Rites Pending For Mrs. Payne

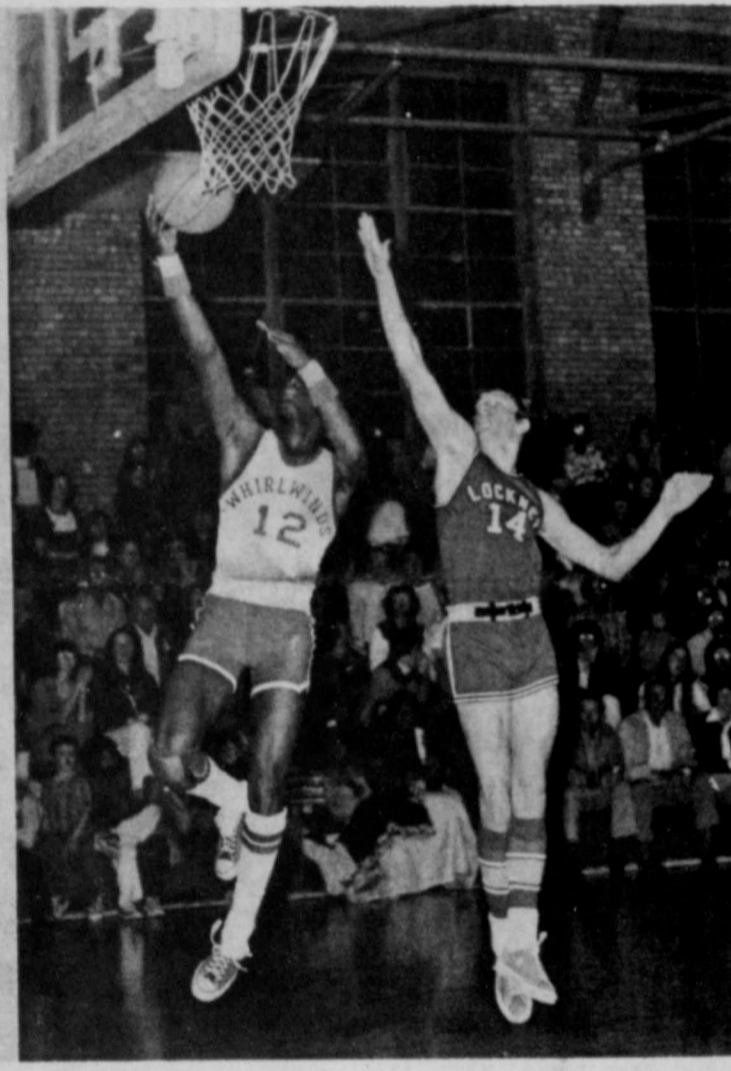
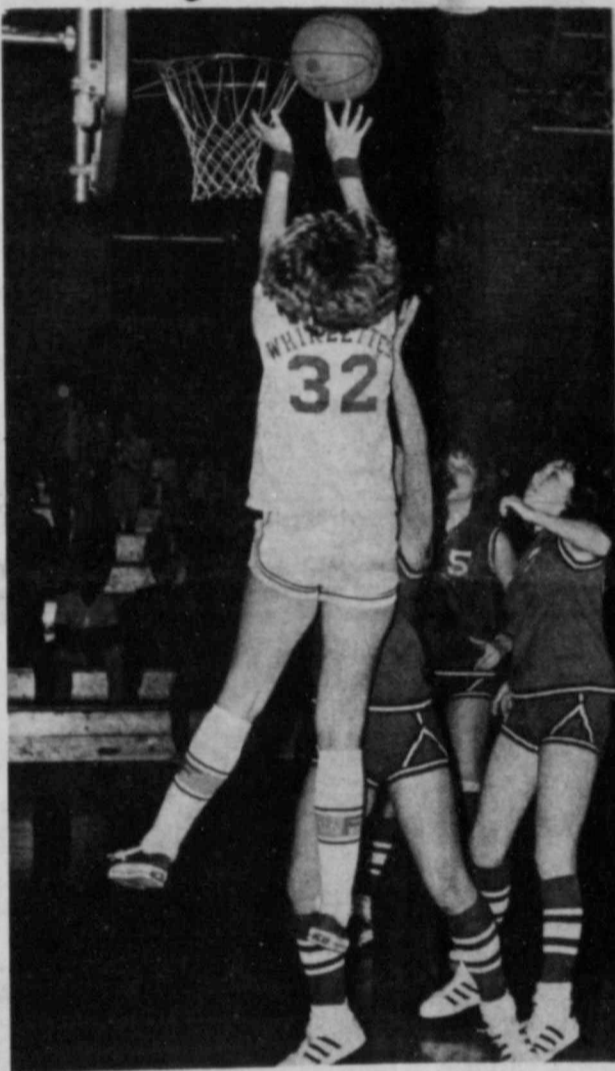

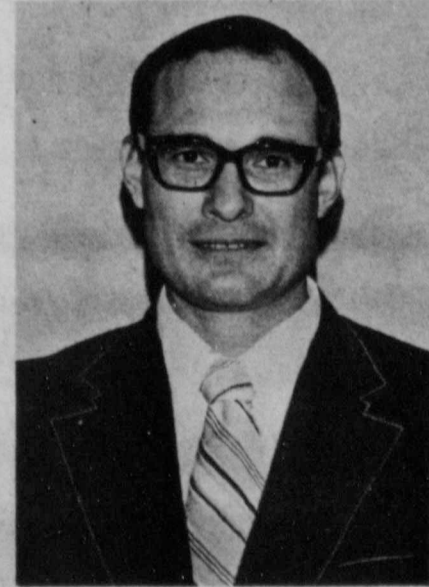
Gene Ehler New Pioneer Natural Gas Manager.

Lions Club JamBree Saturday Night

It's that time again. The next Lions JamBree will be held this Saturday night, February 1, at 7:30 p.m., at the Massie Activity Center. Music will be furnished by a group of musicians who donate their time for the privilege of being able to play together. The JamBree is nothing more than an old fashioned jam session.

"We are going to do something different this time," Art Ratzlaff, coordinator of the program, said. "We have been trying to bring in more musicians than the stage in the MAC will handle. Starting this month we will try to contain it in one group so that the musicians, who usually drive some distance, will be able to play longer and the audience will not have to sit through so many tuning sessions."

The program was originally begun with a two-fold purpose in mind. One was to furnish area musicians a place to play music in an organized fashion. The other was to raise enough money to buy a good public address system for the MAC. There is none now, and for some activities there is no need for one. But our youth like to play music and dance and this requires either a live band or an amplifier of some sort of record, tape or other electric reproduction machines."

Admission for the JamBree is \$1 for adults and 50c for high school and under. Everyone who likes country music is invited to come and listen as long as they like and, since this is just a jam session, anyone wishing to leave before the musicians do may do so without being afraid of being impolite. "We're there to have fun and no one is obligated to do anything they do not wish to," Ratzlaff said. "We are still short around \$650 of our goal, so come out and help us with this project and we will try to keep you entertained," he added.

The Lions put on the JamBree the first Saturday of every month or as long as there are enough listeners to pay the rent.

Floyd Farm Production Costs To Be Studied

A comprehensive survey to determine costs of producing wheat, corn and other feed grains, cotton soybeans, milk and selected commodities will include information from Floyd County farmers.

Charles E. Caudill, Statistician in charge of the Texas

Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, said the national data collecting effort will get underway in late January. Floyd County producers and those in other parts of the country will be personally contacted for information about their 1974 costs of production. Costs of labor,

power and equipment, fertilizer and chemicals, storage, drying and other similar outlays will be determined. All responses will be confidential and only State, regional and national summaries will be issued. The survey will be conducted annually to identify

production practices and establish current national average costs of producing farm commodities. The information will be of major usefulness in identifying and updating budgets for crop and livestock enterprises. The survey results will also provide production costs which may be used as determinants of target price or price support levels.

Lake Theo State Park Created

The creation of a new state park in Briscoe County of the Texas Panhandle was announced jointly today by Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon, State

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, and Representative Phil Cates of Pampa. Located approximately 95 miles from both Lubbock and Amarillo, the

site will be known as Lake Theo State Park.

Survey Says Food A Bargain

AUSTIN—Though retail food prices advanced 11.2 percent in the United States last year, a recent survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service revealed seven countries exceeding this increase. "This survey shows that food is still a bargain in the United States," said

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. He pointed out that prices have climbed 41.9 percent in Brazil, 26.2 percent in Japan, 21.6 percent in Italy, 21.3 percent in Mexico, 17.3 percent in the United States, 15.7 percent in Canada and 12.6 percent in France.

Jan 31 Deadline Disaster Credit

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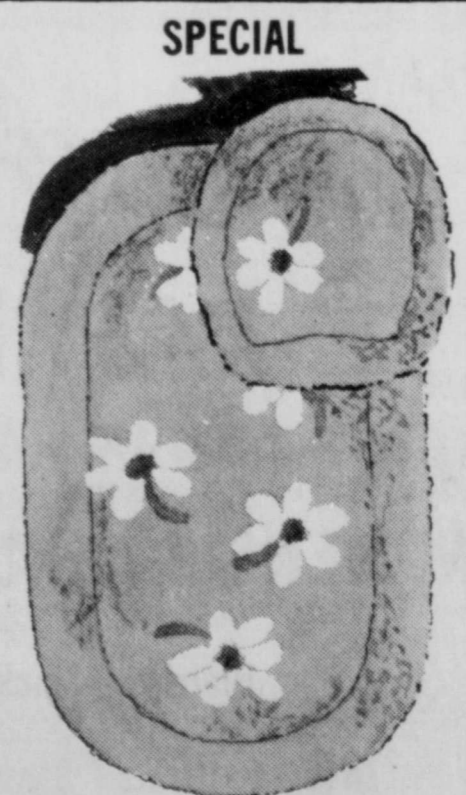

National FHA-HERO Week February 9 - 15

Future Homemakers of America throughout Texas will observe National FHA-HERO week, February 9-15 in conjunction with Vocational Education Week. Using the theme Vocational Education for Productive Careers they join some half-a-million other young men and women members across the country in demonstrating projects that have real value for youth in preparation for future responsibilities.

Future Homemakers of America is one of six vocational education youth groups. Inter-related with the home economics education program in the secondary schools it provides meaning and motivation for youth working toward educational goals related to home economics and vocational education and reaches beyond the classroom instruction into the home and community.

State President, Joyce Tipton, Lipan, explained that the overall goal of the organization is "to help youth assume their roles in society through home economics in areas of personal growth, family life, vocational preparation and community involvement. "In other words," she said, "it helps us develop leadership, good citizenship, and prepare for the vital work of our

HERO chapters, taking the name from home economics related occupations, place major emphasis on preparation for jobs and careers with recognition that workers also fill multiple roles as homemakers and community leaders. 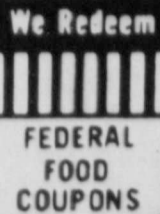

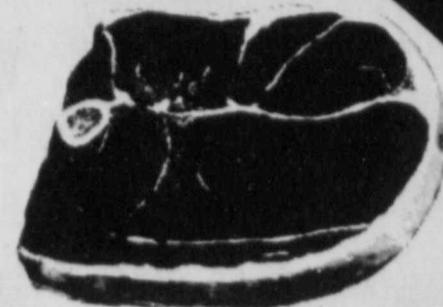
