## Federal Tax Bite \$7,828,000 Locally

Day, April 15th, rapidly approaching, residents of Floyd County are busy

doing their arithmetic these days. They are working their way down to the bottom line on their reports, which will tell them just how much their Federal income taxes will total this

Will they be bigger or smaller than they were last year, when their tax payments, including the amount collected via withholding, came to approximately \$7,907,000?

That was the total received from the local area, according to an unofficial breakdown of the statewide collection figures, recently released by the Treasury Department. They show that personal income taxes collected in the State of Texas

added up to \$9,884,000,000 and that residents of Floyd County produced about 0.08 per cent of it. This year the tax load will be

somewhat smaller overall, according to

the Government's expectations, as detailed in the budget submitted to Congress last month.

The Administration counts on

individual tax returns, including payroll taxes, amounting to approximately \$203 billion, which is \$2 billion less than was collected last year.

In Floyd County, based upon income earned locally in 1974, this year's contribution will be nearly \$7,828,000, it is estimated. Some of it may be rebated later.

As for the following year, the budget provides for a cut in personal income taxes, the purpose being to revitalize the economy by leaving more money in the hands of the consumers.

It calls for a total of approximately \$183 billion in such taxes, down some \$20 billion from the present level.

For Floyd County residents, subject to revisions that Congress is considering, it would represent a reduction of about 10 percent in their combined tax



VEGETABLE GARDEN

Time spent in late winter and early spring to plan your vegetable garden will provide fresh vegetables for eating and preservation with less work, believes Doyle Warren, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The first important con-

sideration is to choose vegetables that the family likes best. If only one or two members of the family like a particular vegetable, it may be cheaper to buy it at the supermarket and use the garden space for those vegetables enjoyed by all. Secondly, choose those

vegetables that have a superior taste and flavor when freshly harvested as compared to the usual store bought produce. Tomatoes, sweet corn, peas and snap beans are good examples of vegetables that taste better when harvested garden

Space is another consideration, adds Warren. A small garden can provide many meals if vegetables chosen do not require a lot of garden space. Also, dwarf varieties of many vegetables

> crops are available. Warren recommends that

the inexperienced home gardener start with a relatively small garden and select vegetables that are relatively easy to grow. A garden 20 feet by 20 feet can provide abundant fresh produce for a family of three or four if managed properly. Beans, peas, tomatoes, radishes, leaf lettuce and squash are good vegetable crops for beginning garden-

Finally, a frequently overlooked consideration is the planned date of the family vacation. If at all possible, plan crops to mature before or after the vacation. Or perhaps a neighbor or friend will be willing to take care of the garden during your absence for a small part of the crop.

So, take time now to begin planning the home garden, suggests Warren. Sketch out the garden plot, list the crops to be grown, and indicate the number of rows, distance between rows and anticipated planting dates of each vegetable.

In developing a garden plan, keep these points in

(1) Group crops according to height to prevent shading lower growing plants; (2) Plant taller growing

plants on the north side of the garden so they will not shade smaller ones; (3) If the garden is on a

slope, run the rows across the slope, not up and down, to help hold moisture and reduce erosion; (4) Group together small growing, quick maturing crops; (5) Successive plantings

may be made to increase productivity (remove early maturing crops as soon as they are harvested and plant a second crop in the same space); (6) And practice crop

rotation if possible. Planning prior to planting a garden will go a long way in avoiding a lot of unnec-

cessary work and possible problems later in the year, contends Warren. If you need garden seed, contact a local 4-H club member. They are selling







planted. Peanut seeding is underway in South Texas. Wheat is making excellent growth on the High and Low Plains. Livestock movement off wheat and oat fields to feedlots has peaked. Livestock condition generally is fair to poor, as grazing becomes short in many areas. Heavy culling is underway in the north and eastern areas of the state and death losses continue to run above normal.

One of the few crops which is behind schedule in planting is rice. Less than five per cent of the crop has been planted in the state. Vegetable crops are making good progress. Cabbage, carrot and onion plants are being harvested in the San Antonio-Winter Garden area as well as the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Peaches are blooming in most areas of the state and pecan trees are budding in north central Texas. Citrus harvest is about completed.

WHERE ARE THOSE ONE MILLION acres that won't be planted to cotton in Texas this year going? Apparently, they will go into sorghum. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes that cotton acres are expected to be down one million acres this year from last year, and that sorghum acres are to be up one million acres from last year.

Cotton acres this year are expected to total 4.3 million acres compared to 5.3 million acres in 1974. Sorghum acres are expected to total 8.5 million acres compared to 7.5 million acres in 1974.

Wheat acres in the state are set at 6.5 million acres compared to 5.6 a year ago.

APRIL 9 will be the date for a special winter wheat forecast for Texas only. The report is to be issued to give producers more information about prospects for the wheat

In 1974, USDA decreed that whenever crop substitution occurred between two crops, total actual production of both crops would be combined to determine eligibility for disaster payment. Under this ruling, many producers who overplanted their feed grain, wheat or cotton allotments and underplanted one or both the others were denied payment even after suffering total or near total loss of one or more crops. Normal or above normal production of one program crop was used to offset disastrous yields on other crops, making farms where this occurred ineligible for payment on failed acreage.

PCG, enlisting support from the Producer Steering Committee of the National Cotton Council, Lubbock's Grain Sorghum Producers Association and others, loudly protested the inequities fostered by these rules at a meeting with USDA officials, including Seneschal, in Washington December 10 and

And, unlike 1974 rules, Seneschal said "For 1975, producers will not be charged for planting another crop on wheat or feed grain acreage which subsequently fails," and "Settlement in such cases will be based on the approved production, if any, on the failed wheat or feed grain acreage.

Another major complaint registered by PCG members in 1974 was against the use of Federal Crop Insurance Corporation personnel, many of whom were unfamiliar with area crops and conditions, as appraisers to inspect weather-damaged crops. This too appears to have been corrected. Seneschal's Long-term letter said "In 1975 appraisal and loss adjustment work will be handled totally by ASCS personnel except on farms covered by FCIC contract. Losses on FCIC insured farms will be adjusted by FCIC personnel as in 1974.

## Indicators Hint Better Cotton

RALEIGH--The economic recession shows signs of bottoming out, and that should mean a better market

for cotton producers. That is the substance of a study of several economic indicators reported in the February "Cotton Summary" published by Cotton Incorporated, the research and marketing company of U. S. cotton producers.

"Cautious optimism" is the way David Cox, vice president for economic research and development at Cotton Incorporated, views the situation for cotton producers.

Cox points to continued consumer purchasing of apparel and other textile products, textile industry efforts to control inventories, and strong anti-recession measures by foreign governments as indicators in brighter future.

The textile industry is still reacting very cautiously," Cox said. "Everyone is afraid to resume normal business operations as long as the overall industry and

general economic situation remain clouded."

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But while cotton buyers are cautious, the wait-andsee attitude cannot last forever. "Retailers and mills both realize that goods should be on the shelf when consumers want them," Cox

One factor lending optimism to the picture was a study by the Market Research Corporation of America showing that 1974 unit sales were down only 3.2 per cent from 1973 and that textile and apparel items were reasonably strong during Christmas and January.

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





#### JOB CORPS

Three young people from Texas who rose from the ranks of the disadvantaged by acquiring education and marketable skills in the Job Corps today were named to the Corps' "Hall of Fame."

Secretary of Labor, Peter J. Brennan, saluted the "Hall of Fame" winners for "exemplifying those qualities that made America great," at the observance of the Job Corps' Tenth Anniversary, in Washington, D. C.

"These outstanding young men and women are wonderful examples of how the Job Corps has helped hundreds of thousands of disadvantaged Americanyouth improve their lives," he said.

The three Job Corps "Hall of Fame" winners included Jessie Al Lane, a graduate of the Timber Lake Job Corps Center in Oregon in

At the age of twenty, he had earned his high school diploma equivalency (G.E. D.) and enough skills to qualify as an apprentice plasterer.

A working member of Local 783 in Austin, Texas, Lane has purchased a mobile home and supports his mother, brother, and a nephew.

In addition to his work, which earns him approximately \$12,000 yearly, he devotes much of his time to counseling potential and present Job Corps members and to helping recent graduates adjust to their new jobs and productive life styles.

Jean Henderson, a widow, was supporting her three children on a motel maid's pay of \$25 a week in 1967, when she enrolled at the Job Corps Center in McKinney, Texas. In less than a year, she earned a high school diploma equivalency, completed a course in office occupations, and began working at clerical occupations.

Today, she is secretary in the Dallas Regional Office of the Social Security Administration, at a salary of \$10,000 a year and owns her own

Although she is furthering her education at Dallas Junior College and teaches Sunday School, Henderson finds time to accept invitations to speak about the Job Corps on television and at business luncheons.

The final "Hall of Fame" award winner from Texas was Rosa Isela Mendoza, a nineteen year old accounting specialist in the U.S. Air Force at Nellis Air Force Base in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Rosa, the daughter of a migrant farm worker, came to the United States from Mexico when she was fourteen years old. She left the seventh grade to work with her family harvesting crops from Texas and Florida to Michigan until she enrolled in the Job Corps in 1971, at the McKinney Job Corps Center. She was placed with the Air Force by Job Corps where she learned her present skills and is permanently stationed at Nellis as a disbursement accounting specialist. She is buying her own home and is an enthusiastic recruiter for Job Corps on the side.
