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Balloon Hobbyist Blasts Off In Floydada

Being photographer and reporter while the boss was on vacation gave me the opportunity to witness and photograph the lifting of a hot air balloon in the wee dawn Saturday morning. My day off too but I'm glad I didn't miss the spectacular.

Nick Owen of Lubbock, who is married to the former Jacque Yearoy of Floydada, is a hot-air balloon hobbyist.

His brother-in-law, Max Yearoy of Floydada had always wanted to go "up" with Nick, so Saturday morning was the chosen time. The site being the track field, adjacent to the park in southwest Floydada. The time, 6:30 a.m., the wind, expected to be relatively calm, but before lift-off, was gusting to 20-25 miles per hour.

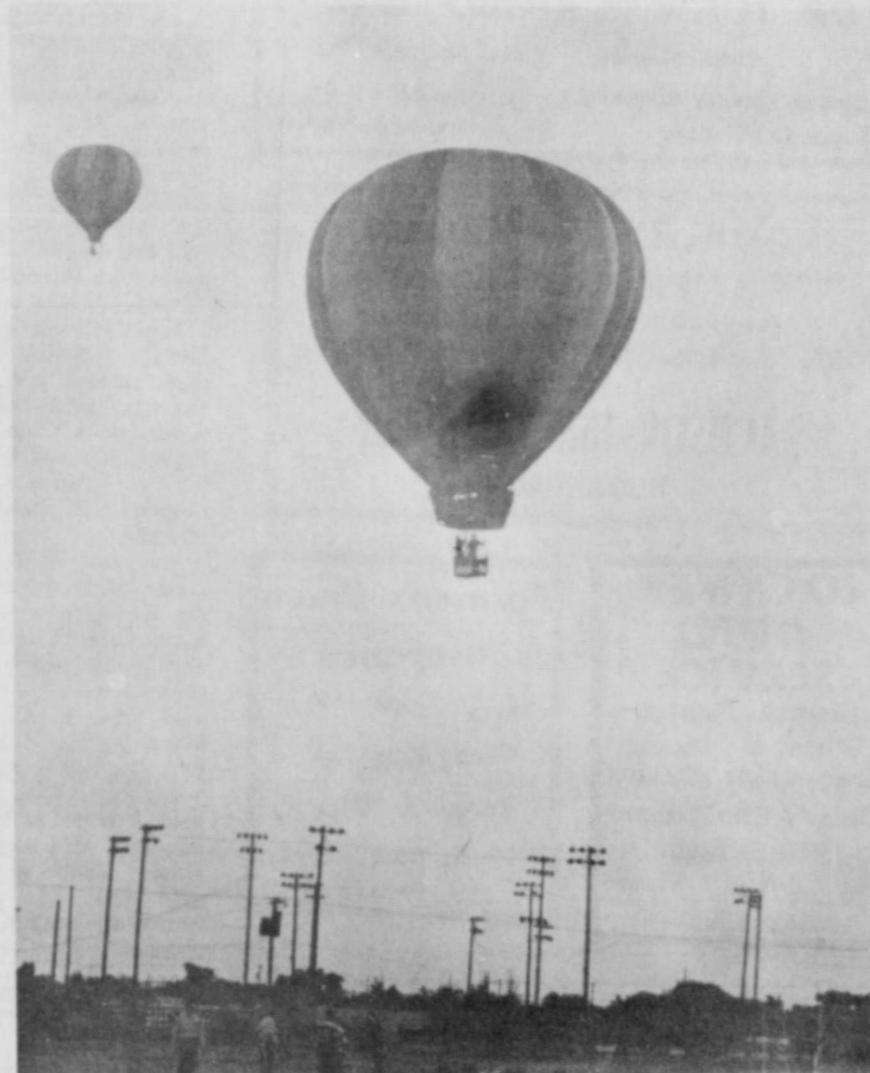
The balloon, when completely filled

with air, is about seven stories high. With the winds as such, it took several spectators to assist in keeping the balloon balanced and then several times it liked to "have gotten away."

The balloon hobbyist says he usually has enough fuel to stay up about an hour, so those of us on the ground thought perhaps he and Max would "bring her down" between South Plains and Silverton, but with the strong winds they started drifting fairly fast toward the canyons of the Caprock, and seeing plowed and "soft" ground below, they set the balloon down just before reaching Edna Gilly's home.

The men set the balloon down fairly easy but the wind caught the balloon and carried them some 108 feet before they were able to control it. Other than dirt in their faces there were no mishaps.

Maybe Nick Owen will return to Floydada some calm morning with his balloon and we can get some before hand publicity, so everyone can witness the "lift-off and flight of the hot air balloon."

Floydada boys did well at the Second Annual West Texas AAU Junior Olympic Preliminary Track Meet in Hereford Saturday. The senior boys came out with a first, a second, a third and a fourth and came in third as a team with a Floydada junior boy joining them in the 440 relay.

For the senior boys, Steve Moore placed first in the 120 high hurdles in 15.5 and a fourth in the long jump. Tom Assiter came in second in the 880 yard dash and Kevin

Ratliff placed third in the high jump and also a third in the 100 yard dash.

The Floydada team consisting of Moore, Assiter, Ratliff and Micky Minnitt, junior boy, took a third in the 440 relay.

Mickey Minnitt took a first in the long jump, 19.6 and a second in the 100 yard dash in the intermediate group.

Ribbons were awarded winners.

Floydada boys will be entered in the AAU District Meet Saturday at Borger.

Fair Plans Made

Teeter said. There will be six children's rides and "six or seven" adult rides, along with several concessions.

There was no carnival at the fair last year. A carnival scheduled to be at the fair cancelled the engagement just days before the event.

The motto for the fair this year, Teeter said, is "Fair Time Is Fun Time", and the key to its success is "You and your participation."

A parade through downtown Lockney will kick off the fair events, beginning at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, September 12. Prizes will be given in

two divisions, community floats and commercial floats. Senior band performing in the parade will receive \$25. Junior high bands in the parade get \$15. Ribbons will be given in several other categories, including antique cars, best cowgirl and cowboy, best oldtime cowgirl and cowboy, best decorated bikes, and riding clubs. J. D. Copeland is chairman of the parade committee. Prospective entrants in the parade are urged to contact him.

The pet show, a big success in its first year in '73, will be back, sponsored again by Il Penseroso Junior Study Club. Any child under 12 is eligible to enter the pet show (he must be able to handle the pet). Each animal must be on a leash, in a cage, or similarly confined. Ribbons will be awarded for the first three places in 13 categories - smallest, largest, longest tail, happiest face, saddest face, longest ears, biggest eyes, curliest tail, furriest pet, most roly poly, most unusual, best trick, and best showmanship. The pet show has been put into the fair program to give the younger age group a chance to participate. Mrs. Bill Turner is pet show chairman this year.

A major change due in the display section this year is the moving of the women's, youth, educational, and arts & crafts departments downstairs in the display building.

The flower show has been cancelled, due to a lack of interest the past several years, and the departments which were formerly upstairs will be moved to the space occupied by the flower show.

Last year, for the first time, the quarterhorse show at the fair was a "Class B" show, and a big show is expected again this year. It's an all-day event scheduled for Saturday, September 14. Riley Harris is chairman of the quarterhorse show committee.

Plaques will be awarded in three categories - teenagers, women, and men drivers - in the tractor driving contest, set for 4 p.m. Saturday north of the rodeo arena. Bill Pallmeyer is chairman of the contest committee.

The Fair Queen Contest wraps up the fair activities Saturday night. Scheduled to start at 7:30 p.m., the contest is open to young ladies age 16 to 19. Entry deadline is September 10. The Fair Queen Contest committee includes Mrs. Randy Bertrand, chairman; Mrs. Dane Gollightly, Mrs. Craig Edwards, Mrs. Roy Kinard, Mrs. Jerry Bourland, Mrs. Richard Hunt, Mrs. Richard Bertrand, Mrs. Phil Green, and Mrs. Bob Hambricht.

There will be a general livestock superintendent at the fair stock show this year. Larry Golden will assist Jake Colston, steer show superintendent, Henry Hinton, superintendent of the junior heifer beef show, and Dan Bayley, lamb show superintendent. Judging in the stock show starts at 9 a.m. Saturday. Cash and trophy prizes will be given in each division.

There will be work day in late August to get ready for the fair. The fair catalogs were delivered to the printer Friday and should be out around the first of August. Catalogs will be available at the county agent's office and from any advertiser in the book.

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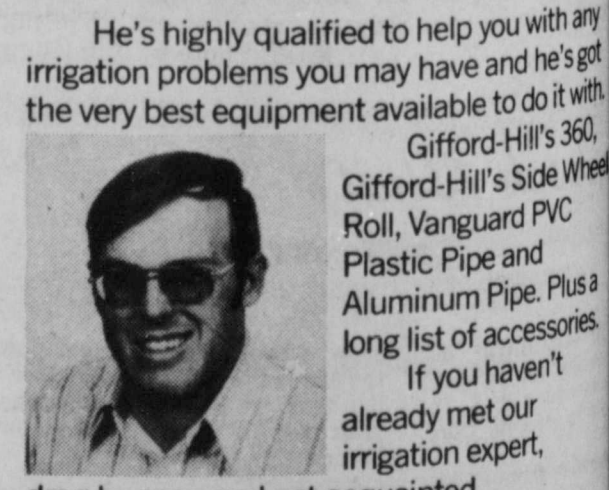

The Commission is an independent Federal regulatory agency with jurisdiction over thousands of products used by consumers in and around the home. The Commission's primary job is to reduce the unreasonable risk of injury to consumers from consumer products. The agency also has the responsibility to provide information that will assist consumers to evaluate the comparative safety of consumer products and help to reduce serious injuries. Fact sheets and brochures on the following subjects also are available at no cost to consumers: Power lawnmowers, power hedge trimmers, bathtubs and shower stalls, tent flammability, stairs, ramps and landings, kitchen ranges, bicycles, lead in paint, insecticides and pesticides, carbon monoxide poisoning, glass door injuries and how to prevent them, dangers of falls related to infant furniture, flammable liquids, flammable fabrics and the elderly, flammable fabrics, playground equipment, extension cords and wall outlets, crib safety, toy safety, poison prevention packaging, repurchase regulations (Federal Hazardous Substance Act). 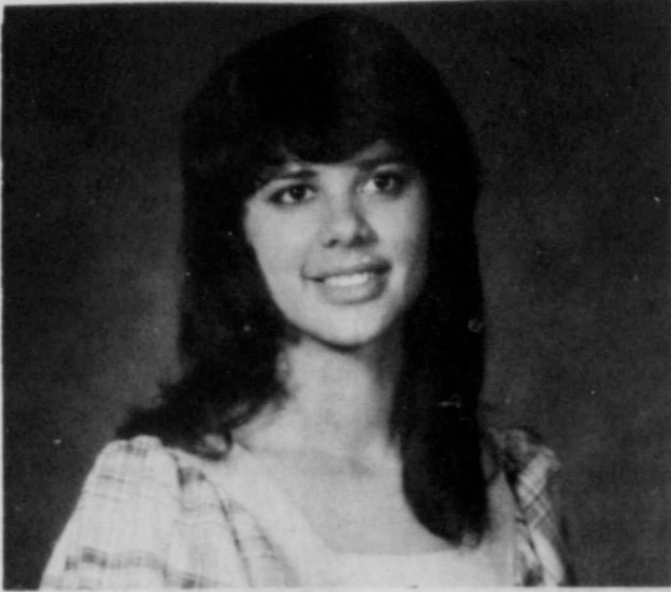
Thelma Morales, Joe Martinez Plan Vows

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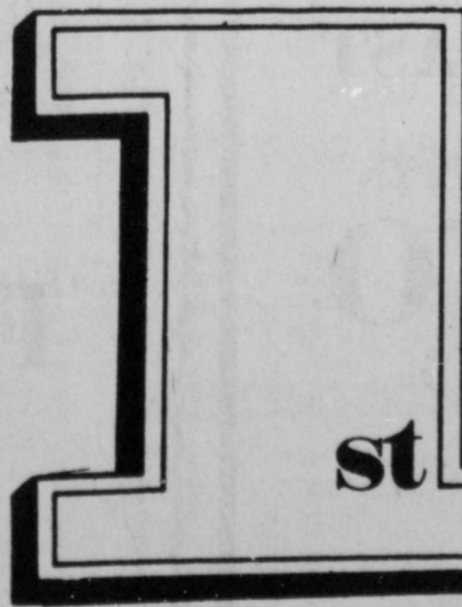
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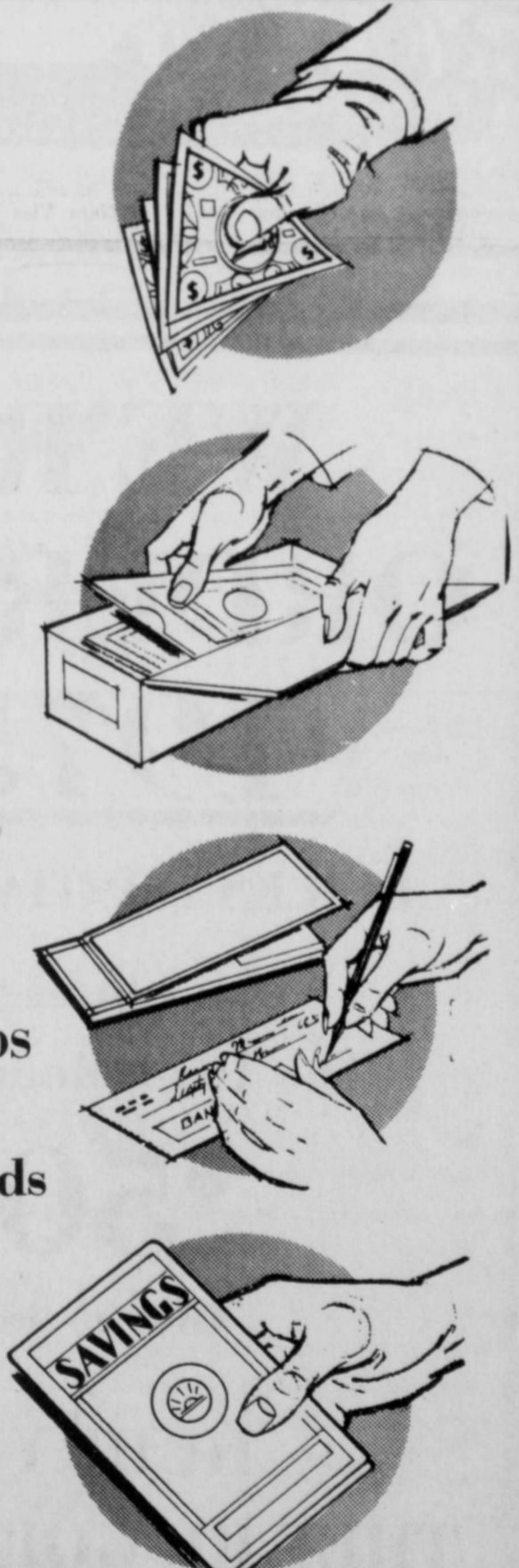

Social Security Representative By Ray Purcell

Q. I have been hearing about the new Federal payments for aged, blind, and disabled people. Why is social security operating this program?

A. Supplemental security income payments are for people with little or no

income and limited resources who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled. Social security is handling the Federal program because it is already in touch with many of these people through already existing social security benefit programs, and because social security has a network of field offices and established data processing systems.

SPAG Grants Approved

AUSTIN — Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved four grants totaling \$87,159 to the area served by the South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, for improving law enforcement and justice.

Largest of the action grants, \$25,713, goes to SPAG for fourth-year funding of the regional law enforcement teletype network. The network permits communication with other agencies and provides access to computerized data from state and national information centers.

Garza County will receive \$11,895 for second-year funding of adult and juvenile probation services.

Crosby County has been awarded a grant of 11,687 for second-year funding of a project providing social and personal rehabilitative services to juvenile and adult misdemeanant probationers.

A grant of \$37,900 will go to SPAG for criminal-justice planning in the counties of Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

The local grants were among 50 approved by the governor totaling \$7.2 million.

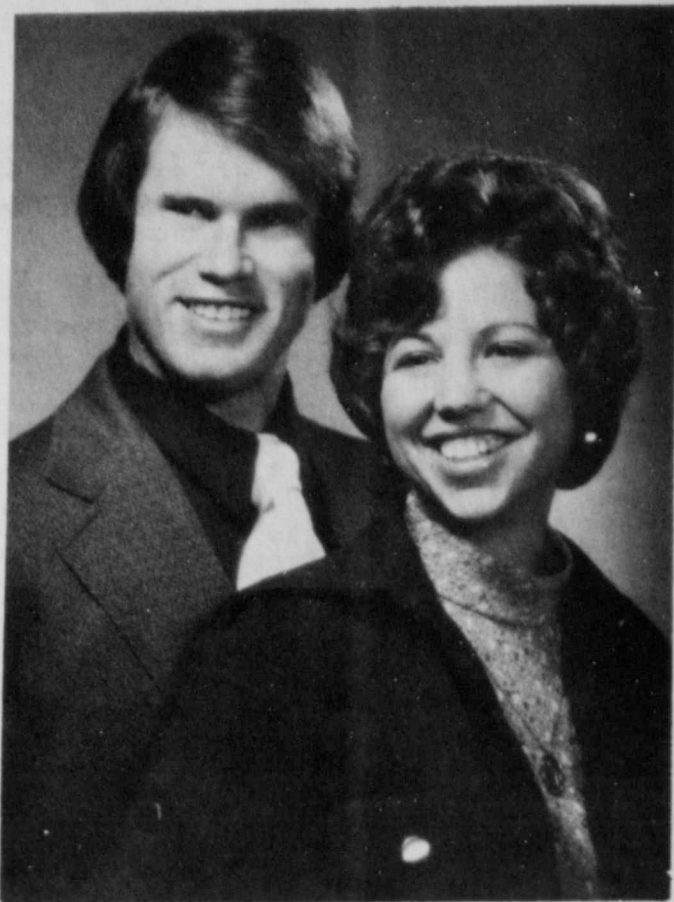

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Sorghum — The Bargain Grain

The market price ratio between grain sorghum and corn has widened in recent

weeks and corn is now \$1.00 cwt. higher than sorghum, according to Grain Sorghum Producers Ass'n. Executive Director Elbert Harp. GSPA is a national organization of grain farmers, with headquarters in Lubbock, Texas.

"Grain sorghum may be a buyer's dream right now," said Harp, "but the seller may find this to be the worst possible time to market his grain". Harp quoted two main reasons for the variation of prices between corn and grain sorghum:

1) Cattle feedlots have cut back sharply on numbers of fed cattle throughout the sorghum production belt. Feedlots that bought ahead are finding themselves in a grain surplus situation and some are reselling a portion of their grain. Others are waiting to see if they are going to have any cattle to feed before purchasing grain.

2) Countries competing with the United States, such as Argentina, Australia and South Africa, have been capturing much of the foreign grain market sales during the past few months. As the cattle situation improves, the GSPA executive feels that feedlots will resume a more normal operation, which should automatically help the grain export situation.

With the corn/sorghum price spread of \$1.00 cwt., Harp said it is likely that there soon will be a large shift of purchasing from corn to grain sorghum to take advantage of the price break.

An example of price comparisons between corn and sorghum a year ago was the February 1973 Gulf Export Price for grain sorghum of \$3.73 cwt. compared to \$3.64 for corn. In June of 1973 the Gulf Export Price for grain sorghum was \$4.37 cwt., compared to \$3.85 for corn.

During other months a year ago, corn and sorghum alternated as to which grain was selling at highest prices in the export market.

Harp said, "As buyers begin now to purchase more grain sorghum, we feel that it will not be long before sorghum prices start moving up in relation to corn. Therefore, we encourage those who have grain to sell to watch the markets very closely and not sell too cheap."

Harp stated that a producer who is concerned about the market dropping below its current level can protect himself by setting a "stop order" to hedge his grain in case the market does start dropping. He said

this would give price protection and a seller also would get the advantage of future increases in market prices.

war or separated from their parents. They had survived by shining shoes, begging or stealing.

For two years, Hughes worked almost alone. Slowly help came. Word got around among the other kids, called "bui doi" — the dust of life. A second hostel opened, run by a Vietnamese; then a third. Now there are five, housing 150 young boys, and two more are planned. It took a long time for the youngsters to learn to trust him, to be sure he would not betray or forget them, as

others had. Dick Hughes persuaded doctors and dentists to offer their services free. He taught the "bui doi" to do their own household chores. An occasional picnic, a trip to the movies, a rare visit to the beach, a pat on the back was their only reward from this foreigner who cared about them.

If the youngsters were to stop stealing and begging, jobs had to be found. Now they are learning to work the land and raise farm animals. Some can develop

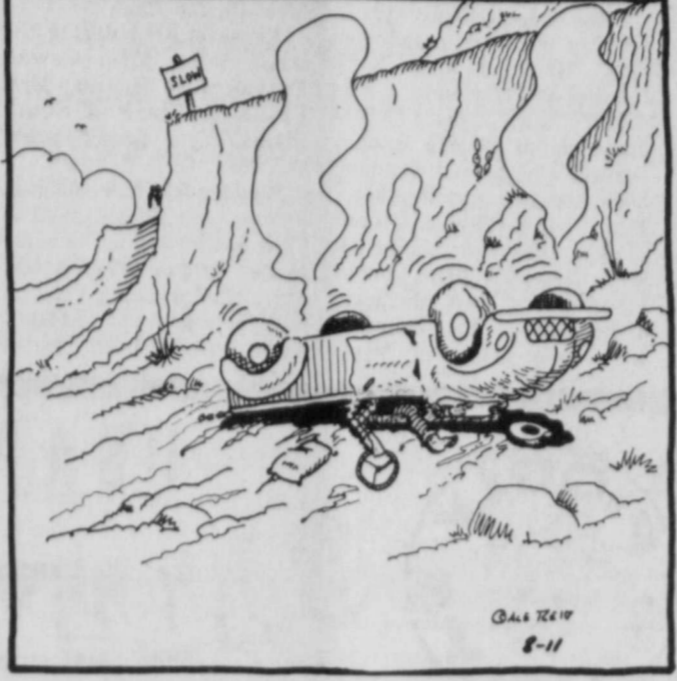
