Natural Gas Hearing Vital To Agriculture

To determine the future of natural gas for irrigation until the third annual Double Day hearing, one of three hearings, will be at Lubbock, it was announced last week.

There will be no curtailment of natural gas for irrigation until the hearings are over and the initial decision is reached by an administrative law judge, according to a spokesman in the Washington office of Sen. John Tower of Texas. The future of natural gas as a farm fuel has been in question since the Federal Power Commission issued a ruling last December which lowered the use of natural gas for agriculture from second to third priority.

Although that decision applied only to customers of El Paso Natural Gas Company, observers believe the action will eventually result in curtailment of natural gas as a farm fuel throughout the United States. Spokesmen for agriculture feel such curtailment would have a devastating effect on production of food and fiber. Officers and staff of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, headquartered in Lubbock, have

worked full time since the December ruling to block the curtailment and have sought to move the hearings from Washington to the Southwest where farmers will be hardest hit by loss of natural gas. Working with the Plains Gas Users Association and Southwest Consumers Association, GSPA spokesmen have continually stressed the technical and economic impossibility of converting irrigation to alternate fuel sources.

GSPA vice president Mabry Foreman of Felt, Okla. and research director Jack King have met regularly with legislators in Washington, personnel of the FPC, representatives of the Federal Energy Agency and U.S. Department of Agriculture, attempting to demonstrate the impossibility of converting commonly used automotive irrigation engines from natural gas to gasoline or propane.

A study by Dr. James Osborn of Texas Tech University indicates conversion to gasoline would increase hourly fuel costs 320 per cent for 150 h.p. engine. Conversion to propane, according to the study would increase hourly costs 282 per cent.

The annual cost of a 3,000 hour irrigation season on the same 150 h.p. engine would jump from \$3,570 for natural gas to \$15,000 for gasoline and \$13,650 for propane, according to the study.

WHERE ARE THE MAY RAINS?

The first Floyd load of wheat came to market May 30 last year and the price was around \$3.25 per bushel...and the crop production was the poorest in many years.

Now...this year, even with no rainfall in the month of May so far, the dry land wheat is holding up considerably well, and still promises to make an above average crop. Tuesday the price was \$3.10 to \$3.20 per bushel.

The national forecast is for a bumper wheat crop.

Would a good rain still help the wheat? Most elevator operators think, if it comes within the next week, it could help the yield. Elevator

operators also estimate this year's crop to be harvested about a week later than last year.

Back in the fall, when the cotton and grain sorghum farmers were watching their harvests ruined with rain, rain, rain...some were optimistic enough to say, "this will surely help our wheat crop."

It is supposed to rain in May? Well, back in 1927 and 1931 there was none reported in Floydada. However, the last ten years the rainfall report shows that it did rain in May: 1974, 1.40; 1973, 1.17; 1972, 4.62; 1971, 4.17; 1970, 1.41; 1969, 7.24; 1968, 2.88; 1967, 4.38; 1966, 2.01 and 1965, 1.47.

State Tax Low in N.H., Sky-High in Hawaii

The average per capita state tax reached \$352 in 1974, up \$225 from 1964, reports the Tax Foundation, Inc.

Bureau of the Census data shows Hawaii's residents paying the top per capita state tax of \$584. Other high states are Delaware, \$538; Minnesota, \$470; and New York, \$470.

States with low per person state taxes are New Hampshire, \$204; South Dakota, \$243; and Ohio, \$260.

Clean Air Act Needs Changes

The National Association of Manufacturers has told Congress that the Clean Air Act is in serious need of amendment to avoid a "collision course" involving energy supplies, social and economic dislocations, and total environmental impacts.

Dr. J. William Haun, Vice President and Director of Engineering of General Mills, Inc. and Chairman of NAM's Environmental Quality Committee, testified for the NAM on proposals to amend the Clean Air Act.

The NAM spokesman said the Clean Air Act should be continued but needs flexibility because "overkill of an air pollution problem can cause an excessive solid waste problem; handling a solid waste problem can create an air pollution problem; or a water pollution problem; and handling a water pollution problem can create a solid waste problem."

Some serious talk about West Texas gas

Adding Up Our Vietnamese Bill

...the next domino to fall in South-east Asia because of America's "abandonment" of an ally — and some people will — remind them of this unpleasant fact: far from discouraging communist aggressive designs, the United States has inadvertently made North Vietnam one of the most formidable military powers for its size in the world.

Item: Thanks to American-made additions, North Vietnam can field at least 1,000 tanks — five times the number Thailand has and about as many as Great Britain.

Item: The Communists have captured more than 1,000 large American artillery pieces; \$500 million in spare parts and engines for everything from Jeeps to fighter-bombers; up to \$300 million in ammunition; \$20 million in fuel and lubricants.

All told, according to one Pentagon estimate, North Vietnam has fallen heir to some \$5 billion worth of weapons and supplies. It is not clear whether or not this includes the \$1 billion worth abandoned virtually intact by the South Vietnamese army in its headlong flight at the beginning of the debacle — but does it matter?

In addition, North Vietnam now owns, compliments of the American taxpayer, one of the finest deep-water ports in the world at Cam Ranh Bay, plus elsewhere in South Vietnam oil tanks, warehouses, barracks, air fields, hospitals, ad infinitum et nauseum.

Without an air force throughout the long war, North Vietnam may also wind up with a sizeable one, depending upon whether the United States can get back the scores of planes flown to Thailand by fleeing whether that understandably jittery country turns them over to the "new government" in South Vietnam, as it has indicated it will.

save the Navy. A gyroscope, once set in motion, will always keep its axis pointed in one direction no matter how much it's moved. Dr. Sperry's new gyroscope compass would always point due north.

Having fixed the Navy's directions, Sperry went to work on its steering. The ability of the gyroscope to stay on such an even keel was used to create an automatic pilot that kept things going in the right direction. Dr. Sperry also developed a gyro to stabilize the ships. It counter-balanced each wave as it hit. Later, he improved ship stabilization by installing a set of gyroscopically controlled fins below the waterline.

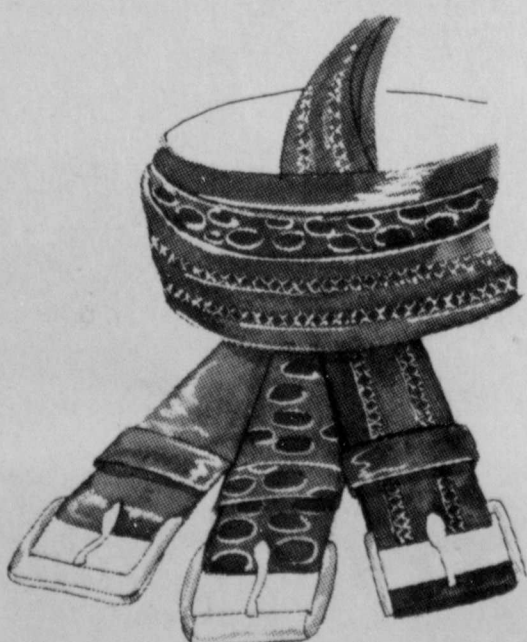

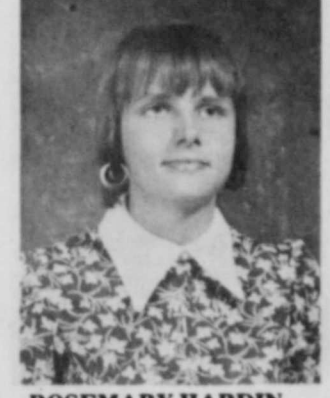

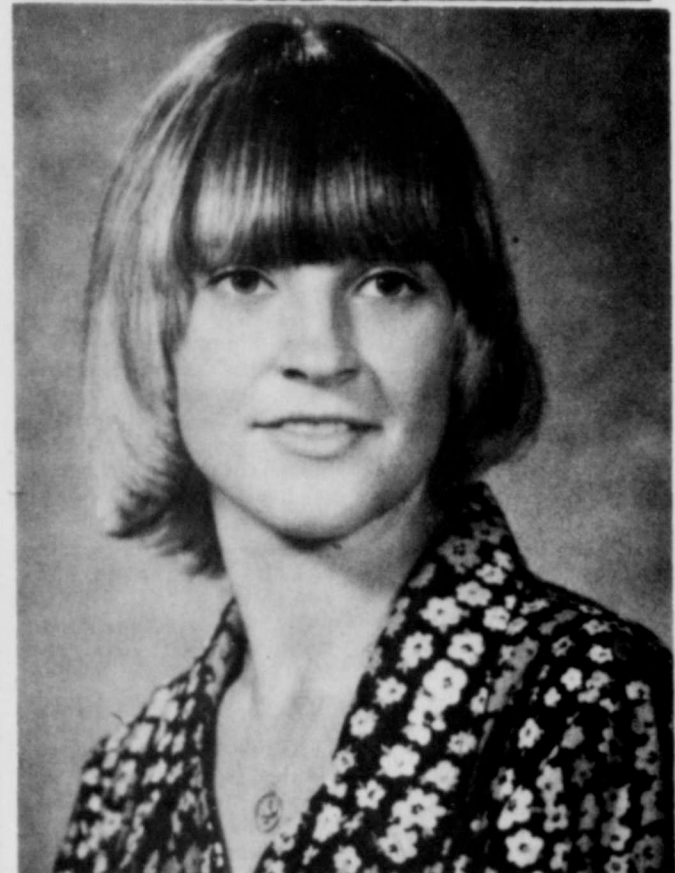

Sometimes when the New Testament doctrine of the 'necessity of obedience' is taught, many people misunderstand and think that when obedience is performed that it means they merit - deserve the reward of forgiveness or heaven eternally.

This is a grave mistake to think obedience merits, deserves salvation or that God owes you because you have obeyed. It is a greater mistake to DISCREDIT obedience and its importance just to "prove" you cannot merit or deserve God's blessing in forgiveness or heaven.

Jesus answered this point once and for all: Luke 17:10 "So likewise ye, when you shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say, We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do."

And Matthew 19:25, 26 When his disciples heard it they were exceedingly amazed, saying, Who then can be saved? But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible." Thus Ephesians 2:8 teaches that salvation is "by grace through faith" and "it is the GIFT of God".

And at the same time Jesus settled another point: "If a man love me, HE WILL KEEP MY WORDS; and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him." (John 14:23) and in John 15:10 & "If you keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his love...You are my friends, if you do whatsoever I command you."

This does not nullify salvation as "the gift of God"; neither does it mean we merit - deserve salvation. Obedience does not take away past sin (which is the transgression of the law of God - I John 3:4), it keeps you from more sin. If there is only one sin (and who has only one?) it requires the blood of Jesus to take it away and our trust in his blood to remove it as well obedience (to the command to repent and be baptized or repent and pray if one is a child of God.) Therefore obedience to the will of God is still required and does not of itself merit salvation.

THUS: Hebrews 5:8, 9 "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered. And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him."

AND Deuteronomy 7:9 "Know therefore that the Lord thy God, he is God, the faithful God, which keepeth covenant and mercy with them that love him and keep his commandments to a thousand generations."

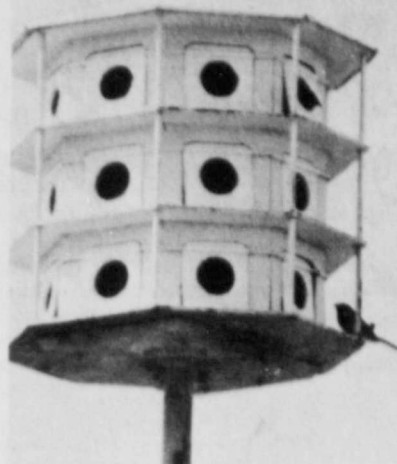

Certify early to get the best service of GI Bill checks is the advice offered to the veterans not now enrolled in college but who intend to attend summer school or the fall term by Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Office Director.

Coker said the Veterans Administration can have the veteran's first GI Bill check waiting for him at his school at the start of the school term if he completes his certification early.

Veterans can contact the campus VA "Vet Rep" or the VA Regional Office in Waco. Most of the veterans who attended college during the 1975 fall term are already certified to receive their benefits as they continue into the summer or fall terms.

VA's main concern is the veteran starting college under the GI Bill for the first time or those who attended previously and are starting again this summer or fall. They must be certified for school benefits if they want an advance GI Bill check when school starts.

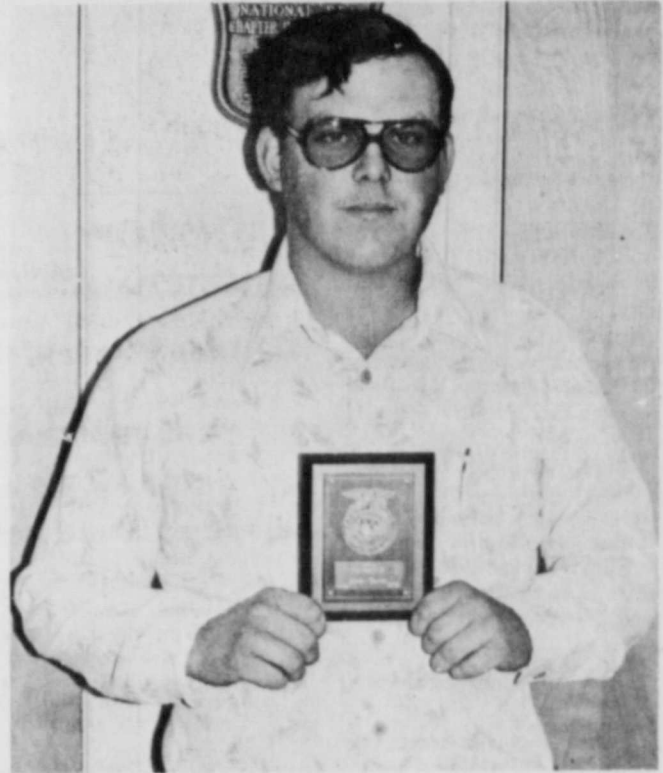
John David Mitchell Receives Law Degree

Phil Cates Favors Rape Bill

AUSTIN (Special). State Representative Phil Cates says he is supporting legislation that would limit courtroom interrogations of rape victims, thereby strengthening the rape laws. "I also favor this bill because it redefines rape to

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include situations where the victim submits because of a threat of injury, either real or implied," Cates said.

"This piece of legislation also lengthens the possible period between crime and indictment to cover cases in which a person confesses to a rape or is arrested years after the offense," Cates said.

"Certainly, there is a need to tighten up the laws that allow rapists and habitual criminals to get off for crimes they should be punished for," Cates said.

"I would continue to hope that we could educate and rehabilitate those we can, especially the first offenders so that they will be able to fit into society, once they have paid for their crime," Cates said in summation.

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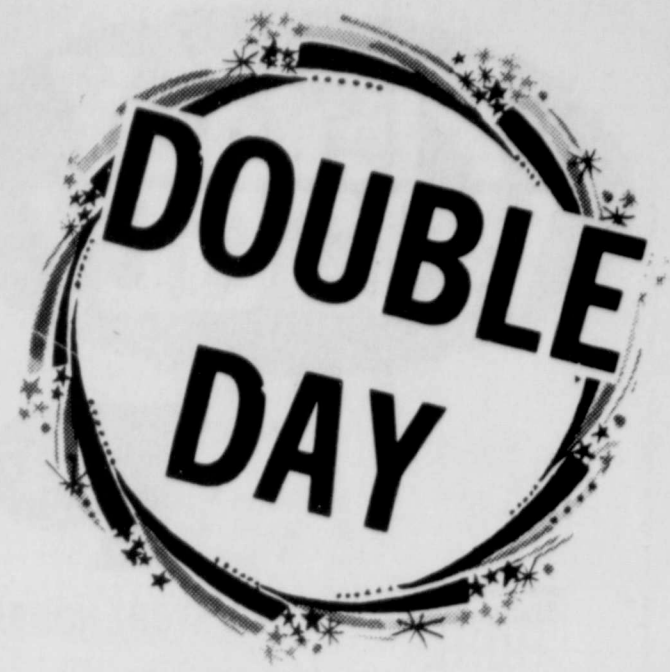
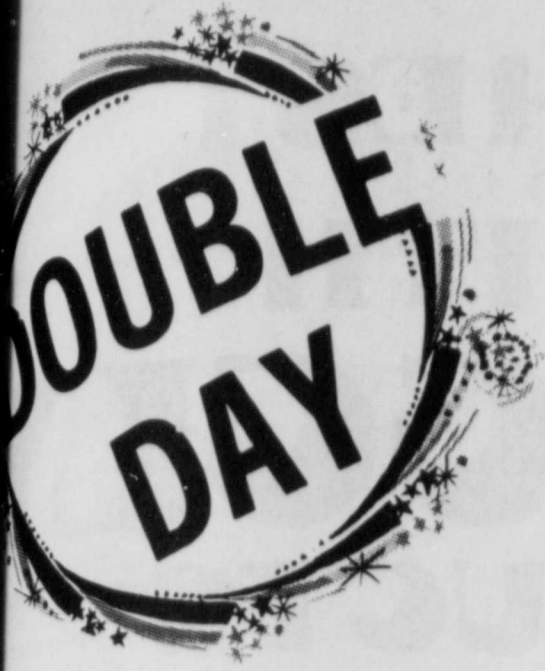

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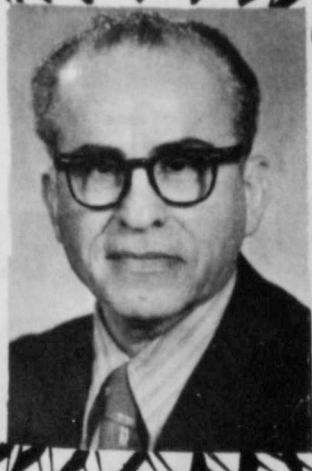
