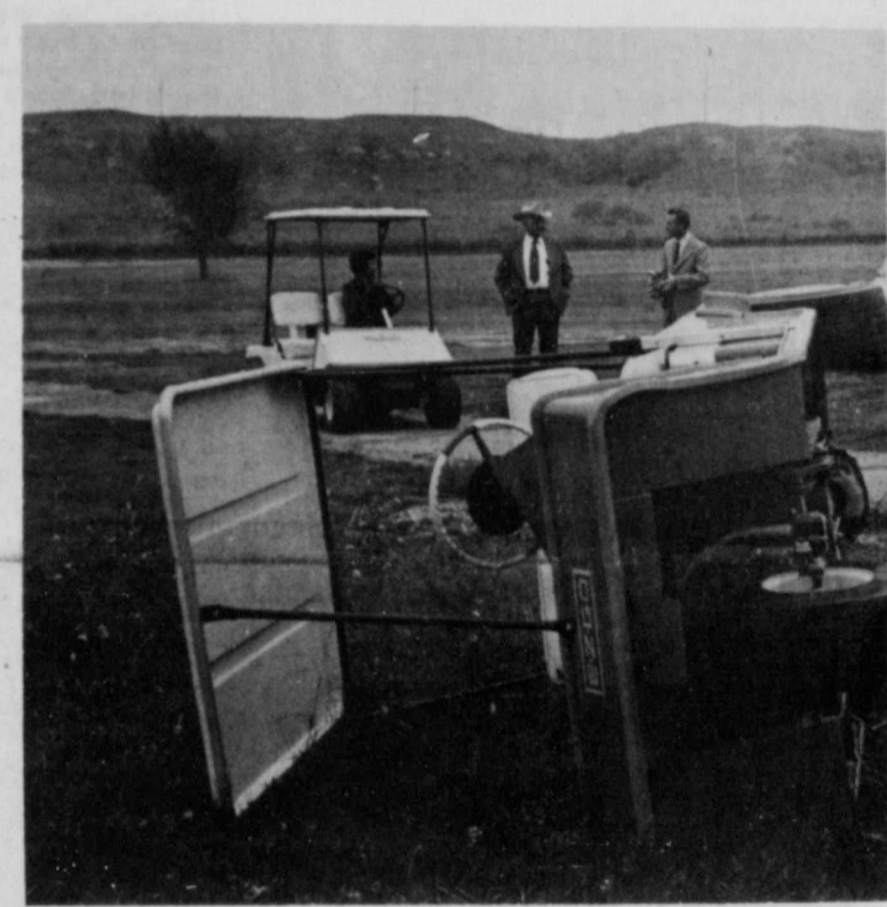

SPAG Gets Law Enforcement Equipment Money For Floyd County

Working through SPAG (South Plains Association Of Governments) county law officials have been notified that a grant of \$41,522 has been approved for Floyd County law enforcement equipment.

Most of the money will be spent for land and tower so that the county law officials may communicate with 27 other communities in 15 South Plains Counties.

Land has been purchased in southwest Floydada for the location of the tower.

The new radio system will have four channels which will enable law enforcement officers to receive, send and monitor conversations between each other. The current system has police and sheriff's officers on different frequencies, thereby hampering communications between the two agencies.

A GE spokesman said the construction of the equipment will begin within 90 days and be completed in a year.

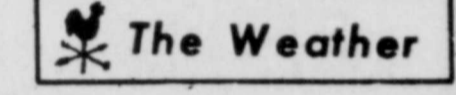

Farmers Union President Attacks Administration's Negative Thinking

The state Farmers Union president, addressing the annual meeting of the Hall County Farmers Union in Memphis Thursday night, attacked what he called "negative thinking" on the part of the Administration and the Secretary of Agriculture.

Jay Naman, of Waco, told the audience of farm and ranch people that "the

Administration hasn't taken one positive step to alleviate the grave economic conditions of livestock producers and cotton farmers."

Naman said that Farmers Union has handed the Administration a positive program to solve the problems of depressed livestock prices and cotton markets. "We have set forth a constructive program to reverse the serious conditions that exist, but our recommendations have been ignored," Naman said. "We have asked the President to immediately embargo livestock imports until the market begins to strengthen. We have urged the Administration to stop the 'rip-off' between the farmer and the government by requiring that those processing meat products for the government pay a reasonable price for the live animals. We have asked that the Administration immediately increase the price support on manufacturing milk and on cotton. The Administration should pledge its support to Congress for an emergency bill to immediately increase the price support on cotton to not less than 50 cents a pound," Naman said.

Naman charged that Secretary Butz is "unsympathetic" to the needs of farmers and ranchers, and said that the new Administration was following the

same agricultural policies, dictated by Butz, that was followed by the Nixon Administration.

"The Secretary of Agriculture could do much to correct our problems with a 'sweep of his pen,' and the Administration could change the whole picture with some positive action," Naman said.

The president of the state-wide farm group called for more unity in agriculture. He said that Farmers Union has pledged to work with other groups toward solving agriculture's problems. "Farmers and ranchers can no longer afford the luxury of being divided along commodity lines. We must work together as a unit and approach the problems of agriculture with a solid front," Naman said.

You should have told "Mother of Eight" doctor who told her, "The law of averages is 50 to one," to go back to medical school for statistics.

No matter how many children of what sex a couple have, the odds are very close to 50-50 that it will be a girl. Before this couple had had any children, the odds were 256 to one against all girls.

The question the doctor was asked. He was asked, "What are the odds that the eighth will be a boy?"

The proper prediction to give this couple, if they had asked for a prediction concerning the eighth child, would be 50-50, but in your case there may be a slight bias. Meals On Wheels Explained By Director

"A wonderful gift to a loved one would be a paid-up subscription to 'Meals on Wheels,'" reported Mrs. Kathy Green, director of Community Action Center, when she addressed Floydada members of the Lubbock Christian College Associates Monday night, October 21. Mrs. Sam Lide and Mrs. Q.D. Williams were hostesses for the meeting held in the community room of Lighthouse Electric.

Mrs. Green stressed that people of all income levels may qualify for Meals on Wheels. Those able to pay \$1.50 for the daily hot meal are asked to do so. Those on food stamps may pay an adjusted fee. The recipient must be physically or mentally unable to prepare their own meal, as stated by a doctor. They must live alone or with another person who is also unable to prepare a meal. They do not have to be permanently dis-

abled, may be recovering from surgery or a sick spell. They do not have to be elderly, just unable to cook for themselves. They are requested to use the service for at least two or three weeks, not just for a day or two, as extremely short terms would make cooking and delivery confusion. Members do not have to be referred, but may simply request the Meals On Wheels service.

The Meals on Wheels service is available five days a week for the noon meals, excluding weekends and holidays. The Floydada Care Center contracted the cooking, and volunteers deliver the meals to patients. This was arranged in order to keep the program strictly a local program, with no State or Federal monies, red tape or extensive bookkeeping involved, Mrs. Green said.

Other towns are reported to have lower priced

programs but are Federally funded and require office employees all of which are paid by the taxpayer one way or another. The Floydada Meals on Wheels program is paid for only by those who benefit from its services.

Mrs. Green said her office was asked to serve because it has a listed telephone and available to the public. Some of their subscribers to Meals On Wheels have been given paid-up memberships for several months or a year by local and out of town relatives.

She said meals for a month are priced at \$30. They are a hot covered dish offering a nutritionally balanced meal. A special diet dish can also be provided if the person's health requires it.

Volunteers may also do their part, Mrs. Green pointed out. She made reference to Mrs. Tommy

Farris, who teaches during the school term, but volunteered to deliver Meals on Wheels during the summer; of Mrs. Q.D. Williams who served during the summer months as Dougherty News Correspondent for the Hesperian, and presented her earned money for Meals on Wheels; to Girl Scouts who made seasonal tray favors and to a Vacation Bible School Class who laminated tray mats.

Mrs. Scott Faulkenberry told of the psychological value the daily contact with people on Meals on Wheels program has. She said the members look forward to the people as much as the food they deliver, and the new friendships were appreciated by both parties. come by the Community Action Center office in Della Plains School.

Next week's program, "Paint It Yourself," will feature house interiors.

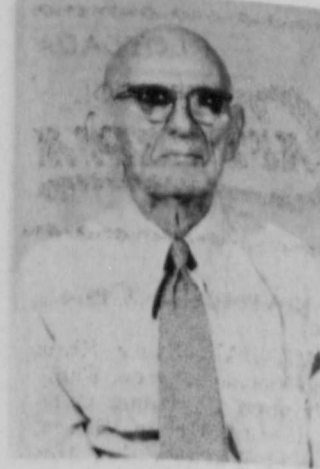

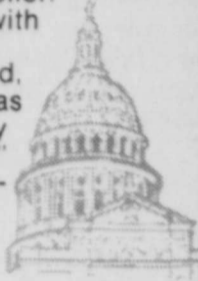

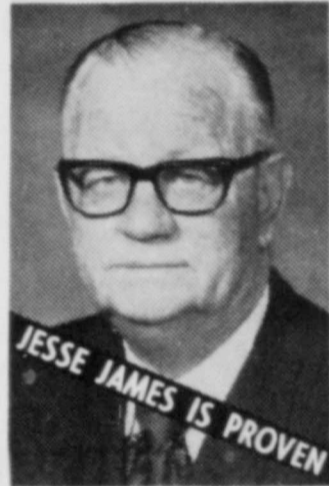

Comes Up With Still Another Idea In

The Battle Against Shortages



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his johnson grass farm continues to wage war on the economic situation, in his own fashion.

Dear editor:

In the on-going drive to conserve energy and fight inflation the head of a large commercial fertilizer company has suggested that people not fertilize their lawns next year and thus save an incalculable amount of tonnage for the farmers who are facing a fertilizer-shortage plus a shortage of money to pay for the high-priced stuff. Food, he suggested, should come before a pretty lawn, until we get the economic problems whipped.

This is another of those stop-gap proposals, like driving 55 miles an hour when you had to wait in line to get gas but now forgotten about unless there's a cop in the vicinity.

Even if you saved a lot of lawn fertilizer, grass will still grow when it rains and have you ever stopped to think how much gasoline is being burned when 20 million lawnmowers across this land are all running at the same time? I estimate enough gas is used to keep lawns mowed in one summer to allow four times as many more people to drive to football games in the fall.

Thinking about this problem, I at first came up with the idea that nobody should

trim his lawn any shorter than his son's hair, but I don't think lawn-lovers will go for it. You might not be able to do anything about your son, but by gum you've still got control of your lawn.

No. The answer is to hold back a few million dollars from Turkey and Greece and let them fight each other with what they've got on hand for a while — isn't the idea anyway to make-do with what you've got these days? — and turn the money over to some scientists with instructions to develop a lawn grass that won't grow any taller than two inches. It shouldn't be such a tough assignment. After all, left alone lawn grass won't grow over a foot or two, maybe three in some instances, but it's a scientific fact it won't grow upward forever, it has a stopping point, and all the scientists have to do is lower that point to two inches and we've got the problem of wasted lawnmower gasoline licked. How you like that, Sheik?

Naturally this will deal a blow to the people who make and sell lawnmowers but they'll just have to turn to something else, maybe say coming up with an appliance that'll play out twice as fast as the ones we've got now. I believe it can be done.

The Journal story cited six indictments in March of 1974 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, for failure to register. All six had presented themselves for registration, but after the time period specified for registration.

"The Selective Service Law calls for prosecution when there is deliberate intent not to register in a timely manner. The charge brought by the Department of Justice for late registration is the same as the charge for nonregistration — failure to register. The

Justice memorandum instructs United States attorneys, to prosecute late

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have "died" but young men still must register 30 days prior to their 18th birthday and not later than 30 days after, according to the law.

In Floydada you may register at the Courthouse with Mrs. Ray Gene Ferguson or at high school with Mrs. James Lovell. Failure to do so is still a violation.

According to a recent article in the Wall Street Journal the Selective Service is still alive and well in Washington and in local draft boards around the country. Its machinery is kept well oiled and running, registering two million 18 year olds a year and issuing them draft cards. The system still holds its annual lottery, matching birth dates of registrants with call-up numbers, just in case the draft is suddenly resumed.

According to the news story hundreds of indictments were cited, charging Military Selective Service Act violations — 657 indictments in the first half of 1974, to be exact. The most common charge was failure to register, with late registration next. The Journal did not find statistics that reflected any notable difference before or after the advent of the All Volunteer Military Force, but the story surmised that most of the charges were filed after the expiration of induction authority. In all, 2,328 indictments for Selective Service Law violations have been filed since the end of inductions.

Again quoting: "Most of those convicted are fined and placed on probation. Of 3,495 defendants tried last year, many of whom were indicted in previous years, 977 were convicted; of these 717 were fined or put on probation, and 260 received prison terms averaging 17.5 months. In 1972, the last year of the draft, 4,906 defendants were tried, 1,642 were convicted, 1,184 were put on probation and 568

registrants, such as the six in Pittsburgh, unless there is compelling justification for the delay," said the story.

The Journal reported that some young men avoided prosecution by voluntarily enlisting in the Armed Forces.

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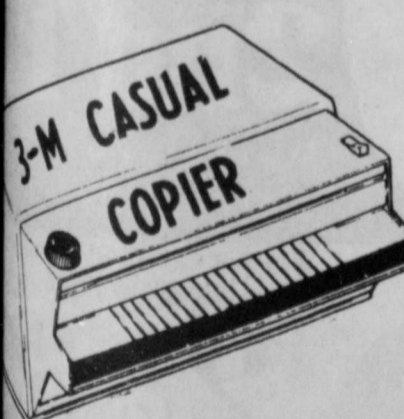

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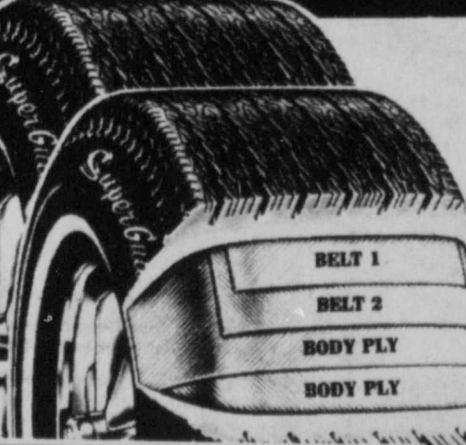

DON'T 'DRESS TO KILL' FOR HALLOWEEN

Don't "dress to kill" when outfitting the children for Halloween.

Help keep Halloween "a fun time," by seeing that costumes are fire-safe whether they are purchased ready-to-wear or made at home. Costumes of flame-retardant materials can save members of the trick-or-treat set from accidents causing painful burns or even greater tragedy.

The greatest Halloween hazard is the clothing fire. Here are some suggestions for helping keep this celebration a happy, fire-safe occasion each time Oct. 31 rolls around:

- * Costumes should be labeled "flameproof" or, if made at home, should undergo flame-proofing treatment. Even then, remember that flameproofing must be renewed each time a costume is washed or gets wet and that any clothing will burn to some extent.

- * Avoid costumes with flimsy fabric, flowing sleeves, huge skirts — especially those traditional billowing robes of ghosts and witches, made of old sheets which easily catch fire when whopped toward flames or sparks by the Autumn wind.

- * Safest disguises are "natural" masks of cosmetic makeup or charcoal applied directly to the skin. commercial masks, wigs and beards should be marked "flame-proof."

- * Use a flashlight — never a lighted candle — to illuminate a pumpkin. Keep children well away from bonfires, fireplaces, sparks and other sources of intense heat.

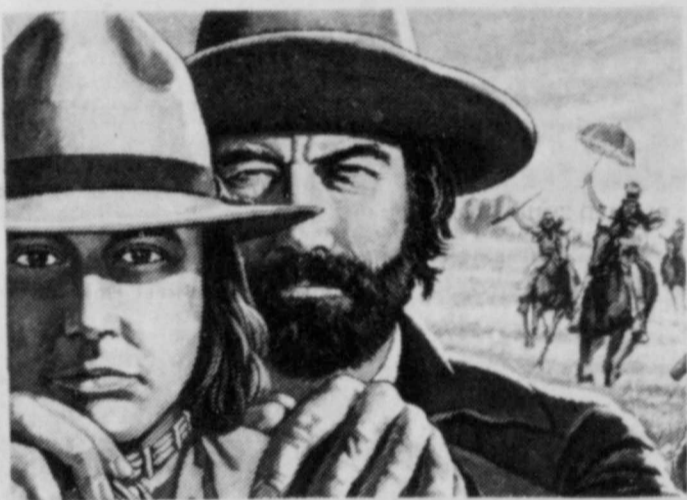
- * Keep Halloween decorations away from lighted candles and light bulbs. Be especially careful with the colorful leaves, corn husks and similar tinder-dry materials used in Autumn

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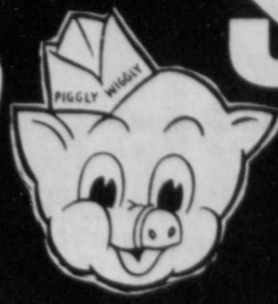

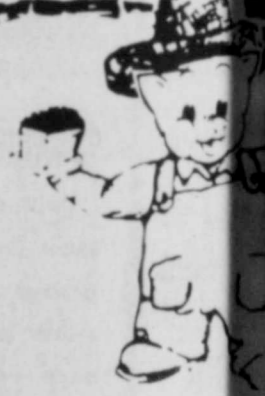
