Floydada School Enrollment 1458

According to a count made Tuesday, the second day of school, 1458 students had enrolled in Floydada schools. This compares with 1467 the second day of school last year.

The school-by-school comparisons with last year are as follows: High School up from last year's 423 to 447. Jr. High down from 285 to 272. R. C. Andrews up from 319 to 326. Duncan Elementary down from 440 to 413.

South Plains school reported a decrease in their enrollment from last year with 38 students in attendance Tuesday.

Dougherty school reported an increase in enrollment from last year with 34 in attendance Tuesday.

Lockney schools reported 1,013, down 20 from last year.

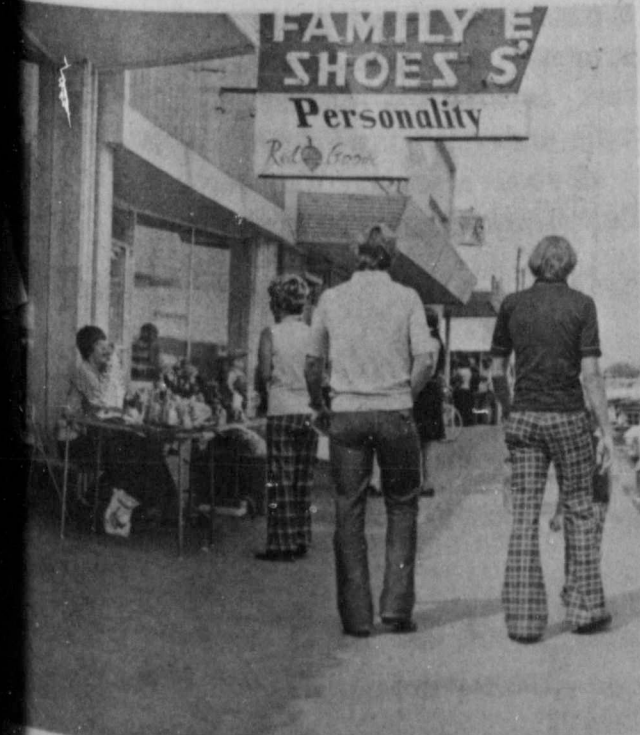

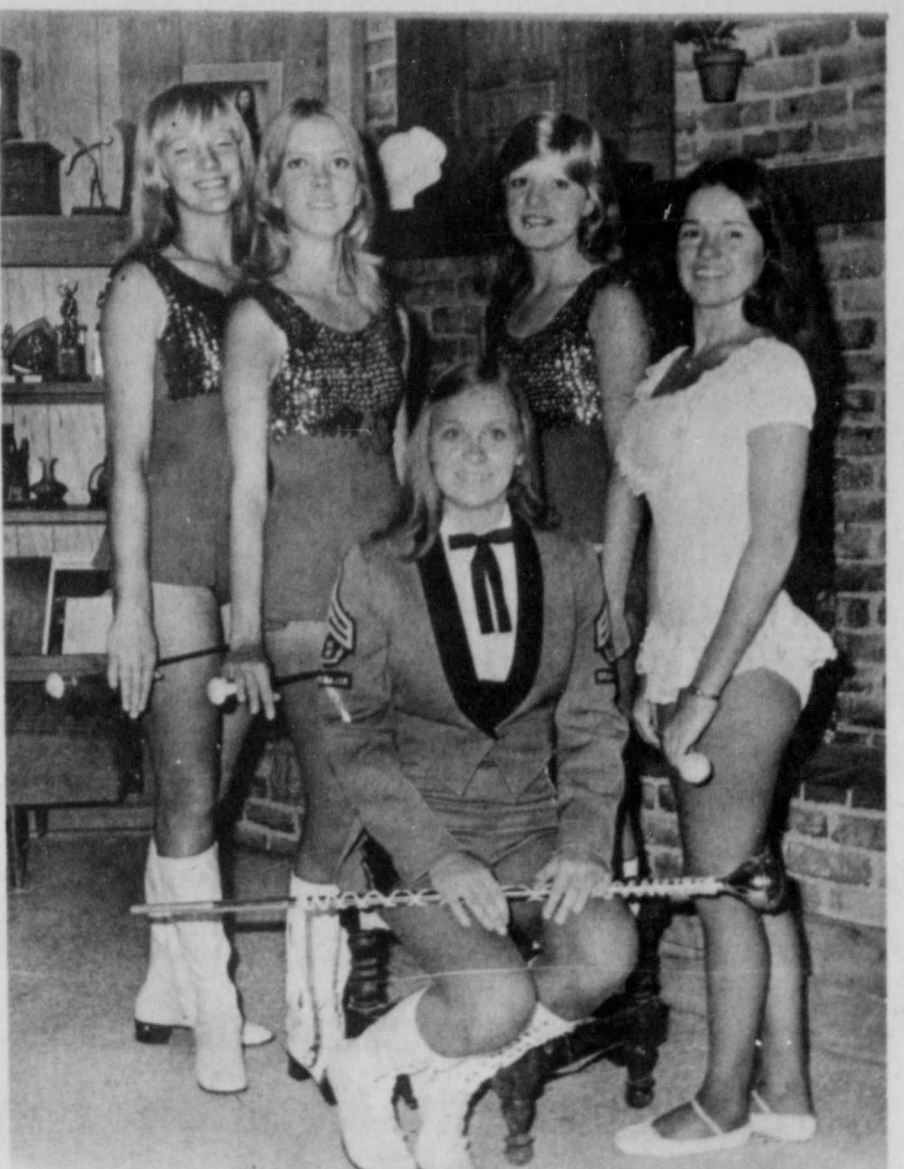

GSPA Official Against Export Controls

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WASHINGTON — Restrictions on the export of U.S. agricultural products would have detrimental results "economically, morally and politically," according to Elbert Harp, executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, headquartered in Lubbock, Texas.

Harp testified today (Aug. 15) before the Senate Agriculture Committee which is considering export restrictions after a severe drought throughout the High Plains reduced grain supplies.

The GSPA official acknowledged there will be a tight grain supply this year

and that the livestock industry will curtail its feeding because of inadequate supplies. "But let me hasten to point out that within the U.S., Asia and Europe, there is a surplus of livestock. Because of this surplus, we don't believe there is or will soon be any real scarcity of food in this country," he said.

Harp added that to impose export controls on grain would "destroy the credibility of the United States to our trading partners around the world."

The GSPA, the U.S. Feed Grains Council (of which Harp is currently serving as chairman) and the U.S.

government have been developing grain markets overseas for more than a decade.

"This market development has provided the U.S. farmer and the economy with one of its best sources of revenue. Agricultural products are the best balance of payment tools that we have today," he said, adding that income from grain export last year was more than \$2 billion.

In addition to economic reasons for avoiding export controls, Harp said there are moral and political considerations as well.





VIEWS OF TRUTH #3 (continued)

5. It is a false view of truth to hold that there is a middle ground between truth and error. According to this view, one does not necessarily accept error if he rejects truth.

Jesus taught "He that is not with me is against me" (Luke 11:23) and men "cannot serve God and mammon" (Matthew 6:24). Some would have us believe "If I say a liquid is a poison and you insist it is a medicine, the moderate would ask us to dilute it with water before drinking it. But if it is a poison, it should not be drunk at all; and if a medicine, it should not be weakened with water." The real question is: which of the 3 are right? It is not: who can make the most soothing compromise between two extremes.

If the teaching is false (poison) it ought not be accepted (drunk) at all. And, if it is true (medicine), then it ought not be "diluted" (made less stringent than it really is).

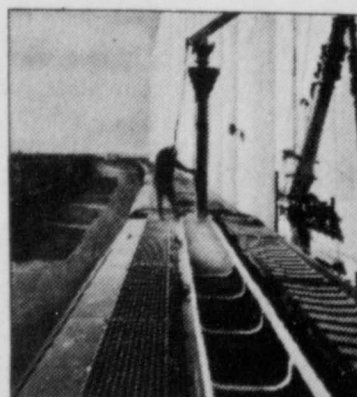

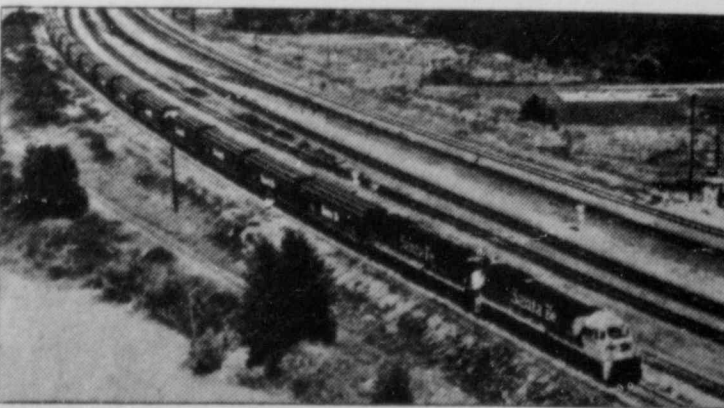
