SPEAKER

A lady who came to Floyd County 70 years ago Mrs. G. C. (Felicia) Applewhite will be the featured speaker at 11 a.m. Saturday.

She retired from school teaching at Lockney in 1973 after 32 years of service, and is known not only in Floyd county, but all over this area.

Her topic will be "I Remember".

Pioneer and traditional songs will be sung at 11:30. The noon barbecue will be served on the square. Exhibition square dancing begins at 1 p.m. The big parade begins at 2:30, followed by the style show at 3:30 p.m.

A string band from Lockney will play during the noon barbecue lunch on the courthouse lawn. Complimentary tickets to the barbecue will be given to all persons who have lived in Floyd or adjoining counties for 50 years.

Sponsors of the barbecue are: Consumers Fuel Assn. of Floydada, Lockney Cooperatives, Floydada Cooperative Gins, Lighthouse Electric Cooperative and the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

The Athena Study Club of Lockney will present the style show, and the wild flower displays will be in the museum.

Over the past weekend the rainless month of May began to get a little damp as Sunday afternoon and Sunday night rain storms swept across the county. It seems that everyone got a lot of wind...some got rain, some got hail.

The southern part of Floyd got the most rain beginning with an inch just south of Floydada and getting up to four inches at Cone where a cloudburst storm of some four inches were received Sunday afternoon and Monday morning.

Good rain from an inch to an inch and a half came to the Lakeview and Dougherty areas. Monday morning South Plains area received a lot of wind and hail, but not much moisture.

In the north part of the county Herman King had a barn to blow away, and Lockney residents experienced some tornado alerts Saturday night. Some of the area round Lockney received about an inch of rain.

The rain will still help the wheat crop...a little. Some young row crops were blown out, by the storms, some were old enough for the beneficial rains to help.

Very little hail was reported in the McCoy area where over an inch of good moisture was reported.

Sandhill Man Dies Of Gunshot Wounds

George Phillip Gatewood, 55, Sandhill farmer, died enroute to a Lubbock hospital Wednesday morning about 9:45. He had been taken by Caprock Hospital Ambulance service early Sunday morning to Caprock Hospital following a reported altercation in the Gatewood home early Sunday.

Floyd County sheriff Bud Rainey said he had been unable to visit with Mrs. Gatewood who is under sedation in Caprock Hospital.

Gatewood was a native of Fort Worth, born November 15, 1919. He and Genie Hope were married in April of 1945 in Lubbock. They resided in Petersburg some 18 years before moving to Floyd County two years ago.

Gatewood was a veteran of World War II, a member of the VFW and American Legion.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Joe (Linda) Lamb of Littlefield; two brothers, Harvey Gatewood of Seminole and Otis Gatewood of Vienna, Austria; a sister, Mrs. Vela Garrett of Lubbock and one grandchild.

Funeral rites are tentatively planned for 2 p.m. Friday, May 23rd in Resthaven-Singleton-Wilson Funeral Home Chapel in Lubbock with Dr. Floyd C. Bradley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Floydada officiating.

Burial will be in Meadow Cemetery at Meadow with military graveside services. Moorer-Rose Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements.

Cottonseed Receiving Greater Use

PHOENIX-Cottonseed has potential for much greater use in the food industry as the result of new developments already commercialized, according to National Cotton Council President C. L. Denton, Jr. While oil from the seed has been one of the top quality vegetable oils in American diets for more than a century, Denton says the cotton industry now appears to be on the verge of seeing a significant part of its meal also going directly into human food products and greatly increasing their protein content.

He explained that this is possible through the use of glandless seed or by removal of the gossypol-containing gland of the cottonseed. The Council president praised members of the National Cottonseed Products Association at their meeting here today for leadership in these efforts and said the move would become increasingly important to the entire cotton industry.

Denton reported that a detailed study of economic and market aspects of cottonseed protein-being made by the Council's market research staff in close cooperation with the Association - will be completed about mid-year.

Turning to government regulations affecting the cotton industry, he said efforts are being made to see that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration director and his staff fully understand all the implications of cotton dust standards that have been imposed and are being considered.

While inspections and citations on cotton dust made at some seed-crushing plants in March have now been withdrawn as a result of these efforts, the Council president said gins and other plants also are being considered for coverage under a cotton dust standard.

And it's pointed out that individuals in big cities are exposed to more situations involving fear, anger and other stress-producing stimuli that frequently have ill effects on mental and emotional well-being. But there is also another side of the coin. An extensive study sponsored by the National Institute of Mental Health and the Foundations Fund for Psychiatric Research indicates that many people find the small town's "prying eyes and clacking tongues" oppressive, and that for them the city's more tolerant attitude provides marked psychological benefits.

Knows Why New York City Is Confronted With Financial Ruin



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm takes a long-distance view of New York this week, we think.

Dear editor: According to something I saw on television the other night, later confirmed by the newspapers-I always wait to make sure - New York City is almost financially busted.

It takes a billion dollars a month to run the city, that much revenue isn't coming in, and if the Federal government doesn't lend or give - generally it's the same thing - the city a billion and a half dollars right away the city won't be able to pay its bills.

The more you think about this the more it makes you scratch your head. New York, we've been led to believe, is the intellectual, financial and talent center of the United States. It has all the big financial houses, Wall Street, the stock exchanges, the capital. It has most of the big publishing firms, television networks, the national magazines, the editors, the art museums, the big writers. In short, it's supposed to have almost a monopoly on the brains of the country.

Yet it can't pay its bills. This is ridiculous, I told myself. Then I got to thinking. Sure, New York has a lot of brains - not all the brains, even if it thinks it has - but they may not necessarily be in

charge of the city.

I mean, stop and think, how many cities and towns can you name, not counting Lockney and Floydada, of course, that invariably elect the smartest men to run the place? How many state legislatures are there that represent the top brains of that state? How many Governors, how many Presidents. . .but wait a minute, this narrows it down too uncomfortably, you're not going to catch me in that kind of a corner.

In other words, sometimes there seems to be a marked difference between the people's brains and the people's government, and numerous remedies have been suggested over the years. The most often stated one is that public office doesn't attract the top brains because they can earn more in private works, and politicians are therefore always saying that if you'll raise the salary of office you'll get a better quality of office-holder.

The only trouble with this is that when we raise the salaries, the same people turn up running again for the same office.

On the other hand, there are those who say people get about as good a government as they can produce, that if the people who complain the most about their government were in charge of it, things would be about like they are now. Don't ask me the answer, Yours faithfully, J.A.

Two Rural Accidents In April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of April, 1975, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1975 shows a total of 14 accidents resulting in no persons killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department

of Public Safety Region for April, 1975 shows a total of 425 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 251 persons injured as compared to April, 1974 with 390 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 35 more accidents, one less killed, and 33 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 18 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1975 occurred in the following counties: four in Lubbock; two each in Bailey, Clay, and Garza; and one each in Hockley, Wise, Yoakum, Briscoe, Castro, Hartley, Ochiltree, and Potter.

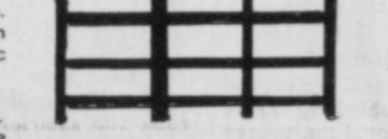

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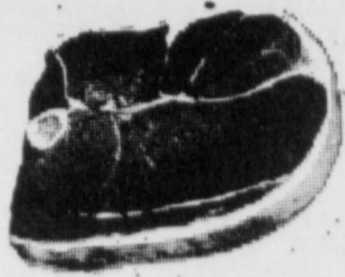
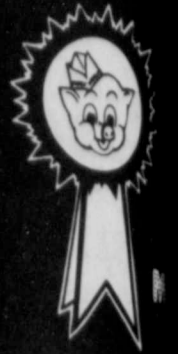
