City Council To Sell Two Power Units

The Floydada City Council decided to sell the two old 1939 Worthington power units to make room for the new 1750 KW engine it recently bought.

J. W. Cannon, power plant superintendent, reports the engines haven't been used in over a year, but are in good operating condition. He said the two old engines would have to come out before the new engine goes in.

The council voted to advertise for bids on the engines and generators.

City engineer Bill McMorries visited with the council for an hour discussing plans to install the new engine and forthcoming paving.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council accepted the bid of Ruckers OK Tire

Service for tire repairs on the city's vehicles for another year. No bids were submitted to supply gas and diesel to the city.

The council approved receiving bids for seal coat paving of \$20,000 worth of paving this summer and an alternate bid for paving to the new farm housing project to be built in northeast Floydada;

The council accepted and tabled a petition signed by 56 citizens living in northeast Floydada to pave every street north of East Missouri and east of Wall street!

Approved more caliche for road to garbage dump grounds to make an all weather road from the highway to the dump grounds;

Decided to call a meeting of the Caprock Hospital board and the county commissioners to work out future ambulance service for this community, in early January;

Approved city offices closing at noon December 24, all day December 25 and 26.

All councilmen were present.

Neil Becker, Gonzales, David Welborn and Troy Marquis were praised by their coach as outstanding on rebounds and Becker made five points.

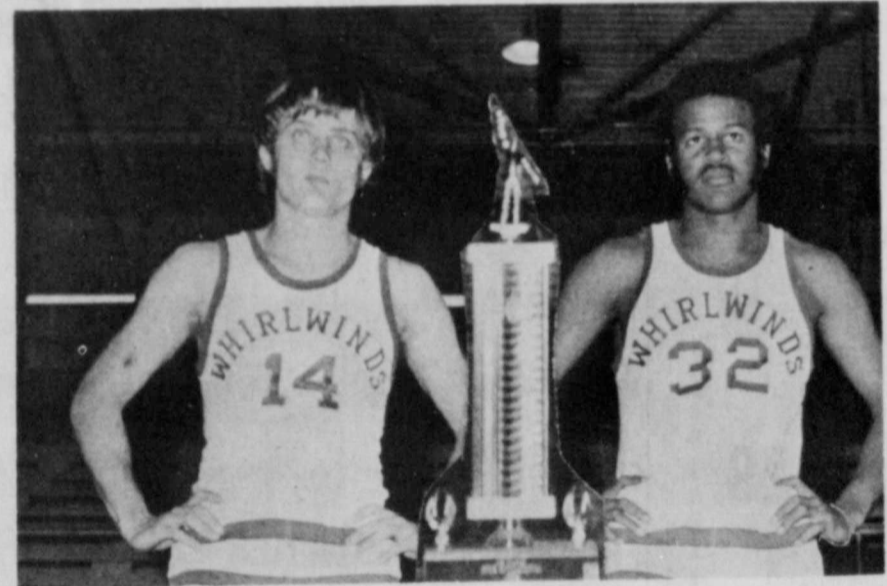

Commissioners Pass Resolution For Probation Department

Commissioners Court passed a resolution at their regular meeting Monday whereas the County of Floyd will establish a Probation Department to handle juvenile and misdemeanor cases. The resolution continued that the County of Floyd wishes to fund said department with assistance from Criminal Justice Division.
It was resolved that Judge J. K. Holmes, county judge, be authorized to execute all instruments that may be necessary for application for said department and other forms in that connection and that Judge Holmes shall serve as chairman of said Probation Department.
Commissioners also approved that as of January 1, 1975 that both Justice of Peace of Floyd County, be paid \$300 a month salary plus \$125 per month travel expense.
It was voted unanimously that \$35,200 be transferred from the special road account to various precincts in the county at \$8,800 each, and that First National Bank of Floydada be allowed to substitute bonds as listed in court minutes of Monday's meeting.
Judge J. K. Holmes said that the raise in salary and car mileage requested by the sheriff was discussed and it appeared at this time that only the 10% increase January 1 that all county officials and employees will receive will be the only raise in salary given the sheriff and deputies.
However, he said the commissioners did discuss raising the mileage rate from 12c to 15c per mile... or furnishing automobiles for the sheriff and deputies.

Cooperative Elevators announced contracts to growers for a relatively new crop for our area. Sunflower contracts will be available after the Plains Cooperative Mill Board meeting of December 11.

At this time it looks as though the price for the contract will be about 15 cents above the base price.

Manager Bill Cagle said the contracts will be available for grower review on December 11th. The sunflowers are marketed through the same channels as cooperative elevators and market their soybeans and wheat.

According to sources from the oil industry in Lubbock there will be plenty of sunflower seed available for everyone. The average yield per acre is a 1500 bushels low to a 2500 pound high. The sunflower requires less irrigation, water requirements and fertilizer are similar to cotton. Main harvest is that sunflowers can be harvested in March, harvested in 120 days and followed by wheat.

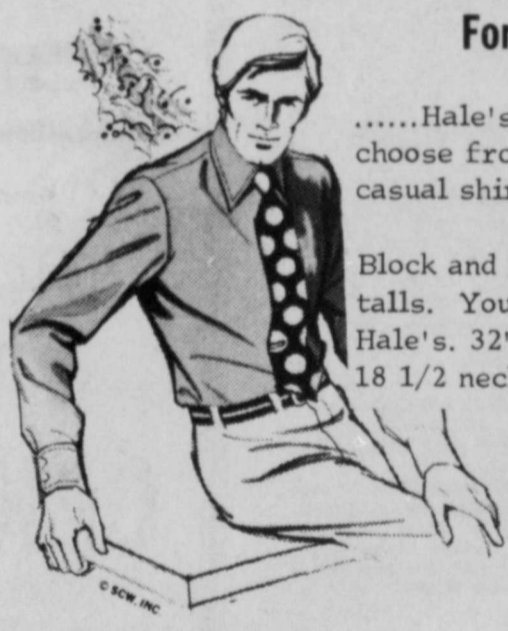



... AN old world favorite, Hungarian Christmas Bread, adds a festive taste to any holiday party menu. The long crusty loaves holds a savory filling made by combining plump raisins with canned poppy seed spread. Poppy seeds sprinkled on the top provide an extra holiday touch. I've never made the cake but have eaten some of my mom's and she says you don't have to be a Hungarian to make one. She makes the loaves ahead of time and stores them in the freezer until a few hours before serving time. Let the bread thaw, then pop into the oven for a fresh, fragrant yuletide treat. The following recipe makes two loaves:

4 1/2 to 5 cups enriched flour*
 2 packages yeast
 1/2 cup milk
 1/2 cup water
 1/4 cup sugar
 1/4 cup oil
 2 teaspoons salt
 2 eggs
 1 can (12 oz.) poppy cake and pastry filling
 1 cup golden raisins
 Oil
 Poppy seeds

Stir together 2 cups flour and yeast. Heat milk, water, sugar, 1/4 cup oil and salt over low heat until warm, stirring to blend. Add liquid ingredients to flour mixture and beat until smooth, about 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer. Blend in eggs. Add 1 cup flour and beat 1 minute more. Stir in more flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and satiny, 8 to 10 minutes. Shape into ball and place in lightly greased bowl, turning to grease all sides. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 to 85°) until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down; divide in half. Roll each half into 10 x 12-inch rectangle. Spread with poppy filling, leaving 1-inch margin on all sides; sprinkle with raisins. Roll up jelly roll fashion. Seal bottom and ends securely. Place on greased baking sheet, seam side down. Make shallow, diagonal cuts across top. Brush with oil. Sprinkle generously with poppy seeds. Let rise in warm place until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in preheated 350° oven 30 to 40 minutes, or until golden brown.

Mrs. Matsler -- 'Happiest Person In Hale County'

Meet one of the happiest persons in Hale County—Mrs. A.T. Matsler, 83.

That was the self-appraisal of the pioneer woman whose busy life keeps her in contact with lots of happy people and some not so happy.

"There is no one in all Hale County happier than I am," Mrs. Matsler declared recently. Perhaps her statement could have taken in more territory, but she was on safe ground as long as she included only her home county where she knows hundreds of people.

Mrs. Matsler is not aware that she has applied any particular line of philosophy to living. At least, she was unable to define her personal philosophy more than to say that she stayed busy. "There is something to do every minute," she said.

"Keeping busy" in Mrs. Matsler's words includes helping others. "Some people need more help than others," she noted, "and all of us could use some kind of help sometimes," noted the spry, slightly graying woman who has heartily responded to neighbors' calls ranging from getting a fretting baby to sleep to tending the dying.

Mrs. Matsler lives south of Plainview on the site of the home to which her husband took her as a 16-year-old bride on Christmas Eve, 1907. She has lived alone since her husband's death in 1959 in her cheery, neat-as-a-pin house located a mile and a half from the nearest neighbor.

Her husband homesteaded the Matsler home place in 1894. The next year after their marriage the couple built a 3-room house. "When a baby was born we added another room if we needed it," Mrs. Matsler said, "and there were seven babies arriving singly at two-year intervals."

In the 67 years since her marriage Mrs. Matsler has not spent a Christmas away from home. And she plans to be home this Christmas for the annual yule gathering

of her best sons and daughters and families who can be on hand.

The Matsler home was a gathering place for young people over a wide area while the Matsler children were growing up. "I always liked to know where my kids were, so we just had their friends come here. We played games, visited and just enjoyed ourselves. Maybe someone would bring a musical instrument and we would play ring games," she said.

Keeping her house, tending her pot plants which attest to her green thumb, going, piecing quilts, keeping in touch with friends and family by telephone caring for her chickens and peafowls occupy most of Mrs. Matsler's time.

"I woke up one morning not long ago and right off decided I wanted a new car," she said. She bought a car and was rather put out with having to let it sit idle during the recent rainy weather, as she lives a few miles off the pavement.

Incidentally, Mrs. Matsler is among the few residents of Hale County who has chickens. "I always have had chickens and will have them as long as I can take care of them," she said. She was a little upset recently when stray dogs or coyotes got into her flock and killed 10 hens and peafowls.

Asked how her large family made out during the Depression, Mrs. Matsler inquired quite seriously, "When was the Depression?" Told that it was in the late 30s, she said she was not aware of a Depression. We had our living right here on this place," she said. But she remembered the dust storms.

Mrs. Matsler has had comparatively little illness during her 83 years. "I have had surgery a few times," she said, "but I always got over it real quick."

Mrs. Matsler said when someone asked her what she was going to do when old age caught up with her, she replied, "The Lord will take care of me. He always has. I believe in miracles," she declared.

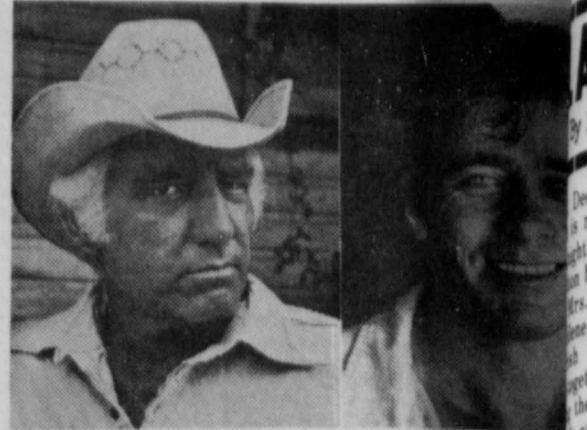

High Plains Cotton Harvest Past Halfway

The High Plains cotton harvest passed the half way point during the first week in December, according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the USDA's Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. "Curiously enough," he added, "the half way mark was the first week in December last year."

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa, and Levelland classed 206,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 6. This brought the season's total to 342,000. On this same date last year the total was 1,181,000.

At Lubbock predominant grades this week were 41 and 51. Grade 41 accounted for 28 percent while grade 51 was assigned to 27 percent of the cotton samples. Twenty-four percent of these samples were reduced one grade because of bark, the same as the previous week.

The predominant staples were 31 and 32. Staple 31 amounted to 29 percent and staple 32 was 28 percent of the samples this week.

Micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 accounted for 27 percent of the samples. This compares to 36 percent the week before. Micronaire readings below 3.5 accounted for the other 73 percent this week.

Pressley Strength tests averaged 82,000 pounds per square inch.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Grade 41, Staple 31 - 34.45, Staple 32 - 35.15 cents per

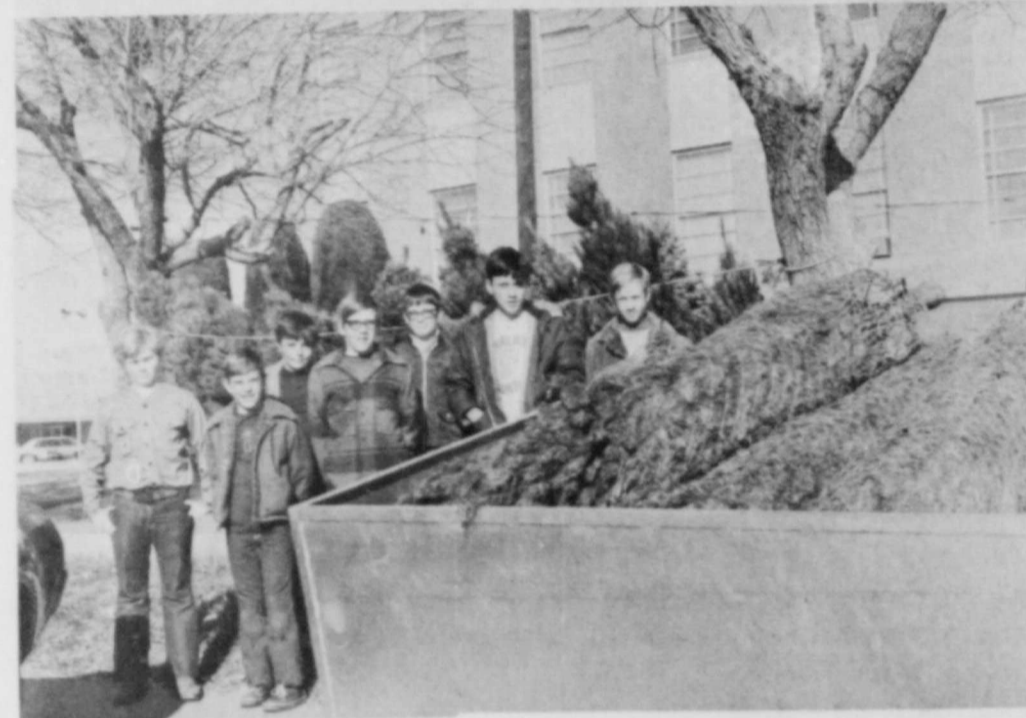
