## School, Hospital, City Elections Saturday

The voting places will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. with the city council and mayor's election being held at the city hall. The school board voting place will be in the county courtroom of the courthouse...the Caprock Hospital board election will be in the judge's

office.

Saturday is also election day for school board members at Dougherty and South Plains schools.

The election is to elect two individuals for city council, two for the school board and two for the hospital

board. Two places are to be filled on the Dougherty School Board of Trustees and three at South Plains School.

There is no opposition against Parnell Powell, who is seeking re-election for the office of Mayor of Floydada. Jerry Thompson and Wayne Russell, whose terms are up on the city council, are seeking re-election with no opposition; Laron Fulton is running unopposed for a seat on the hospital board, along with Dallas Ramsey, who is seeking re-election. The term of Bill Daniel is also up but he is not seeking re-election.

There will be a contest in the Floydada school board election as two candidates have filed for the office of Mrs. Lon Davis, who is not seeking re-election. Louis Bearden and Harvey Allen have filed and Gene Arwine, whose term expires, is seeking re-election.

Terms of Robert Ward and Kent Covington are up as trustees of the Dougherty School. James Ray Cage is

the only candidate for the place. At South Plains terms of three are up and all are seeking re-election, Dean Stewart, Dale West and Fred Marble.

There had been no absentee votes cast in any of the elections Friday.

**AMENDMENT ELECTION**  
Absentee voting on the two amendments to be voted on April 22, starts April 2 at the Floyd County Court House. The two proposed Constitutional Amendments are for or against:

No. 1 - Revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals, and

No. 2 - The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

## 'Wetbacks' Picked Up In Floyd

According to a report by phone yesterday from W. E. Binegar of the Border Patrol in Lubbock, 69 Mexican Wetbacks have been picked up in Floyd county since January 1, 1975.

He also reported 12 had been picked up in Crosby county.

Using, in some instances, airplanes to spot the Mexican farm laborers the arrests and investigations have been stepped up drastically as Texas' unemployment increases. Floyd farmers have had their homes and farms searched as the arrests are made.

Some farmers have lost farm hands who have worked for them several years...who have established their homes and families in this county.

Binegar said that in the 28 counties that his office patrols in the Lubbock area 391 Mexican aliens were picked up in the month of March. Of these, 240

were employed, 109 in agriculture, 128 in industry.

He said the average amount arrested now is 300 per month in the 28 county area.

He said 946 had been arrested since January 1, 1975.

Binegar said that there is a possibility that in the future employers will be fined for hiring Mexican Wetbacks. It has been reported that January unemployment in the Laredo labor market area at the exceptionally high rate of 19.2 percent and unemployment generally high along the border, and the problem of Mexican workers migrating to Texas and entering the labor market of the Southwest has become a "mounting issue for the seventies."

### High Court Changes Collection Procedures Of Commodity Assessments

The Texas Supreme Court reaffirmed an earlier ruling regarding the Texas commodity check-off law on March 26.

"The ruling will require each producer to sign a form indicating his participation or exemption in the check-off program at the time of settlement," explained Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. "This is the only change in the law," Harp added.

Commissioner John C. White pointed out the judgment results in requiring the commodity boards to make only one change in their collection procedures.

"Collection can now be made only after each producer has indicated his desire with respect to whether he wishes to have an assessment made or not," White said.

He added that no other changes in the administration of the program are necessary and that first

handlers who are the collectors of the assessments are still responsible for making collections exactly in the same manner as in the past.

Expressing appreciation for cooperation shown in the past by grain processors to TGSPB, Harp pointed out that 96 percent of the farmers in TGSPB's area have been participating in the TGSPB program.

"This strong support has

enabled TGSPB to accomplish many goals benefitting the sorghum industry. TGSPB grants accelerated research that provided greenbug resistance in sorghum. TGSPB nutritional research resulted in higher loan and target prices. And overseas promotion by TGSPB developed strong export markets," Harp said.

"Our record of only four to five percent of producers

asking for refunds indicates farmers want TGSPB's program of research, education and market development," Harp continued.

New forms are being mailed to each grain processor in TGSPB's 29-county area. The forms must be signed by each farmer at the time of settlement, showing whether he wishes to participate in the TGSPB program.

"Except for this new requirement, the procedure for settlement will be handled exactly as in the past with the completed forms and money due at the TGSPB office by the 10th of the month following settlement," Harp concluded.

#### VA NEWS

The Veterans Administration today reminded widows of veterans whose pension and compensation payments were terminated after their remarriage that a 1970 law allows restoration of these benefits if they become widowed a second time.

Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director, noted that prior to enactment of PL 91-376, VA benefits for a widow were permanently discontinued if she remarried.

This policy applied to VA pensions paid to needy widows of veterans who died of nonservice-connected disabilities and to dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) paid to widows of those killed in military service or who died of service-connected causes.

Widows interested in regaining these benefits should contact regional Veterans Administration

Hollums has received his juris doctorate from Texas Tech's school of law and has established his law practice in Floydada. He also is serving this district's Texas Senator to the Texas Senate, Ray Farabee. Her husband was the one who made her first aware of how important the conservation of soil and water is to the High Plains.

His father and his grandfather saw the Plains without irrigation, then with irrigation and now the slow return to less irrigation due to the lowering water table.

In her classroom, there is not a specific unit on conservation itself, although the book is written from an ecological viewpoint and almost every chapter has some emphasis on the interrelationship of all the environment and the delicate balance of life. She invites a guest speaker from the Soil Conservation Service to speak about saving the soil, water and plants. The slide presentation leads to discussion of conserving all our natural resources and environment by studying soil formation, soil types, importance of humus, relation of the use of water and land according to what it can produce, the results of poor use of the land and water, the work of the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District, work of the USDA, Soil Conservation Service, and other related activities as food resources in a starving world, the oil crises, and endangered plant and wild-life species. She believes only by teaching and reaching America's youth will conservation continue to be understood.

According to G.L. Fawver, chairman of the board, Mrs. Hollum's entry based on the outstanding teaching of conservation has been sent to the Texas Conservation Award Program in Fort Worth, Texas to be judged on a regional and state level. The winners will be announced at a later date on these entries.

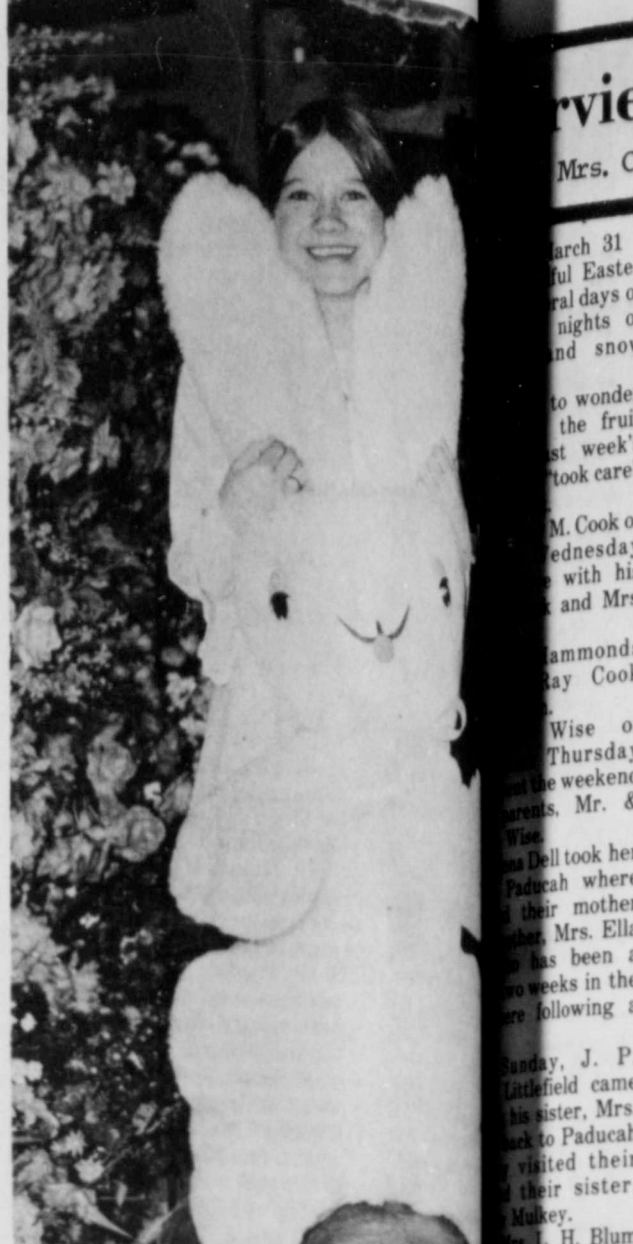

## Floydada Junior High Band To Participate In Festival

Approximately 3500 junior high school musicians representing 65 different school organizations will converge on the campuses of Cisco Junior College and Cisco High School Friday and Saturday, April 4-5, for the sixteenth annual CISCO JUNIOR MUSIC FESTIVAL for school bands, orchestras, and choirs.

Among those participating in the festival will be the Floydada Junior High Band under the direction of Dennis Teasdale.

The 60-plus junior high musical organizations participating in the two-day festival will enter concert and sight-reading competition evaluation as groups, and individuals and small groups will enter solo, ensemble, and twirling competition.

The organizations will be rated for their performances on a scale of I to V, with I being the highest, or "superior" rating and V being the lowest. Bands,

orchestras, or choral groups receiving I ratings will be awarded trophies, with a "Sweepstakes" trophy going to any group earning a I in both concert and sight-reading. Organizations will receive tape recorded criticisms from concert judges and written or taped criticisms from a sight-reading judge.

All band and orchestra concert playing will be in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium at Cisco Junior College and all choral performances will be at the Cisco High School Auditorium. Concerts are open to the public. There is no charge for admission, but sight-reading and solo and ensemble events are not open to the public.

## What One Person Can Do

FRANZ JAGERSTATTER Farmer

In 1943, two things set Franz Jagerstatter apart from his neighbors in St. Radegund, Austria. The peasant farmer was considered too pious because he went to Mass every day; and he opposed the Nazi regime.

Franz had been the only resident of the village to vote against Austria's union with Nazi Germany five years earlier. And he refused to collaborate in any way. He avoided Nazi meetings, contributed to none of their collections, turned down their farm subsidies and family assistance programs.

Married and the father of three girls, all under the age of six, Franz resisted pressure from his wife, his mother, his friends and his parish priest. The local bishop tried to talk the young farmer out of his stand. They reminded him of his responsibilities to his family and his duties as a citizen. But he refused to budge from his conviction that the Nazi government

was immoral and was fighting an unjust war.

When Franz refused military induction, he was jailed and condemned as a traitor. The prison chaplain counseled him to accept military service. The night before his death, he told the priest: "I cannot and may not take an oath in favor of a government that is fighting an unjust war."

On August 9, 1943, he paid for his convictions with his life. Franz Jagerstatter, 37, was beheaded in the Berlin-Brandenburg prison.

Few are required to die for their convictions. But all are called to be men and women of conscience.

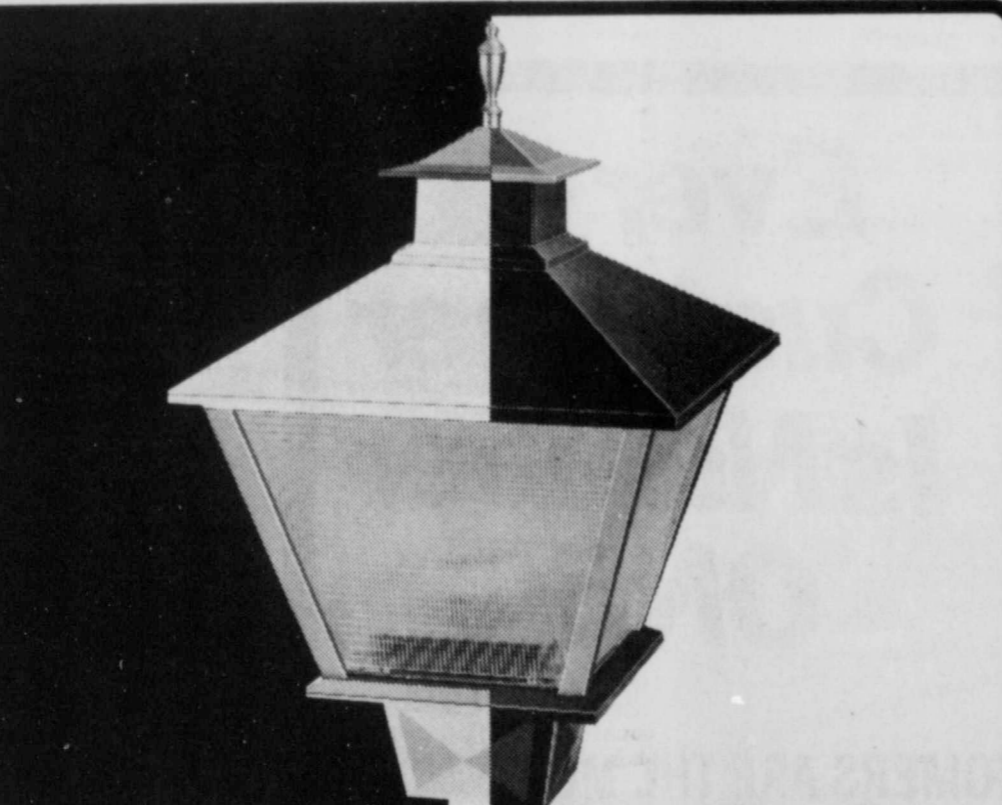

### If Proposals Pass Drunks Will Go To The Hospital Rather Than Jail

In the future, Floydada city policemen will take drunks to the emergency room at the hospital here for treatment instead of to jail if proposals before the legislature become law.

The state proposals under consideration would provide a means to enforce Public Law 93-282 if passed by congress.

In summary, the law requires a peace officer to take an intoxicated person to the detoxification center if he has committed no crime other than being drunk.

Since Floydada has no detoxification center, officers would take the person to the hospital emergency room.

The law requires the hospital to accept the patient or lose federal aid paid through Medicare and Medicaid.

If neither a detoxification center nor an emergency room is available, the officer can take the person to the jail and hold him in a cell while he notifies the detoxification center.

It makes the peace officer differentiate between the drunk who needs to be controlled until he sobers up and the medical problem of the really chronic alcoholic.

The problem for the policeman is to decide whether to take the drunk to

jail and consider him a law-breaker until the fact that he needs medical help is determined, or should he take the person to the hospital for treatment until it can be proved that he needs to be confined.

A hint of what is coming is found between the covers of "A Source Document For Alcohol Education In The Central Hospital."

This book is a course outline complete with lesson plans on treating alcoholics.

Curriculum includes classes on admittance of a drunk, evaluation, treatment techniques, the role of the nurse and her relationship to the drunken patient, medical information, patient-personnel relationship and what welfare or social work groups can assist.

### Floyd Philosopher Private School Teaching Leaders How To Dodge Television Questions

I have been reading articles in the newspapers and magazines about how school kids aren't learning as much as they used to—that is, about scholastic things, not some other things. On those other things they may be ahead of most of us.

But on scholastics, over the past 12 years the average grade on the Scholastic Aptitude Test high school graduates take before entering college has dropped 38 points, based on tests of one million students, so you can see if anybody in Floyd County made a low grade he's not by himself, the situation prevails all over the nation for high school graduates entering college. There are no entrance requirements for Congress.

This decline in students' knowledge has a lot of people worried and there's considerable clamor to do something about it. Some want to go back to basic teaching, some want to get better teachers, some better school boards, and some just wring their hands. Nobody apparently has thought of getting better students.

But I think I have the solution. There is a private school in New York whose sole purpose is to teach politicians and leaders of industry and business how to answer questions on television. Well, it's not exactly how to answer questions, it's how to dodge them without getting flustered or stepping on anybody's toes.

For example, you ask any candidate now running for the nomination for President in 1976 if he'd accept say George Wallace or George Meany or Ralph Nadir as a running

mate and if he has been trained properly it'll take him five minutes to discuss the democratic process and how far in the future 1976 is and what the country needs to do unite and this nation is big enough for all shades of opinion and what's the next question.

Or if the question is about something he doesn't know anything about, he'll say "it'd be inappropriate for me to go into that."

Or ask say an oil executive if he thinks a 100 per cent increase in profits by his company during the oil embargo last year wasn't a little high and if he's been to that school he'll give you a string of statistics so long that by the time he's through everybody has forgotten what the question was and is sorry it was asked.

Listen to "Meet the Press" or "Face The Nation" and see if you don't think they should be re-named "Dodge The Question" and "Two-Face The Nation."

I'll tell you, a man's got to go to a mighty good school to answer a question about Viet Nam by discussing the Alaska pipe line, or one about what he'd do if he were President by deploring unemployment.

I've often thought reporters ought to stop asking people on television oral questions, they ought to just submit a true-or-false written exam and read off the answers. Anyway, if that school in New York can attain such success with public figures, it might be interesting to see it have a go at public education. I've never seen a school so efficient in reaching its goals.

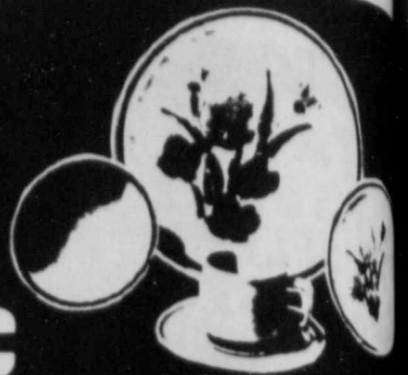
