



A SCHOOL TEACHER AT KRESS makes a good point in comparing the Governor's salary with school teacher salaries. Here's what she says:

"With the upcoming teacher pay raise issue being discussed statewide, I have been confused about Gov. Briscoe's reasons for being against a substantial pay raise for Texas teachers that would at least bring their salaries to the national average.

"As you know Texas teachers' salaries rate 38th in the nation, meaning that 37 other states pay their teachers more than Texas does. I wondered how our Governor's salary compared nationally and I found that only one state pays more. New York pays \$85,000 while Texas is second paying \$60,000. (These figures can be found in World Book Encyclopedia 1973 edition. Salaries could have been increased since then and do not allow for any fringe benefits such as travel allowances.) If he drew a salary comparable to Texas teachers he would draw \$27,500, or less than one half of his present salary.

"I doubt if our present governor is so much concerned with the amount of his salary as he would be embarrassed and discouraged by losing the prestige of being number 38 instead of number 2...and in our affluent state of Texas."

# "You could see 200 windmills"

"You could see 200 windmills from atop the elevator," was a statement made by Calvin Steen to Jr. High student Brenda Jackson this week. The occasion for the statement was the demolishing of a Floydada landmark, the old elevator just north of the Producer's elevators.

Steen told Brenda the elevator was built in 1912 by the Barkenmyer Brothers, who came to Floydada from Kansas. It held 100,000 bushels of grain. The elevator handled grain and

It is believed to have been at one

time the tallest structure in Floyd county. The elevator was sold to Henry Edwards in 1913. In about 1960 it was sold to Producers.

Producer's manager Bill Cagle said for many many years the size of the grain dump was small as it needed to handle only a wagon, which was pulled into the elevator by a team of horses or

Steen said he worked for the elevator some 29 years.

The almost 200,000 pages of records also contain the correspondence of the executive officers of the railroad. "Such information reveals corporate strategy," he said, "and that is one of the things that intrigues me most, especially if you can contrast strategy with what you see in the local

newspaper."
Also included are data on train wrecks, law suits and labor disputes.

Dr. Hofsommer said that "the study of short line railroading is important. Short lines were built either as a realistic way of providing transportation needs, or as a pest, with the hope that a major line would pick them up."

Other railroad materials available on film at the Tech repository are related to the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific; the Texas and Pacific; The Fort Worth and Denver, and the Sante Fe railroads, Murrah said.

# Wylie And Roberts Attend Houston Meet

Arthur L. Wylie and Lindell Roberts, both of the Swifty Systems in Floydada, have returned home after attending the annual convention of the Texas Oil Marketers Association in Houston, ending Friday night (Apr. 18).

They reported that a near-record attendance of more than 1,000 oil and gasoline wholesalers, distributors and suppliers heard discussions on energy prob-

One of the speakers, new Association president Kenneth Peeler of Midland, said Washington blunders on energy matters have contributed substantially to both inflation and the recession.

"There seems to be more interest in the nation's capital on how to win the next election than on action needed to encourage the development of domestic oil reserves and reduce costly foreign imports," he said.

Retiring President Jack Robertson of Corpus Christi said a tariff and added gasoline taxes would discriminate against motorists, particularly those in sparcely-populated areas of the State. If more taxes are to be placed on gasoline, then the tax should be shared with consumers of other petroleum products. "The energy crisis is the problem of all Americans, not just one segment, the gasoline

consumer," he said.



# Mt. Blanco Community To Be Honored

Plans were announced Thursday by Committee Chairman Edmund Brown, a resident of the community and a direct descendant of Hank and Elizabeth Smith, the community's first reside-

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measured 27 x 24 inches.

by the Texas Historical Commission in October, 1971 for the Best Recorded Program of Work for that year. Verna Anne Wheeler was then Chairman of the Crosby County Historical

Committee.

The following year the County committee chose Mount Blanco as the proposed site to erect the marker and an intense research project was begun on a history of the area.


A 68-page history was compiled by the Pioneer Memorial Museum staff which included a 21-page history written by Fannie Matthews Green, Floydada. The history was approved
