Open Tennis Tournament Thursday

Floydada's annual open tennis tournament begins Thursday and finals will be played on Sunday. Another big tournament is expected with over 100 players signed up.

Last year's tournament was so large that all six Floydada courts were used, Lockney's two courts were used, lighted courts were used at night and pro-sets were played. And ... early morning rains two mornings delayed beginning of play.

Max Crawford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl F. Crawford was a 1956 graduate of FHS and here's what the Houston Chronicle has to say about him:

"The Most Auspicious debut of a Texas writer since Larry McMurtry. That's the way the publishers are talking about a new novel by a young writer, Max Crawford.

The novel is "Waltz Across Texas" and it will be published this fall by Farrar, Straus. A call to their publicity department elicited the information that Max Crawford was born in Lubbock in 1938 and grew up in a small town on the Texas High Plains. He got a degree in economics from the University of Texas and worked on underground papers around the country. He got a writing fellowship to Stanford in 1968. His novel, set in modern Texas, is about the murder of a prominent rancher.

The other FHS graduate is Arminta Cain, daughter of Charley Berry, who makes her home in Elsinore, California. She graduated from FHS in 1950.

She is drama, speech and Spanish teacher at Elsinore High School and has 74 drama students. She was recently on the "Wizards of Odds" TV show and won some lawn furniture. From a record-breaking 2,888,600bale crop in 1973 to the dismal prospects for maybe half that much in 1974 is truly going from feast to famine in one short year. Most

observers now say the Plains (25 PCG counties surrounding

Guesses at standing acreage of irrigated cotton at the end of June are generally in the range of 1.7 million. Much of this is late cotton, replanted after widespread hail and sand losses.
