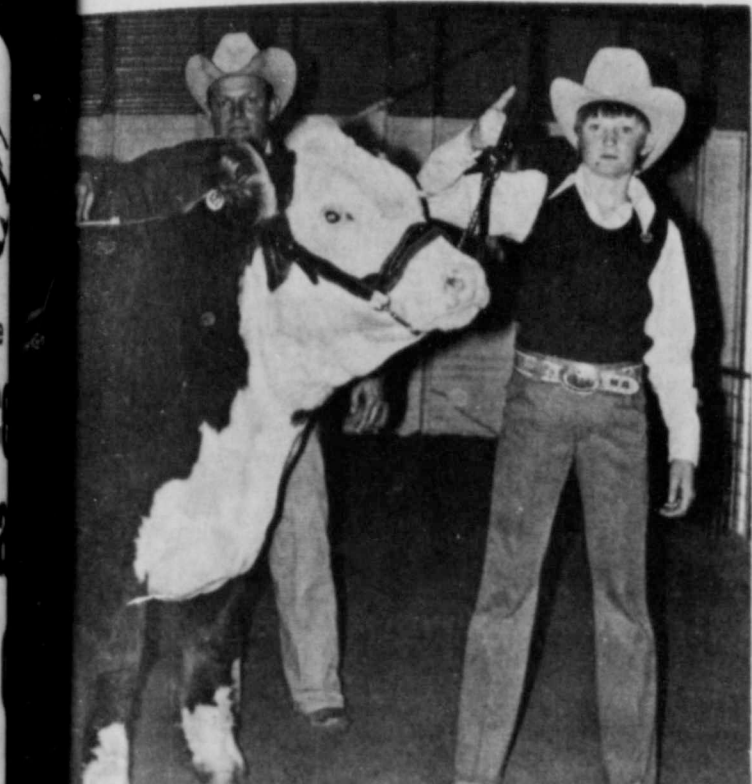

Atomic Energy Program

Set At LHS

COLLEGE STATION — Lockney High School students will view a demonstration March 14 of atomic energy and its uses. A program titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint them with principles and sources of nuclear energy. Its role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research will be explained. Sponsored by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering, the program is conducted by Orlan L. Ihms. Using student terms, he will describe structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion. Ihms will employ special electronic equipment to show how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity, plus other applica-

tions. Use of radioisotopes in life process studies, disease diagnosis and treatment and other sciences will be shown too.

The demonstrator-lecturer will also go before Lockney High science classes for a chalkboard talk. It will cover atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers, among other topics.

A two-degree graduate of Texas A&M, Ihms is specially trained in nuclear science. He has traveled over Texas 3 1/2 years presenting "This Atomic World."

The program is a joint effort of TAMU, Oak Ridge Associated Universities and the Atomic Energy Commission.

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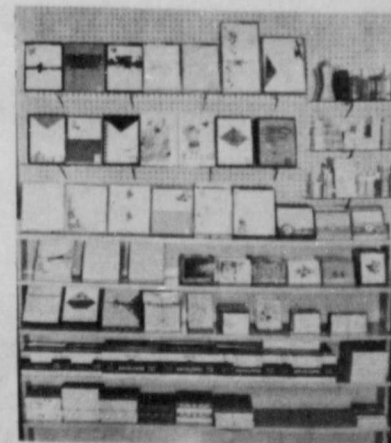
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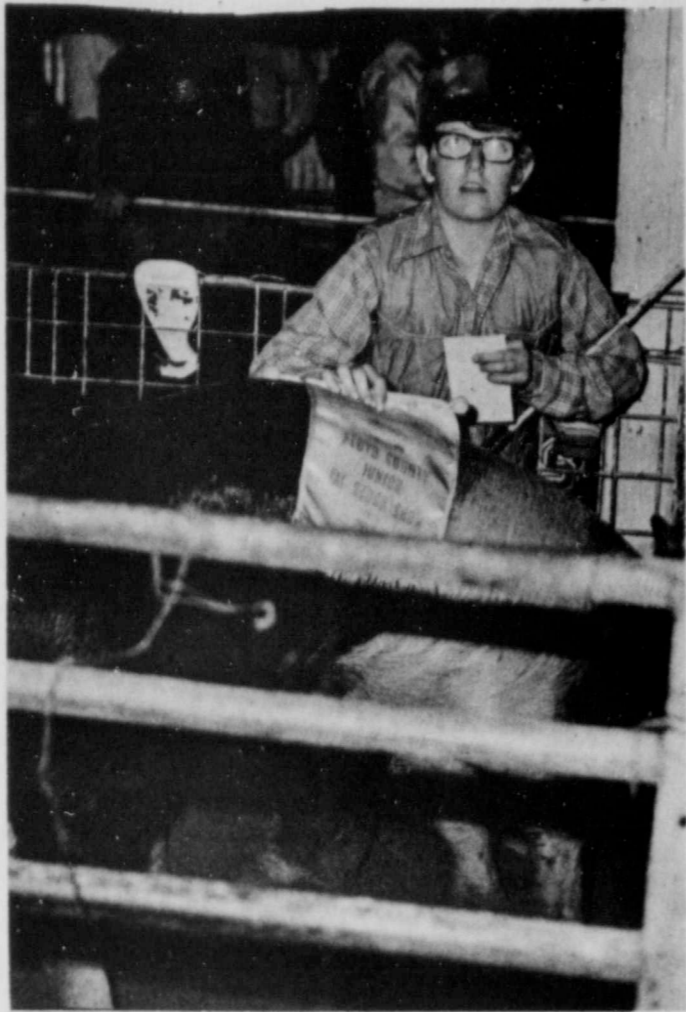

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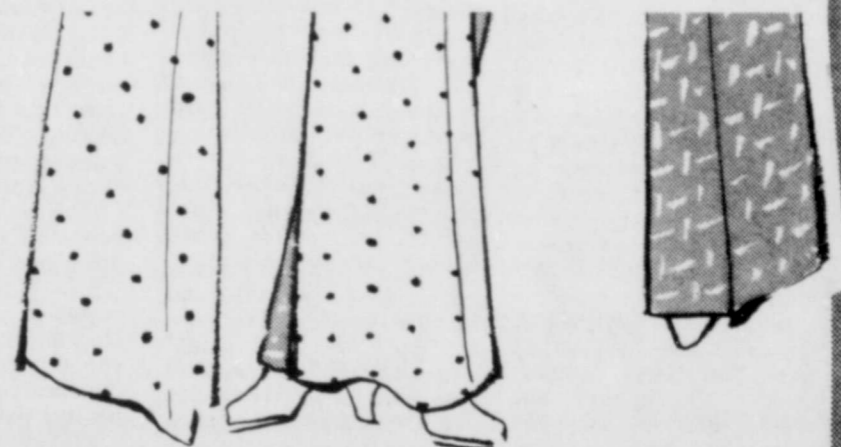

POLICEWOMEN... are now on patrol. Since 1969, Metropolitan Police of the District of Columbia has been a leader among the nation's police departments in expanding employment opportunities for women. The assignment in 1972 of a substantial number of newly hired women to the most important of all police jobs, the job of patrol, broke the national barrier which had limited all but a few female officers to "policewomen's work."

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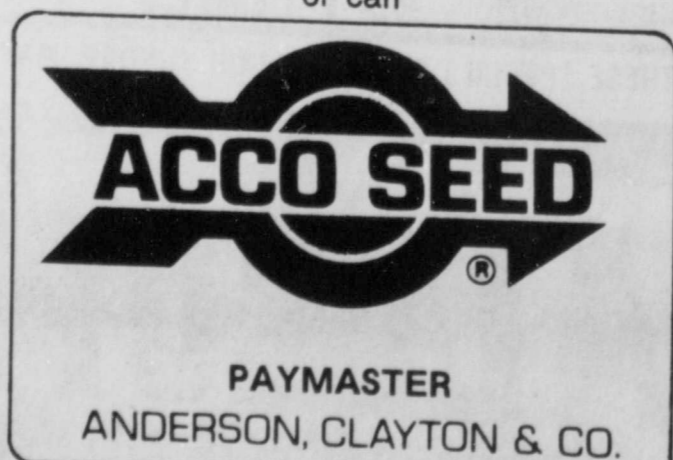
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PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

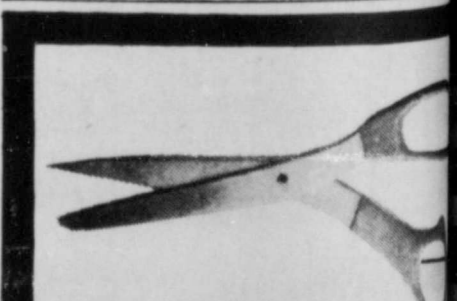
Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."



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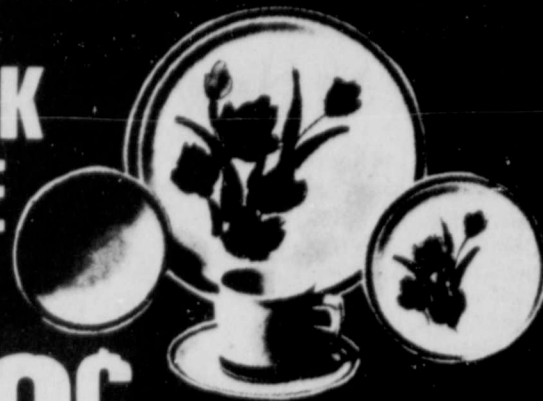

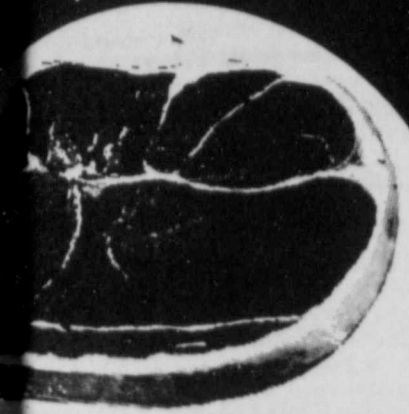

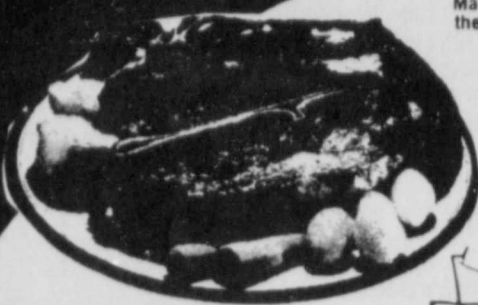

Floyd Farmers Eligible For Federal Crop Insurance

Farmers in Floyd County are eligible for increased benefits under the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance programs on cotton and grain sorghum for the 1975 crop.

Burl Lyles, field representative from the District Office at Lubbock, said today that insured farmers are now able to value their guaranteed production under the FCIC programs at a 17-40 percent higher level than a year ago depending upon which crop is insured.

The highest increase is in the cotton program where the price paid for losses was raised to 35 cents a pound from previous high of 25 cents (or 28 cents, for some counties). Increases have been made in the grain sorghum program with prices up to \$2.50 a hundredweight from \$2.00 a year ago.

"These changes have been made to help insurance coverage keep pace with rising farm production expenses in the past two years," Lyles says.

As production costs — including fertilizer, seed, labor, chemicals and machinery — continue to increase at a rapid pace, it is more necessary than ever for Floyd County farmers to

protect against crop destruction hazards beyond their control. This is especially true if borrowed money is at stake, he says.

Lyles will be in the County for a limited time advising farmers of the FCIC program changes for 1975 and taking applications from those interested in participating in the U.S. Department of Agriculture volunteer program.

During the 1974 growing season more than 12,000 farm units were insured in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico with Federal Crop Insurance protecting \$47.5 million worth of growing crops on nearly one million acres.

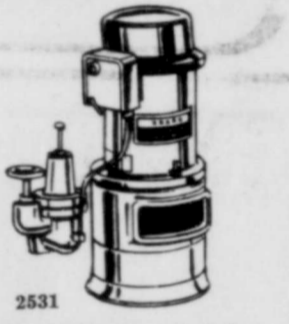

He received general training as a light weapons infantryman and as a mortar and recoilless rifle crewman, in addition to specialized weapons instruction.

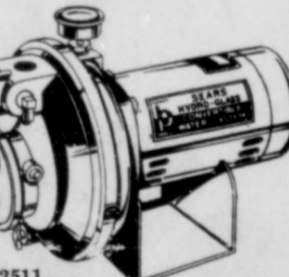
He also was taught the proper use of high explosives and the placement, detection and disarming of mines.

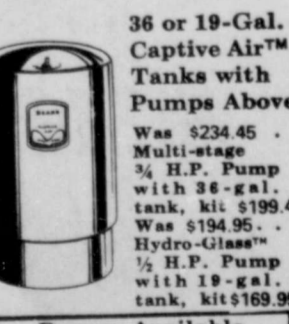

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RESTORATION OF THE CHURCH

The Apostles of Christ were led by God's Holy Spirit "into all truth" (John 14:26; 16:13). What they wrote was "inspired" (meaning God breathed) 2 Timothy 3:16, 17, and "revealed" says Ephesians 3:1-7 and I Corinthians 2:8-13. Therefore what they wrote becomes our standard, what we are obligated today to follow exactly. What they taught and what they did we must do and teach if we are to meet God's approval.

During the late 1800's and early 1900's those men leading the restoration movement re-discovered this truth. Barton Stone and others issued "The Last Will and Testament of the Springfield Presbytery." In it they pointed out that according to the scriptures each congregation of the Lord's people have the right of self government, they protested against religious division and party splits, and insisted that the Bible be accepted as the sole authority in religion. In each of these areas they took the Biblical stand as we must do.

Each of these are taught plainly in God's Word, these are Apostolic "revealed" and "inspired" teachings for the church today that these men re-discovered. Consider the following: Acts 14: 23 and Acts 20:17-35 as well as other scriptures show each congregation had elders to do the "ruling" and "overseeing" and there was no church organization nor church ruling body greater than the local church. I Corinthians 1:10-13 and 3:1-6 as well as other passages teach we are not to be divided in what we teach or believe in spiritual matters. II Timothy 3:16, 17; I Thessalonians 2: 13; II Peter 1:3, 4; and Revelation 22:18 19 as well as other passages show that the Bible is the sole and only authority in religious matters.

Thus those men and others came to this conclusion: Where the Bible speaks, we speak; where the Bible is silent, we are silent. That must be our conclusion and our practice.

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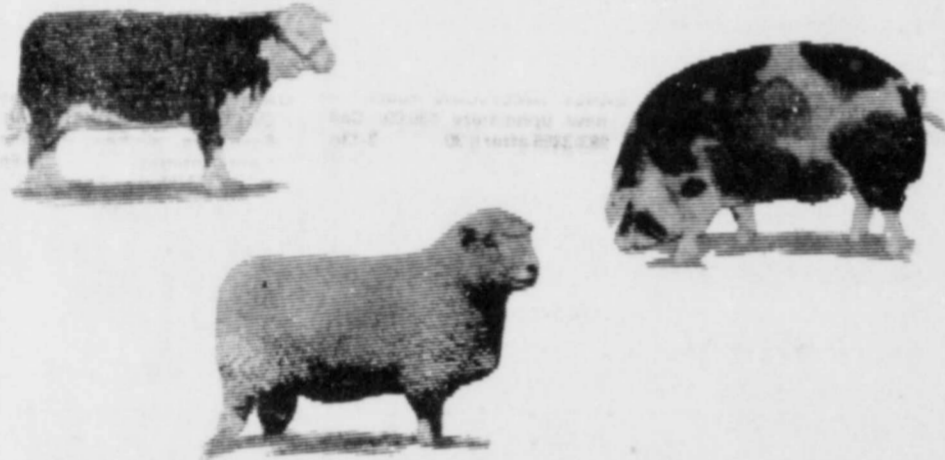
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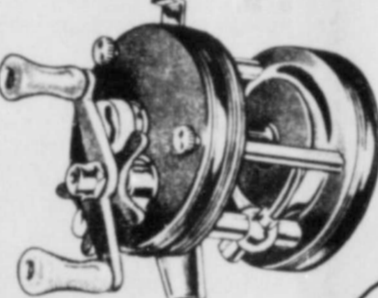

Some Veterans Eligible For VGLI

An estimated 2.7 million Vietnam-era veterans separated from April 2, 1970 through July 31, 1974 are eligible for new low-cost Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI), but they must apply before August 2, 1975. The new program is designed as interim protection during readjustment to civilian life, according to the Veterans Administration.

Servicemen discharged since August 1 receive application forms automatically, but those discharged before the insurance became available must apply. Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, said.

Nonrenewable, five-year term coverage is available in \$5,000 increments up to \$20,000. Monthly premium for the maximum coverage is \$3.40 for veterans aged 34 and under and \$6.80 for those 35 and over.

Former servicemen may convert Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to VGLI without medical examination if applications are received within 120 days of separation. Applications after that time must include evidence of good health. This requirement is waived for veterans with VA-rated, service-connected disabilities.

Application forms are available from the Waco VA Regional Office, 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, and veterans service organizations. Completed forms and premiums should be sent to the Office of Servicemen's Group Life Insurance, 22 Washington Street, Newark, N.J. 07102.
