Contract Signed For Housing Units

Construction Begins January 1

President of the Floydada Housing Authority, Dale Goen, signed a contract for \$455,017.00 with the Hoover Construction Company Inc. of Burnet, Texas Monday afternoon for the building of 42, two bedroom housing units in Floydada.

The concrete block housing units will be built about a block east of Della Plains school in northeast Floydada on a plot of land about two blocks by a block and a half that cost the Housing Authority \$9,000.

Plainview architect James Robison said it was anticipated that construction would begin January 1 and it would probably take ten months to complete the project.

Total square footage is 29,482 feet with 27,230 living area. There will be a maintenance and laundry building also. The contract includes TV wiring and tower, refrigerators and ranges for each apartment.

It is thought that a fence, playground equipment and landscaping can be provided later.

Construction of the units will be hadite block, concrete floor, with wood gables and composition roofing. The overall appearance will be similar to the migrant housing units located in east Plainview.

Russell King will be manager of the housing complex. The project was accomplished as an overall effort by Al Harrison and the FmHA, Bill Hale of the Floydada Development Company, and the Housing Authority.

The purpose of the new apartments is basically for farm workers and rent paid will not be subsidized. \$450,000 of the cost of the project

came from a government grant, and the rest is a long term government loan payout.

Entire cost of the project including architect and legal fees, and operating money is near a half million dollars.

Need for the housing project has been voiced for years by cotton and vegetable farmers, vegetable packing plants and cotton gins.

Floyd Massey

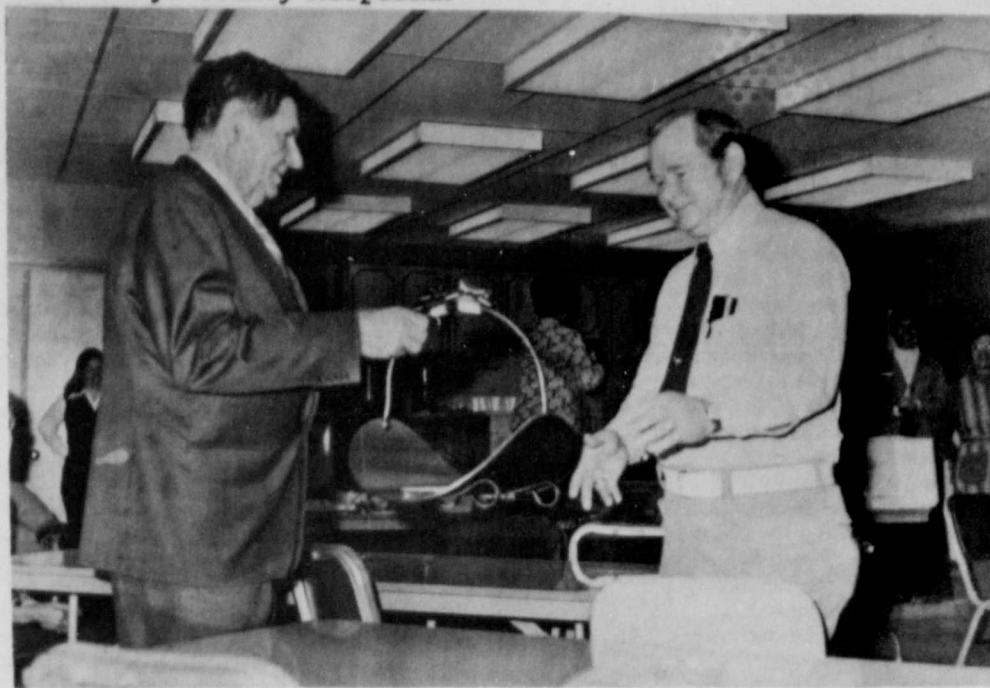

2 October Accidents In Floyd

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of October 1974, according to Sergeant Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1974 shows a total of 39 accidents resulting in five persons killed and 15 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1974, shows a total of 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured as compared to October, 1973, with 664 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 377 persons injured. This was 162 less accidents, 12 less killed, and 162 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Hale; two each in Haskell, Lubbock, Palo Pinto, Wise; and one each in Clay, Briscoe, Hall, Ochiltree, Oldham, Roberts, Swisher, and Wheeler.

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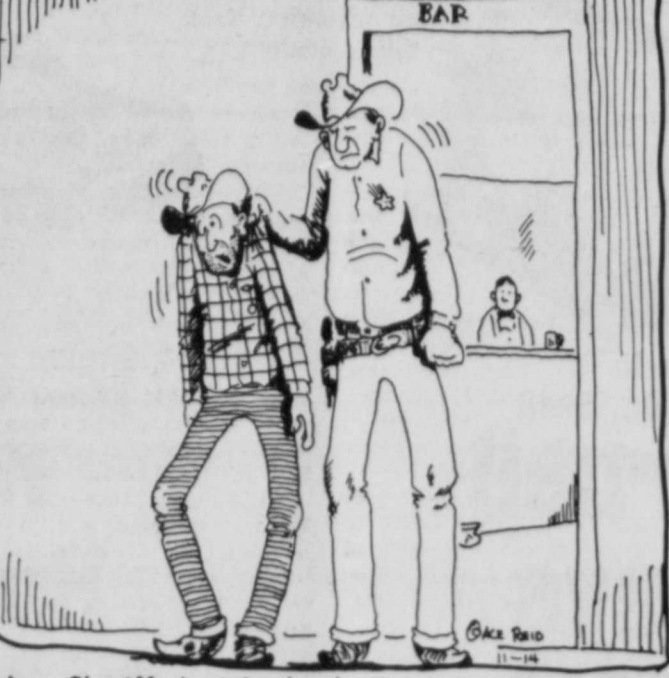

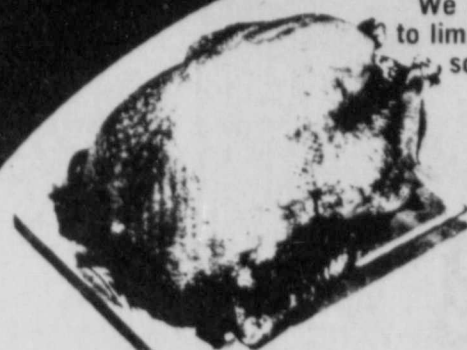

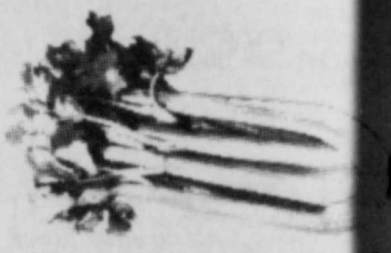
