THE FACTS OF ARTHRITIS....

Maybe You Have It And Don't Know!

Arthritis - the nation's number one crippling disease, will be the subject of a Public Forum to be held at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium at Floydada tonight. The forum is being sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and the Plains Division, West Texas Chapter, of The Arthritis Foundation, according to Mrs. Sharon Hillis, extension agent.

Statistics released by The Arthritis Foundation indicate that one out of 10 Americans has arthritis in some form and that 250,000 children are stricken each year.

Arthritis is not just an "old folks" disease, but strikes at any age, from birth to age 30 or 40. Almost 2 million Texans suffer from the more than 100 forms of arthritis.

Dr. Charles Seward of Amarillo, associate professor, Department of Rheumatology Texas Tech University School of Medicine, will discuss the various kinds of arthritis and its symptoms, diagnosis and treatment. A native Oklahoman, Dr. Seward is a graduate of Central State University and the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine. He is a member of Potter-Randall County Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, American Medical Association and the Texas Rheumatism Association. The author of numerous papers on internal medicine, he is currently chairman of the Medical Board of the West Texas Chapter.

The Forum planning committee includes Mrs. Hillis, County Extension Agent; Mrs. Clay Henry and Mrs. R. G. Dunlap, Women's Division of Floydada Chamber of Commerce; Ricky Burns and Doug Frazier, board of director and manager, respectively of Floydada Chamber of Commerce; Doyle Warren, County Extension Agent; Kathy Green of the Multi-Purpose Service Center in Floydada; Sandy Taylor of the Il Penseroso Study Club of Lockney; and J. K. Holmes, County Judge.

Also participating on the panel will be Dr. Lester Wolcott, chairman of the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at TTUSM. Dr. Wolcott is a physiatrist, and will speak on the importance of physical therapy in the treatment of arthritis. The public is urged to attend this free meeting and

to take advantage of the information about arthritis.

Anyone desiring to tape the entire program may do so to be presented to organizations or for their own information.

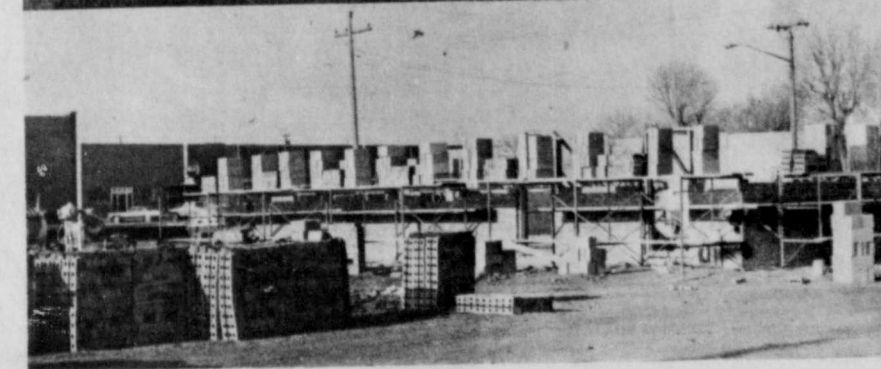

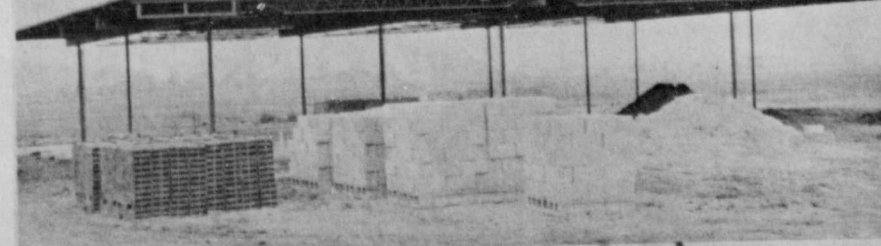

Fitness Program Means Good Jobs For Many Women

Having the will to do a task is important, but having the physical stamina is also necessary, and often more difficult. Many women are running into this problem as they take on jobs previously limited to men.

To remedy the situation, Harry Dailey and Ann Topping were asked to develop for the Ohio Bell Company an "occupational fitness program" for installers and other outside plant forces.

The Ohio Bell program, possibly the only one of its kind in the country, seeks to develop the physical abilities required by craft personnel to do the job adequately. It is designed primarily but not exclusively for women.

Participants jog, do sit-ups, hold ladders and other job-related tools, climb poles, and exercise on a universal gym.

According to Mr. Dailey, results of the five-month old program have been excellent. The high failure rate for women in outside plant jobs has dropped drastically. "Women who, in the past, might have been unsuccessful in an outside plant job are now performing that job in an entirely satisfactory and commendable manner."

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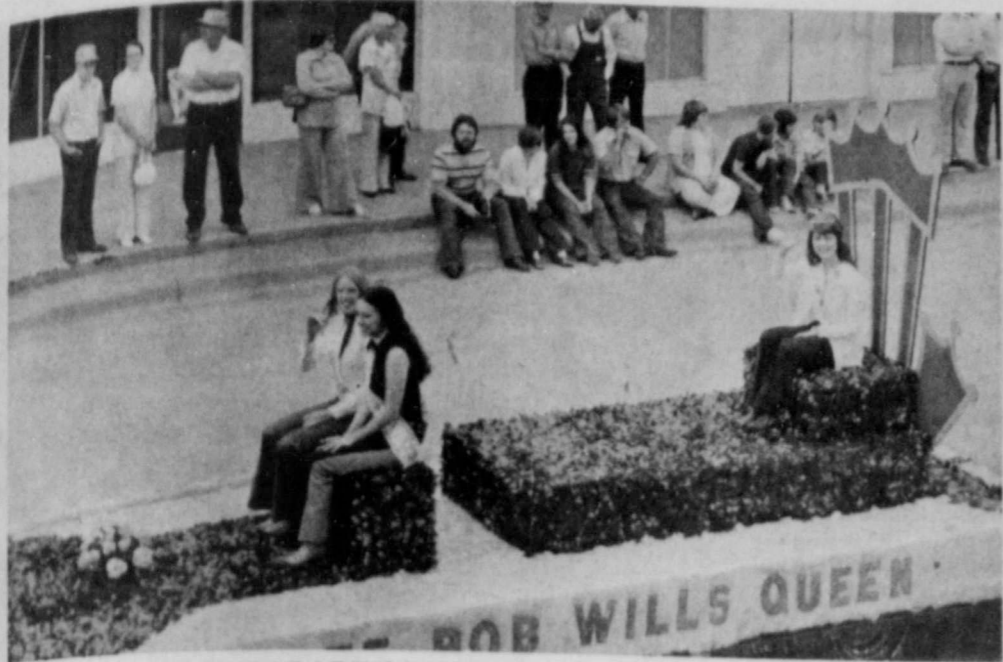

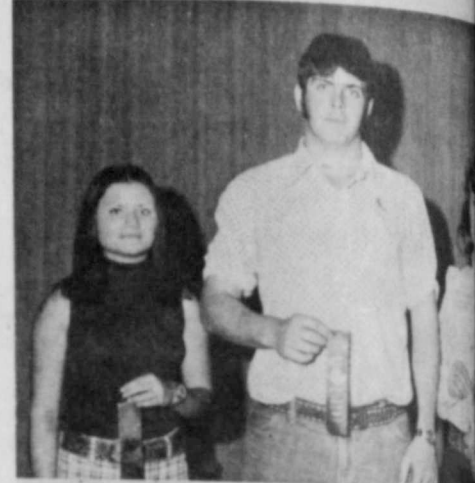
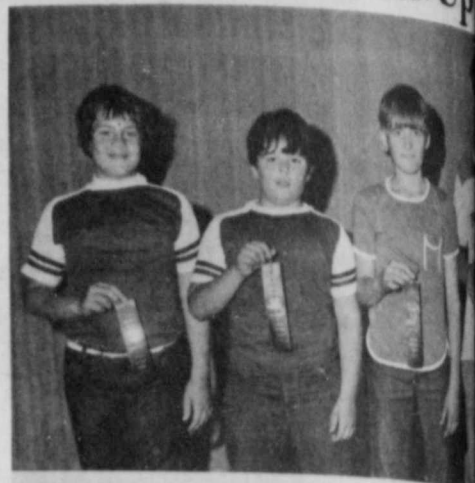
Mark Beedy, Greg Pruitt, Rodney Ratheal and Kelly Marble were the Junior Dairy team which placed third in the contest.

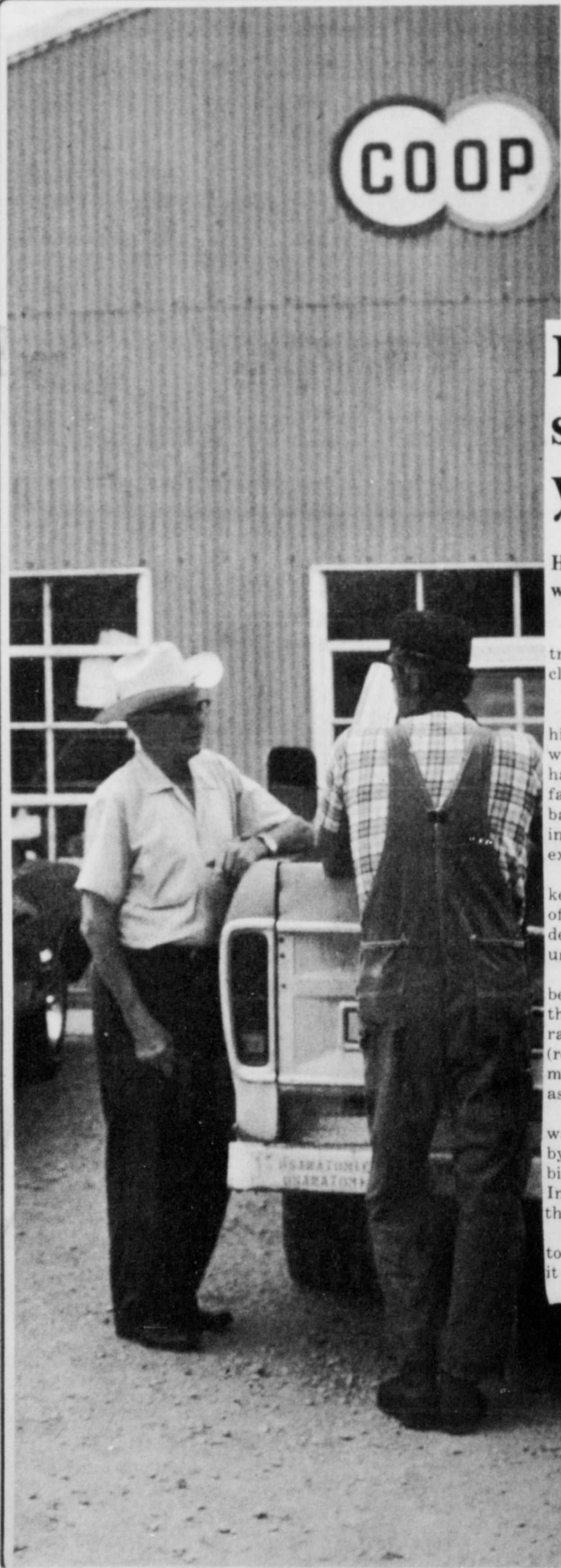

"Our state tax dollars should not be spent elsewhere when Texans are in need of support during hard economic times," Cates noted.

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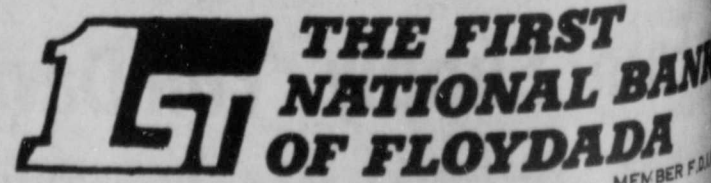

College, Vocational, Hobby Classes Now Available In Floydada

College, vocational and hobby classes will be organized for Floydada area people by the staff of South Plains Junior College Regional Occupation Center.

Leon Harris, of the Center, met with the local steering committee recently. "Advanced education of the future will not be tied to huge, sprawling, expensive college campuses," he said. "The trend over the nation is to utilize a central administration office and send teachers out to communities on request. Instead of spending local tax money building Floydada a community college, why not let an existing college pay your school a fee for recycling your buildings at night and during summers?"

The Bicentennial Committee of the Floyd County Historical Museum initiated the interest survey to determine which courses are preferred. The Floydada High School Student Council distributed the questionnaire throughout the schools this week.

Vocational and college courses are open to anyone age seventeen years and older. Hobby courses may be taken by any age group and only twelve people are required to start a class. College credit course grades

are transferable to other colleges, and work previously completed at other colleges will be accepted for class admission here. Two years of college work can be completed in the program.

College credit course fees will be: 3 hours - \$58; 6 hours

- \$76; 9 hours - 105; and 12 hours - \$140.

Hobby courses are lower priced, depending on the subject. These prices do not include books or fees, only tuition. Grants and loans are available to students of family income up to \$15,000 adjusted income. Mr. Harris urges all students to apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, as over \$2 billion dollars in federal money for Texas students was turned back to the federal government last year because no one bothered to apply for it. Adults as well as teen-agers

may qualify for grants.

Copies of the subject survey may be acquired at the museum. Results of the survey will be tallied May 12. Prospective students should indicate whether they prefer high school, college, vocational or hobby classes and give their name and address before returning the paper to a school or the museum. Everyone in the Floydada area is invited to participate. Classes will begin this summer.
