School Board, City Council, Elections Set

Both Elections April 5

Two elections were set Monday night as the school board and city council met. Both elections will be held on Saturday, April 5, 1975. Deadline for filing for election to either board is a month before election day, March 4, 1975.

In the city council election mayor Parnell Powell's term is up and councilmen Wayne Russell and Jerry Thompson. The term for each is two

years. In the school board election the terms of Mrs. Lon Davis and Gene Arwine are up. The school board terms are for three years.

Although the Caprock Hospital board election has not been officially announced, it is presumed that it will be the same day as the school and city elections. The terms of Dallas Ramsey and Bill Daniel come up in this election. Their terms are for a two year period.

A.W. Coltharp Retiring, Bob Alldredge Principal

The Floydada school board accepted the resignation and retirement of Jr. High principal A. W. Coltharp at its February meeting Monday night.

Principal Coltharp is retiring after 22 years with the Floydada school system and a total of 36 years in the school teaching profession.

The school board then approved the selection of Bob Alldredge to succeed Coltharp. Alldredge has been a teacher 25 years. . . 10 years in Floydada. He is DECA coordinator at high school.

City Council Spends Another \$100,000 On Power Engine

The Floydada City Council accepted more bids on installation of its 2500 KW engine Monday night and when they were all discussed and approved had committed about another \$100,000 on the project.

Mayor Parnell Powell said that it appears now that the complete installation and purchase of the motor and generator may cost \$300,000. "However, this is still \$300,000 less than we had originally thought the cost would be on a new engine," the mayor added.

The council approved the bid of West Texas Mechanical of Lubbock for \$45,000 for piping the power plant, the bid of G. E. Jones of Amarillo for \$33,370 for electrical wiring and modification of the existing electric system, and P. & B. Construction of Goodland, Kansas to pull out and haul off the three old Worthington engines.

The council also approved the purchase of some smaller accessory items for the engine and generator.

As It Looks From Here

Omar Burleson, M.C. 17th District, Texas WASHINGTON, D.C. — at the first meeting of the United Nations in January of 1946, its membership was composed of 51 Nations, all of them being on the side of the allies in World War II. Today there are 138 member Nations, each having a vote in the General Assembly equal to ours. A United States' proposal, that would have established requirements for U.N. membership on the basis of size and responsibility, never made it to first base. Some of the Nations in the U.S. have proved they are unable to govern themselves, yet they sit in the General Assembly and vote against seating the South African delegation and give legitimacy to the Palestinian terrorists. Under present circumstances we can do nothing about it. There is something we can do about it if we will. The first thing is to stop voting in the General Assembly. It would only require the President to instruct Members of the U.S. delegation to ignore voting in that body. There is no reason why we should vote either "yes" or "no" or even "abstain", just leave a record of "not voting". The U.N. started off with laudable purposes. Then, with the emergence of such nations as Uganda, Burundi, Mauritania, Tobago, Chad, Guyana, Albania, Maldives, Togo, and a lot of other names we never heard of until a few years ago, a majority was created which evidently hates the United States. If a big majority of the Assembly wants to welcome terrorist groups and listen to their speeches as they did this last session, the General Assembly has lost all usefulness to us. When the Palestinian Liberation Group came to the U.N. they were welcomed with open arms. They urged the support of terrorist outfits to be the rightful government of Cambodia, Palestine, Mozambique, Southwest Africa

Vets GI Loan Interest Rate Drops

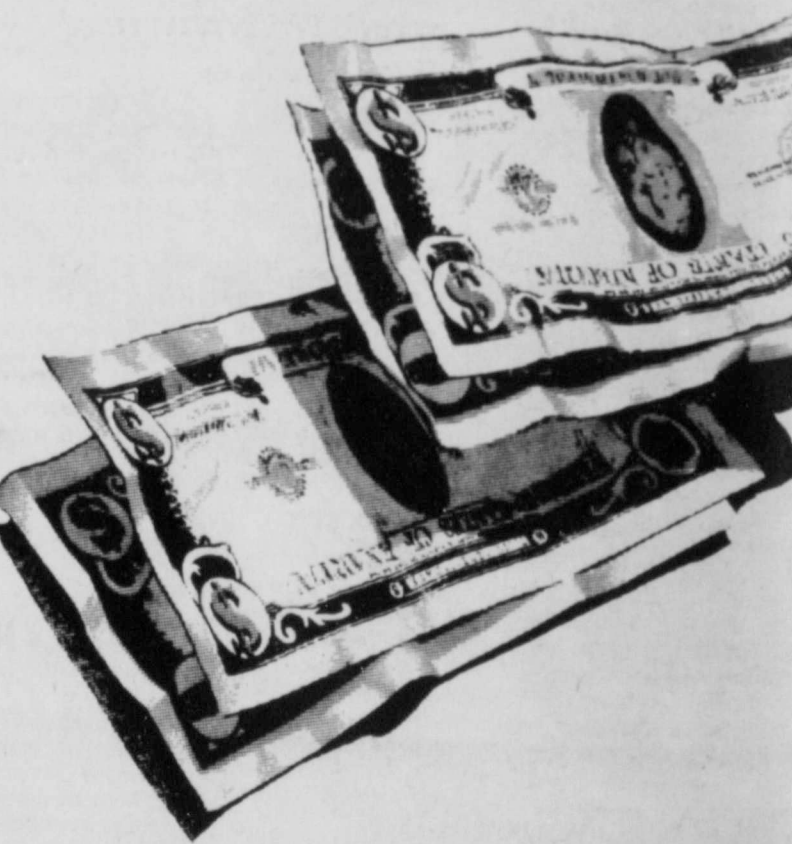
The maximum interest rate on Veterans Administration GI home loans was dropped from 9 percent to 8.5 percent effective January 21, 1975, it was announced by Richard L. Roudebush, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.
Roudebush, who established the lower VA rate after consultation with the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, noted that the reduction was the second since last November 24 when the maximum interest rate was 9.5 percent. The new 8.5 percent rate will also apply to FHA home loans, he added.
The percent rate is the lowest since April 1974 when the rate was increased from 8.25 to 8.5 percent. The rate was increased to 9 percent last July, then to 9.5 percent last August, and then was cut to 9 percent effective November 25, 1974.
The half-percent decrease would mean as much as \$9.90 per month savings to the typical veteran home buyer, and over the 30 year life of a \$27,500 VA loan, the total saving could be as much as \$3,535.

The VA Administrator said the VA home loan market was greatly expanded under legislation approved by the President December 31, 1974 when more than four million veterans whose GI home loans have been paid in full and the home disposed of became potentially eligible for new loans guaranteed by VA.
The legislation also increased the maximum VA loan guarantee amount from \$12,500 to \$17,500, authorized loans for the purchase of mobile home lots, increased the amount of mobile home loans and broadened the possibilities for guaranteeing loans on one-family condominiums.

Veteran Benefits

Exempt From Income Tax

Here are tips from the Veterans Administration on federal income taxes for veterans filing returns.

In general, Texas VA officials noted, veterans benefits are exempt from federal income tax, and need not be reported as income.

This income tax exemption applies to dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but federal estate tax does apply to insurance proceeds. Also, interest earned on government life insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with VA is considered income and must be reported on federal income tax returns, it was explained.

Among major tax exempt veterans benefits are compensation, pension, GI Bill and other educational assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees.

Also exempt are grants to service disabled veterans eligible for specially adapted homes and cars, and clothing allowances for veterans whose prosthetic devices tend to wear out or tear their clothing, VA officials advised.

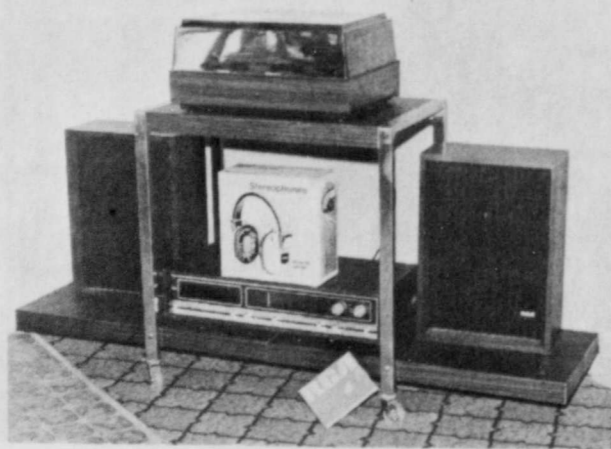
