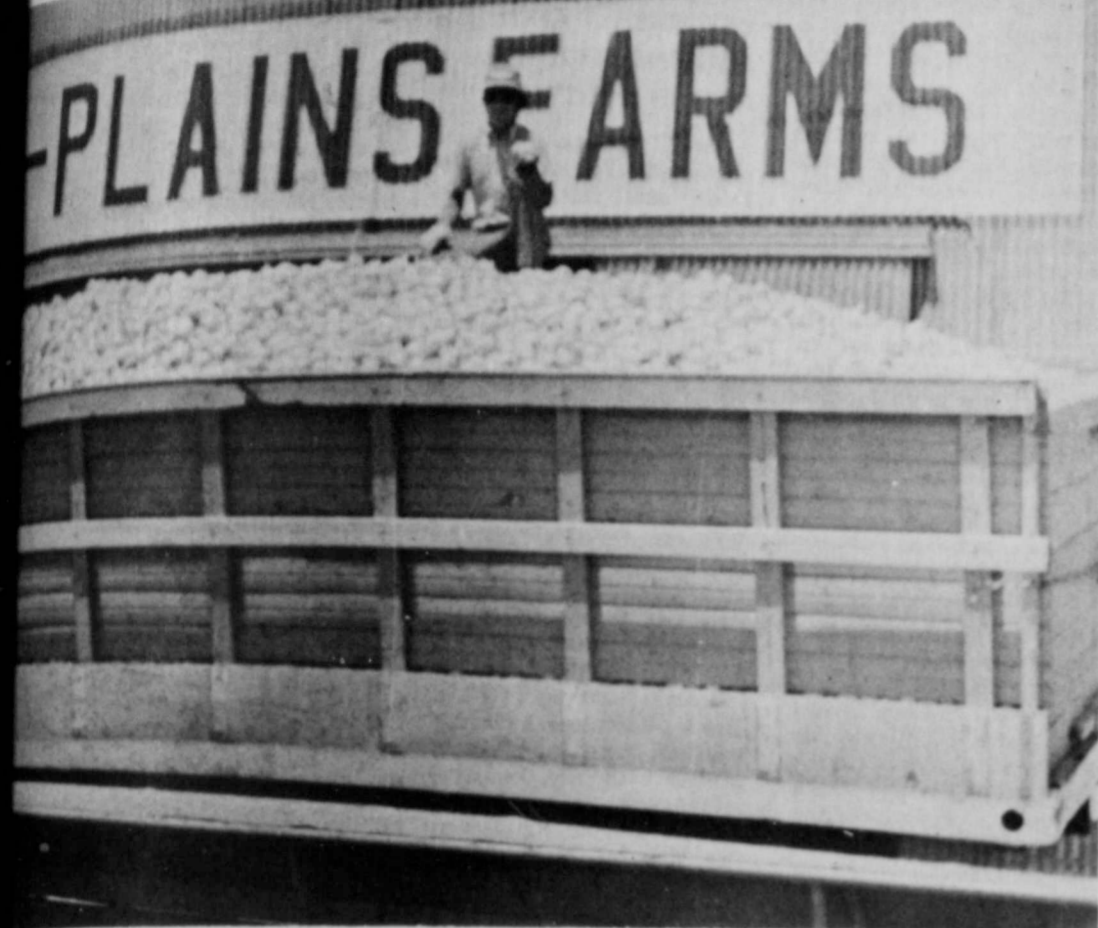

First Load Onions To Market

The first load of onions came to market in Floydada Saturday morning. It was a load of New Mexico yellow granos from a two acre plot farmed by Buck Hickerson.

The yield was good, around 500 sacks per acre. The price on onions at this time is reported "fair."

Hickerson has another 14 acres of Spanish onions that will be harvested later. Chuck Holmes of DeBruyn Hi-Plains Farms produce plant reports that there are around 800 acres of onions to be marketed in his plant and

Louisiana Strawberry's plant this year.

Holmes said the bulk of the onion crop will hit here around the first of July.

OTHER VEGETABLES

Holmes reports other vegetables are being planted at this time... and this includes cabbage, peppers, carrots and cucumbers. He said that some of these crops are already up and growing... some were hailed out and had to be replanted.

GOOD SUMMER INDUSTRY

The vegetable industry has long been a good summer industry for

Floydada and employs over 500 people in the fields and plants. Although this year's crop is expected to be smaller than usual, the volume will be considerable. Since cotton, grain and soybean prices have increased, more farmers are staying with these crops. Of course vegetable prices are going up also.

The problem of housing for the workers still remains a big problem in the Floydada area.

Danny Quisenberry Gets WTSU Scholarship

CANYON, TEXAS — Danny Quisenberry, a standout hurdler from Floydada, has signed an athletic scholarship agreement with West

Texas State University track coach Bob Kitchens.

Quisenberry ran 14.5 in the 120-yard high hurdles this past spring and a 40.9 time in the 330-yard intermediates. He was third at the Class AA regional meet after capturing the district championship.

The 6-1, 170-pound athlete made big strides in lowering his times each of his three years of varsity competition. As a sophomore Quisenberry ran 16.2 in the highs and 43.9 in the intermediates. He lowered those times to 14.9 and 42.6 as a junior and dropped them further as a senior.

"The big thing about Danny is the steady improvement he showed each year," said Floydada coach L.G. Wilson. "He gained strength and speed each year. His attitude toward work is good and that should help him in his further hurdling. He has the potential to be outstanding, especially as an intermediate hurdler."

A B-plus student in the classroom, Quisenberry earned all-district honors in football this past fall as a defensive end. He was also an end on offense.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Quisenberry.

63.2% In Floyd County Are Home Owners

NEW YORK, June 15 — One firm asset that most families in Floyd County can count on, in these times of economic uncertainty, is the homes that they own.

Their equity in these homes, representing their market value minus the mortgage debt outstanding on them, comes to a hefty \$9.9 million, it is estimated.

This refers solely to single-family, non-farm dwellings that are owner-occupied. Not included are multi-unit properties that are rented and units that are vacant.

The facts and figures on homeowner assets, locally and elsewhere in the United States, are based upon data gathered by the Department of Commerce in connection with its latest Residential Finance Survey and upon data from the last Census of Housing.

Nationally, the figures indicate, the value of these single-family dwellings adds up to more than \$684 billion. In the local area the total is approximately \$20.6 million.

The survey shows that most homes are mortgaged. Of the 31 million single-family properties in the country, 61 percent have mortgages on them, up

from 57 percent in 1960.

In Floyd County's regional area, some 60.5 percent have mortgages. The other 39.5 percent are owned free and clear.

On the average, the figures indicate, mortgage debt on single-unit homes amounts to about 52 percent of their market value.

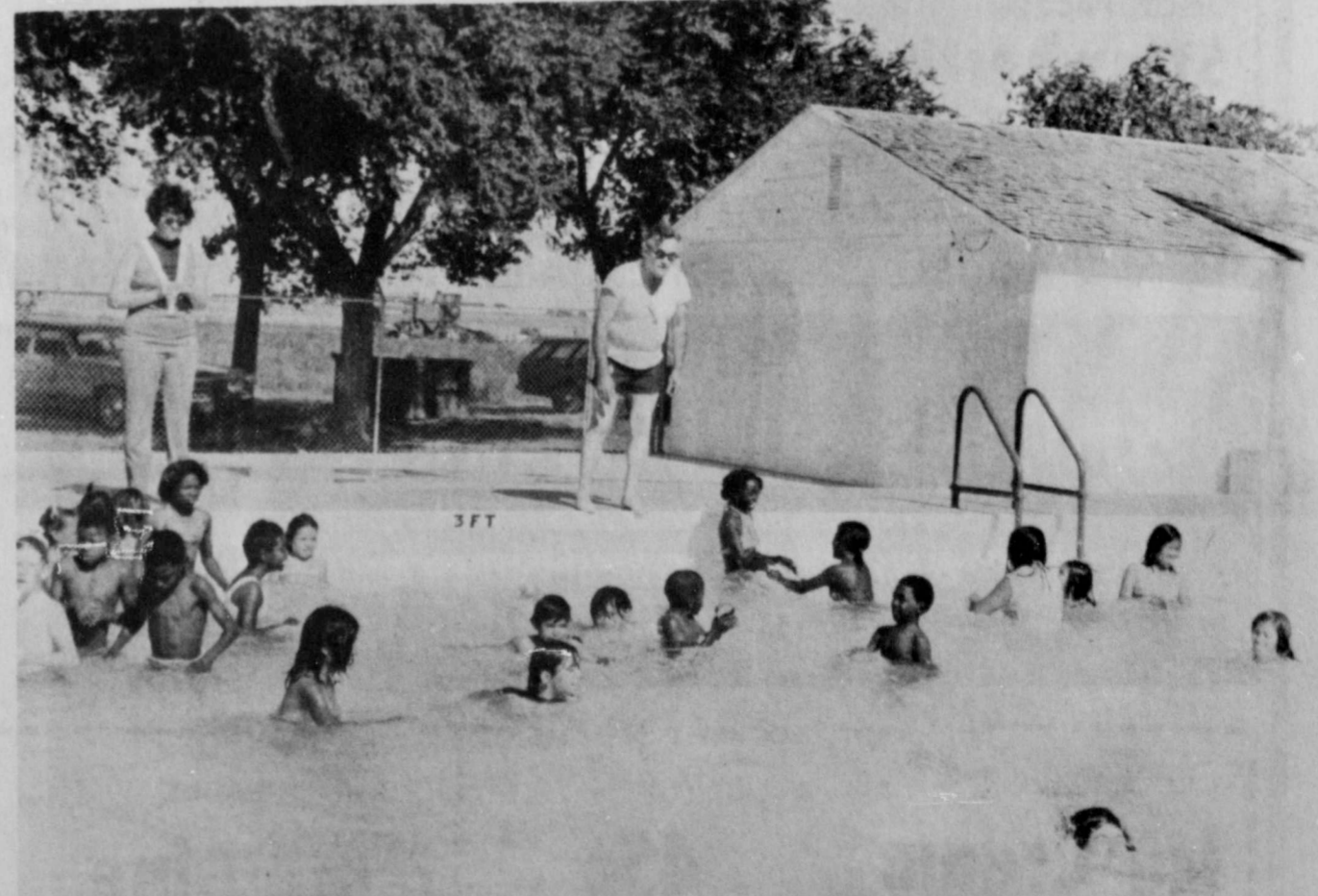
On that basis, the market value of local one-family dwellings is offset by mortgage obligations of close to \$10.7 million, leaving home owners in the area with an equity of approximately \$9.9 million.

Savings and loan associations are the principal holders of conventional loans on single-unit homes, according to the report. Next in order are banks and life insurance companies.

Except for the last year or so, there has been a steady upward trend in home ownership as more and more families found the means to acquire property.

According to the latest tabulation, some 63.2 percent of the homes in Floyd County are now owned by their occupants.

This compares with the United States average of 62.9 percent.

Lockney 4-H Takes Field Trip

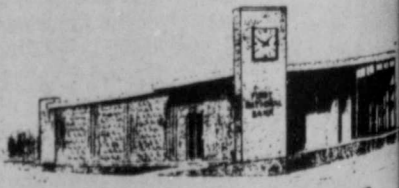

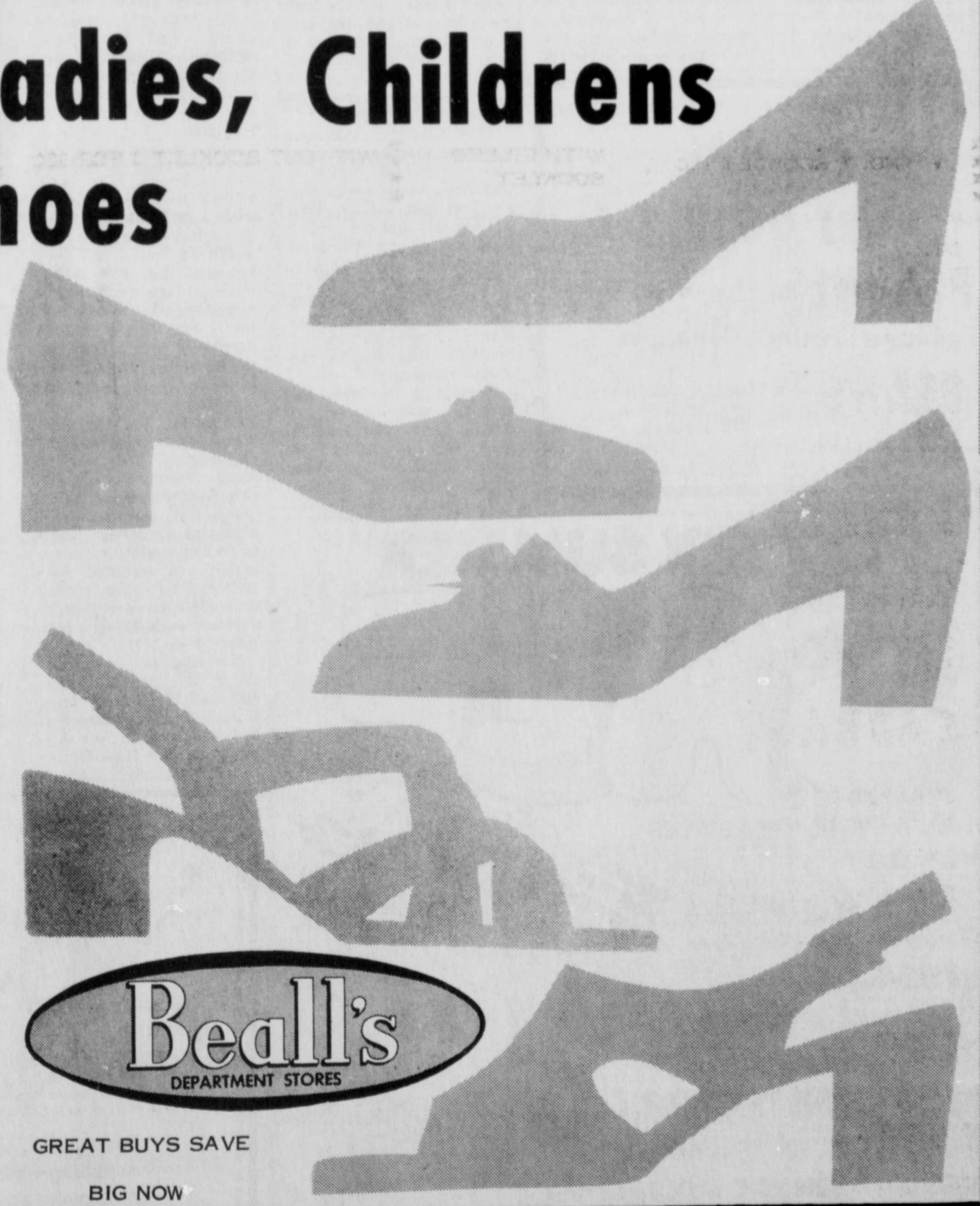
