## School Starts August 26

Students in the Floydada Independent School District will register for the 1974-75 school term Friday, August 23, according to school officials. The term begins Monday, August 26.

Students enrolled in either of the two elementary schools and Junior High will commence registering at 9:00 August 23. At high school seniors will begin registering from 9 a.m. until 10:30; juniors from 10:30 until 12 noon; sophomores from 1 until 2:30 p.m.; and freshmen from 2:30 until 4 p.m.

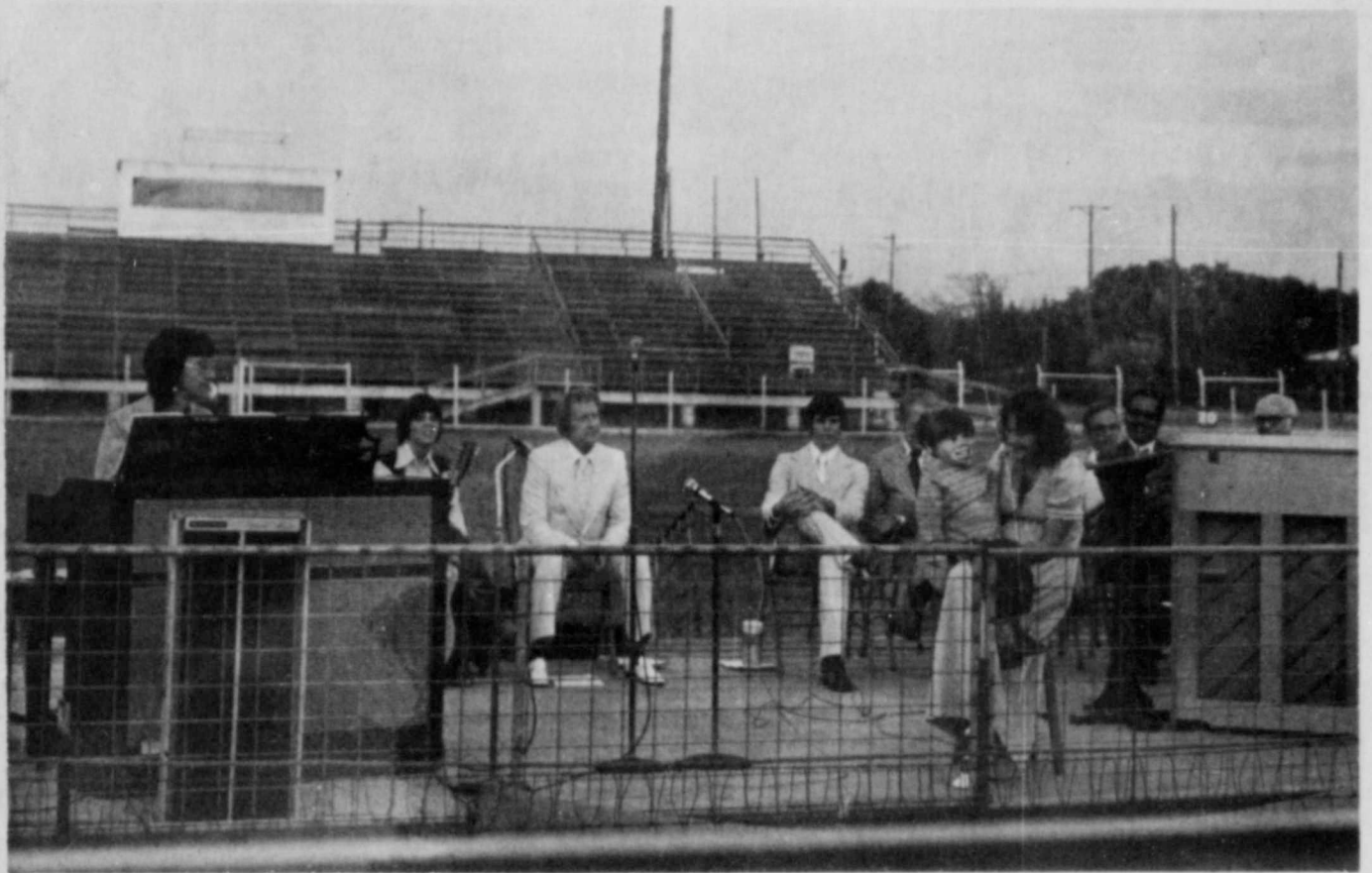
Pictures of the three lower classmen will be taken at this time. Seniors are to have their pictures taken at their convenience at Parker Studio.

Boys wear ties and no coats. Pictures will be in color.

Teachers will report for in-service duty August 19. Other in-service days are October 26, November 21, February 25 and April 11. Students will have holidays on in-service days as well as November 22-23 for Thanksgiving; Christmas and New Years, December 24 through January 1, and Easter, April 12-15.

All pre-school, kindergarten, and 1st grade students who will be attending school for the first time must bring their birth certificates with them. Also their health cards showing their record of immunization shots must be brought on the day of registration.

The mixture cuts down on pollutants but it may not reduce the appetites of gas-guzzling vehicles.

Dr. Walter J. Ewbank, professor of aerospace, mechanical and nuclear engineering, began working on the process for mixing gasoline and water nine years ago. He said he has tested mixtures ranging from almost none to 50 per cent water.

He said 25 per cent water works quite well, but a 10 per cent water mix seems to produce the best mileage.

'74 Peach Production Up Slightly

AUSTIN—Peach estimates for the 1974 season are 330,000 bushels, an increase of 20,000 over last year but far below the 604,000 bushels in 1972, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

White said the year has been "a good one for

growers in Gillespie and Gaines counties." Peach farmers in the East and North, plagued by weather damage, did not fare as well, however. Production in those areas has been low.

Texas has approximately 1 million trees. Of these, 207,000 are in Gaines County in the High Plains and 112,000 in Gillespie County, traditionally the largest peach producer in the state.

In the past, Gaines peaches have been damaged by frost, but this year production has risen. Harvest has just begun there, but has peaked in other parts of the state.

White said quality generally has been good. Wholesale prices in the San Antonio-Winter Garden area recently ranged from \$3.50-\$4 a half bushel, a drop of nearly \$2 since early July. The Dallas market reported half bushels retailing at \$7-\$9.

"People overlook the opportunities in small businesses" believes Oley Allison. "scissor sharpening has been good to us."

It all began quite by accident when Allison, an electrician who had been ill and in Veterans hospitals for over a year, decided to take a locksmith course by correspondence. Then he answered a classified ad and was employed to run a key concession stand on Sears parking lot in Amarillo. His employers told him not to worry about the scissor-sharpening machine in the stand, because "There's not much demand for the service." Oley taught himself to use the machine and increased the stand's business during his year there.

Finally, Oley ordered a machine and began traveling, calling on barber, beauty and fabric shops. Then about five years ago, the lady manager of a Cloth World store asked the Allisons to work exclusively for the company which headquarters in Amarillo. There were only 9 stores then, but now well over 100 stores are in the chain across the south and southwest.

Cloth World advertises that a professional sharpener will be in a particular store on a certain date and that one pair of regular scissors per customer will be sharpened free, with a small charge for extra regular scissors, pinking shears and electric scissors. The Allisons are on a flat rate with the company, with that small charge as their commission.

When Oley and Wynona first began traveling, they worked Cloth World shops as far away as Florida, Wichita, Kansas, and back west into Arizona. Their route now includes New Mexico, El Paso, Midland-Odessa, Abilene, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Amarillo and sometimes Wichita Falls and Lawton, Okla., and Texas coastal cities. Stores

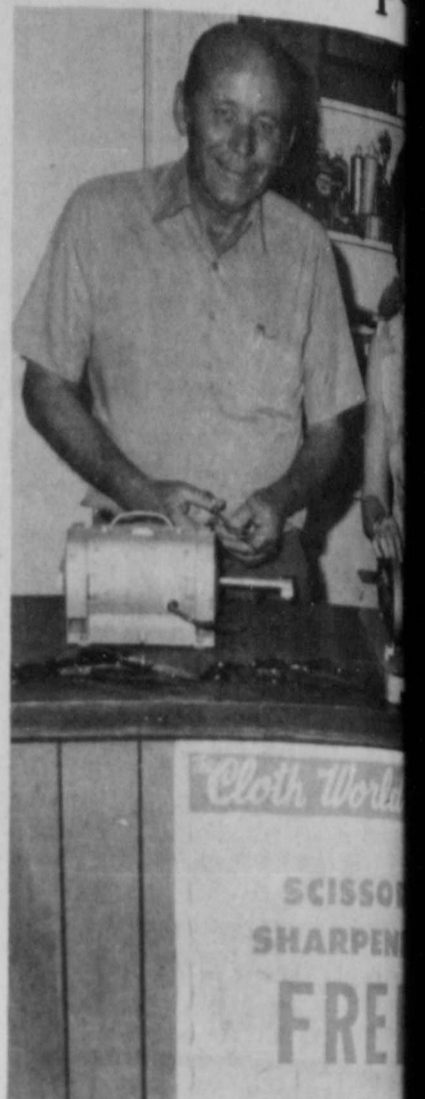
would like to have them once every month, but that isn't possible.

The Allisons have learned to allow two or three days per store to keep from being overloaded on a one-day stand. Recently in Fort Worth he sharpened 450 pairs on the last day there, but really thinks about 250-300 pairs is about as busy as he ought to be. He can sharpen over 50 pairs of regular scissors (that are of a good grade) in an hour, and Wynona considers herself nearly as fast. Ordinarily, she stays at one table, checking in or giving out the scissors while he does the sharpening, but she has worked stores alone. "People were surprised to find a woman at the machines," she relates.

Each customer's scissors are put into a paper bag that is marked with the condition of the scissors (good shape, sprung or whatever), and the customer is asked to write her name or address on the bag. Allison prefers to keep only one bag at a time on his working table, so that he doesn't mix up people's scissors. "Most customers aren't that sure of what their scissors look like, so it would be easy to lose them." Occasionally someone may take the wrong bag, but they are usually returned. Anytime the Allisons lose scissors, they replace them with a very good pair, regardless of the quality of the pair that was lost.

Naturally, they can relate stories about how customers try to out-manuever the "one pair sharpened free to a customer" policy. "We tell children that this program is for adults, because children shouldn't be carrying those sharp scissors." Oley laughs at the remembrance of a couple in Mesa, Arizona, who came into the store together, then separated.

One hundred eighty-six students will receive the Bachelor of Science degree, 18 the Bachelor of Arts, 53 the Bachelor of Business

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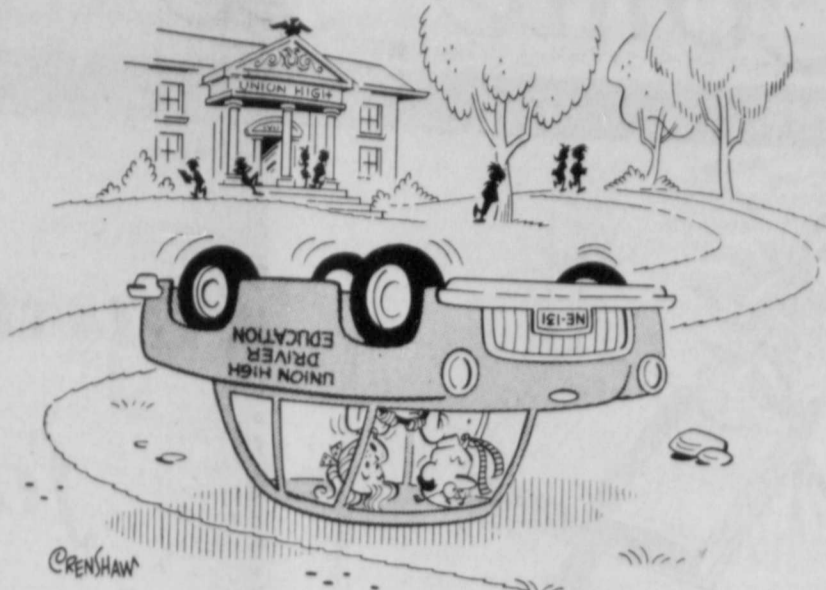

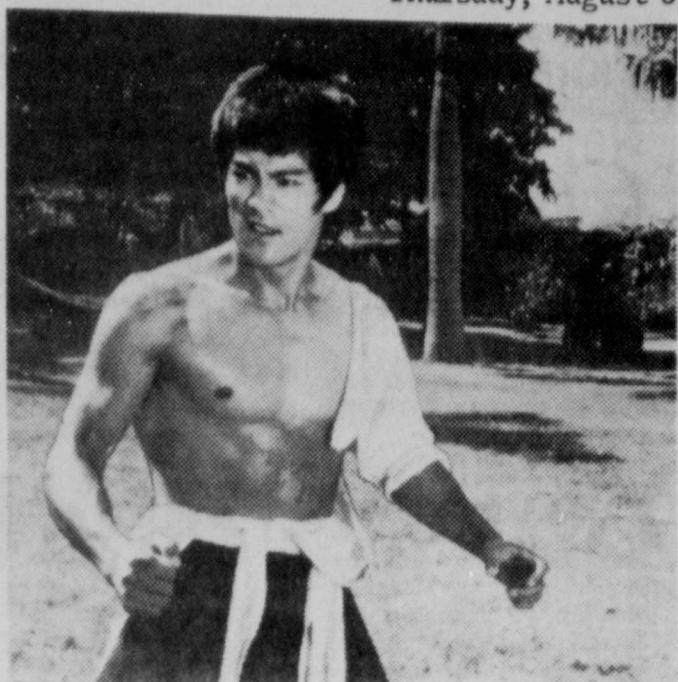

together", she stammered without thinking. Then she started over, "I mean we just go home together." Allison told her "That sounds like fun, but finish signing this and I'll do the sharpening."

Allison says that some ladies want it all free and sometimes forget what fictitious name they put on the second sack, so they have trouble picking up the scissors. Wynona adds "if a woman decides she is going to get that extra pair done free, she will think up a way". One lady picked up her scissors, promising to pay a small charge before she left the store. Wynona noticed her leaving quietly a little later. "If she thought I was going to run after her for that money, she was wrong." At all times, the Allison's try to remain good humored because they feel they are working for Cloth World and want to represent the company well.

The Allison's believe that the best people in the world are in Texas, as they have less static and trouble with Texans. They particularly remember Florida residents as being suspicious and have had scissors stolen off tables there.

Allison has noticed people watching him as he works and knows they are trying to learn the trade. One man in Florida brought in four pairs of ruined scissors and confessed that he'd been in the day before and observed Oley. "It looked so easy and simple that I went home and told my wife I could do that using my grinder." Allison doesn't mind people watching him work, and encourages others to get into the business. "No one likes to have too much competition, but this field is wide open," he says. Jim and Ruth Brown of Lockney traveled a short time as scissor-sharpener but quit when they didn't like to drive in the heavy traffic found around cities. He then opened a cabinet shop here.

The Allison's say they see a tremendous amount of junk - poor quality scissors. "Somebody is always telling me to be extra careful because those scissors were their Mama's or grandmom's" declares Oley. "I finally told Wynona to gather up all the scissors our mothers' owned, throw them away, and I'd replace them with good ones, so our kids and grandkids wouldn't be telling somebody that someday." Oley has no argument with sentiment, but the ladies would be better off framing the scissors instead of using them, he believes.

Another cause of damaged scissors, according to Oley, is trying to sharpen them on knife-sharpeners that are on electric-can openers. "I told Wynona if a woman ever admitted that she had done that I wanted to meet her and buy her a Coke!" He says that ladies always claim that their children or their husbands did it. Finally one day a lady in Arizona came in saying "I did it. I did it. I did it," and he gave her a quarter and told her to buy herself a Coke.

The Allison's like to tell people how to use the scissors, and recommend that seamstresses get several pairs for different uses: a large, heavy pair or electric scissors for polyester double knits which dull scissors quite quickly, a

thinner or lighter weight pair for other fabrics, pinking shears, a small pair to use at the machine, and a pair for paper cutting. "My pet peeve", Oley says, "is to hand a lady her sharpened scissors and then watch her try them out on the paper bag." And yes, he tells those ladies what they are doing to their scissors!

Oley has invested over \$10,000 in sharpening and key-making equipment and hopes someday to open a sharpening shop. "After seeing men in those retirement communities in Florida and Arizona, we hope we never get to where we don't have anything to do."

A hazard to sharpening is the steel dust which once gave Oley a real problem because of the wind blowing the dust around every time the store door was opened as he was working in Wichita Falls. He drove home by himself barely able to see. They have learned to use a harder "rock" that doesn't shed. He checks his high-speed equipment often to keep it in adjustment so that nothing will fly off the machines.

Wynona says that if someone had told her fifteen years ago that she'd be doing this, she would have argued the point. At that time she was running a beauty shop in Lockney. She also is a real estate broker and keeps up her license although inactive now. The Allison's say that although "togetherness can be carried too far" they have enjoyed traveling together the 30-40,000 miles each year since they began scissor sharpening. "Even after 42 years of marriage, there is still something new to learn about each other, and we talk or make plans for the sharpening shop we will establish some day."

They travel in a van that carries their clothing, their tables and machines. They live in motels with kitchenettes and have a few favorite ones where they stay as long as two weeks in one area. Bookings at Cloth World stores are spaced to allow off-days, but they are very particular about being at the stores on time. "Once I had a wreck in Fort Worth and had to buy another vehicle at a beating, but I got to Houston on time, and we have never failed to make a booking."

They have begun a collection of unusual scissors and now have about 25-30 pairs. He especially treasures a pair of paper-hanging scissors with copper handles that he found in Arizona. He told the owner why he wanted them, so the owner offered to trade for a good pair of new ones. Men will let you buy old scissors, but women are too sentimental" he claims.

Oley can't say enough about how much he likes the Cloth World people. Wynona agrees "The company has treated Oley so great, and business is so good. I've seen a gleam in his eye that he didn't have before we started this."

The Allison's are parents of three children and grandparents to eight children: Don, a builder and developer in Memphis, Tennessee; Darla, Mrs. Marion Cross of Plainview; Diane, Mrs. Ronnie Dye of Raleigh, North Carolina; Andrea and Renee Allison, Ricky, Kelli, Curtis and Patrick Cross; Teri and John Dye. Wynona Allison is the daughter of Mrs. L. A. Wofford of Lockney.

#### AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

By Congressman Omar Burlison

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Another new agency of government is being created out of an existing program which provides legal services to the poor.

As of now, the office of legal services is in the office of Economic Opportunity. It is able to provide legal advice to those who cannot afford to pay, but a new measure passed by the House of Representatives and now in the U.S. Senate, creates a Federally funded program run by a private corporation with a Board of Directors.

As the bill was first drawn, there was provided what is known as "back-up" services. This meant that the corporation could contract with universities to research legal questions sent them by its lawyers. It was argued that these back-up centers for research would be a waste of money and it was dropped out of the bill. Also deleted was a wide range of services in connection with any legal difficulty. The latest version would provide aid only in civil cases and not including criminal matters. It also has a prohibition against government lawyers taking cases involving school desegregation, abortion, selective service or military

### Picture Not Bright In Feedlots

AUSTIN—July marked the fourteenth consecutive month that Texas feedlots have operated with reduced placements, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White recently announced.

He said the number of cattle and calves in feedlots has dropped from 2.2 million in January to 1.7 million as of July 1. Many lots are operating far below the 85 percent of capacity range.

The high cost of feed was cited by White as the reason for reduced numbers of cattle on feed. Stockmen have been losing as much as \$100 a head on cattle going to market.

desertion and matters dealing with political activities, labor matters or demonstrations.

Under the Office of Economic Opportunity there is evidence that in many of the larger cities, lawyers went out and brought in clients in whose name all sorts of claims were filed. In other words, the lawyers found the people to fit certain cases instead of cases fitting the individual. In many instances the clients realized no benefit of any kind but were used as a tool for all sorts of suits.

No one should be denied access to the courts when they have a real cause but for legal grievances to be created is something else. The record indicates that hundreds of suits were filed with little expectation of being finally successful but with a hope of settlement out of court for a fee from the Government.

At least it is a hope that with changes made in the pending proposal some of these ridiculous activities may be ended.

With consumer protection and a 1,001 other governmental services, this appears to cover just about everything, except spiritual advice. This would probably

be added if there were not a Constitutional provision separating church and state.

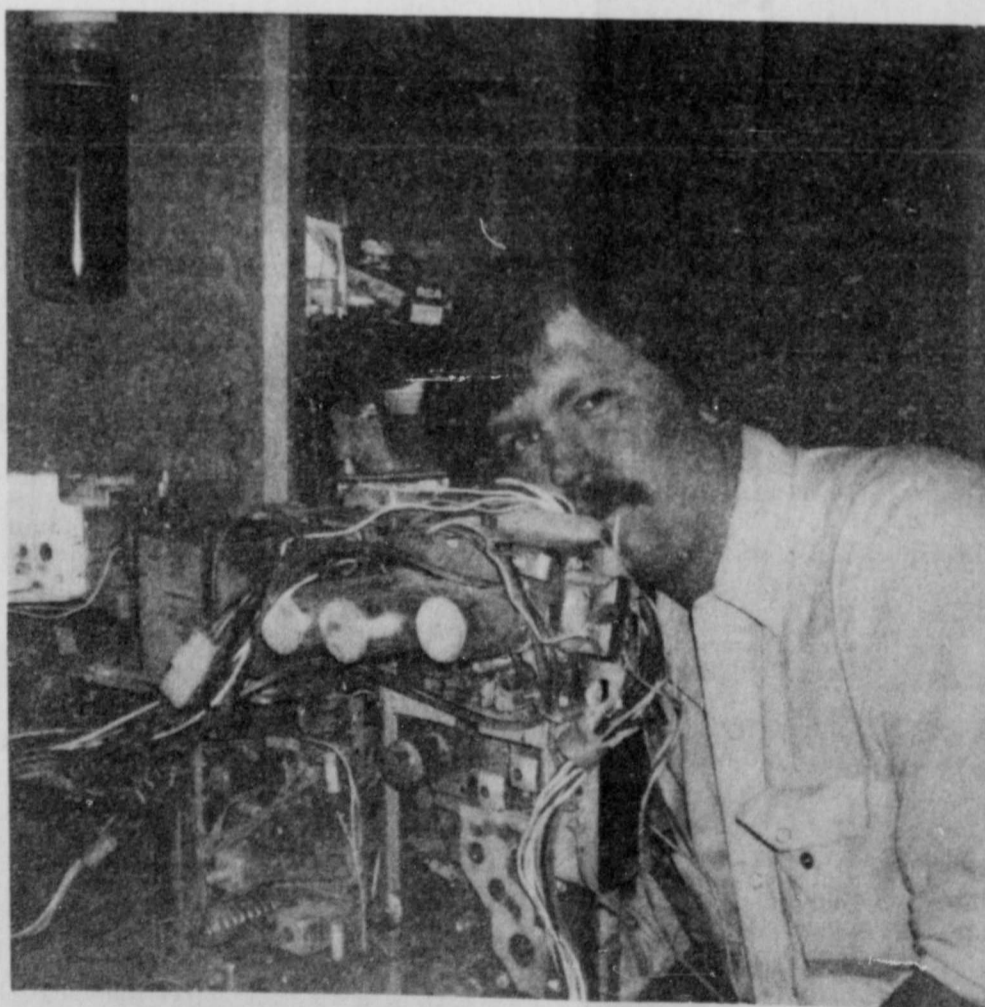

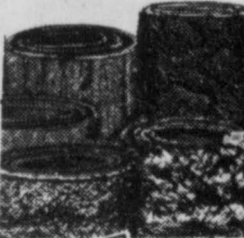
