AREA NOT YET OPEN TO PUBLIC

Mackenzie Dam Nearly Complete

Although the Mackenzie Dam is essentially complete, the area will not be ready for utilization by the public before spring, according to Don Bookout, attorney for the Mackenzie Water Authority, who spoke to representatives of the four area towns comprising the authority at a meeting held Monday in Tulia.

The meeting was called by Tulia Chamber of Commerce to initiate plans for promotion of the lake which will serve Tulia, Silverton, Lockney and Floydada, and to coordinate these plans.

Fencing of the property has not been completed and the area is presently under lease for cattle grazing. Adequate personnel is not available at this time to police the property. Neither boat ramps nor an office

building has yet been constructed. Guard rails have not vet been constructed in potentially dangerous areas and there are many opportunities for sightseers to be injured.

In short, the area is not yet ready for public use and all vehicular traffic is banned.

Preliminary plans have been made to lay off certain areas for lease to individuals who desire to build cabins for personal use. Tentative locations include two peninsulas on the south side of the lake. Tentative plans are to reserve most of the north side for the public, those not desiring to construct private property.

In answer to numerous inquiries from persons wanting to lease building locations. Bookout said that certain dates would be announced this fall. after the building plots have been surveyed and zoned for interested persons to drive through the area and become familiar with the locations and prices of the lots to be leased. Lots nearest to the lake will lease for a higher fee than those more distant from the lake.

All taxpaying residents of the four communities will then be invited to examine maps to be located at all banks in the four communities and sign up for a building site in the section desired, placing the money in escrow. The specific lot will then be determined by lot in a public drawing.

After tax paying residents of the four communities have been given a chance, all other interested persons will be given an opportunity to select building sites.

Bookout noted that there will be plenty of building sites for everyone in all price ranges.

"We have enough locations to satisfy every resident of the four communities should such a demand exist," he said. "Other such lakes have contracted with commercial firms to sell lots through sales promotions.

Bookout said that these two peninsulas alone will have a total of from 300 to 400 building sites.

Because no tax funds can be expended on recreational aspects of the lake, many of the improvements needed will have to await funds from other sources.

Inasmuch as the taxpayers have built the dam, directors of the authority are anxious for the people to have access to the project as soon as possible. Bookout said. But until potentially dangerous areas can be enclosed and adequate personnel provided to police not only sightseers but the public property, the area must be considered off limits. Damage occurred recently to the dam when youth on motorcycles attempted to use it as a race track. Gary Martin has been named assistant manager of the authority, assisting Clayton Keller, manager, whose work must be limited due to a recent heart attack.

In The Kitchen

Nearly everyone cans and freezes vegetables from their gardens in just about the same way, but most women have a favorite pickle recipe that must be made each year.

Clara Jeffcoat originally gave this recipe to Lucille Harris over 30 years ago and it has been a favorite of the Harris family since. Lucille says Clara gave her jars of the pickles after hearing that Lucille was craving pickles before the birth of her daughter.

DILL PICKLES

Bring 2 qts. water, 1 qt. vinegar and 1 cup pickling salt to a rolling boil. Pour over whole or sliced, washed pickles that have been placed in clean jars. Add a piece of fresh dill to each quart. Don't use pickles for

several weeks.

CLARA JEFFCOAT

LIMED SWEET PICKLES

Buy 2 cups lime from lumber yard. Mix with 2 gallons water and pour over 7-10 lbs. of peeled and chopped or sliced cucumbers. Soak for 24 hours. stirring gently, occasionally. Rinse cucumbers three times in Iresh water. Cover with cold water and let soak 3 hours. Drain off water and cover cucumbers with the following mixture: 2 qts. vinegar, 11 cups sugar, 1 tbsp. each of pickling salt. celery seed and cloves. Let soak overnight. Next morning add a few drops green food coloring if desired and cook over medium heat for 45 minutes or longer. Pack in hot, sterilized jars and seal. LUCILLE HARRIS



2 (3-inch) sticks cinnamon Dip tomatoes in boiling water just until skins are softened, about 1 minute. Remove skins and stem ends; coarsely chop. Place tomatoes, onion, green pepper, corn syrup, salt and vinegar in 4-quart saucepan or kettle. Tie mustard seed;

cinnamon in cheese cloth; add to vegetable mixture. Bring to boil over medium heat; reduce heat and boil gently, stirring occasionally, about 2 hours or until mixture thickens. Remove spice bag. Leaving 1/4-inch head space, ladle into clean hot 1/2 pint jars with 2-piece metal caps. Seal following jar manufacturer's directions. Process in boiling water bath 10 minutes. Cool on wire rack or folded cloth. Label and store in cool dry place. Makes about 5 (1/2 pint) jars.

Pollution control facilities not. The and equipment for farm and ment me business machinery may depr qualify for rapid federal income tax depreciation if a bit installed and certified before the January 1, 1975, says Doyle G. Warren, county agent for the Texas Agricultural g Extension Service.

Farmers and businessmen may amortize or depreciate No. 5 the cost of certain pollution P control facilities and equipment over five years (60 months) even if the equipment has a longer, useful life.

Such facilities must have been installed and appropriately certified by state and federal pollution control certifying authorities after 1968 and prior to 1975. Also, the Internal Revenue code provides that the facility must be "a new identifiable treatment facility used in connection with a plant (or other property) that was in operation before 1969."

Any facility that is used to control the pollution or contamination of air or water is eligible, if the other conditions are met, notes Warren.

Many recent pollution control investments are viewed in two parts - one that qualifies for the fast write-off and one that will

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



100 years of wheat Santa Fe all the way

Back in the 1870's when the Mennonites began their migration from Europe to America-Santa Fe was there! A representative of the railroad traveled abroad in those early days to influence homeseekers to settle along the pioneer rail routes being built westward across Kansas. The Mennonites were seeking freedoms of a new country and liked what they learned about America. Santa Fe helped with their transportation, even sharter-

Santa Fe built special housing facilities in the settlement areas of Kansas and sold land, much below actual values, to the new homeseekers.

Santa Fe moved supplies for the home builders at reduced prices, sometimes for free.

Developing this new land back in the 1870's was not without hardships for the early Mennonites or for Santa Fe's pioneer rail builders. At that time, hardly anyone realized that their efforts would be rewarded through a few sacks of wheat seed which thrived in Kansas and spread to help make mid-America the breadbasket of the World.

100 years of moving wheat

Wheat is usually moved in a short period of time to meet harvest deadlines, export schedules and marketing requirements. These conditions make great demands on the railroads and it takes Santa Fe's modern facilities, an upto-date car fleet and skillful employees to get the wheat job done year after year.

During the past century many things have been done to move wheat efficiently. Two examples stand out in Santa Fe's history:

(1) The giant 100-ton covered hopper car first introduced for moving wheat in 1963. Today, Santa Fe has 12,000 of these cars in service, the largest fleet in the rail industry, and 1,000 additional are now on order. Altogether these 13,000 hoppers have a capacity equivalent to approximately 21,000 conventional box cars.
