Ned was one of the most courteous, friendly, positive persons I have ever known. He was a sort of soft speaking fellow...always complimentary...always thinking about something nice to say about someone.

Ned was a good sport. Several years ago he let us take his picture holding a fishing rod, so that we could superimpose a picture of a huge fish under the pole that he had supposedly caught in the dry river down by Roaring Springs. It made a good April Fool story.

He was the typical tall Texan...and 10' tall to Floyd folk.

One of my happiest recollections of Ned was singing on the same row with him in the choir. He sang bass and you should have heard the many puns and witty sayings that went on between him and Doris Drysdale between songs at practice sessions.

If Ned thought a song was too difficult for the choir, he quietly suggested to the director, "we better pass this one in."

The first time Ned was in Methodist hospital I visited him and asked about the bottle of water on the bedside table. Ned replied, "that is good old Dougherty water...I don't like this city water."

Ned exemplified the life of a true Christian...he kept the faith... He fought a good fight against the gradual destruction of cancer...some five years. After it had begun to take over his bone system he told me one day... "I get impatient, but I still have hopes that I can beat it out."

Ned loved the earth...he became a successful farmer after graduating from Texas Tech. The college years were something else, as he and his band played for South Plains people many years.

For 22 years Ned emceed the Lighthouse Electric annual meeting... he kept people laughing and made the day an enjoyable one for everyone.

Personally, we'll miss Ned in so many ways...as will everyone who knew him and loved him. Our thoughts and prayers on behalf of Lorilla and Sammy go to the loving Father who welcomes Ned home.

the city councilmen, mayor, city attorney, chamber of commerce manager, Hesperian reporter and a large group from the Della Plains area expressing their views on the way they would like for the money to be applied for and used.

The objectives of the grants are for eliminating slums and preventing the deterioration of property and community facilities of importance to the welfare of the community and restoring and preserving properties of special value for historic, architecture of esthetic reasons, more rationally utilizing land and other national resources and better arranging residential, commercial, industrial, recreational and other needed activity centers.

It was decided by the council to use the \$100,000 for paving in the Della Plains area. City officials with the help of SPAG personnel will apply for the money next week.

BIG CITIES GETTING MOST OF THE MONEY

Under the present program 80% of the Federal Funds will go to the metropolitan areas, Lubbock will receive 5.3 million (but other towns in Lubbock county like Idalou and Slaton will not receive any of the money.) Since Floydada isn't in Lubbock county, it is possible to receive the funds here.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council: Canvassed the votes of the April 5 election for mayor and councilmen;

Approved charging city residents \$1.00 month for six months (beginning May 1) for mosquito spraying;

Approved payment of \$12,000 for repair of one of the Superior engines in the light plant;

Appointed Wayne Russell Mayor Pro Tem;

Appointed the Floyd County Hesperian as official newspaper for the city;

Approved lowering water rates 40% beginning 15th of May so city residents can water their gardens and yards during the hot summer season. Lower rate continues through September 15;

Increased city resident sanitation rates from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per month and adjusted commercial users up according to volume of garbage pickup;

Appointed Chuck Holmes to take Bill Hale's place on the Floydada Housing Authority board. Hale had resigned the position;

Adopted ordinance for new speed limits on Price street and the Silverton highway in the city limits...ordinance to be published;

Appointed S. W. Ross to serve another two year term on the Mackenzie Water Authority board;

Appointed J. C. Wester as municipal court judge for a two year period.

Employed Murky Carver to be city dog warden at a salary of \$130 per month.

A long-time barber in Floydada, Joseph Paul (Slim) Looney, 86, was found dead at his home Tuesday, April 15, around 1:15 p.m. Mr. Looney had been ill for about a week and was discovered by his son, Pete Looney, of Vernon, who came through Floydada to check on his father.

Funeral rites are to be conducted this morning (Thursday) at 10:30 in the Victory Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Emmitt Clampitt, officiating, assisted by the deceased's son, Pete Looney.

A native of Fannin County, Looney was born December 5, 1888 and moved to Floyd County in 1906 from Hunt County. He and the former Lillie Mae

Littrell were married in Plainview in 1920. Looney had been a barber in Floydada some 60 years and continued to operate his shop on California Street. He was preceded in death by his wife, March 2, 1969.

He was a member of the Victory Baptist Church and the Floydada Oddfellow Lodge.

Survivors include four sons, Joseph Weldon and Lynn V., both of Albuquerque, New Mex., Ervin Paul of Lubbock and Edward E. (Pete) of Vernon; 18 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Interment will be in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

School Board Employs Teachers For Another Year

The Floydada school board devoted most of its Monday night meeting to employing school teachers for another year.

Preceding interviews with all the school system's principals about hiring teachers the board gave a silver plate with appropriate appreciation to Flo Davis in recognition of her six years of service on the board. She did not seek

re-election. Thomas Warren was re-elected president of the board and he welcomed new board member Harvey Allen. Another board member seeking re-election and elected was Gene Arwine. Arwine was elected vice president of the board and Betty Holmes secretary.

In other business board members

Travis Jones, Lawrence Stovall and Jerrold Vinson canvassed the school board election votes.

NEW TEACHER HIRED

Karen Dunn was approved to teach in the DECA department. A vacancy was made in this department when Bob Alldredge was selected to become principal of Junior High next year.

JIM POPE RESIGNS

The board accepted the resignation of coach Jim Pope effective April 18. Pope has accepted the head football coach and athletic director position for Munday schools.

TEACHERS RETIRING

Two teachers are retiring: Mrs. Ann Smith at Andrews Ward and Mrs. Thelma Horn at Della Plains. Mrs. Lean Watson is taking a leave of absence from Duncan Elementary.

Teachers who submitted their resignations included: Gay Miller at Duncan, Mrs. Valarie Kinnibrugh at Duncan and Ruth McIntosh at Jr. High.

SCHOOL FINANCES

School tax assessor-collector and business manager Claude Estes gave charts to each board member describing several finance plans for the state's schools next year. If there is no bill passed, Estes said the assessed valuation would have to be increased from 47% to 60% on an estimate that the school's financial needs would increase 10% next year.

He warned that if the Governor's plan were selected the assessed valuation might run as high as 90%. He also stated the valuation of the school district's property and real estate would be increased from the present \$73,000,000.00 to \$113,286,402 under the Governor's plan. The Governor's plan would include a small increase in beginning teacher salaries from \$6600 to \$7430. The TSTA's plan would seek \$10,000 starting salary and would

require a new state taxing law. The Governor's plan would require no new state tax (based on the Governor's estimate.)

GOVERNOR'S PLAN UNFAIR

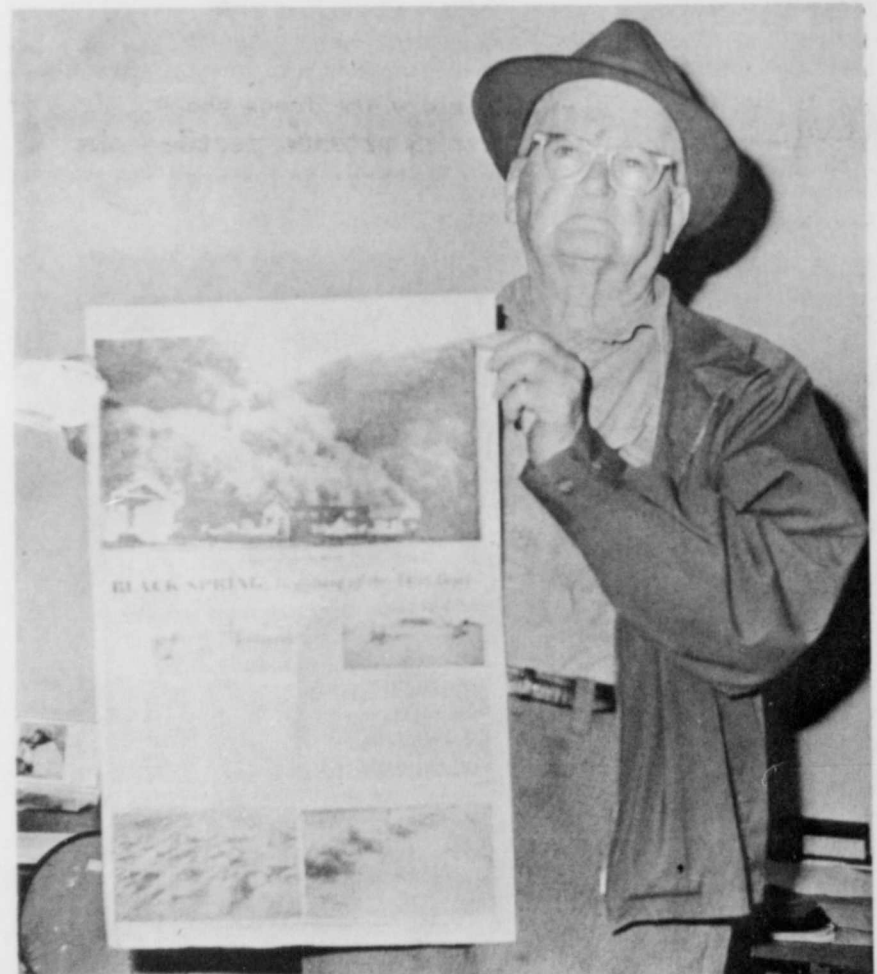
Estes said the Governor's plan would

greatly increase taxes for people in this area, while it would show less increase

to the people in the big cities. He urged everyone to contact the Legislators and voice opposition to the Governor's finance plan.

A. Promote an aggressive membership expansion drive so that the chamber may better provide the resources required to carry out the program of the chamber to the entire membership.

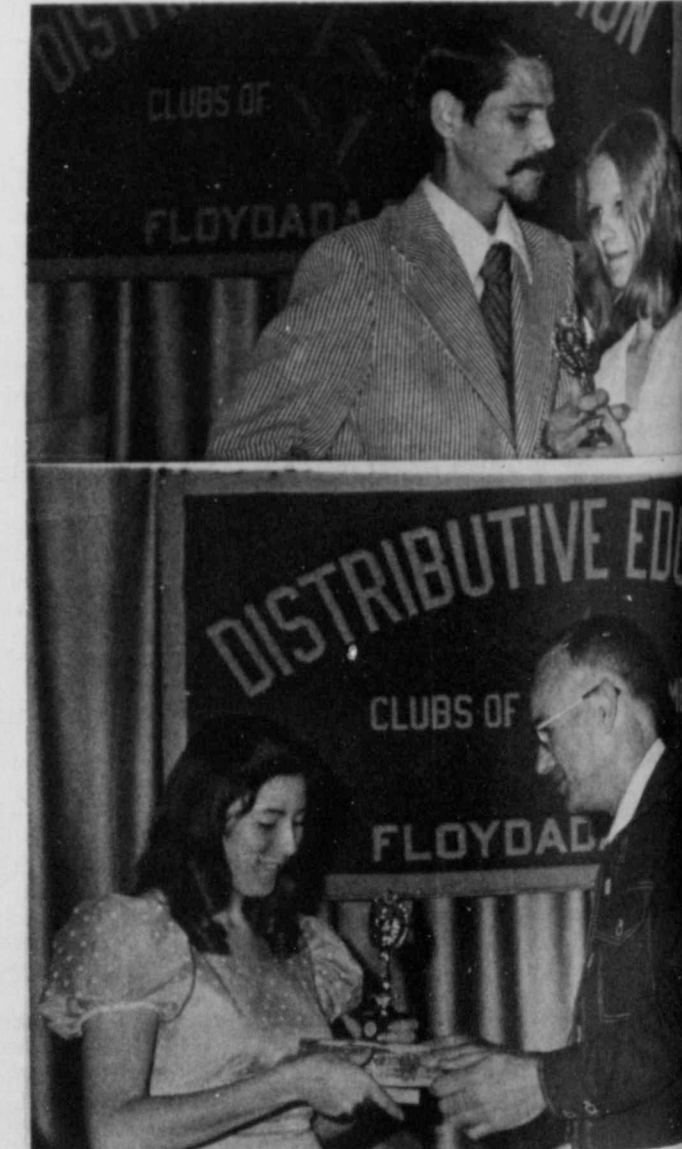
B. Provide new members with information about the functions of the Chamber of Commerce.

A well known Floyd County civic leader and educator died last night after a lengthy illness Monday.

Funeral rites were held at the City Park Church of Christ Tuesday afternoon. Officiating was Pastor Patton, minister of the church. Coffman of Lubbock, and Tidwell, pastor of the Methodist Church.

Bradley was born in Chilton, Tex., and graduated from Texas Tech where he received a business administration degree. He was a veteran of World War II with an armored division and served in the rank of Captain. He was discharged in 1946 and served in the Bradley Orchestra in Lubbock. He was married to Stephens June 28, 1947.

Bradley worked for the Administration before Estacado where he was in charge of the County in March of 1950. He was engaged in farming.

Bradley was a member of the Park Church of Christ and had worked on several committees, including the County Fair Board. He was always in demand for his programs, thus he served as the annual Light House meetings from 1951 until his death.

Survivors include his wife, Sammy of the home. Earl W. Bradley of Lubbock, Tex., and J. Brooks Bradley. Burial was conducted at the County Memorial Park. Pallbearers were Ralph Cardinal, Raymon Martin, Henry Hines and Lawson.

There is no automatic transfer. Applications for transfer may be obtained at the school business office, 208 South Main.

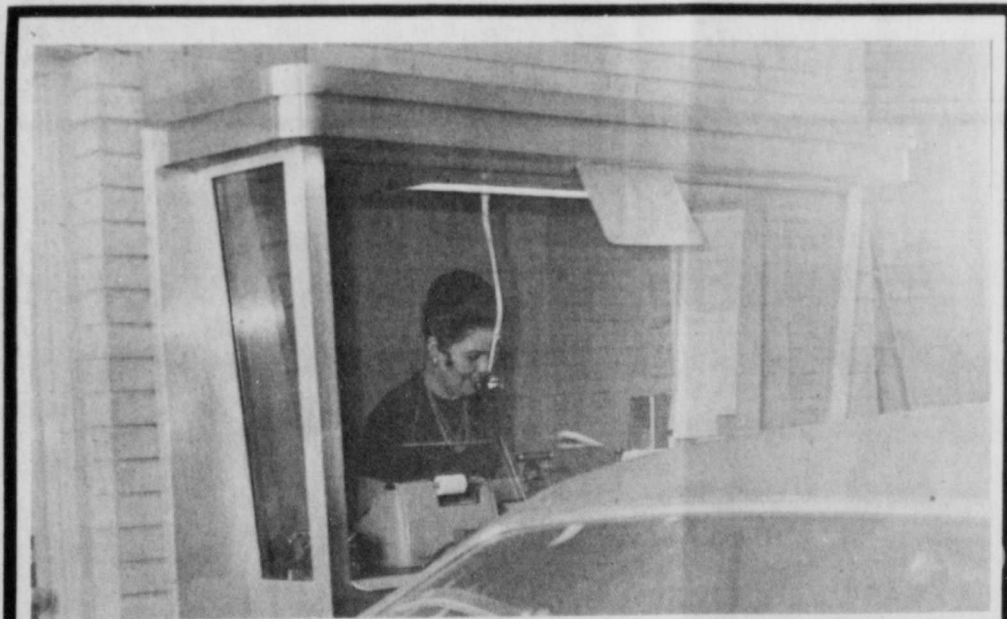
**Il Penseroso

MRS. GREEN TELLS OF JOB CORPS SUCCESS

That's also how Mrs. Charlene Green also feels about the Job Corps. She was trained at the Guthrie, Oklahoma, Job Corps Center and now is a reading instructor.

"I remember I was 17 and hadn't completed high school in Somerville, Texas, when I heard about the Job Corps and applied," Mrs. Green says.

The 25-year-old mother of four children eventually got her high school degree and graduated in May, 1974, from Langston University where she majored in elementary education.

"Attending Job Corps was very exciting," Mrs. Green remembers. "We worked hard but there were picnics, dances and a Christmas party. Of course, there were a few bad eggs. But there are a few bad eggs anywhere you go."

Charlene says the Job Corps student of today is much the same as she was in 1967.

"I have students who are really determined to make something of themselves," she says. "We talk together about all of their problems, not just reading. If they want to talk, well, I'm here."

Asked what she thought she would be doing if she hadn't been trained by the Job Corps, Mrs. Green said: "Oh, I'd probably still be rocking and sewing back in Somerville."

Vera Mabry, 19, is an example of the true grit attitude of Job Corps graduates asking for a new start in life.

The mother of a daughter, a high school dropout and unemployed, Vera lacked the financial means to secure vocational training. This made her eligible, like all the others, to apply for Job Corps.

Vera heard about the Job Corps through a friend. "It sounded so good, I really didn't believe her at first," Vera says. "I decided to see for myself."

As a non-resident, she had to travel 66 miles round trip each day from Claremore to the Tulsa Job Corps Center. She wanted to do this so she could keep her child with her.

Upon entry into the Job Corps, she scored the highest total on Center record on her SAT (Stanford Achievement Test).

They actually pay you to go to school," Vera says. "I got up to \$20 every two weeks. They paid me my gas money. I got \$20 as a clothing allowance and I could eat meals at the center when I wanted to. They even offered to send me to college."

"The Job Corps is a nice bunch of people to work with. They have some problems with a few of the girls—and they should really think twice. It was really a lot of benefit to me."

Vera had to arise at 5 a.m. every day to get to the Tulsa Center. At 17, she had completed her GED (High School Diploma) and a stenographer training and was eligible to enter the BRAC (Brotherhood of Railway, Airline Steamship Clerks) program.

"On the average I make \$41.50 a day at Frisco Railroad," Vera says. "I have worked ten different jobs, including shorthand, typing, filing, key punch, you name it."

"I recently got a raise and have received my high school diploma. I sometimes think about my Job Corps experience and realize that if those people hadn't been as nice as they were, I never would have made it. They go out of their way to help you."

Asked what she would be doing if it wasn't for the Job Corps, Vera says, "If I hadn't gone to the Job Corps I'd be working some place for the minimum wage—if I was lucky."

Those are the stories of a Social Security worker, a mechanic, a reading instructor, and a secretary who made it—without a struggle—thanks to Job Corps.

Plainview Man Teaches Ecuador Indians New Farming Techniques

AGATO, ECUADOR — Three years ago, Peace Corps volunteer Malcolm Walker of Plainview, Texas came to South America to live among the 2,000 Indians of Agato, Ecuador.

With earth, wood and water, he constructed a simple Indian abode which had no running water, electricity or plumbing.

Like the subsistence farmers in the area, he put in a small garden beside his home. But unlike his neighbors who grew corn year after year, Walker's garden contained a variety of new vegetables such as carrots, beets, cabbage and lettuce — plus an abundance of beautiful yellow marigolds.

Walker, who completed his Peace Corps tour in early March, said that when he first began farming there, "The flowers were a real attention-getter. First the women stopped by to ask what the flowers were. During the conversation, I'd begin to talk about the other vegetables I was growing. In turn, the information was passed along to their families and neighbors."

It was Walker's job as a Peace Corps volunteer horticulturist to improve the family gardens in his area by introducing new varieties of vegetables and better gardening methods to local farmers and school children.

His other goals were to devise a better system of crop rotation and to introduce companion planting and organic gardening.

When he first started out, Walker admits, a major part of his work was developing good community relations. The Indian community was poor, but proud. They didn't look kindly upon a stranger coming into their midst telling them that they should change their ways.

Walker first had to prove he knew what he was talking about. Things were slow at first, but as his garden progressed he was able to get 12 families to begin similar ventures.

He explained that although the flowers were the "ice breakers," they were really put in to show the value of companion planting.

Experiments had shown that certain flowers, such as marigolds, could be interplanted with vegetables to help retard germs and insects that attack food crops.

The strong roots of the flowers are able to fight certain germs and keep the vegetables from being overwhelmed. Also, the colorful blossoms of the flowers attract insects away from the vegetable plants.

His work helped to show that these findings held true for Ecuador.

Walker didn't try to introduce irrigation in Agato because water is in short supply much of the year. However, he did encourage farmers to use organic fertilizers to improve their crops and to cultivate their land better.

Periodically, he would hold conferences for farmers so they could see his vegetable garden and hear about various techniques they could try.

About once every two weeks, Walker would go to the school to see how the children were coming along with their garden projects.

The school garden was one of his first projects after he became accepted in the community. He asked school officials to let the "future farmers" of Agato plant a garden for the school.

When his plan was accepted, Walker began teaching the children the basics of farming. Now, the kids help with all phases of the gardening — preparing the soil, planting the seeds, hoeing and harvesting.

Walker extended his original two-year Peace Corps tour by an additional year in March, 1974. He hoped that his additional work would ingrain the new farming methods so that the Indian community would continue them after he'd gone.

He feels they will and that he has helped the people of Agato permanently improve their diets and farming habits.

A native of Plainview, Walker is the son of Mrs. R.C. Walker of 2601 West 11th St., Plainview. He graduated from Plainview High School in 1967. He attended the University of Texas in Austin for a year and graduated in 1971 from Texas Technological University in Lubbock with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering.

During summer vacations he worked for Walker Bros. Produce Co. in Plainview as a farm hand and for the Grubbs Consulting Engineer firm as a field engineer.

Walker was one of 230 Peace Corps volunteers serving in Ecuador in agricultural, health, education and special placement programs. Around the world about 7,900 Peace Corps volunteers and trainees are serving in 68 developing countries.

The Peace Corps is part of ACTION, the federal agency for volunteer service established in July, 1971 to administer volunteer programs at home and overseas. Mike Balzano is director of ACTION.

\$11 Million To Protect Waterfowl

AUSTIN—A 1975 water bank program aimed at helping preserve waterfowl habitat has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

More than \$11 million tentatively has been made available for the program to be concentrated in the north central, west of Red River and Mississippi River waterfowl flyways.

The program, first conducted in 1972, compensates participating farmers for maintaining wetlands and providing additional habitat for nesting and brooding places of migratory waterfowl.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said state, federal and private conservation wildlife agencies will be consulted to assure coordination of the program.

The USDA Agriculture and Conservation Service administers the water bank with planning assistance and technical services provided by the Soil Conservation Service.

Honey Bees May Be Aid To Soybeans

Honey bees could play an important role in science's quest to develop hybrid soybeans.

Long recognized for its pollination of about a hundred crops ranging from alfalfa to cucumbers, the bee up until recently was thought to be of little benefit to soybeans which are self-pollinating.

However, agricultural researchers in Wisconsin noted that bees increased yields of certain soybean varieties that were being grown in caged plots by as much as 16%.

Other varieties were not noticeably affected, however. Now scientists are screening several hundred varieties to test their appeal to honey bees and their potential for higher yields through bee pollination. These results are expected to aid plant breeders in developing new varieties, and be of special help in programs that require use of hybridization.

The process of hybridizing soybeans was recently made feasible by a team of scientists
