## Winds Test Hornets' Sting

### 7:30 Kick-Off Wester Field

After losing the first district game of the season to Lockney last week, the Floydada Whirlwinds are set and primed to beat the Tulia Hornets who will buzz into Wester Field Friday night.

Kick-off for the game is 7:30. It will be the second district game for both teams, the Hornets stinging Idalou 47-7 last Friday night. Idalou hasn't won a game this year.

Tulia's season record is 3-4. Tulia passed and ran some 427 yards. Tulia quarterback Steven Brown threw three TD passes. Brown is a sophomore, and has recently taken over the signal calling from junior Monte Cannon. Cannon kicked five PATs in the Idalou game and scored one TD on a 31 yard run.

Halfback Carl Smiley, another junior has done well in the scoring department.

The Hornets are tough on defense, having allowed only 54 points in seven games. They have eight defensive starters who returned this year. One of the Panhandle's most versatile runners is fullback Raymond Williams. He also made a TD at Idalou.

Floydada beat Tulia 28-0 last year.

## Warren Wins Football Contest

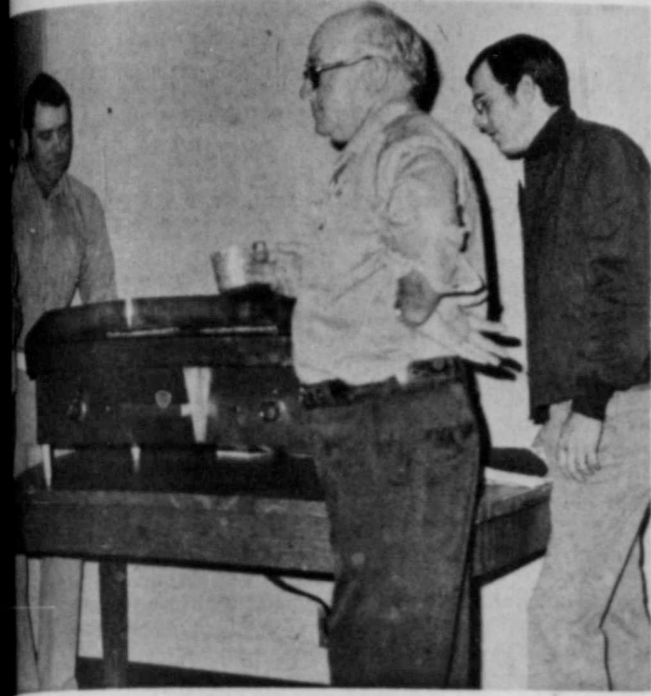

## Floyd Grain Sorghum

### Best Now In Elevator

Estimates made by elevator operators in Floyd County, it is thought that 40 percent of the grain sorghum

is estimated that 65 to 80 percent of the harvest is over in south Floyd County and about 40 percent in the north part of the county.

Farmers had about three good days

of harvest in between the last two rains with a lot of grain coming in last Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

It started raining Monday night with reports of up to two inches in parts of the county.

Only bright spot is the all time high of \$6.00 per hundred for grain sorghum. 6,000 pounds per acre is very good this year. . . a lot of irrigated is producing four to five thousand pounds per acre.

#### WHEAT

Much of the wheat is up and growing, but some farmers have yet to sow.

Some elevators report a shortage of wheat seed. Since the cow business is so poor, there is not as many cattle on wheat pastures as usual. . . so many farmers did not sow for an early grazing crop.

#### COTTON

Of course this cold wet weather hasn't done anything but damage the cotton crop. Last estimate made by cotton organizations in Lubbock was a 100,000 bale count for Floyd County. This is down from an earlier estimate of 115,000.

If this materializes, Floyd will be in the top five counties of the 23 South Plains counties.

Rainfall for the year is getting close to 25 inches, although the county suffered a bad drought the first of August. A banker at Brownfield in commenting about Terry county's application to the government for "disaster classification" said it was made on the grounds of extreme drought and extreme rainfall.

Records Key To Good

Of Agriculture

of the Census, part of the Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

From Alaska to Florida, from Maine to Hawaii, farmers and ranchers will receive census forms in the mail around the first of the new year. The report forms are to be filled out and mailed back promptly.

Farmers themselves have participated in deciding what information is collected in the census. Representatives of farm organizations such as the Farm Bureau, The Grange, Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, and Farmers Cooperatives serve on the Advisory Committee that recommends to the Bureau the questions that should be included in the census.

Three kinds of information are requested about operations during 1974: first, a count of farm resources, number of farms, area of farm land, acres of cropland and pasture, number of various kinds of farm equipment; second, a record of farm products produced and sold during 1974; and third, selected farming activities during 1974 such as number of days of off-farm work by the farmer, amount spent for farm labor, for custom work, for feed, for gasoline and oil.

To report this kind of information, a farmer will need to have a few simple records. The Census Bureau is urging each farmer to have his records of quantities harvested, products sold, major farm expenses and the like readily available so that he can easily and accurately fill out his census report when it comes.

It is from the Census of Agriculture, conducted every five years, that data are taken to form the basis for programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Congressional farm legislation, farm organization policies, farm programs established and administered by State departments of agriculture, and many other services provided by colleges, business firms, manufacturers, publishers and broadcasters.

The Census of Agriculture is the only source of statistics on agriculture that are comparable from county to county nationwide. It is the sole source of comprehensive data tabulated for each State and for the U.S. for farms classified by size, tenure, type of organization, market value of products sold, and type of farm enterprise.

Every farmer's report is confidential by law. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The mail census method reinforces confidentiality. And it allows the farmers to complete his report at his convenience with accurate information from his records.

**Newest Farmers Home Administration Moves Ahead**

J. Lynn Futch, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, Temple, Texas has announced the promotion of Ormel I. (Jack) Boyd to Chief, Business and Industrial Programs (B&I).

Boyd has served as B&I Specialist for the past year, assisting with implementation of new guaranteed loan authorities assigned to FmHA by the Rural Development Act of 1972, Public Law 92-419.

Activity in the new program of providing loan guarantees to aid in business and industrial development in towns and cities of up to 50,000 has exceeded expectations according to Futch. He noted that eight conditional commitments to guarantee loans of \$29.2 million were authorized in the past fiscal year. Since July 1, 1974, ten commitments for

\$1.6 million have been issued. Futch said fifty-eight requests for loan guarantees of \$16.6 million are presently being evaluated or applicants have been advised to complete formal applications for final feasibility determination.

Boyd has been a member of the State Director's staff since 1968, serving as Community Programs Specialist until 1973. He completed twenty years federal service in 1974. All his service has been with FmHA except for military duty in World War II. Boyd was FmHA County Supervisor in Seguin, Guadalupe

County from 1959 to mid 1968. He received special recognition in 1967 for his work with rural groups and communities on rural water systems. During 1957-58 he served as Assistant County Supervisor in Richmond, Fort Bend County. Prior to employment with FmHA, Boyd taught vocational agriculture for eight years.

**GRAIN OFFICIAL URGES CONTRACT BUYING**

LUBBOCK — Livestock producers and other grain buyers should contract now while supplies are adequate to meet their demand, according to officials of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Elbert Harp, executive director of the national organization headquartered in Lubbock, said, "We do anticipate a very tight grain situation throughout the coming year. But at the same time, there should be no problem securing the amount needed."

The GSPA official recommended that the harvest season would be a good time to contract for grain supplies. He emphasized that contract means "booking" for later delivery and that it is not always necessary to make full payment for the grain at the time the agreement is made. He also pointed out that grain may be contracted for later delivery either at

since the supply is available to any buyer, foreign or domestic. Reduced grain supplies were the result of prolonged drought, followed by excessive rains and early frost on the High Plains.

**Oil Profits Take Leap**

NEW YORK (AP) — The nation's biggest oil companies began reporting third-quarter earnings Tuesday, with profits up from a quarter to one and a half times those reported a year ago.

Exxon Corp., the nation's largest oil firm, said earnings rose 25.4 per cent over the third quarter of 1973, while Shell Oil's were ahead 158 per cent. Standard Oil of Indiana's earnings doubled and Gulf Oil Corp.'s were up 31 per cent.

Earnings by Gulf and Exxon had risen dramatically in the year earlier period over the 1972 quarter.

Exxon said its earnings totaled \$800 million for the three

Friend Of The Hungry

Dave Gagne claimed the entire population of the world as his dependents on his 1972 tax return. He listed 20 imprisoned Vietnamese civilians as symbolic dependents, each representing one-twentieth of the earth's two billion people. His claim was disallowed.

Mr. Gagne subsequently left his \$12,000-a-year job in Minneapolis to reverse his lifestyle as the \$50-a-week director of AMOS (Alliance To Move Our Society). Mr. Gagne chose the unlikely, upper-middle-class community of Wellesley, Mass., as his starting place. So far, he has nothing but praise for his lowered standard of

living. "Life is easier with no car and fewer possessions," he says. "It's a more human way to live in this commuting, consuming community."

Moving society is slow work. But last spring almost a thousand people in Wellesley - students, church members and the previously uninvolved - joined in a nationwide fast day and sent the food money they saved for use in long-term development programs for the world's poor. The money was forwarded to Oxfam-America (474 Centre Street, Newton, Mass. 02158).

This November 21, just before Thanksgiving, there will be another "Fast for a World Harvest." Why fast? "It's easy for people in Wellesley to write out a check for world hunger and not do anything personally," explains Mr. Gagne. "People everywhere are starving (fasting). A fast requires us to think about that on a very personal level. Oxfam tells us that there is something we can do to help."

If you'd like to help the world's hungry, you might consider fasting on November 21, and sending your food money to Oxfam-America.

DEAR PUZZLED: This is not a job for "we"—your husband should handle it alone. And if he really wants to discourage further gift giving, he will—*toot sweet!*

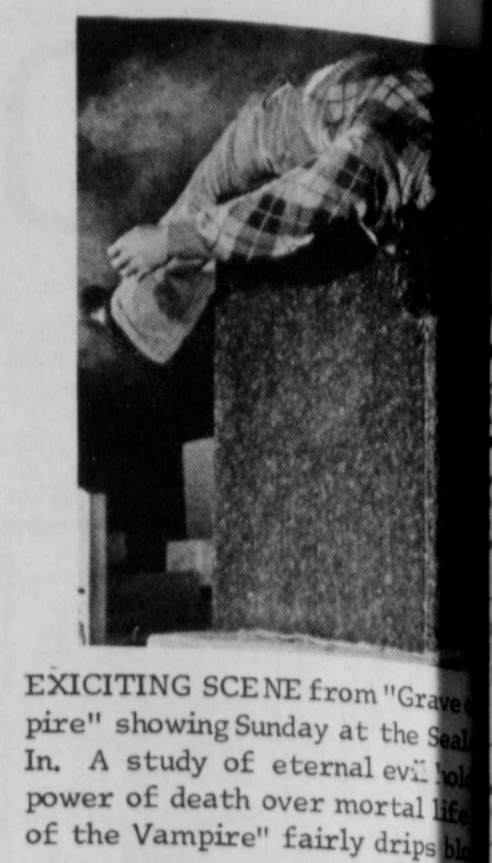

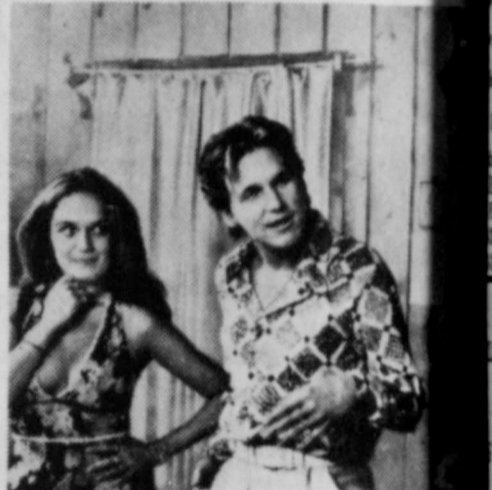

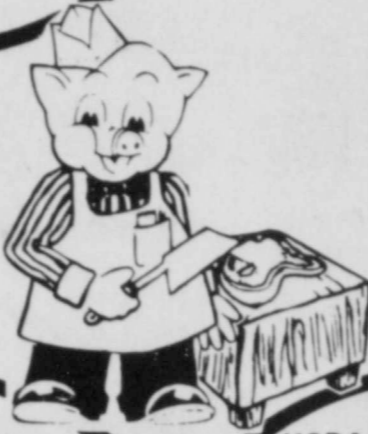
