### Lockney

Although the county football championship is at stake, the Lockney-Floydada game is also the first district game for each team. The game will be played Friday night in the Longhorn stadium.

The Longhorns have looked good at times, they have one of the best offensive backfields in the district, but have lost some games due to fumbles. They were upset by a Kress 29-28 two weeks ago and lost to powerful AA Dimmitt 40-15 last week. Although they beat Dimmitt 30-9 on first downs, 345 to 213 yards rushing, five costly fumbles ruined them on the scoreboard. Longhorn Willie Mathis kicked a 38 yard field goal, Quarterback Zach Cummings made the two touchdowns. Danny Foster, Mark Sherman, Charles Sterling, made most of the ground yardage for Lockney. 6-3, 170 pound quarterback Cummings is one of the best passers in the district and a senior who was number one quarterback last year.

Lockney has about the same line from last year, and all their backfield graduated except Cummings. The Longhorns looked good against Post, the first game of the season, and also defeated Crosbyton for their 2-4 record at this point.

Senior guards Robert Murdock 5-10, 180 and Martin Stoerner, 6-0, 180 both have two years of experience and two very strong spots in the Longhorn lineup.

### Erosion On Cultivated Land Causing Soil Loss

If you can see signs of erosion on cultivated land, you are probably losing soil at the rate of more than 14 tons per acre per year.

"A loss this high shows the land is inadequately protected," Joe Platt, Soil Conservation Service Soil Conservationist says. "Generally, losses much higher than this occur when rain or wind can strike bare cropland. Very steep unprotected land can lose more than 300 tons of soil per acre per year."

"It is not particularly important that the farmer or gardener is able to tell how many tons of soil is lost," Platt continued. SCS conservationist can figure for those who really want a good estimate. The important thing is that if the farmer and gardener can see erosion — something needs to be done, fast.

"A common misconception is to blame all visible water erosion on running water, which we call 'runoff,'" Platt said. "Runoff does cut

ditches and rills, but is generally a sign of advanced problems, which actually start with raindrops striking bare soil. You can prove this to yourself by observing bare soil in a small flower box or enclosure. Beating raindrops will actually erode the surface of the soil by splash action with no runoff at all. On the other hand, if you cover the box of soil with clippings, or plant it thickly in grass no measurable splash erosion will occur. What this tells us is that a cover on the cultivated land — is the best soil protection.

"There are several things that farmers and gardeners can do about erosion," Platt said. "First, practices can be used that keep a cover on the land." Believe it or not, this can be done even in fields of sorghum, cotton, corn and soybeans with practices such as minimum tillage.

"Contouring, crop rotation, terracing and other methods are also helpful to keep runoff from carrying sediment from the field," Platt said.

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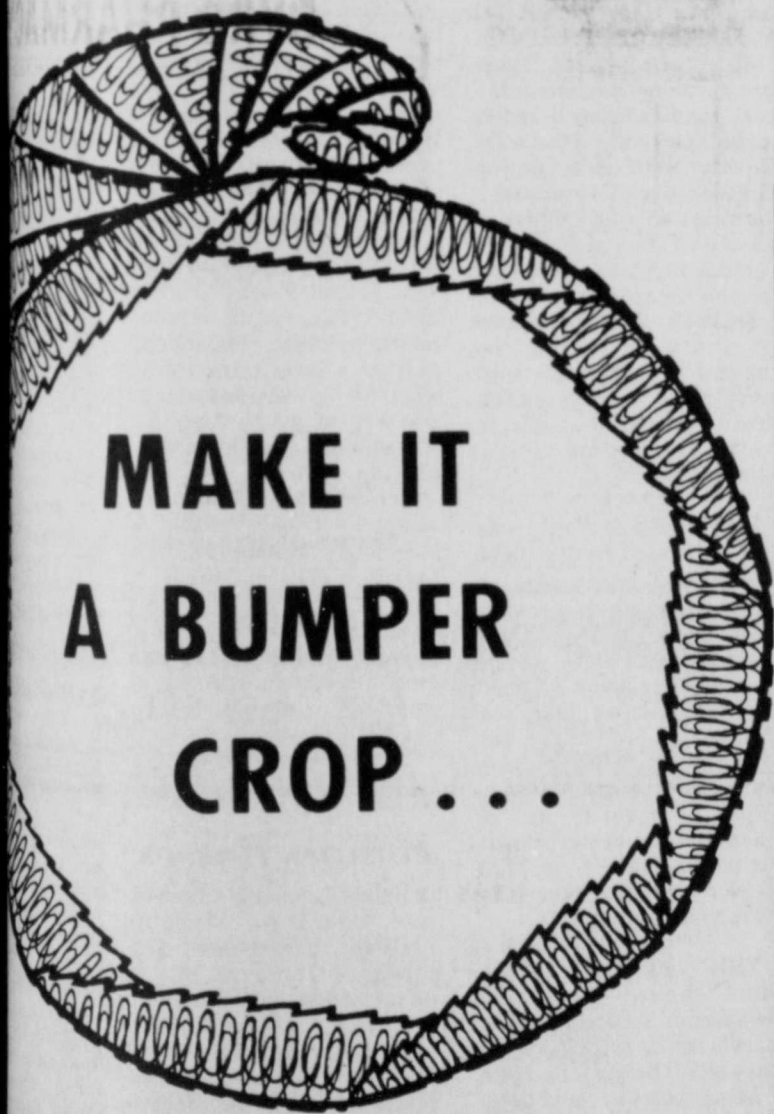

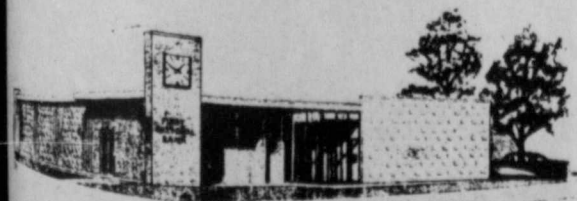

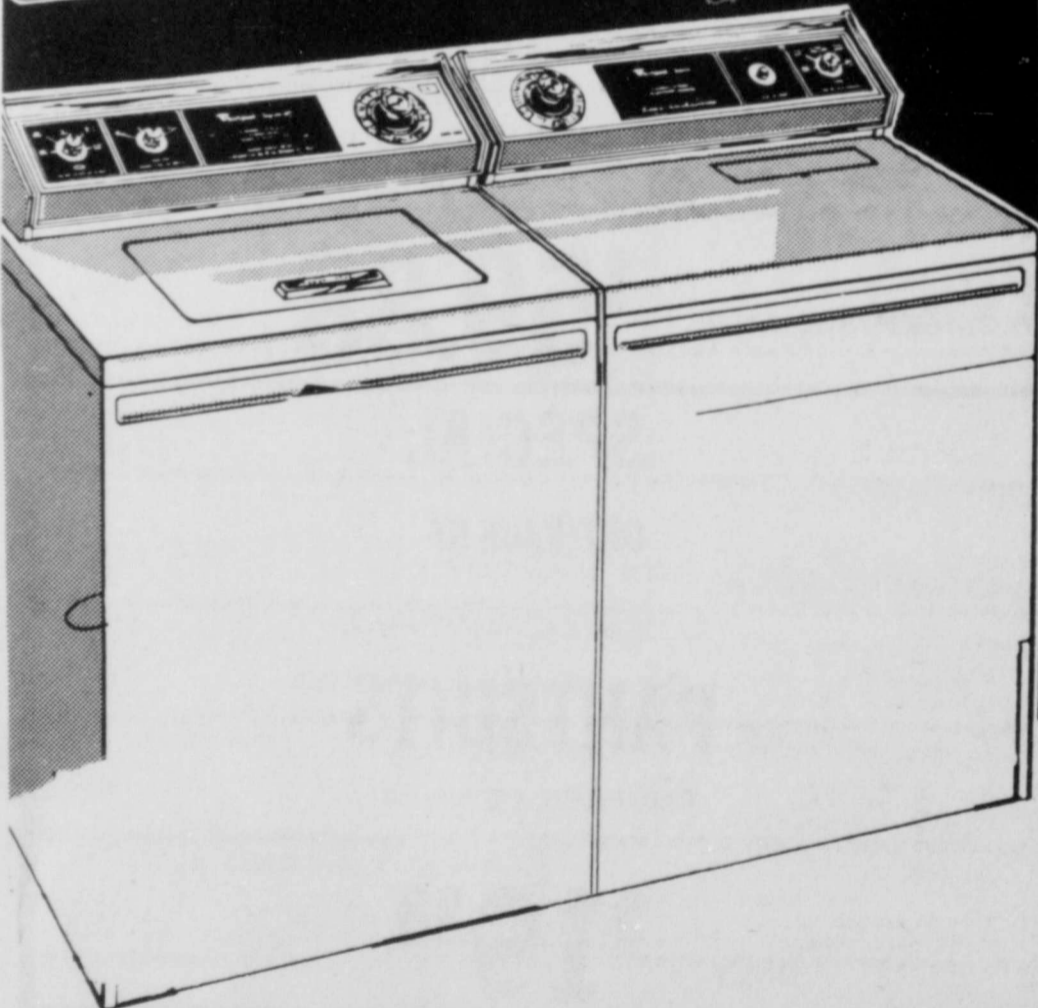

### YOUR EYES

## As It Looks From Here

EDITH FOSTER,  
Librarian

When Edith Foster got her degree in library science from Georgia's Emory University in 1944, she dreamed of a job in the Library of Congress. But she was offered the directorship of the new West Georgia Regional Library in Carrollton. There were difficulties — it had no home, no books and no money.

The library recently celebrated its 30th anniversary in a \$410,000 building, with 180,000 books and an annual budget of \$140,000. And Miss Foster is still there, the driving force behind it all. "Dr. Irvine S. Ingram, president emeritus of West Georgia College told me that I should let my bucket down where I am," says Miss Foster. "I did and I have no regrets." The Georgia librarian is nationally known as a library association executive and author. But she has given herself chiefly to the West Georgia Regional Library.

Back in 1944, the librarian at West Georgia College "gave me half of a basement room in the old college library," she recalls, "and I borrowed 775 books from the Library Extension Service." With a foundation grant and local donations, Miss Foster put together a small fund to cover operating costs.

In 1946, the "library lady," as she was called, pioneered a bookmobile service, bouncing over a 1,000-mile route of unpaved roads. Her favorite memory of stops at homes, country stores and schools, is the shrill cry of an excited child greeting her, "I read a book! I read a book!"

Today "her" Regional Library ties in with an adult education program, "College in the Country," and offers audio-visual and other services for community enrichment. "Let your bucket down" where you are. Your contribution, however small, will do for your community what no one else's can.

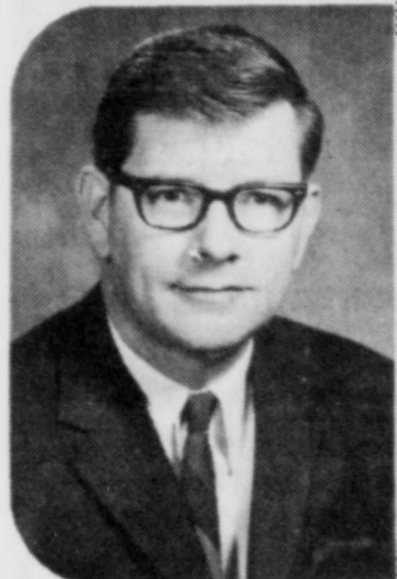

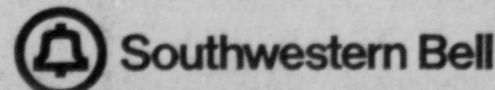

## Mary Kirchoff Discusses Energy Problems

Texas control over Texas gas was advocated today by Mary Kirchoff, candidate for the State Senate in District 30, when she said Texas needs to take a positive step immediately to prevent future energy problems throughout the State.

"Both Texas and the federal government have the authority to regulate intra-state gas," she pointed out, "and whoever asserts jurisdiction first will get control."

If our Legislature drags its feet on this item, we face the prospect of federal control which conceivably could lead to further shortages of fuel."

Mrs. Kirchoff noted that Senator Adlai Stevenson (D-Ill.) has already jumped out front on this issue by introducing a bill in the United States Senate (S-2502) which would give the U.S. government regulatory authority over gas moving in intra-state commerce.

"Texas should hold first priority rights over Texas oil and gas produced on state-owned lands, once our contractual obligations are met," Mrs. Kirchoff said, "If we do not act now, the federal government will. If we lose the opportunity to control this vital resource, we will have another federal check-rein dictating policy and practice over what rightfully should be handled by Texans."

Noting that Texas is the largest producer of hydrocarbons in the United States, the Plainview candidate said, "The Federal Power Commission has approved the sale of Algerian gas in this country at \$1.85 per mcf, while some of our domestic gas is being sold for seven cents per mcf. This makes no sense whatever, and it is unfair to our domestic producers to force them to sell our gas to the East Coast and make us in Texas rely on Middle East crude oil or Wyoming coal to meet our energy requirements."

"Both logic and economics suggest that Texans burn Texas natural gas for heating and power, while other parts of the country should use energy resources located close to them," Mrs. Kirchoff said. "We already know what it's like to have shortages of energy in Texas. We have already experienced these shortages in our homes, in our industries — in fact, we even had a shortage of fertilizer that was related to the shortage of natural gas. This

must not be allowed to happen again. Prompt action by the legislature can solve the problem and this should be an early item on the legislative docket when the Legislature convenes in January."

The county approved the remodeling of the dormitory on second floor of the court house, which formerly housed jurors overnight. The remodeling will be in accordance with designs submitted to commissioners by Mrs. Emily Potts, school counselor. When completed the space will house an outreach unit of the Mental Health organization.

Floyd County Museum will receive \$2,000 out of county revenue sharing for upkeep of the museum, according to minutes of the court.
