



Floyd Cancer Rate Below Average

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 - The recent mastectomy operations on First Lady Betty Ford and Mrs. Rockefeller have drawn special attention in Floyd County to the incidence of cancer in the local area and to the progress being made in coping with it.

Figures compiled by the U.S. Public Health Service shed light on the size of the cancer problem locally and how it compares with the situation in other communities.

Based upon the Government's last three annual reports, the number of deaths in Floyd County caused by the various types of cancer has averaged 14 a year, with one of them attributed to breast cancer.

The figures relate to the resident population only. Deaths locally of non-residents are not included.

The overall cancer mortality in the area has been somewhat lower than in most parts of the country. The average has been 132 deaths per 100,000 population.

Throughout the United States as a whole, by way of comparison, the rate was 160 per 100,000. In the State of

Texas it was 137.

In Floyd County, in the three years, it was responsible for 13 percent of all deaths. Elsewhere in the United States it averaged 17 percent. Although the incidence of cancer has

shown little or no decline in the last two decades, more cures are being effected than ever before. The American Cancer Society reports that one out of every three persons who get it are being cured.

By "cured" is meant survival for five years without further evidence of the

A new in-depth study of cancer cases in the United States, by far the largest ever undertaken, has been announced by the National Cancer Institute.

It will conduct a continuing survey of cancer occurrence involving a population of 23 million people, among whom it is expected that some 60,000 new cases will be discovered each year.

They will be carefully observed to develop clues as to causes and effective methods of diagnosis and treatment. The project is called SEER, for surveillance, epidiomology and endresults reporting.

Minimum tillage is a soil erosion preventive practice. Losses from wind and water are nominal. With this type of farming there is less of a weed problem due to ground cover at all times. Some herbicide utilization could also be worked effectively into the system. Root penetration will improve due to the absence of a plow-pan formation. Along these same lines soil aeration will improve because of less chance for the

soil to sun-bake. With minimum tillage small grain could be seeded between cotton rows before the bolls open. The small grain could be grazed out or harvested. There are many more benefits to minimum tillage farming and possibly many which haven't been realized as yet.

The farmer who employs minimum tillage on his farm can save on fuel, maintenance, and labor costs. If the farmer of a 320 acre farm spends 47 cents a gallon for fuel, one dollar per quart of oil, and one dollar and sixty cents an hour for labor these expenditures would amount to \$1560.25 for ten operations. He could save \$780.13 by cutting operations to five, and \$1248.21 by cutting

U.S. Cotton Strong At European Market

FRANKFURT, Germany - American Upland cotton is making itself a sought-after commodity at the 32nd Interstoff trade fair here.

Exhibits of 100 per cent cotton fabrics by 17 leading U.S. mills, knitters and converters are attracting hundreds of viewers each day to a special cotton service center.

The American exhibits were coordinated by Cotton Incorporated, the marketing and research company of U.S. cotton growers.

Cotton Incorporated is cooperating with the International Institute for Cotton in showing the fabrics.

The Interstoff fair, held twice a year, is the largest fabric show and buyers. market in Europe. The current event runs November 19-22. Cotton fabrics being

shown include 100 per cent cotton denims, bull denims, brushed and sateen twills, corduroys, populins, chambrays and canvases.

New fabric constructions include pure cotton knits, interlocks, jerseys, ribs, terries, jacquards, pointelles and knitted velvets.



FOOD STAMP ALLOTMENT TO INCREASE FOR FAMILY OF FOUR

Food stamp allotment for a family of four will increase on January 1 from \$150 to \$154, based on August food price statistics, according to an announcement today by Under Secretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell.

Allotment adjustments are based on the cost of the Department of Agriculture's (USDA) economy food plan as it is computed from Bureau of Labor Statistics food prices. The law

requiring semiannual adjustments specified that the January 1974 adjustment reflect changes in food prices through August 1973. Maximum income eligibilmaximum income eligibility ity standards by household standard for the four-person household will increase from

\$500 to \$513. Cost of the economy food plan for August was 153.40 for a family of four with school children. Accordingly, USDA will raise the value of the coupon allotment from \$150 to \$154 for a family of four and make appropriate adjustments for other household sizes.






