Rain, Terrible Hail Hits Floyd

A cold front set off thundershowers across Floyd County Sunday morning with some rainfall reports going over 2 1/2 inches. But, with the good rainfall came some reports of damaging hail.

County Agent Doyle Warren estimated 10,000 acres received from bad to slight hail damage in the Sandhill area of the county...possibly as much as a million dollars loss in grain sorghum and a million dollar loss on the cotton crop.

As well as could be determined the hail began Southwest of Lockney near Chester R.C. Mitchell farms, moved south about eight or nine miles into the Harmony Community.

Hardest hit were Fred Jackson, Roger Dowdy, Weldon Pruitt, Kelton Shaw; others received slight to considerable hail included: F.L. Montandon, Gene Bloys, Edwin Nutt, Jim and Junior Simpson, Roy Hale, David Battey Jr., David Campbell, Orba and Arlan Miller, Willis Apple, George Gatewood, Charlie Perry, Jerrold Vinson, Gerald Bright, Cleo Fulton, Laron Fulton, A.E. Schwertner, and Milton Evans. Most all these farms received two inches or over of rain.

Roger Dowdy told a Hesperian reporter, "we were coming home from church Sunday very happy about the good rain. However, when we

discovered our hail damaged crops...we weren't so happy."

Mrs. Fred Jackson said, "well, this part of farming, we have learned we can't count on the money from a crop until it's in the elevator or gin."

Floydada officially received .81 of rain....about four miles south of Floydada two inches was reported. The Lakeview area reported an inch of rain. Southern Floyd County received 1 1/2 inches.

The rains came in time to help all crops, and will improve prospects for better crops all across the county. Some farmers are beginning to turn off their irrigation wells.

One farmer in the Center Community said he had plenty of moisture to plant wheat.

Amounts of rainfall in the Lockney area ranged from half an inch to over three inches. George Worsham, just north of the Lockney city limits, reported three inches; Herman King at Lone Star received 1.2 inches; at Sterley gin, the total was nearly three inches; Herman Graham at Muncy measured 1.85 inches; a mile and a half west of Muncy, Roland Watson received 2.7 inches; the Acco Seed gauge near Aiken showed 2.75 inches; and the totals in Providence area varied from .5 to 3.5 inches.

School Board Approves Budget

In a long session Monday night the Floydada School Board worked on approving a budget for the new year that may come out in the red over \$40,000.

The projected income in the budget is \$1,160,914.00, the expected expenses \$1,203,166.00.

So, the board discussed some alterations and possibilities:

If Governor Dolph Briscoe calls a special session in January and the legislature shifts surplus tax money to the schools, Floydada schools will receive about \$53,000.

The school enters the new budget year with approximately \$30,000 surplus from last year.

No doubt the year will end with

many items in the budget costing more than the budget estimate.

The board is going to try to make the school year without a tax increase.

A 99 member Whirlwind Band needs more uniforms and band instruments.

School salaries, insurance and transportation costs in sharp increases.

OTHER BUSINESS

The board approved an increase in school lunches of 10 cents per lunch...elementary students will pay 60 cents, secondary students 70 cents and adults 80 cents.

Business manager Claude Estes reported that 53% of the school lunches were served free on the Government's lunch program last year.

The board adopted "Plan B" for this year's lunch program which will mean free lunches for children from families on the following income levels:

- Three in the family 0 - \$4,740 income.
- Four in the family 0 - \$5,540 income.
- Five in the family 0 - \$6,480 income.
- Six in the family 0 - \$7,310 income.
- Seven in the family 0 - \$8,060 income.
- Eight in the family 0 - \$8,810 income.
- Nine in the family 0 - \$9,510 income.
- Ten in the family 0 - \$10,190 income.

The board approved the employment of three new teachers: Wayland graduate Patricia Smith to teach remedial reading at Andrews Ward; Sherry York to teach migrant students at Andrews Ward, and Loretta Morren, P.E. Aide at Andrews Ward.

The board also approved employment of Clovis Myrick, janitor at Andrews Ward.

The board approved the same tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation for the budget and 25 cents for debt retirement under which the school has operated for several years.

The board granted a contract to Lydick Roofing of Lubbock to put a new roof on the agriculture building at high school.

All board members were present except Jerrold Vinson, Lawrence Stovall, and Flo Davis.

Give Your Blood Today

It is hoped that everyone physically able, will give blood from 2 to 7 p.m. today at the Massie Activity Center. Representatives of the Lubbock Blood Bank will be here to draw blood.

The drive is sponsored by the Floydada Kiwanis Club, the women's division of the Chamber of Commerce and Caprock Hospital.

So far this year, Caprock Hospital has used some 100 pints of blood from the Lubbock Blood Bank, and only 23 pints were given a couple of months ago when the Kiwanis Club sponsored a blood donor drive at Reed Ford Sales.

This statement from Robert Williams, Caprock Hospital Administrator gives some background information on the needs of the drive:

"The problems facing the Hospitals today are many and we all are trying to find solutions to them and give more care to more people. However there is

one problem that we alone cannot in any way solve by ourselves. This is one of extreme need of Human Blood.

All of the Hospitals in this area use the services of Blood Services, Incorporated of Lubbock for supply of blood for our medical needs. At the present time there is a very critical shortage of Human Blood in this area.

We are doing more major surgeries, which sometimes requires Blood to be given or to be on hand to use if necessary. It has become very difficult for us to get blood when it is needed because the Blood Banks just do not have enough voluntary donors.

It is a very noble and generous act of a person to donate a unit of Blood for the need of another person.

Medical science has performed many great deeds but has not been able to substitute anything for the real thing, Whole Human Blood."

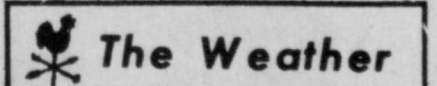

City Council Considering Tax Office Consolidation With School

The Floydada City Council instructed City Manager Bill Feuerbacher to set up a meeting with the Floydada School Board to discuss consolidation of the city, Mackenzie Water Authority and school tax offices at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Mayor Parnell Powell said, "we don't know how good a job the school is doing in collecting taxes, but we feel that we are missing enough taxes to pay a full time certified tax collector. The city of Tulia has consolidated with its school and Mackenzie, and it might be a good step for Floydada."

The council devoted considerable discussion to sharing costs with the county on radio dispatching and radio communications equipment. Although no official action was taken the council seemed to be in agreement of forming a county-wide law enforcement center.

The council decided not to buy any more diesel fuel storage tanks, since it

now has a 45,000 gallon tank that will run the city's electric power motors on a 30 day run. It was the feeling that the availability of diesel will be better this fall.

The council has instructed police chief Tom Hopper to hire a night watchman for downtown Floydada.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council:

Approved the purchase of a \$610 two way radio for the city manager's car;

Approved setting aside \$500 per month on the purchase of sanitation truck chassis when the present ones wear out;

Approved a 5% cost of living increase for the city's employees beginning with the October 15 payroll;

Approved purchase of a new copy machine;

Approved repairs of motors in the electric plant and irrigation wells after investigation of their needs.

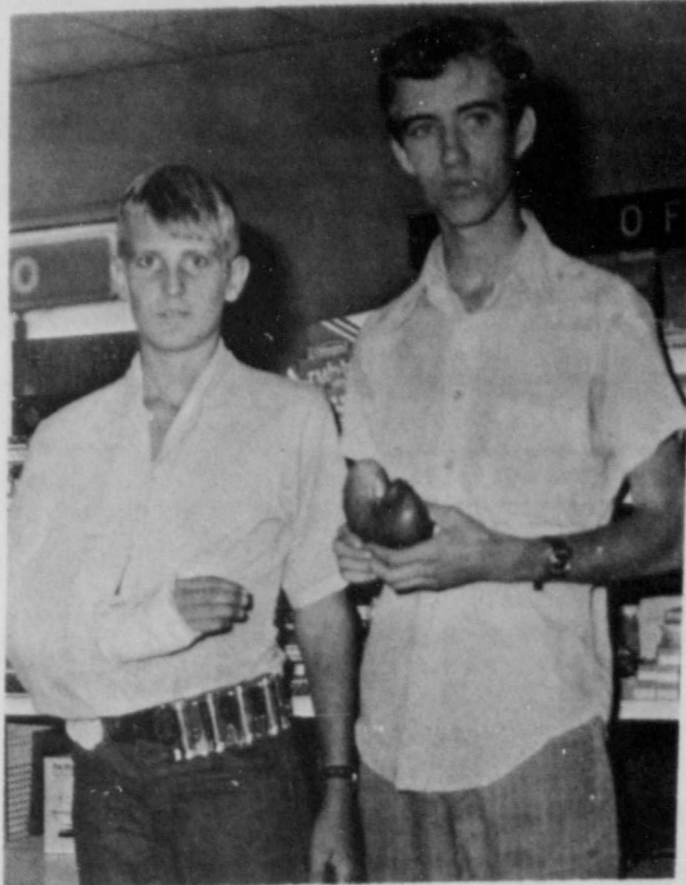

HARP TO HEAD FEED GRAINS COUNCIL

Elbert Harp of Lubbock, Texas was named chairman of the U.S. Feed Grains Council during the Council's annual membership meeting in Stratton Mountain, Vermont this week (Aug. 7-9).

Harp is executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, both headquartered in Lubbock.

The U.S. Feed Grains Council, which represents virtually every sector of feed grain production and marketing, is one of the major organizations responsible for the development of foreign markets for U.S. agricultural commodities.

The council was formed in 1960 by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and other agricultural groups. The USFGC, a non-profit organization, works under contract with the foreign agricultural service of the Department of Agriculture to increase dollar sales abroad of U.S. feed grains.

The council has developed and is currently implementing marketing programs in 20 countries and has generated more than \$2 billion in direct sales during the past five years.

Harp toured the council's marketing areas in Asia early this year and will travel worldwide later this year as a representative of the council.

The Boys Ranch Band will provide the music for the rodeo, while other boys operate concessions for bar-be-que beef and other refreshments. 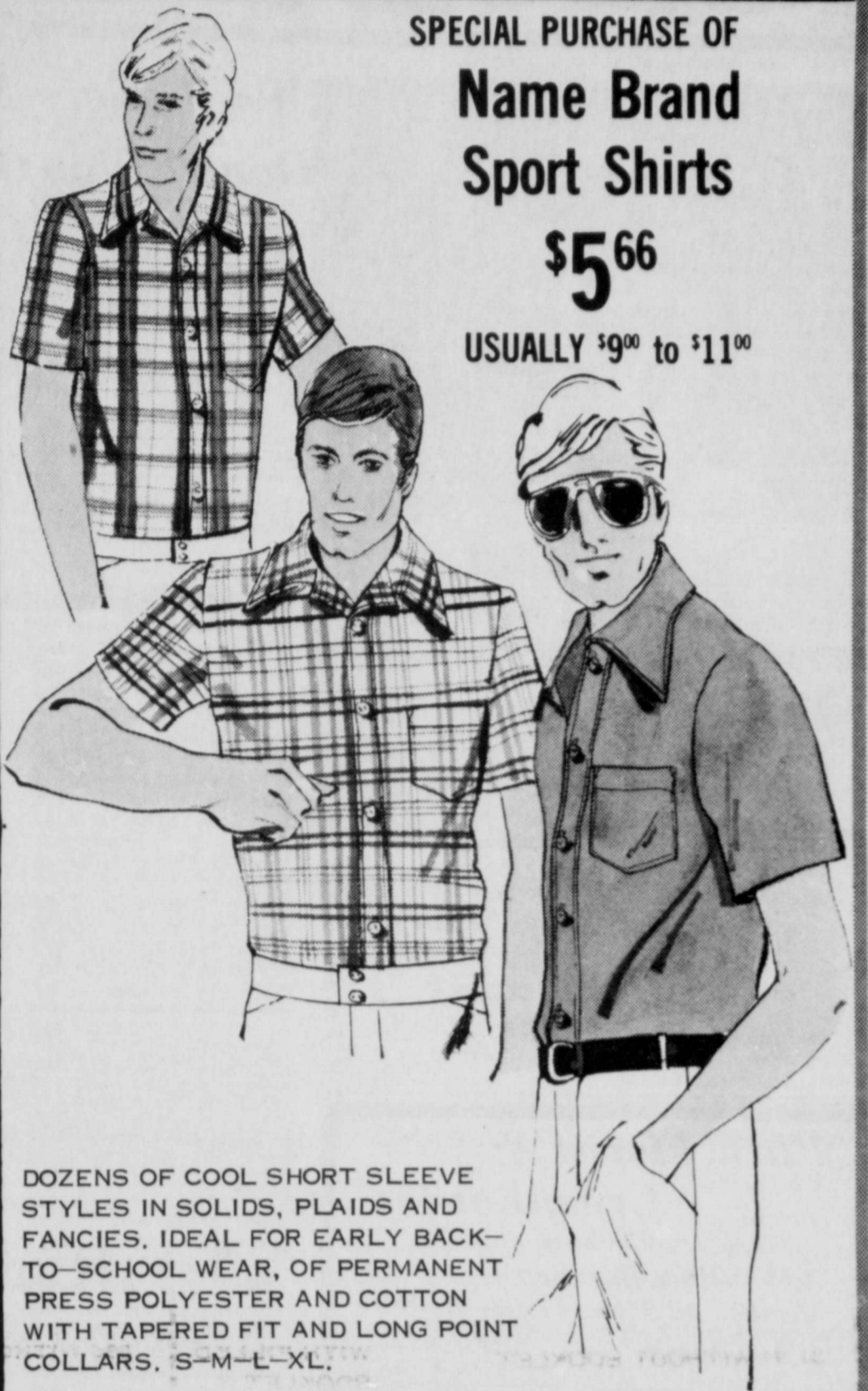

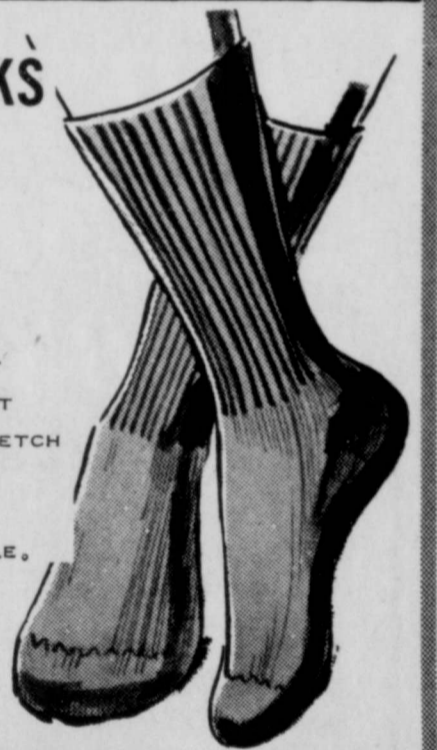

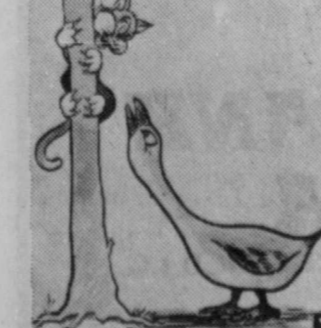


JOE VASQUEZ RECEIVES DEGREE

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm works around the edges of truth-telling, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

I have about decided maybe that everybody in this country ought to start telling the truth or everybody ought to decide not to believe anybody.

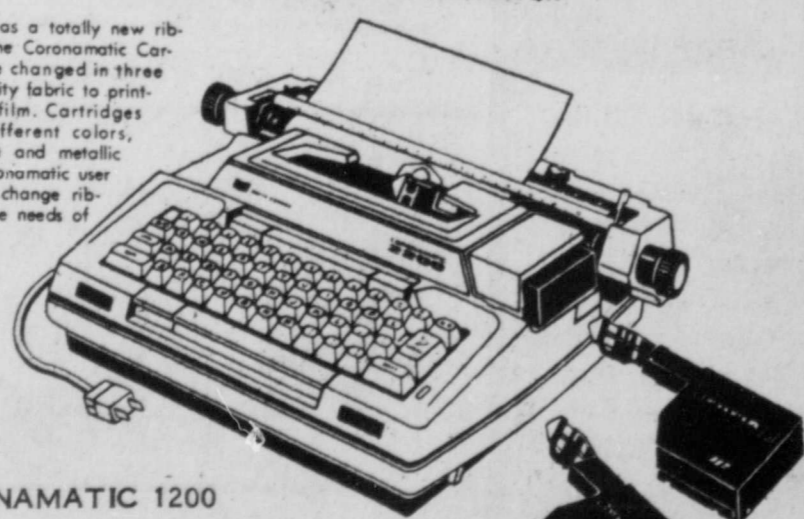
