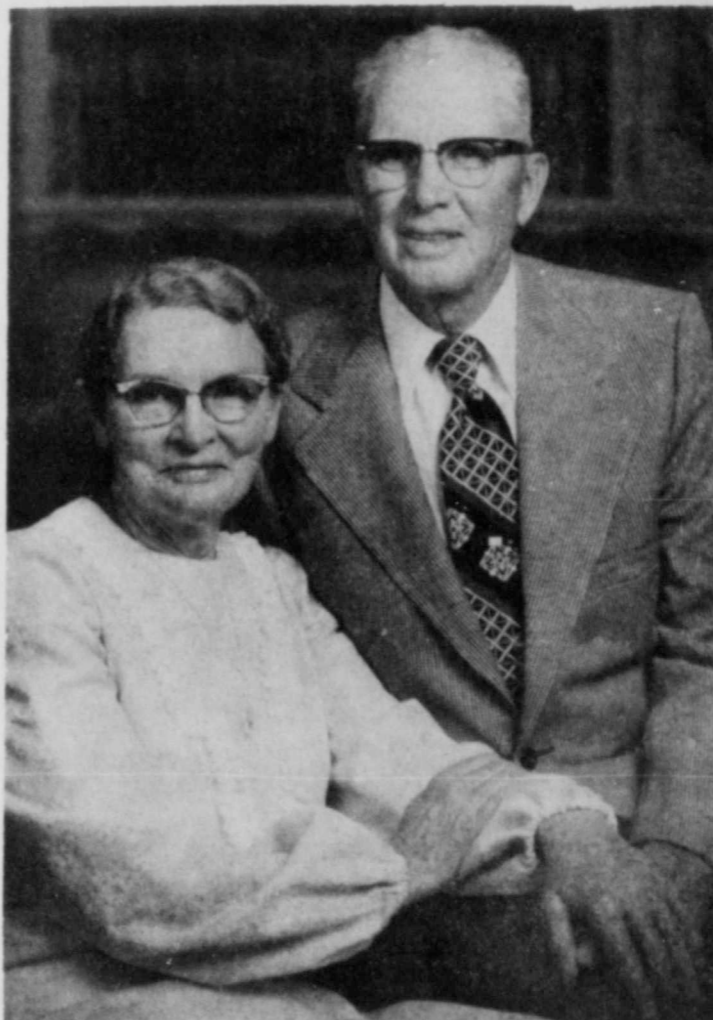

DO plant taller flowers behind shorter ones. It will help to heighten your garden's appearance. Too many places hide their beauty.

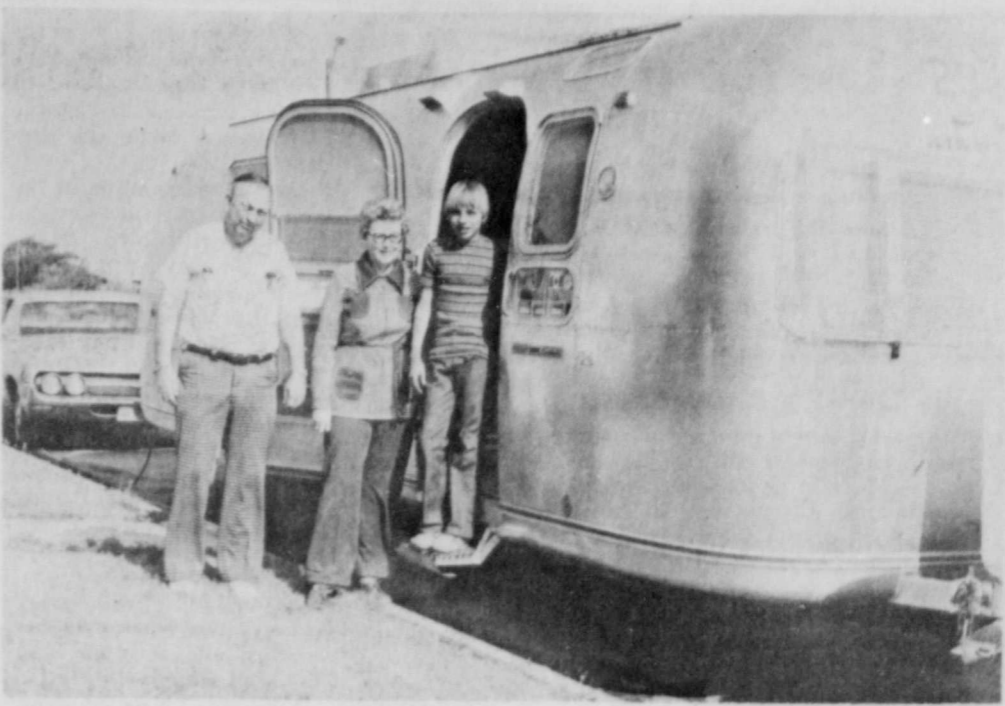
DON'T overcrowd. Learn how tall and how wide each plant will grow and seed accordingly. If you do have to thin them later, they'll have a fatter chance of surviving if you cut back just after the seedlings have sprouted.

DO use the right fertilizer. The food that makes your grass grow greenest may produce anemic-looking flowers. Green thumbs agree, fertilizers with a high percentage of phosphorus are best for your blooms.

DON'T plant too deeply. This slows germination and could nip growth in the bud. The seeds should be covered, but not buried.

DO protect your plants from pests.

DO mass colors rather than mixing them. A pretty garden should leave you an impression of soft-petaled harmony.

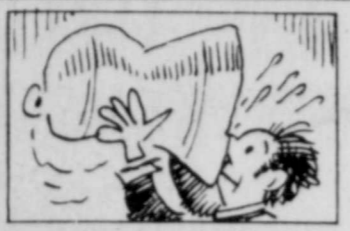

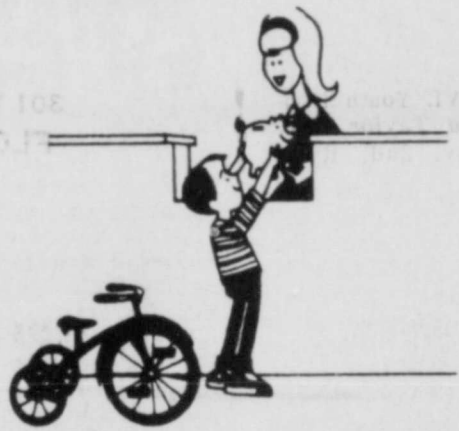

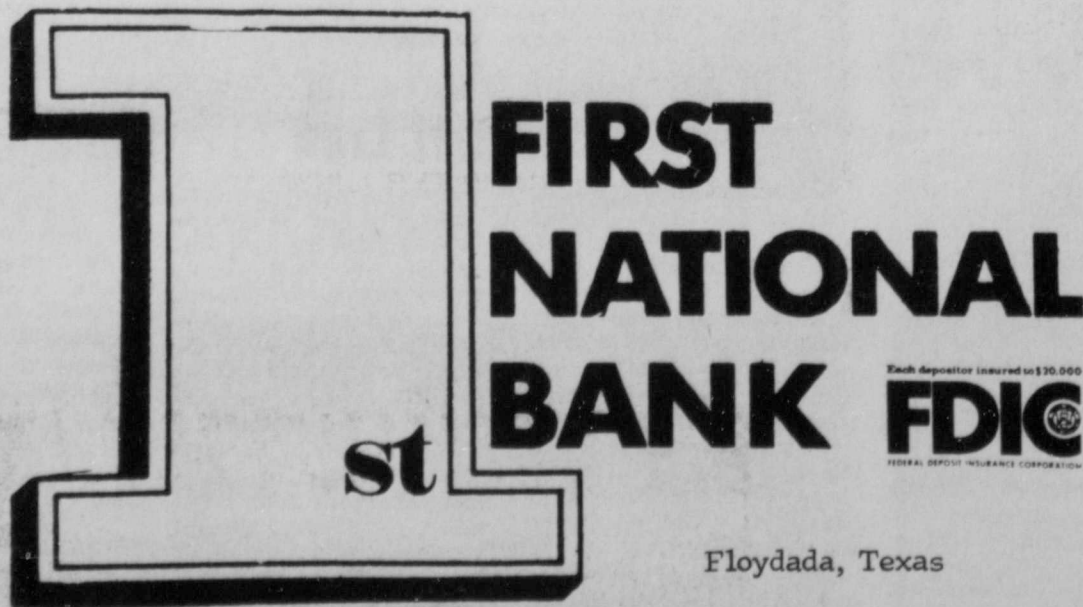
