

## Atomic Energy Program

Set At LHS COLLEGE STATION -

Lockney High School students will view a demonstration March 14 of atomic energy and its uses. A program titled "This

Atomic World" will acquaint them with principles and sources of nuclear energy. Its role in agriculture. industry, medicine and research will be explained. Sponsored by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering, the program is conducted by Orlan L. Ihms.

Using student terms, he will describe structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as Ihms will employ special

had been hired and selected for this study, it was found they were similar in education (average of 12.8 years for women, 12.9 for men) in civil service test scores of an average of 82 for both groups. New women and comparison men also earned similar average scores at the police academy. Most of the new women were black (68 percent compared to 42 percent of the men), and more had children (54 percent of the women, 31 percent of the men). Both men and women had to meet a minimum height requirement of 5'7"

The initial evaluation of the work of the new female officers was published in 1973. The report includes supervisory ratings, patrol observation by trained observers, opinions of citizens who observed the police in action, and arrest statistics.

It was found that police-

women working in a generally similar manner, responding to similar types of calls for police service, as the men had no incidents which cast serious doubt on the ability of women to perform patrol work satisfactorily. The report said the women made fewer arrests and gave fewer traffic citations; men were more likely to engage in serious unbecoming conduct; wom en were somewhat more likely to be assigned to light duty as the result of injuries, but injuries did not cause them to be absent from work more often than men.

In sum, the study shows that sex is not a bona fide occupational qualification for doing police patrol work.





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## **PUBLIC NOTICE**

OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975.

ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a. 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and



## Floyd Farmers Eligible For Federal Crop Insurance

Farmers in Floyd County are eligible for increased benefits under the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance programs on cotton and grain sorghum for the 1975

Burl Lyles, field representative from the District Office at Lubbock, said today that insured farmers are now able to value their guaranteed production under the FCIC programs at a 17-40 percent higher level than a year ago depending upon which crop is insured.

The highest increase is in the cotton program where the price paid for losses was raised to 35 cents a pound from previous high of 25 cents (or 28 cents, for some counties). Increases have been made in the grain sorghum program with prices up to \$2.50 a hundredweight from \$2.00 a year ago.

'These changes have been made to help insurance coverage keep pace with rising farm production expenses in the past two years," Lyles says.

As production costs including fertilizer, seed, labor, chemicals and machinery - continue to increase at a rapid pace, it is more

protect against crop destruction hazards beyond their control. This is especially true if borrowed money is at stake, he says.

Lyles will be in the County for a limited time advising farmers of the FCIC program changes for 1975 and taking applications from those itnerested in participating in the U.S. Department of Agriculture volunteer program.

During the 1974 growing season more than 12,000 farm units were insured in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico with Federal Crop Insurance protecting \$47.5 million worth of growing crops on nearly one million

1. The area over or within which equipment may be operated shall include portions of these counties: Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Randall, Deaf Smith and Parmer.

The target within which hailfall is intended to be decreased is described as follows: The outer boundary commencing at the point of intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb: thence northward along the Hale-Lamb County line to the southern boundary of Castro County; thence westward nine (9) miles along the Castro-Lamb County line; thence due north to State Highway 86: thence eastward along State Highway 87; thence southward along U.S. Highway 87 to the northern boundary of Hale County; thence eastward along the County; thence county line to Farm Road WEATHER MODIFICATION

378; thence southward along Farm Road 378 to U.S. Highway 70: thence south-eastward 1½ miles along U.S. Highway 70; thence due south to the Floyd-Crosby County line: thence west-ward along the county line to the intersection with Lubbock County; thence southward eight (8) miles along the Lubbock-Crosby County line: thence due west to Farm Road 400 to the Hale-Lubbock County line; thence west-ward along farm Road 400 to the Hale-Lubbock County line to the intersection of the counties Hale. Lubbock. Hock-ley and Lamb, the point of origin.

3. The equipment, materials, and methods to be used in conducting the operation are a weather radar system. cloud seeding aircraft and flares for dispension of silver iodide nuclei near cloud hase.

## Some Veterans Eligible

For VGLI

An estimated 2.7 million Vietnam-era veterans separated from April 2, 1970 through July 31, 1974 are eligible for new low-cost Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI), but they must apply before August 2, 1975. The new program is designed as interim protection during readjustment to civilization life, according to the Veterans Administra-

Servicemen discharged since August 1 receive application forms automatically, but those discharged before the insurance became available must apply, Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, said.

Nonrenewable, five-year term coverage is available in \$5,000 increments up to \$20,000. Monthly premium for the maximum coverage is \$3.40 for veterans aged 34 and under and \$6.80 for those 35 and over.

Former servicemen may convert Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to VGLI without medical examination if applications are received within 120 days of separation. Applications after that time must include evidence of good health. This requirement is waived for veterans with VA-rated, service-connected disabili-

Application forms are available from the Waco VA Regional Office, 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, and veterans service organizations. Completed forms and premiums should be sent to the Office of Dervicemen's Group Life Insurance, 22 Washington Street, Newark, N.J. 07102.




