## Open Tennis Tournament Thursday

Floydada's annual open tennis tournament begins Thursday and finals will be played on Sunday. Another big tournament is expected with over 100 players signed up.

Last year's tournament was so large that all six Floydada courts were used, Lockney's two courts were used, lighted courts were used at night and pro-sets were played. And...early morning rains two mornings delayed beginning of play.

Flo Davis and Floydada tennis coach Raymond Jones are tournament directors and they are making arrangements for tennis players to stay in Floydada homes during the tournament. It looks like Lockney's courts will be used again this year.

### SCHEDULE

All Jr. High and High School matches begin at 8 a.m. Thursday. High school graduates to 35 singles and doubles begin at 8 a.m. on Friday. Mixed doubles begin at 8 a.m. on Saturday. Finals will be played Sunday afternoon beginning at 1 o'clock. There is a possibility of some Jr. high and high school finals being played before Sunday, according to the schedules of the players.

The tournament is sponsored by the Floydada tennis club, and the club will also sponsor a concession stand at the courts.

Jones reported Friday morning that some divisions had already been filled, and around 110 had entered singles and there were over 240 entered in doubles.

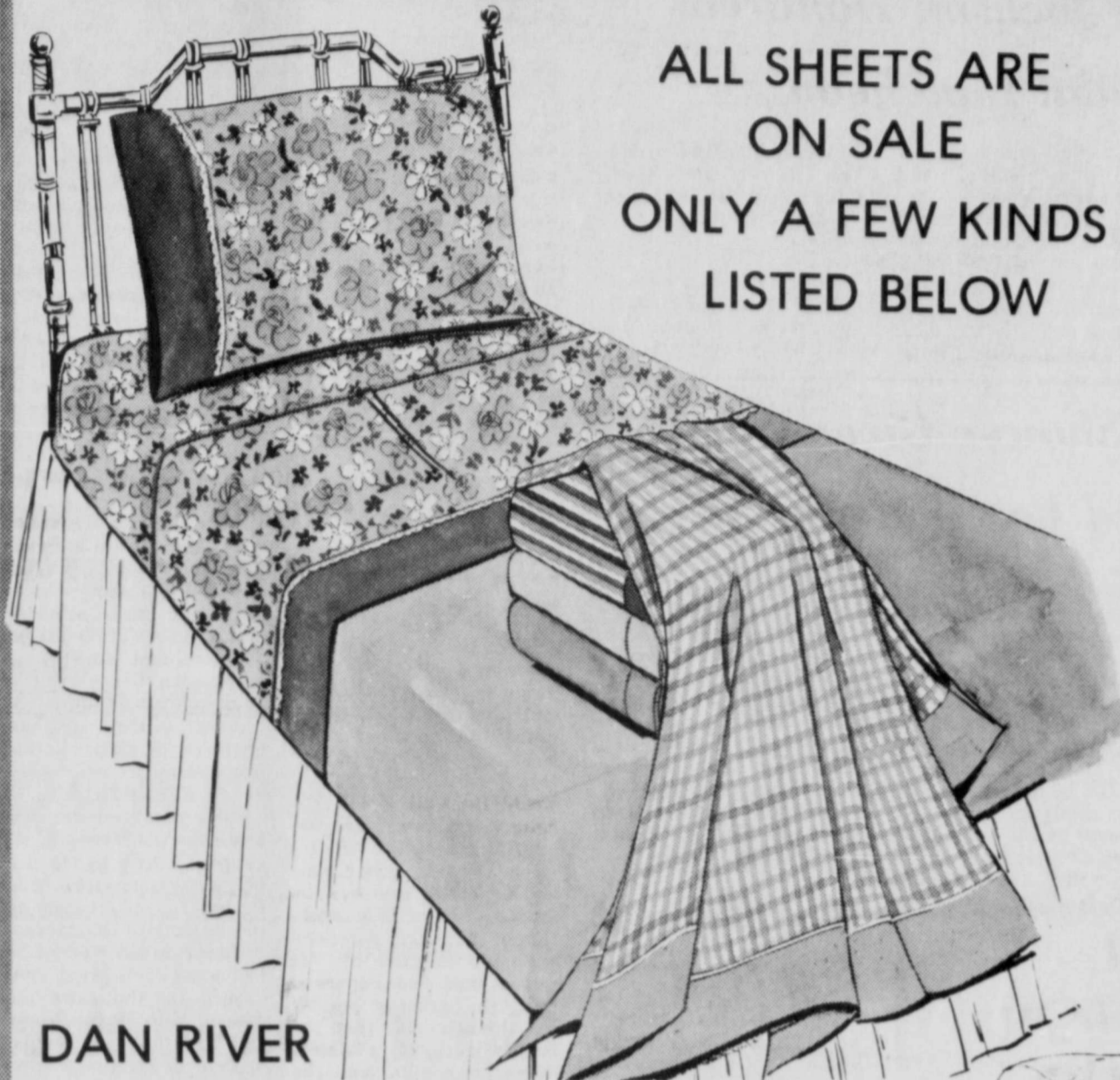

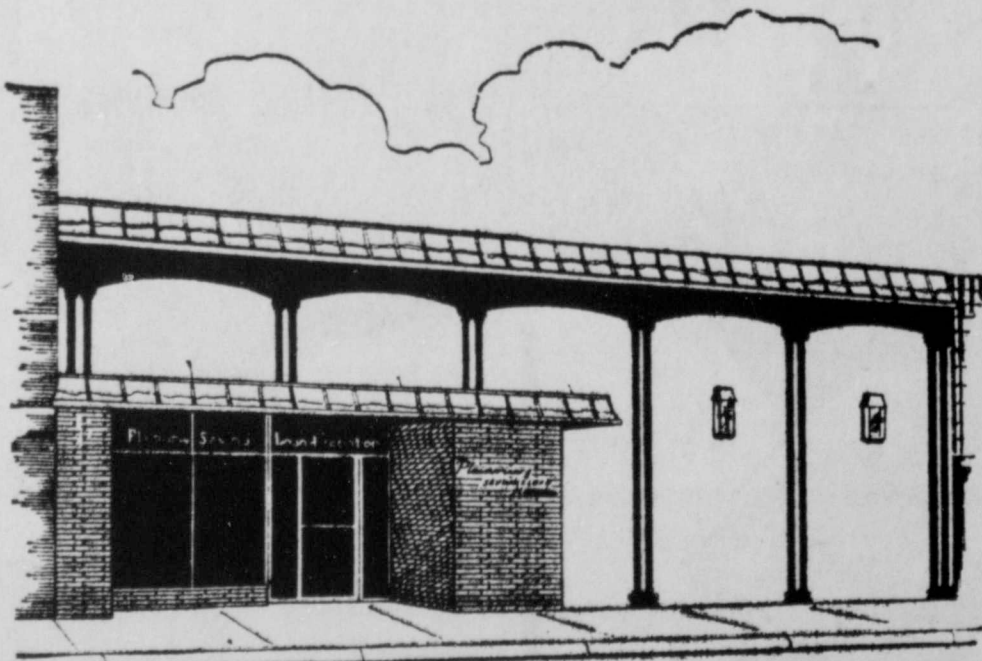
