Greenbugs Hit Grain Sorghum

Grain Sorghum crops in the High Plains are being hit by greenbugs in epidemic proportions, according to Jack King, research director of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board.

King compared this infestation of greenbugs to the epidemic of 1968, but added the main difference is that control is very poor at this time. The use of existing chemical compounds is resulting in only 50 to 70 percent control.

"We don't know why we're having control difficulties," King said, "but it could be one of two things: The extremely dry period could have affected the results of chemical usage or there may be a resistance in greenbugs to the present registered compounds."

King added that farmers should

recognize that in most cases, the fault is not with the chemical itself or the aerial applicator.

"If chemicals are going to work, then the low rate (one-sixth pint) is enough. If chemicals aren't going to work, it doesn't matter how much is used," King said, adding that if rapid mite buildup is present, higher rates of granular or liquid chemicals could be advisable.

The area hardest hit at this time is north of Plainview, east of the Caprock and west through the grain sorghum producing areas of New Mexico. There appears to be some problem north of the Canadian River, but there's little reported activity in the North Plains.

The rest of the offensive line was wiped out by graduation.

Tony Hesson (6-1, 195) senior and Mike Reeves (5-11, 165) senior will share the center job. Reeves also started at linebacker last fall.

Leslie Soto (5-9, 195) junior, Gary Nixon (5-10, 175) junior, Greg Bishop (5-8, 195) junior and Keith Marricle (5-10, 170) senior will be four good guard candidates to pick from. The end jobs are wide open — Elton Ratliff (5-11, 165) junior, Alvin Stofel (6-0, 170) junior, Lyle Suggs (6-0, 160) senior, and Tom Assiter (6-0, 145) senior are the top candidates. Suggs is a defensive holdover from last year.

Fair Building To Get New Roof

The Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair Association board of directors met in a special called meeting Monday and discussed the bid for the repair of the roof on the fair building. After the discussion by 13 board members and six advisors, the directors voted unanimously to repair the roof, at a cost of \$3,500. Charles Huffman, chairman of the roof committee, made the presentation.

It was decided that the method of payment would be first by personal donations. No business people will be talked to fair board president Eddie Teeter said, because the directors feel that most businesses have already supported the fair every time they have been called upon.

Each board member made a personal

donation at the meeting to kick off the project and show their support.

Individuals wanting to make contributions are asked to contact Bill Pallmeyer in Matador, Riley Harris in Silverton, Tommy Assiter in Floydada, Buster Terrell in Plainview, Eddie Teeter in Lockney, or any board member.

The roofing material is a plastic cement with fiberglass webbing, produced by Texas Refining Co. of Fort Worth. The material is claimed to have a wide range of weather resistance (it is said to run at 200 degrees and freeze at minus-40 degrees), and the job carries a seven-year guarantee. James Younger, company representative from Plainview, will supervise the work, which is scheduled to begin

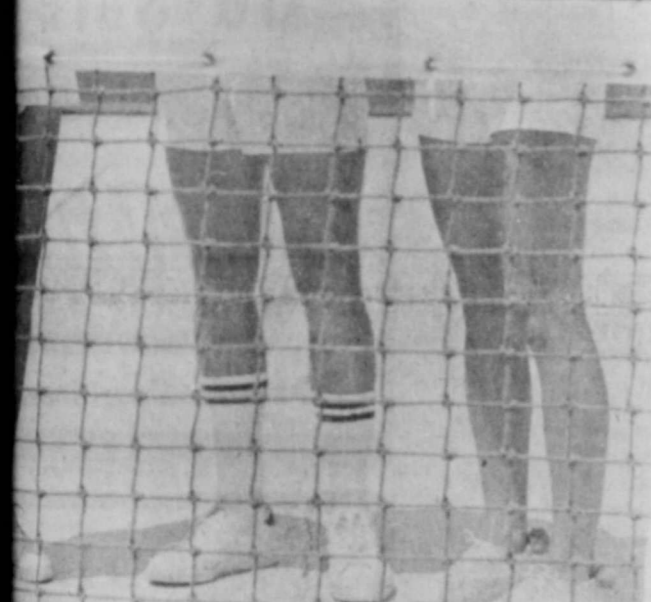
around September 1. The fair starts its three-day run September 12.

Gets Tangled Up In Economics Again This Week



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm gets tangled up in economics again this week.

Dear editor:
 If a person pinched himself every time he hears or reads something it's impossible to believe these days he'd stay black and blue. It's wall-climbing to hear a witness in Washington solemnly swear he can remember one thing in his favor and can't at all recall another thing that'd convict him. But one of the oddest things I've read lately, having nothing to do with remembering, was a statement the other day by the chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, Herbert Stein.

In opposing a 5 to 10-billion-dollar tax cut to slow down inflation, Mr. Stein said it wouldn't do any good. "We shouldn't be putting that much money in the hands of the people because they'd only go out and spend it," he said. "Wait a minute," I said to myself before hunting for a new spot to pinch, "you mean the government will keep that 5 to 10-billion-dollar denied tax cut and put it in a savings and loan account? You mean the Federal government, which has over-spent its income every year for the past 25 or 30 and is now over 300 billion dollars in debt, is lecturing the people for spending money?" I got up and went for a long walk. Maybe

an economist can but I can't understand why if the government spends 10 billion dollars it's all right but if the people do it's inflationary.

In fact, I have as much trouble understanding economists as economists have understanding the economy. For instance, Economist Stein said that inflation should be blamed on the people for lack of self-discipline, for too many demands, and that they should return to the "old time religion" of saving and controlling their desires.

This is true, people shouldn't spend more than they make and ought to add to their savings every pay day, but have you ever stopped to think what would happen if everybody did? If everybody saved and saved till we all had say \$200,000 apiece drawing 8 percent interest, or \$16,000 a year, which ought to be enough to live on, how much do you think \$16,000 would be worth in buying power? Probably \$250, and everybody would have to go back to work again.

It doesn't pay to think too much about economics. It's safer to just go on like we are, stopping every now and then to cuss the government.

MANY VETERANS ELIGIBLE FOR MEDICAL CARE

Many men and women who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States are unaware of their eligibility for medical care through the Veterans Administration hospital system. Unfortunately for some, the inquiry concerning this eligibility comes only after they have spent all of their ready assets for private hospital care. Every veteran should acquaint himself with the benefits to which he may be entitled.

Under present laws, a veteran may be eligible for admission to a VA hospital if the period of military service terminated under conditions other than dishonorable. This applies to both men and women, and to wartime and peacetime service. Some veterans may be eligible even though their discharges were other than the regular honorable type.

Eligible for admission to a Veterans Administration hospital for treatment of any condition is the veteran whose discharge was either Honorable or General under Honorable Conditions. If a person received an Undesirable Discharge or a Bad Conduct Discharge, he may or may not be eligible for VA hospital care, depending upon the circumstances causing the discharge. In such instances, a veteran should apply for medical care when it is needed, and the VA will obtain the military records and determine whether the discharge is a bar to benefits. A Dishonorable Discharge is given as a result of a General Court Martial, and will always serve as a bar to veterans benefits.

A number of veterans who served only during a period of peacetime have in the past been denied admission to a VA hospital. Such veterans, if their service was honorable, may now be eligible for hospital care. Public Law 93-82, effective on September 1, 1973, placed wartime and peacetime veterans on the same basis with reference to VA hospital care. Any veteran who is in need of hospital care should contact his local Service Officer, and determine whether he is eligible for treatment in a Veterans Administration facility.

Judge Proclaims Farm Safety Week

County Judge J. K. Holmes has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1974 as **FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK** in Floyd County at the request of Floyd County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is joining efforts with other farm and ranch agencies within the county and many of its 209 counterpart FB's across the state.

In his proclamation, Judge Holmes said "there are many practical, common sense precautions that farm people can practice to prevent deaths and injuries". Some of the suggestions made by the Judge include: replace the faded Slow-Moving Vehicle emblems on farm equipment used on public roads, use protective equipment at work, drive defensively, buy tractors with rollover protection, and follow good safe practices at home and recreation.

Like the cost-price crisis, farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural safety through regulatory requirements for their hired labor and added cost of new equipment as a result of these regulatory requirements. Reviewing the report of Fatal Farm Accidents in Texas for 1973, Farm Bureau President Paul Schacht said, "we are concerned with more than just crop and livestock productivity alone." He expressed concern about the 214 fatal farm accidents which occurred in 123

different counties. "Of particular concern are the 59 deaths occurring to young people under 20 years of age and the 73 deaths occurring to the older group over 60 years of age," he explained.

"Forty-two people died as a result of firearms accidents and there were 41 drownings - and only a small percentage of the total fatalities were involved in agriculture."

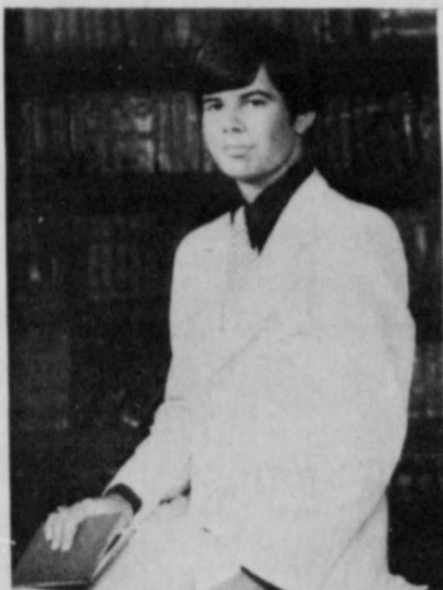

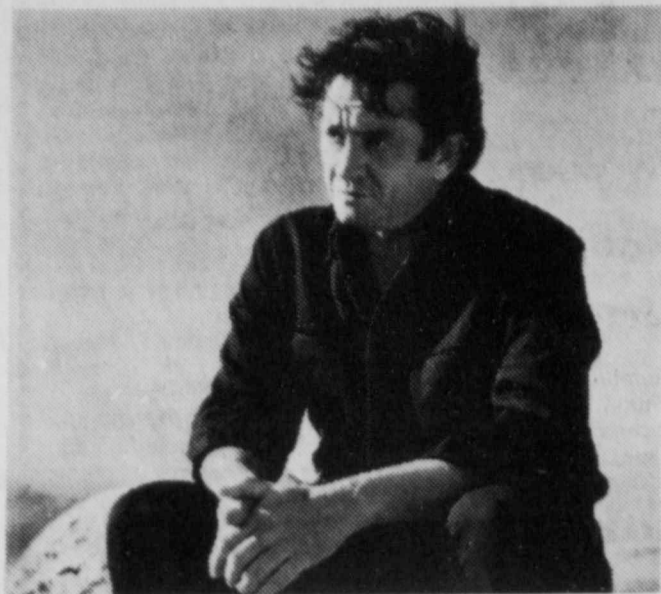

Mrs. Kirchhoff To Serve On State Committee

Mrs. Mary Kirchhoff of Plainview, Texas, candidate for the State Senate for the 30th district, has been asked to serve on the Texas Republican Positive Action Committee, which held its organization meeting Saturday, July 20, in Austin, Texas.

In her work to promote rural areas, she assisted in organizing the West Texas "Small Towns Task Force" for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and developed plans and materials now being used in local, state, and national levels.

"I am a strong believer in helping people to develop right where they are," she emphasized. "Local programs can be developed to meet local needs - which is what we did in the Small Towns Task Force."

"On any level, people want to have a part in their own government, whether it be local, state, or national. Our work with the Positive Action Committee will help to open some avenues of opportunity."

"Integrity in government is not only desirable, but it's a must. And by listening more to the voice of the people, we can help to bring it about."

Hightower Investigating Use Of Aircraft By State Representative

Hightower asked Attorney General John Hill to clear up "the legality of a delegate receiving reimbursement for chartering an airplane for travel to and from Austin for the purpose of attending the Convention and returning home."

"The Vernon senator said "the Administration Committee always has followed the letter and spirit of the law, and now that this question has arisen, we are simply seeking a ruling from the Attorney General as to what actually is the law."

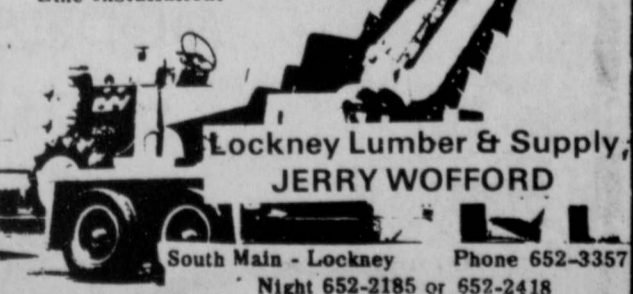

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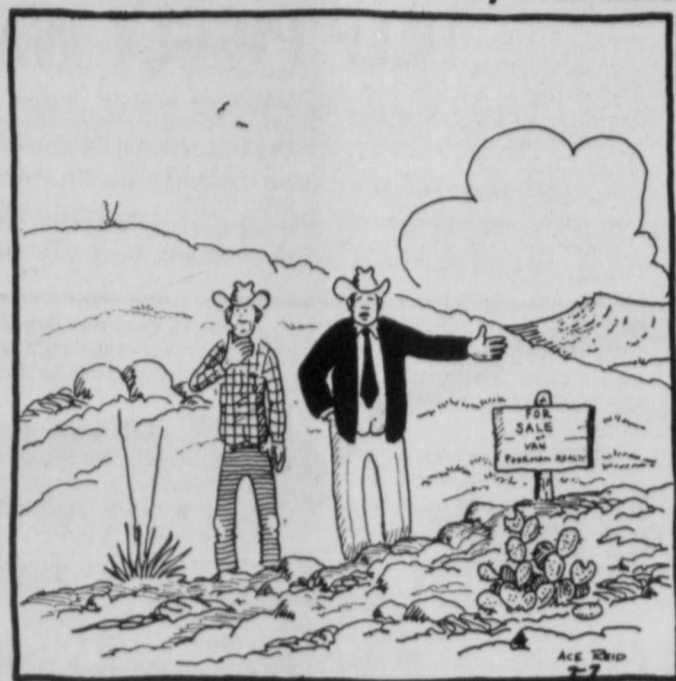

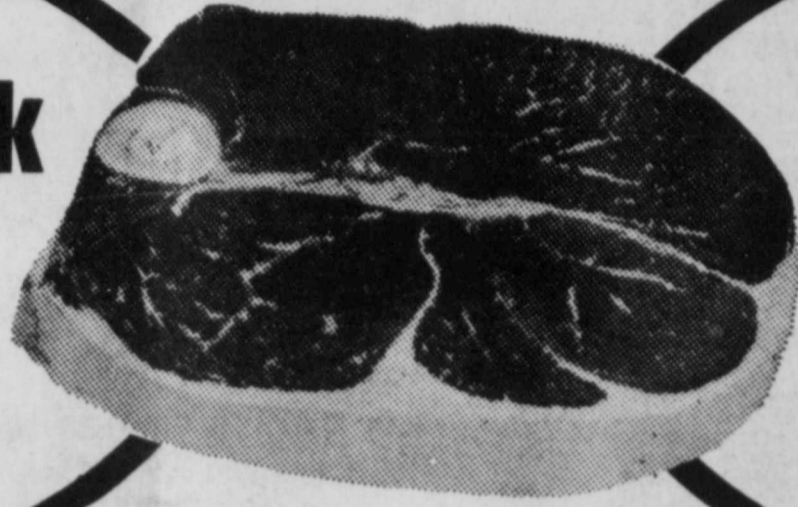
