There is no estimate yet on how many acres of Floyd wheat are destroyed.

It appeared Wednesday that skies were clearing and Floyd farmers who were hailed or rained out would soon be back replanting. Most will decide whether to risk a late cotton crop or go to soybeans.

WE BORROW the following from Wes Izzard's column, with the hope that he won't mind our use of the excerpts from a letter written by a Lutheran pastor:

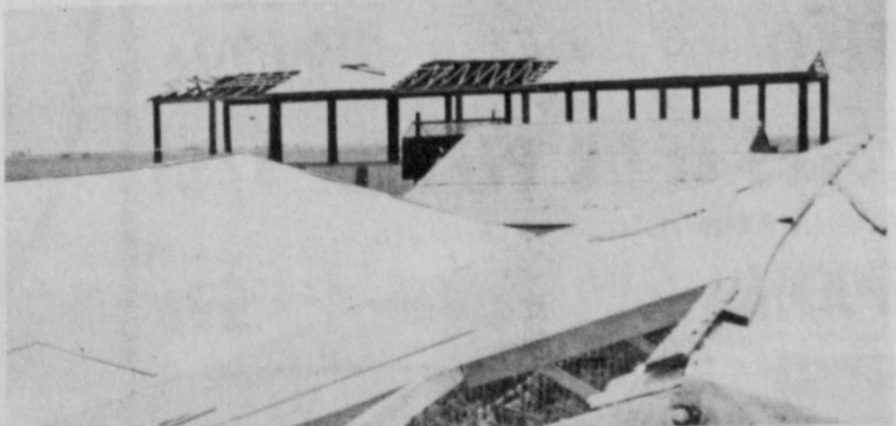
"Atheists," the pastor wrote, "may be pretty smart fellows, but you don't find them doing any great organized work in the world."

"You never hear of an Atheist hospital, or an Atheist children's home, or an Atheist's committee for the Relief of Starving Whoosis Tribes."

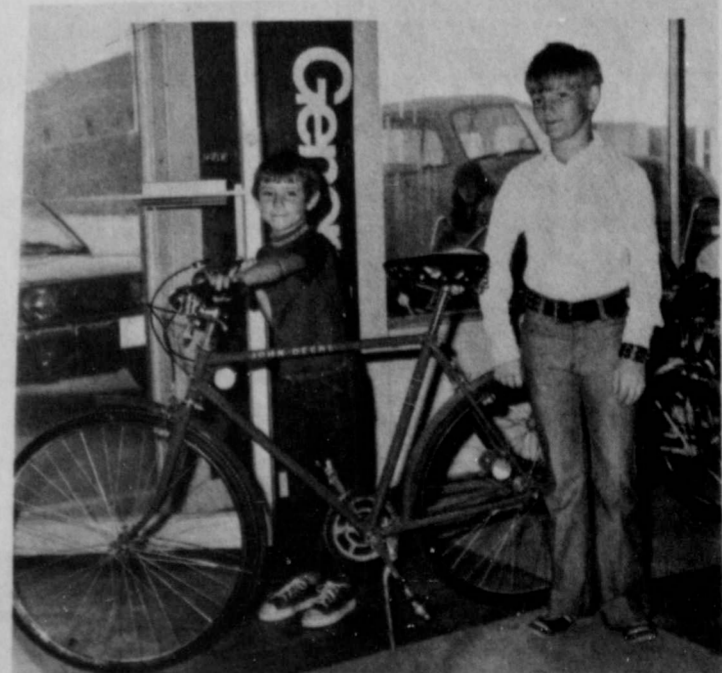
"Atheists don't even have glee clubs, picnics or bowling teams. It seems to take some kind of faith to get people together to do some good or even to have some fun."

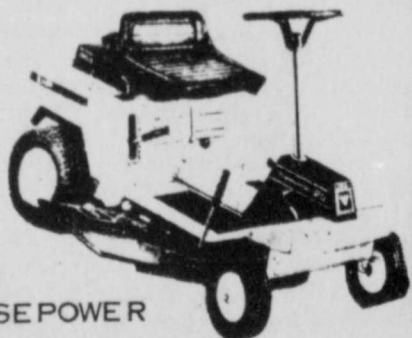

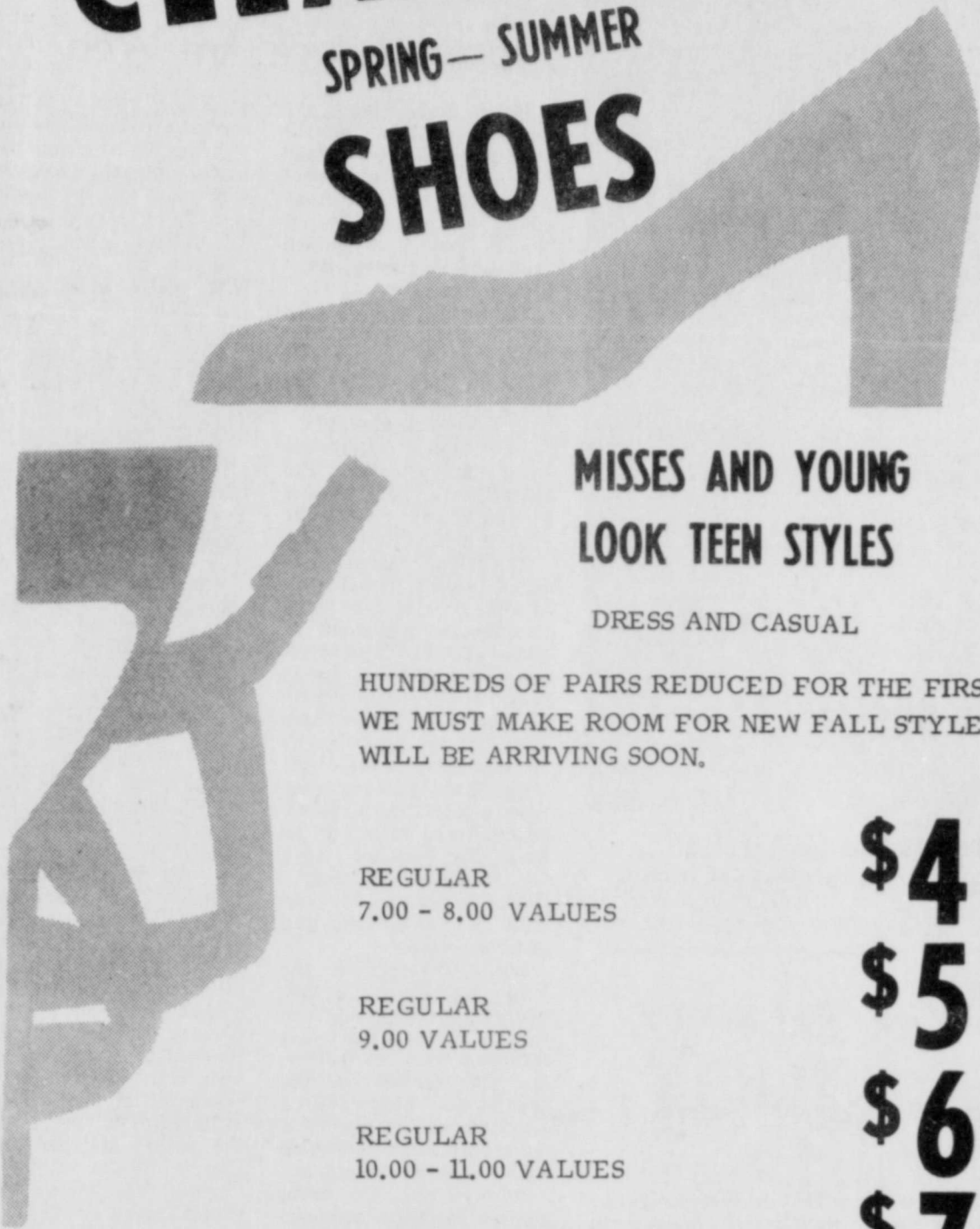

The program was then turned over to the speaker, Mrs. Mae Bomer, relating Her Romantic Tour of Old Mexico: "This tour took us to El Paso where we were processed through Mexican Customs, our tour guide assisted with the formalities.

"We boarded a special Omnibus de Mexico Tour Coach. Through the window we viewed the captivating and exciting scenery: mountains full of crags and canyons, a stop was made at a quaint Mexican Village, and served a box lunch.

"We arrived in Chihuahua in mid-afternoon, checked into the hotel and made a tour of the Metropolis of Chihuahua which is located in the center of a rich silver mining, timber and ranching district. We visited the State Capital, Federal Build-

ing, and La Quinta Luz; the home of Pancho Villa. We had our pictures taken and visited with his 83 year old wife, a very gracious lady, who walks with a cane and enjoys visitors.

"We toured old and antique buildings that were built and furnished by former rich Mexican dignitaries. The buildings are museums now. The water supply is furnished by aqueducts which were built over 200 years ago to supply the town and irrigate the farms.

"On the train Chihuahua el Pacifico across the Sierra Madre we passed through Tarahumara Indian Country, considered the most primitive Indian group in the Americas.

"At Cabanas el Divisadero we stayed at a rustic hotel and as you descend the steps from the R.R. station there are several small sheds where the natives sell souvenirs, soft drinks and tacos. It's quite captivating to see the little Tarahumara children cuddling baby goats as docile as kittens, while their mothers are busy weaving grass baskets to sell to the tourists. This is a copper canyon and the beauty is behold! spread out five times larger than the Grand Canyon with gorges, spires, battlements and halls which change appearance with the changing light.

"On the hiking tours the beautiful scenery was never-ending, but the poverty in this Indian territory made one sad.

"On the train through Copper Canyon we passed over 39 trestles and through 86 tunnels, you feel like you're in a time machine rather than a comfortable Vista dome train. We traveled mile after mile of untouched land; magnificent cliffs, ravines, rivers, bluffs, tall fir trees changing to oak and more tropical trees as you descend the mountains and arrive back to the flavor of the Old West, back to the frequent settlements along the R.R. tracks back to the split rail fences, log cabins set off in the clearing, fruit trees growing, cattle and horses grazing, piles of lumber and logs ready for shipping

"Passing through the Mennonites Settlement hewn out of barren desert are vast acres of productivity achieved by the "plain people", granted land rights by the Mexican Government some 50 years ago. The Mennonites disapprove of oath taking, infant baptism, military service or holding public office; they have pursued their way of life WITHOUT TV, radio and automobile. Yet they produce excellent cheeses and farm produce. And they have nothing to do with Spanish or Indian people. They live quite to themselves and are prone to travel from place to place
