Whirlwinds Open Season At Crosbyton

Kick-Off At 8 P.M.

Floydada's Whirlwinds take on the A Crosbyton Chiefs Friday night in the season opener at Crosbyton. Kick-off time is 8 p.m.

The Whirlwinds, again predicted to win 4-AA district, go into the game in good physical condition and have improved depth over last year's team.

Coach L. G. Wilson, who has compiled a 54-11-2 record with the Whirlwinds, has 16 lettermen including three offensive and seven defensive starters back.

In the game with Crosbyton coach Wilson says "we feel like we have the strength for running plays, but quarterback Mike Vickers is a capable passer if we need to throw the ball."

Wilson said that the Chiefs have a young line, but most of their backfield is loaded with good experienced players. Senior Marty Davis, quarterback for the Chiefs last year, continues in that spot as does fullback Max Lawson, a big 187 pound senior who really hits the line. The Chiefs also have Ruben Munoz, a guard who received honorable mention all district last year. Junior running back Ronald Wiley has the speed to get away in a hurry.

Other Chief standouts with experience include center Greg Salley, ends Homer Vera and L. D. Terrell, tackle Manuel Guerrero, guard Mark Odum, linebacker Tom Anzell, and running back Ray Harris.

Quarterback Davis weighs 180 pounds and is a good broken field runner.

While the Whirlwinds have no blazing speed, overall team quickness is good and Wilson adds, "we have good leadership. Our seniors have fine attitudes and everyone has worked hard."

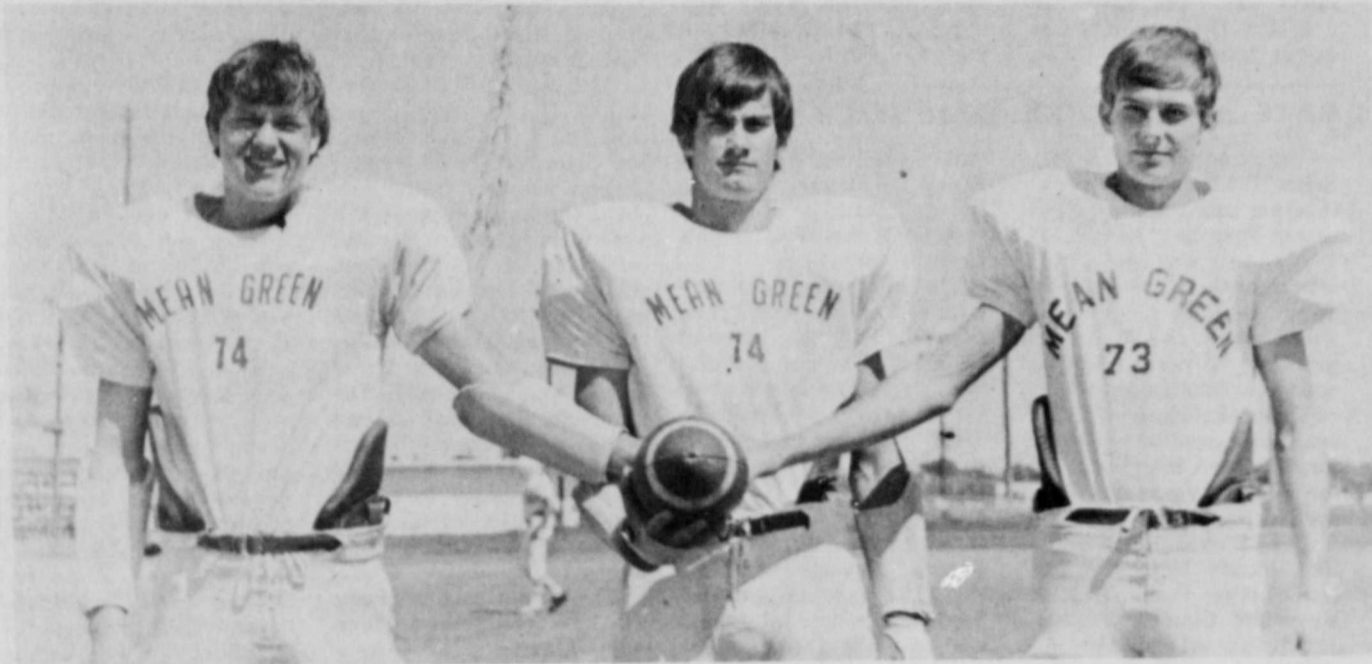
Vickers, who will operate the Wishbone attack, will be backed by 160 pound Greg Goen.

County Fair Art Department To "Go By The Book" This Year

Floyd County Fair officials remind prospective entrants that rules will be strictly adhered to in the Art Department show at the fair this year. (The Fair opens a three-day run September 12).

Specifically mentioned is the rule which states that "All adult pictures must be framed and wired for hanging (Exception - children art may be matted neatly and have a string attached to back for hanging.)"

Other rules in the Art Department include these: "No article must be over three years old."

"No more than one entry may be entered under any premium number. Pairs will be exhibited as one entry."

"All entries must be the work of the exhibitor, no tracing or number paintings will be accepted in this department."

"The decision of the judges will be final."

"No article will be accepted if it has been entered in Floyd County Fair before."

"Copies in the adult division are in a class to themselves and will be judged as such"

"Paintings must be in before 10:00

a.m. Thursday, September 12."

Because of some last-minute changes, Mary Ruth Fewell will be superintendent of the Fair Art Department this year. She will be assisted by Mrs. Gail Wilson, Mrs. Leslie Wilkes, Mrs. Van Bradley and Mrs. Byron Brook.

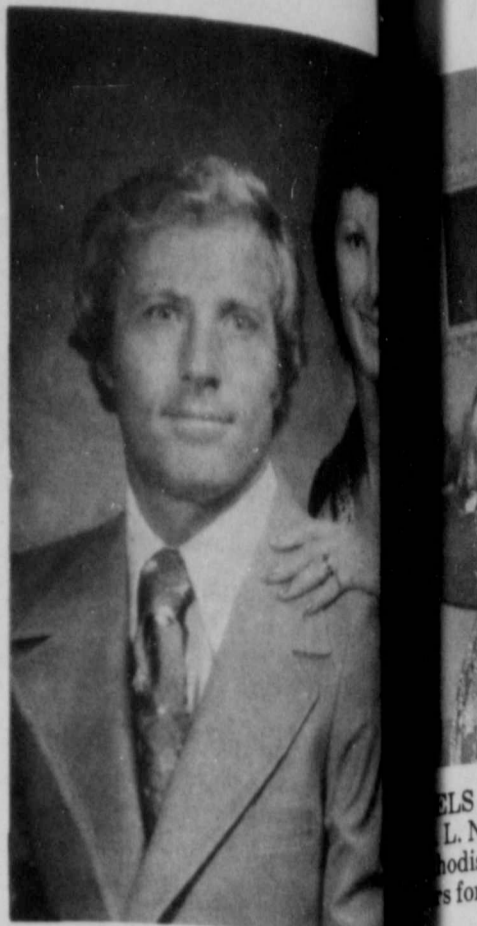
To qualify for the recognition, students must achieve a grade average of 3.0 on a 4 point scale.

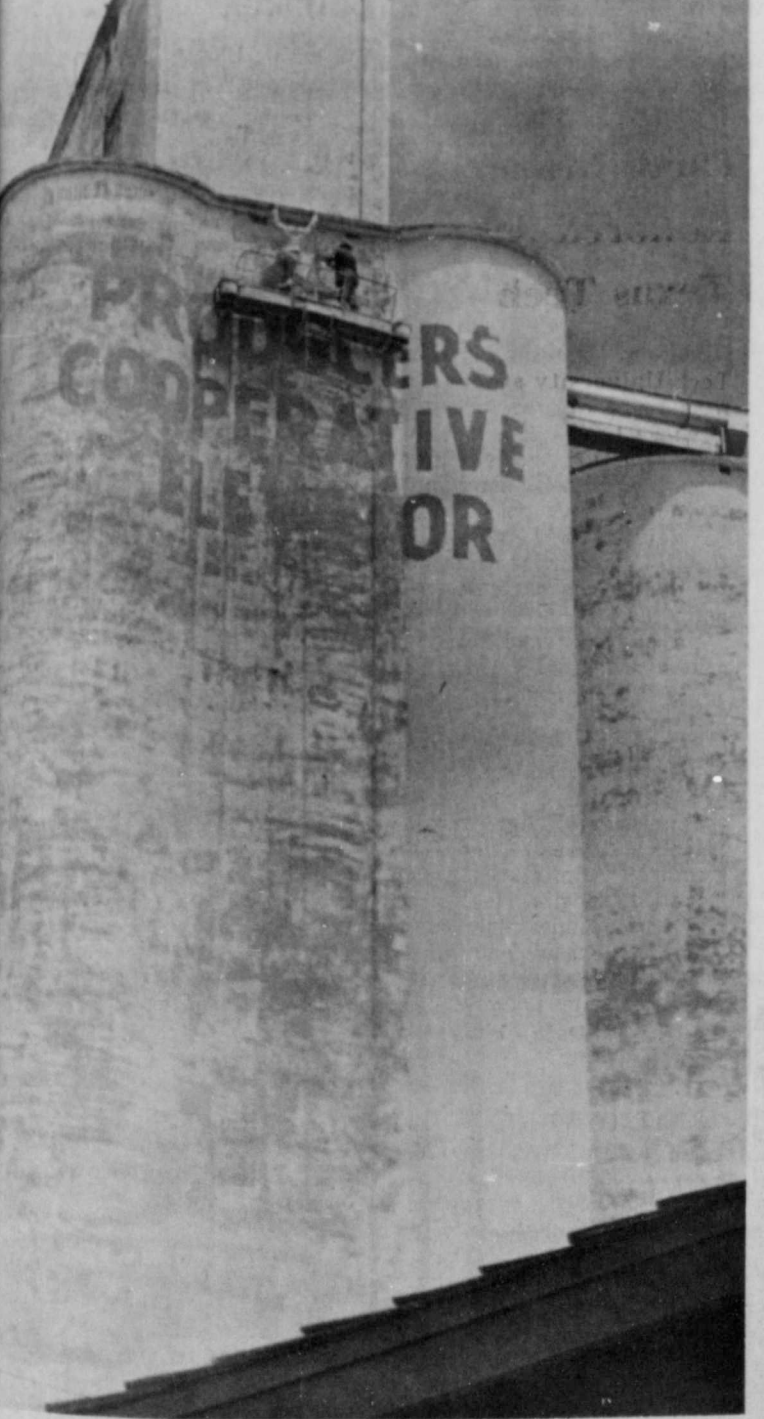

AUTHORITY IN RELIGION

The realm of faith lies within that of Divine Revelation. All that I have the right to believe, I must believe because it is that which God has revealed and stated plainly enough in His Word that I can understand what God would have me know. God has said it plainly enough that if I will honestly approach His Word and hear all the testimony, free from my own ideas, opinions, and preconceptions, I can learn what the will of God is for myself (consider: John 7:17; John 8:31, 32, and Isaiah 35:8).

Truth came from God and error comes from man. This is the dividing line between truth and error. The test of what we believe in religion and of our authority in religion is: DOES IT COME FROM MAN OR GOD? God's Word, his message to man, is final and completed, it was given by the revelation (Ephesians 3:1-7; I Corinthians 2:9-13) and inspiration (II Timothy 3:15, 17; Mark 13:11) of God. If what you believe came from God, then you can put your finger on the passage that teaches it. If you cannot find it taught in the Word of God, then you know that it did not come from God but from man and therefore there is no divine authority, and if no divine authority then it does not please God.

And a person's "interpretation" of a passage is not what will judge you in the day of judgment. Jesus said, "...He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my Word hath one that judeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." John 12:48. What will judge us in what the Word of God actually does say.

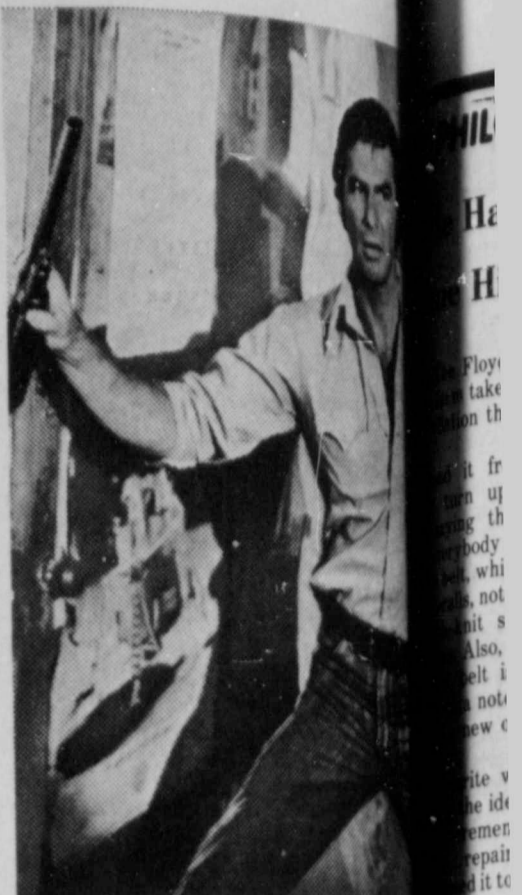

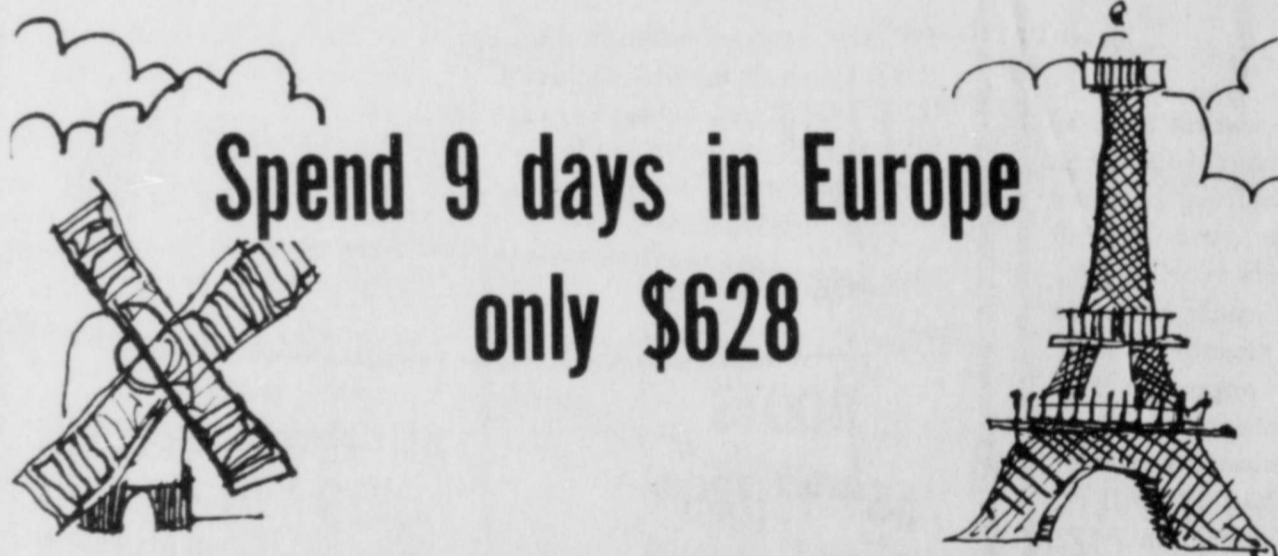

Energy Needs To Bring Quick Developments

Industry in the U.S. will have adapted almost completely to higher energy costs and other implications of the crunch within 5 to 10 years, First National City Bank of New York economists predict.

Energy shortages will mean "significant relocation of industry and development of mass commuter transport systems," within the decade, according to Citibank experts.

Hardest hit by higher fuel costs will be industries "cyclically most sensitive or that stand to be affected most by curtailment of less essential energy consumption, including the auto industry, steel, nonferrous metals, basic chemicals and cement."

"Shifting to more expensive energy sources means allocating a larger share of our national resources to the production and distribution of energy. That means, in turn, that fewer resources will be available for produc-

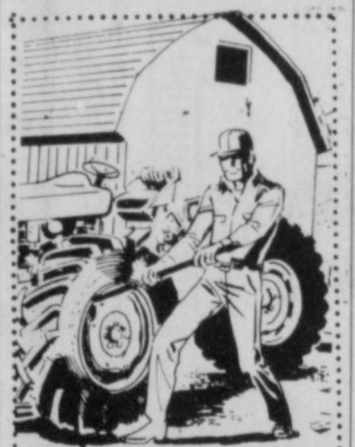
