More Floyd People In Government Jobs

NEW YORK — How many Floyd County residents are holding down local government jobs?

How does the number so-employed locally compare, relative to population, with that in other communities?

A comprehensive survey of public employment, covering all parts of the

country, has just been released by the Department of Commerce, based upon data gathered in connection with its latest Census of Governments.

It lists the number of people on public payrolls in the various divisions of local government — county, township, municipality, school district and special district. Federal and state employees are treated separately.

It shows that in Floyd County, after converting part-time workers to their full-time equivalent so that inter-county comparisons can be made, there are approximately 33 full-time employees or their equivalent locally for every 1,000 residents.

This is a larger operating force than is found in most places in the United States, where the average is 32 per 1,000 population. Among local communities in the State of Texas the average is also 33 per 1,000.

As for the actual count, the report shows a total of 360 equivalent full-time workers on public payrolls in the county.

With regard to the payroll to operate the local governments, it has been running somewhat lower in Floyd County than in most parts of the United States. Whether the services rendered were more productive or less so is not taken into account.

The total payroll in the month when the census was taken represented a cost equal to \$17.18 per local resident.

Nationally, the cost of meeting such payrolls averaged \$25.16 per capita per month. In the State of Texas it was \$20.24.

If all public employment — Federal, state and local — were taken into account, it would be found that one person out of every six in the nation is on some government payroll, according to the Tax Foundation.

It places the current public payroll at more than \$135 billion a year, up 60 percent in the last five years.

Floydada's tennis team travelled to Slaton Thursday where they had no trouble winning seven out of eight matches. Most of the matches were pro sets.

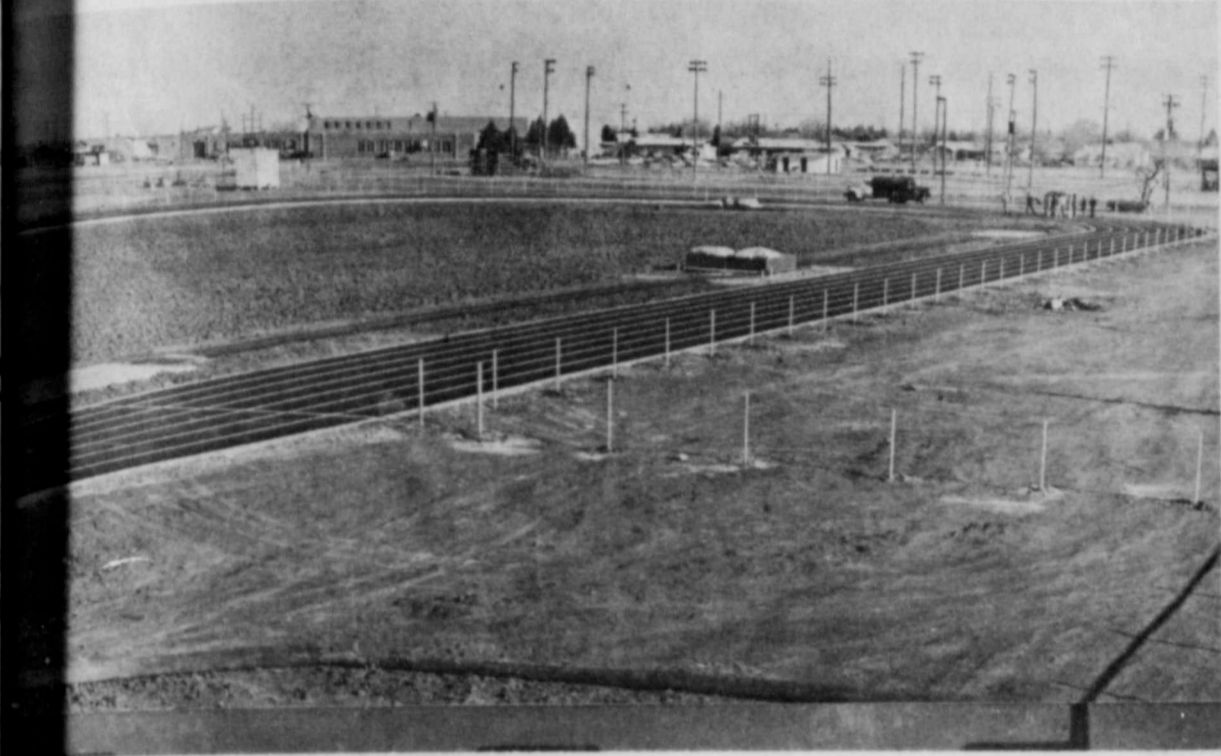

Floyd Outlay For Cigarettes

NEW YORK, March 15 — What do you have residents of Floyd County do with their smoking habits in 1975?

How much does the average Floyd County smoker spend for cigarettes?

local people swore off completely, some cut down on the number they smoked and some turned to cigars and pipes as a substitute.

More recently, however, despite the barrage of medical reports in subsequent years linking cigarettes with heart disease and other illnesses, they have been puffing away at a near-record rate.

Figures released by the Government, by the Tobacco Tax Council and by others depict the trend in each section of the nation.

Cigarette sales in Floyd County in the past year came to approximately 1,262,000 packs, according to a breakdown of regional totals reported by industry sources.

In terms of the local population over age 18, this was equal to 173 packs per person.

It was a lower rate than was found in most areas. The average throughout the United States was 214 packs. It was 183 in the West South Central States.

Although most health authorities believe the case against smoking has been well proved, the tobacco industry maintains that the evidence is merely statistical and that no cause and effect relationship has been properly documented.

Despite the steady increase in taxes imposed on cigarettes by Federal, state and many local governments, making smoking more costly, sales have been on the rise in the last few years and are within two percent of their all-time high.

The biggest increase since 1970 has been among teenage girls. They now smoke nearly as much as the boys.

How much does the average Floyd County smoker spend for cigarettes?

Approximately \$87.50 a year, it is estimated.

The total bill, for the community as a whole, was close to \$639,000 last year.

The experience in Russia was found to be very meaningful tho the group did not stay in homes there. They found Russian youth friendly, staying in collective homes when not in school, as most parents are employed. Women do all types of hard labor in Russia. Mrs. Craig said, including street repairs, street cleaning and mowing grass in parks.

Kathy related to club members that by far her most outstanding experience on the trip were the people themselves. She said

people are basically the same everywhere and they were received in each country as an individual.

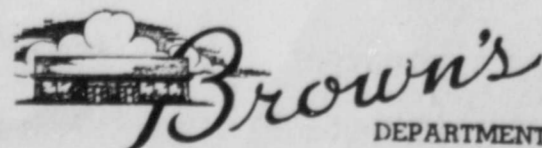

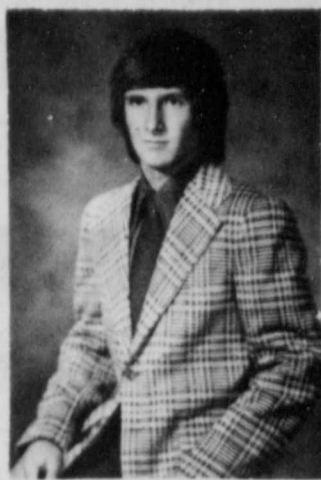

Hunting, Fishing And Trapping Proposal Meeting Wednesday

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has set the time and date for public hearings on proposed regulations of particular interest to sportsmen in Texas.

Individuals interested in hearing the new proposals and wishing to make comments about these items should be present at the county courthouse in Floydada at 2 p.m. on March 26, 1975.

The department holds these hearings every year to gather information concerning proposed hunting, fishing and trapping regulations.

As the result of action by the Texas legislature, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department commission is responsible for the setting of seasons, bag limits, and means and methods of taking wildlife resources in Texas.

All comments made at each hearing will be recorded and presented to the Parks and Wildlife Commission for their consideration at a later date.

Texas game wardens and biologists have been gathering pertinent information during the 1974 hunting, fishing and trapping seasons. This information is studied, discussed and it will be presented as a new proposal at each hearing.

Each meeting will be headed by a hearing officer, an inland fisheries biologist, a wildlife biologist and a law enforcement official.

Upon approval of these proposals by the Parks and Wildlife Commission, the proposals will become law and listed in the new 1975-76

hunting, fishing and trapping regulations to be available prior to the start of the 1975 season.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department invites anyone having comments about wildlife proposals or wishing to hear the new proposals to attend their county hearing.

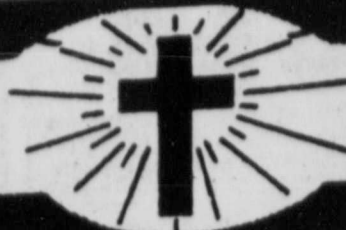

A few years ago one of the popular songs expressed the greatest need of man with the words, "What The World Needs Now Is Love." With increasing turmoil and conflicts that need becomes greater with each passing year. Selfishness is the predominate attitude. Love is the best antidote for selfishness. The world recognizes the need for love and desires love yet the world is full of hate.

Christianity provides the answer to this world need. The fundamental principle of the Christian message is love - the fundamental principle of Christian conduct is love. This is not to imply that every professing Christian demonstrates this principle. If that were so, this would be a much proclaimed God's love for man: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." This is the kind of love that seeks the welfare of those who are loved.

The ministry and teachings of Jesus were based on this kind of love. He made it clear that all the law could be met by this kind of love - love for God and love for man. During his final days he gave a new commandment to his Apostles: "That ye love one another." There doesn't seem to be anything new about that commandment, but new quality came with his next statement: "As I have loved you, that ye also love one another." This adds the greater quality of Christian love which is to the point of self-sacrifice. Jesus went on to say that it is by this kind of love we prove to the world we are really his disciples.

Finally, consider the conditional statement of Jesus, "If ye love Me you will keep my commandments," If we really love him, the natural result will be obedience. If you love Him, search the Scriptures and be obedient to His commands.

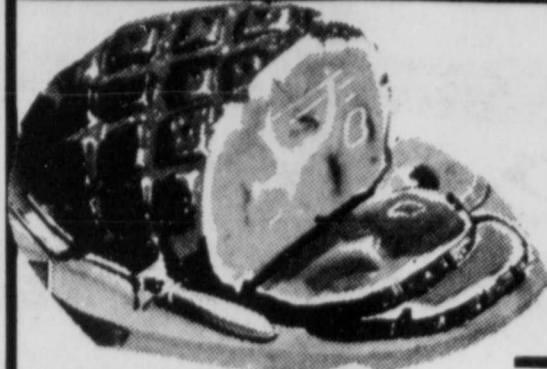

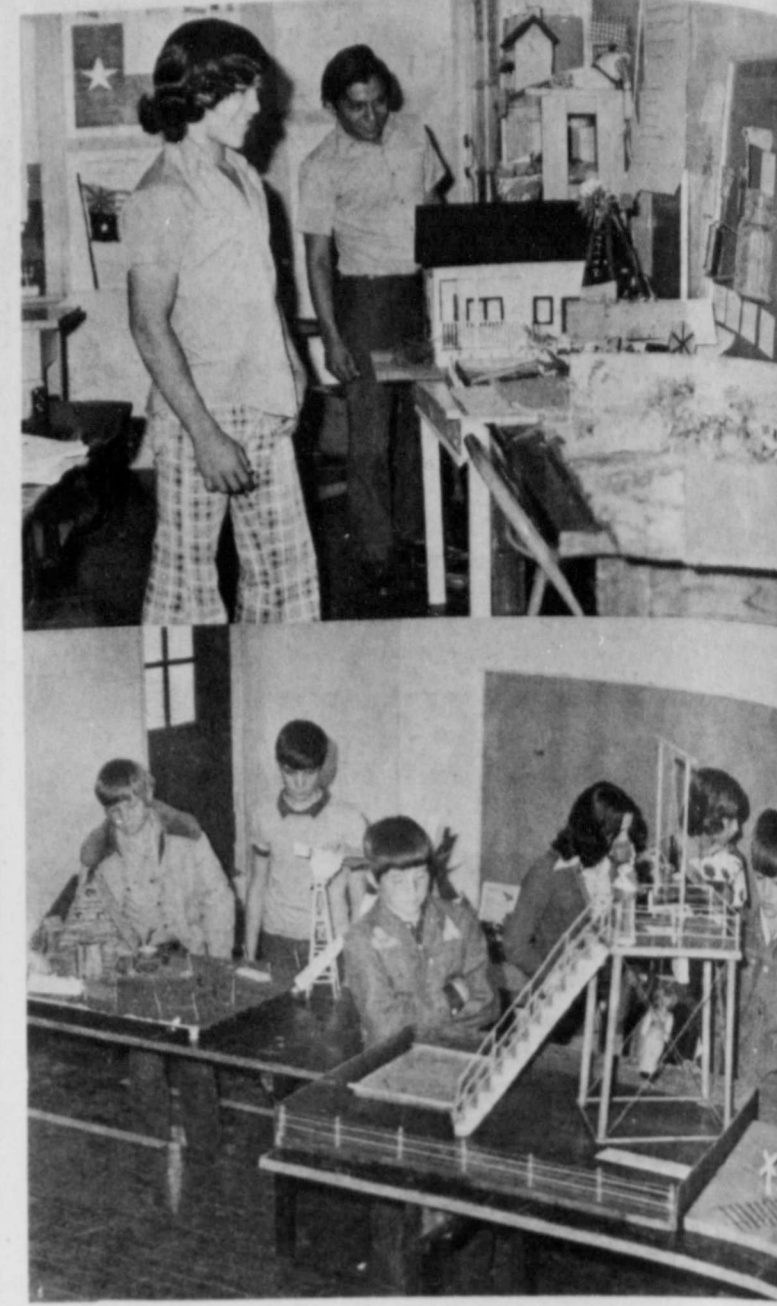

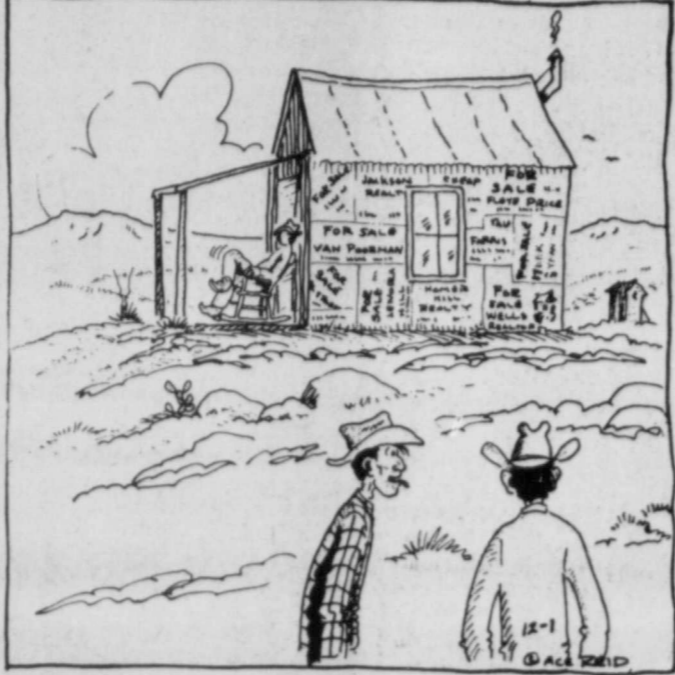
