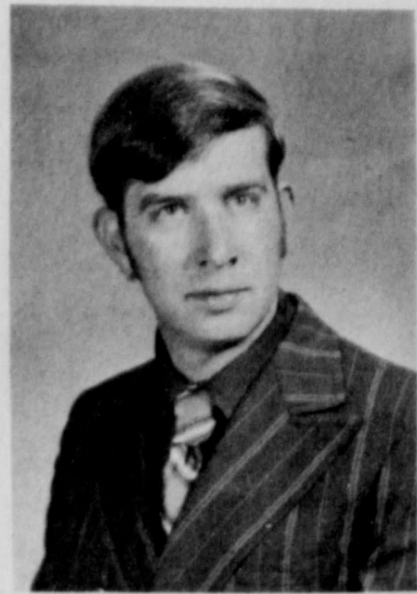

To Assume Duties

Here In December

Troy L. Patton, 27, new administrator for Caprock Hospital, will be moving with his family to Floydada in December at which time he will assume duties in late December vacated by the death in September of Bob Williams. Patton was administrator of Richards Memorial Hospital in Paducah from August, 1972, until assuming duties as administrator of Lynn County Hospital in Tahoka in February of 1974.

He is a graduate of Guthrie High School in Guthrie and a graduate of West Texas State University in Canyon where he received his Bachelor of Business Administration Degree in 1971. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Patton of Paducah.

The new Caprock Hospital-administrator is married to the former Norma Allen of Snyder. The couple have two children, a daughter, Jeanna, age six and a first grader and son, Chad, who is three. Mrs. Patton is an R.N. and a graduate of Hendrick Memorial School of Nursing in Abilene. She was employed at D. M. Cogdell Memorial Hospital in Snyder from 1966 until 1972 where she was head of the inhalation therapy department for five years. From 1972 until 1974, Mrs. Patton was Director of Nursing Service at Lynn County Hospital District and from August, 1974 until the present has been Assisting Director of Nursing Service at Lubbock Medical Center Hospital in Lubbock. Mrs. Patton has submitted a month's notice of resignation and said she does not plan to be employed in Floydada.

The couple are members of the Baptist Church. In a letter to the Hesperian, Patton said he and his wife are happy to have the opportunity to move to Floydada and become a part of the town and work with the people who comprise it. He said Caprock Hospital is an excellent facility with much to offer, and the governing board is one to be admired.

## Floyd Cancer Rate Below Average

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 — The recent mastectomy operations on First Lady Betty Ford and Mrs. Rockefeller have drawn special attention in Floyd County to the incidence of cancer in the local area and to the progress being made in coping with it. Figures compiled by the U.S. Public Health Service shed light on the size of the cancer problem locally and how it compares with the situation in other communities.

Based upon the Government's last three annual reports, the number of deaths in Floyd County caused by the various types of cancer has averaged 14 a year, with one of them attributed to breast cancer.

The figures relate to the resident population only. Deaths locally of non-residents are not included.

The overall cancer mortality in the area has been somewhat lower than in most parts of the country. The average has been 132 deaths per 100,000 population.

Throughout the United States as a whole, by way of comparison, the rate was 160 per 100,000. In the State of

Texas it was 137.

In Floyd County, in the three years, it was responsible for 13 percent of all deaths. Elsewhere in the United States it averaged 17 percent.

Although the incidence of cancer has shown little or no decline in the last two decades, more cures are being effected than ever before. The American Cancer Society reports that one out of every three persons who get it are being cured.

By "cured" is meant survival for five years without further evidence of the disease.

A new in-depth study of cancer cases in the United States, by far the largest ever undertaken, has been announced by the National Cancer Institute.

It will conduct a continuing survey of cancer occurrence involving a population of 23 million people, among whom it is expected that some 60,000 new cases will be discovered each year.

They will be carefully observed to develop clues as to causes and effective methods of diagnosis and treatment. The project is called SEER, for surveillance, epidemiology and end-results reporting.

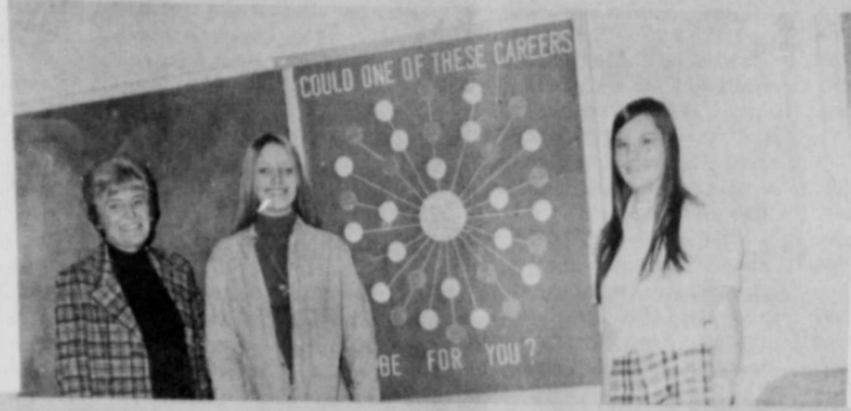
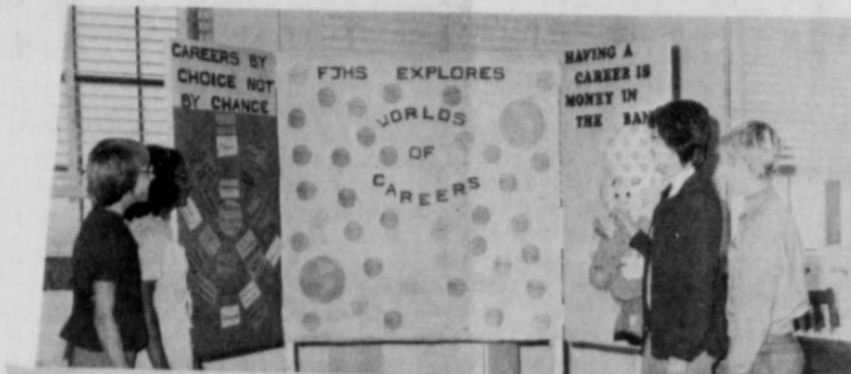

## Rites Saturday For Mrs. Watkins

Funeral rites were conducted Saturday, November 23 at 2 p.m. for Mrs. Charles W. Watkins, 86, in the Quaker Avenue Church of Christ, 4319 17th Street, in Lubbock. Mrs. Watkins, the former Emma Duncan, and daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. Arthur B. Duncan, died Thursday morning about 7 o'clock in a hospital in Fort Worth. She had been confined to bed for the past five years.

Mrs. Watkins and her sister, the late Maud Hollums were the first two children born in Floyd County, in a dug-out in the Blanco Canyon. She was born March 19, 1888, and her sister, Maud, in 1886.

Mrs. Watkins's husband was widely known in this area, being editor of the Crosby County News at Old Emma from 1903 until 1913, then for 50 years was a pioneer Church of Christ preacher. He died some ten years ago.

Mrs. Watkins is survived by eight of her ten children; two sisters, Mrs. John Hammonds and Mrs. J. Sam Hale, both of Floydada, and a brother, Carroll V. Duncan of Amarillo.

## FOOD STAMP ALLOTMENT TO INCREASE FOR FAMILY OF FOUR

Food stamp allotment for a family of four will increase on January 1 from \$150 to \$154, based on August food price statistics, according to an announcement today by Under Secretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell.

Cost of the economy food plan for August was 153.40 for a family of four with school children. Accordingly, USDA will raise the value of the coupon allotment from \$150 to \$154 for a family of four and make appropriate adjustments for other household sizes.

Maximum income eligibility standards by household size starting Jan. 1 are: One - \$194; Two - \$280; Three - \$406; Four - \$513; Five - \$606; Six - \$700; Seven - \$793; Eight - \$886.

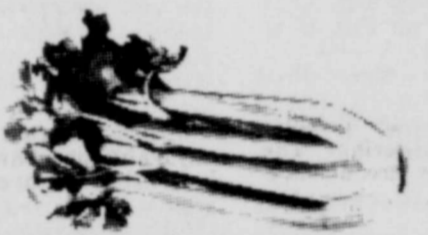

Pallbearers were Mace Coate, Edgar Bill Jones, Roger Hett, Harry Coate, Johnnie K. Jones and Steve Mize.

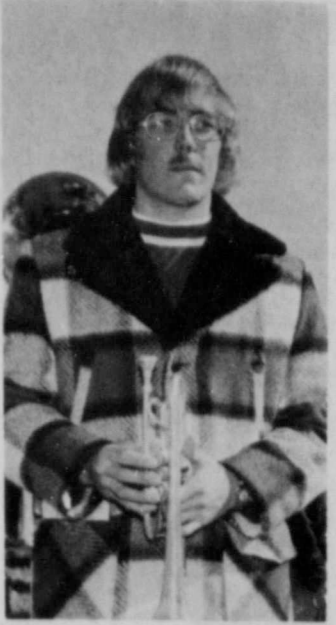

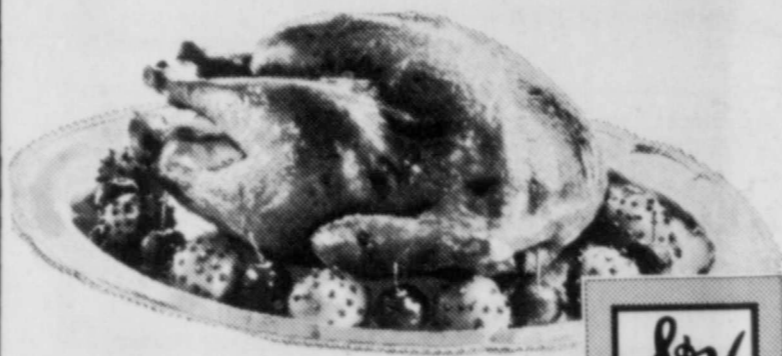

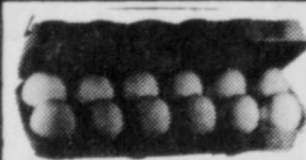
